# Executive Message

Dear Fellow Congregants,

It's December and that means it's time to spin the dreidel and light the Hanukkah candles. I wanted to emphasize the joy we get from light energy in this message—not just Jews, but everyone. Hanukkah comes early this year. I think one of the best parts of Hanukkah is lighting the menorah every night for eight days. Each night it gets a little brighter till we get all eight candles lit. But then it's also a little sad, because we have to wait another year for the bright lights to return once those candles go out. One of my best experiences with light was during a late winter while working outside on the B-52s at Eielson AFB, way up near Fairbanks, Alaska. I kept seeing these wavy colorful lights zooming across the skies every night, but didn't know what they were. Somebody finally told me those are the Northern Lights (aka Aurora Borealis) I was seeing. I have to say if you ever get a chance to witness them—it's worth it. They are mesmerizing, I promise you will never forget the experience.

It seems like all the winter holidays center around light and copy each other in many ways. Not too surprising, since the tradition of artificial lighting began with ancient pagan festivals that preceded any of the modern holidays. Like the ancient people, we celebrate light because we miss it due to the shorter days in winter. The further north you go the shorter the days get in winter. I remember in Germany it would stay light in June until 10 pm and in the winter, skies would be completely dark by 4 pm. We appreciate light because it brings warmth, knowledge, wisdom, and life.

The following winter holidays all use candles, electric lights, or fireworks to enhance and celebrate the occasion: Hanukkah, Christmas, Diwali, Kwanzaa, and Lunar New Year. One thing these holidays, celebrated around the world, all have in common is


illuminating lights of all types. While on this topic, I should include the energy we use to make latkes! After all, light is a form of energy.

As I mentioned above, in some ways the customs surrounding the winter holidays seem to copy each other. My 'Mench on the Bench' is standing by, ready to take his proud place on the shelf near the gifts this year. Now we have 'Ask Bubbe on the Bench' as well. Great idea, and I bet somebody made millions on it. Wish I had thought of it. If you're not familiar with 'Mench on the Bench' it was inspired by 'Elf on the Shelf', which came out a few years back for Christmas. Originally gelt or money was only given during Hanukkah but that has evolved into toys and gifts similar to Christmas. So lighting candles or electric lights is similar in all of these holidays, as is gift-giving and of course great food.

By the way, if you need Hanukkah candles please come by the Agudath Achim Gift Shop, run by Susan Gross. The gift shop has plenty of candles, menorahs and other fantastic Hanukkah items to meet all of your holiday needs. Also don't forget about the community Hanukkah party coming up on December 5th at Agudath Achim at 5 pm hosted by the North Louisiana Jewish Federation. Latkes and brisket will be on the menu plus music by the nationally renowned Jewish musician Noah Aronson.

In closing, I'd like to thank Rabbi Sydni, Rabbi Feivel, and Rich Dechowitz for helping replace US flags at the Agudath Achim Cemetery this past Veteran's Day for our Veterans buried there. Rabbi Sydni led a short service honoring our vets.

# Message from Rabbi Sydni

Our Lost and Found collection is piling up at Agudath Achim! We have an assortment of glasses, a ring, and a fleece blanket. As a Jewish organization, it is our obligation to at least try to find the owner of each of these items, as the Torah teaches:

If you see your fellow's ox or sheep gone astray, do not ignore it; you must take it back to your fellow. If your fellow does not live near you or you do not know who she is, you shall bring it home, and it shall remain with you until your fellow claims it; then you shall give it back to her (Deuteronomy 22:1-3).

Returning lost objects is not just a nice thing to do, but a mitzvah - a commandment! It's not just a commandment about oxen or sheep, but in the modern day, it's about objects like rings, glasses, and blankets.

Long after Biblical times, the Rabbis of the Talmud—especially Tractate Bava Metzia—established rules and limits to returning lost objects. For the mitzvah of returning a lost object to be binding, it must be something distinguishable, something that the owner most likely has not yet given up on finding, and something of value. In the case of Agudath Achim's particular lost objects, they are each distinguishable enough that if you know what you are looking for, you will be able to describe it. As the Talmudic Rabbis' examples of owners' despair are largely examples of the owners losing their objects in a crowded place, no owners should despair of losing their objects at Agudath Achim! We have a small enough building, and hopefully, a caring enough community that every object lost here should easily be found.

