## Executive Message

#### Dear Members & Benefactors,

We have been in the process of discussing the addition of a structure in the area behind our synagogue for quite a few months now. The idea of an outdoor complimentary structure was suggested by Jennette Ginsburg who has advocated for the biblical garden, along with Rabbi Feivel; both have gotten it off to a great start. Our giant fig tree produces an abundance of fruit every year, and we have also planted pomegranates and olive trees as well. More vegetation planning is being considered for the future.

Phase two, and the most expensive plan of the Biblical Garden Orchard, is to add a professionally constructed, aesthetically pleasing structure that can have a dual purpose for providing shade for outdoor events such as meetings, classes, meals, and services, while replacing the dinosaur sukkah we assemble and disassemble every year on Sukkot. The sukkah assembly and disassembly takes several of us not-getting-any-younger-folks to transfer from the storage shed, put together, take down, and schlep back to the storage unit every year. It's served us well but is ready to be retired.

What I have suggested is a pergola that would be able to serve both purposes. If you don't know what a pergola is, look around Shreveport and you see them everywhere—especially in people's backyards. It's a wooden structure with open walls and an open roof made of pillars and beams.

I really believe this addition to our garden will be very beneficial to our congregation, especially since we have so much nice weather in the south. I have contacted Mr. David Boone from the Caddo Sheriff's office who runs the Re-Entry program that teaches Caddo prison inmates skills to find employment after incarceration. He has accepted our request to build a pergola for Agudath Achim. This would help us save thousands of dollars in labor costs. The only costs the Shul would incur are for materials. It's not cheap but is well worth the investment. However, others in the planning want to get estimates from private contractors as well so we can ensure we get the best product for the cost.

Jennette has created a GoFundMe account to help us pay for the garden project and it has already raised about \$1600 from family, friends, and some members of Agudath Achim. Depending on how big we decide to make the pergola, materials will probably be our biggest expense. If you can afford to pitch in a few dollars, I'm asking you to consider contributing to this worthy project that we will all benefit from. To donate, you can send a check to the office and make a note it's for the Garden structure. Also, we are working on making it possible to donate dues and donations online through the synagogue web page at www.agudathshreveport.com. I also want to wish everyone a happy Hanukah starting December 10th. If you need Hanukah candles or gifts, the sisterhood gift shop can sell you both (see p. 5 for gift ideas). Be safe as always.

## Rabbi Sydni's Message

#### Elevating in Sanctity

Beit Shammai says: On the first day, one kindles eight lights, and from then on, gradually decreases [one by one].

Beit Hillel says: On the first day, one kindles one light, and from then on, gradually increases [one by one].

#### ~Talmud Bayli Shabbat 21b

We are living in Beit Hillel's world. On the first night of Hanukah, we dust off our hanukiot and insert one candle to celebrate the beginning of the holiday. On night two, we insert and light two new candles, and so on and so forth.

The Gemara cannot decide whether Rabbi Yosei bar Avin or Rabbi Yosei bar Zevida taught that Shammai's reasoning was according to the Sukkot sacrifices; when the Holy Temple stood, the priests would sacrifice thirteen bulls on the first day and one fewer each day after that. Hanukah was, after all, the Maccabees' substitute celebration for Sukkot, after they were unable to celebrate during the Greek occupation of the Temple.

I'm more interested in Beit Hillel's reading. According to Rabbi Yosei, Beit Hillel reasoned that we must always elevate in sanctity; we must not lower. Accordingly, we increase in light on each night of Hanukah. At the darkest part of our year, Hanukah reminds us to keep pursuing the light, to keep increasing our attempts at everyday holiness. Those

little candles serve as reminders to us to dive even deeper into mitzvot from one day to the next—increasing our donations to the causes we support, expanding our practices of kashrut and prayer, and learning more about our Jewish tradition. As a synagogue, those little candles remind us of how, gradually, we must never settle for as is; instead, we must constantly rethink how to be more inclusive, more inspiring, more righteous in what we offer. As bleak as this time of year or this time in world history may look, Hanukah pushes us towards our obligation to embrace hope, especially in times like these.

Each day of Hanukah, we clear out yesterday's candles and begin anew. Even if we were not able to be our brightest selves yesterday, we have a new chance to pursue greater holiness today. While we may not be perfect in our attempts at sacred living, in Beit Hillel's world, complacence is not an option. This Hanukah, may we embrace the challenge to improve our Jewish practice and our righteousness each and every day. May we look to the light for the strength to know that increasing hope, and even increasing effort towards the good are ideas that our Jewish people have held for thousands of vears.

## Standards for Safety

Just as a reminder, please refrain from coming to the synagogue if you are feeling unwell. Of course, we welcome your presence online.

Community members are encouraged to bring their own face masks, tallitot, and kippot. When walking in the door, people are encouraged to take a face mask, a prayer book, a kippah, a tallit, and an Etz Hayim from a table or two at the front. These can be taken home and brought back to synagogue for future use.

All other prayer books have been removed from the seats.

Congregants and visitors required to wear face masks when in the building.

The social hall, library, and office will be closed.

Every other row is taped off. If it seems necessary for us to have more space, we can open up the partitioned room as well.

During the service, if possible, the Torah and ark are only be handled by Rabbis Feivel and Sydni, who will switch off as Torah readers and singular gabbai (unless someone else wants to leyn). Those coming up for honors or leading parts of the service will stand at the secondary readers stand.

For those who wish to socialize during services, we will keep water bottles, iced coffee, and prepackaged snacks spread out on a table in the lobby.

There will be no bagel breakfast, oneg, or

kiddush lunch after services until it becomes clear that sharing food is not a threat to our health.

Hand sanitizer is on the bimah and in the foyer near the beverages and snacks.

Thank you, Carnell, for keeping surfaces clean between services.

We will continue to offer access to services and classes online for those who do not feel comfortable attending in person. We encourage people who feel unwell or unsafe coming in person to stay at home.

Community members should refrain from physical contact with others not in their household. A wave or thumbs up is a great substitute for a handshake or fist bump.

We review these standards at each month's board meeting.

Regarding Covid exposure: if you have been in close proximity with a family member who has tested positive, please get tested yourselves. This will provide as much protection to others as possible. Please do not come into the synagogue until that family member tests negative and you have waited an additional 14 days after their negative results to ensure that you are not positive without knowing it. Asymptomatic people are actually the biggest spreaders of Covid. So far, the masks and social distancing seem to be working. The Executive Board agrees that this information was important for all to know if the situation arises. See CDC guidelines for further information.