While objects like a stray cookie from an oneg or a singular hair clip are probably not valuable enough to return, we cannot truly know the value of a particular object to a particular person. Whenever we see a lost object that gives us pause, we must remember that that object may carry great emotional or practical meaning to a searching owner. It is always better to assume an object's value and, as the Torah requests, "do not ignore it." Instead, our Talmud teaches, we proclaim to our fellow townspeople—in our case, Jewish community members—that an object has been found. We then hold onto it until the owner finds it, or until we are certain enough time has passed that the owner could not possibly still be looking.

Thank you to all who have repeatedly reminded me where my lost keys, journal, and water bottle are within this building. Each of these objects has significant value to me, as I would imagine so many of your objects, even those that others might take for granted, have value to you. Now, the next time you see a toy left on a park bench and post on your neighborhood Facebook group, you are doing much more than a good deed. When you see a dog wandering alone in the neighborhood and call the number on the collar, you are performing a mitzvah! And of course, thank you to those who claim your own lost objects for helping your Agudath Achim community to perform that same mitzvah of returning that which has been lost.

### Dr. Keren McGinity, USJC Interfaith Specialist



Keren R. McGinity is an educator-activist who specializes in Jewish intermarriage and gender roles. She is affiliated with the Hadassah-Brandeis Institute and teaches at Brandeis University.

As of November 1, 2020, Dr. McGinity began her tenure as the Interfaith Specialist working towards greater diversity, equity, and inclusion at the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. Dr. McGinity was the founding director of the Interfaith Families Jewish Engagement program at Hebrew College in Boston.

### Rabbi Lauren Tuchman

Rabbi Lauren Tuchman is a sought after speaker, spiritual leader and educator.



Ordained by The Jewish Theological Seminary in 2018, she is, as far as she is aware, the first blind woman in the world to enter the rabbinate. She provides consulting to individuals and organizations across the Jewish community on a variety of matters pertinent to disability access and inclusion. She has taught in numerous synagogues and

other organizations across North America. She was named to the Jewish Week's 36 under 36 for her innovative leadership concerning inclusion of Jews with disabilities in all aspects of Jewish life. In 2017, she delivered an ELI Talk entitled We All Were At Sinai: The Transformative Power of Inclusive Torah. She is a participant in the Institute for Jewish Spirituality's Clergy Leadership Program. In 2020, she was honored by the Jewish Orthodox Feminist Alliance (JOFA).

### Anjelica Ruiz, Keshet



Anjelica N. Ruiz works in the Jewish community. She holds a B.A in Criminology from St. Edward's University, M.S. in Criminal Justice from Texas State University and M.S. in Library and Information Sciences

from the University of North Texas.

She loves traveling and is passionate about social justice. She completed the Anti-Defamation League's Glass Leadership Institute in 2016 and now sits on the ADL Texoma Regional Board. She recently completed the Union for Reform Judaism's JewV'Nation Fellowship in the Jews of Color cohort.

Anjelica loves reading and is a self-professed life-long learner. She also loves writing and is an alumna of the Tent: Encounters with Jewish Culture's Creative Writing seminar and the Yale Writers Workshop.

## Community Religious School

Recently I shared with the Religious School Facebook group an article about being the "Hanukah parent." While I had never heard this phrase before, it became immediately clear what it meant – the parent of the sole Jewish student in the class coming to school and explaining the holiday that falls near Christmas. I remember my mother doing this at various points when my sister and I were in elementary school, and trying it myself when my own kids were younger. While I was never ambitious enough to make latkes for the class, a menorah and dreidel did make an appearance.

This article was especially meaningful on the heels of the program put on last month by Shreveport's own Rabbi Sydni Rubinstein along with Dr. Keren McGinity of the USCJ. To paraphrase Dr. McGinity, Christmas falling in the month of December is an annual reminder that we live as a religious minority in this country, and for interfaith families, that can be an even greater challenge. At the same time, combining various celebrations from multiple backgrounds can be a powerful symbol of interfaith cooperation and shalom bayit, peace in the home.

I hope all in our community enjoy this season of colder weather and winter holidays, and leave you with some discussion questions suggested for a Hanukah parent: "What makes freedom important for all people?" and "How can a small group make a difference?"
