Executive Message

Happy Purim!

I was in the office last week when Michelle received photos of past Purim potluck dinners and services at Agudath Achim from Rabbi Kawaler. I started to reminisce. Some of the photos were of when Leonard Nimoy visited us and posed for pictures with Rabbi Kawaler; that must have been the year Rabbi Kawaler wore his Star Trek costume for Purim. The confirmation class—our children that all grew up so fast and have all moved away—were also in the photos. Pictures and photographs do such a great job of letting us relive our past. One picture that really captivated me was of Raymond Murov-he did so much for our Synagogue. Raymond was a major financial contributor and always had a joke to tell. He also served as treasurer for the Men's Club for years. Raymond was famous for his persistent phone calls asking you to buy squares for the football pool. Hardly anybody could turn him down.

I'm not going to explain too much about Purim because many of you know the characters and the story. Evil guy Haman wants all the lews annihilated. Heroine of the story, Queen Esther, and her cousin Mordechai uncover the plot. They tell King Ahasuerus who has Haman executed saving the Jewish people. We read it every year in the book of Esther: the Megillah. Purim is on the horizon, (February 25) and we've decided to celebrate it on Zoom this year because we want to keep everyone safe. With vaccinations for Covid 19 getting into people's arms at an accelerated pace, I hope we're going to be able to get together in person sooner rather than later.

Our past Purims have included some great potluck dinners and great people with great costumes. We'd all head to the sanctuary and read the Megillah. Sharing a meal with everyone is one of my favorite things about coming to the synagogue, which I'm sure is no secret to anyone who knows me. Besides the good food, some of us, or myself, would bring something a little stronger than punch to wash it down with. The ladies of the sisterhood that made hamantaschen and others in our Shul kitchen were fantastic too. Playing the characters in the Purim shpiel brings back lots of good memories too. David Gross seems to always get the part of King Ahasuerus. He has the best commanding voice when he commanded SERVANTS!! I encourage everyone to play a character when they are asked as it really makes the story much more fun. If not, we always need groggers to make noise when Haman's name is read.

Here's a fact I didn't know and wanted to share for meals on Purim: Hamantaschen has a sister food, Kreplach—17 meat-filled dumplings often served in soup. We customarily eat them three times a year on Purim, the eve of Yom Kippur, and Hoshanah Rabbah. You can also fill your Kreplach with other things like potatoes or cheese.

I learn something new whenever I write about a subject. Be safe every day, and thanks for reading my message.

Rabbi Sydni's Message

...They were to observe these as days of feasting and merrymaking and as an occasion for sending gifts to one another and presents to those in need (Esther 9:22).

Our most topsy-turvy festival is right around the corner, and as excited as I am about our Megillah reading and Purim carnival this year, I am even more excited to highlight two Purim mitzyot we often leave behind.

Mishloah Manot - A Delicious Gift Exchange

As the book of Esther dictates, we are obligated not only to enjoy our own food and celebration, but also, to share that food and celebration with others on Purim. As Esther 9:22 mentions gifts (plural) to one another (singular), the custom has evolved for each person to give at least two gifts of food to at least one friend. That could mean handing a casserole and a tray of brownies to a neighbor who needs an extra boost, exchanging Tupperware containers full of food with a friend, or even placing some pre-packaged candies and cookies in the mail for family across the country. This year, especially, is a time to think about those in our community who would benefit most from a cookie and a card, from that reminder that we're still here for them even without close physical presence.

Mishloah Manot - A Delicious Gift Exchange

We derive our obligation to donate to more than one individual or organization on Purim from that same verse of Esther, as "presents"

and "those in need" are both plural. We live in a community with multiple organizations that support individuals in need. Just as a couple of examples, as so much of Purim's appeal is food-oriented, the <u>Food Bank</u> of Northwest Louisiana feeds the hungry throughout our region, and Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger works to address food insecurity from the perspective of Jewish text and tradition. If you have another favorite organization or two, Purim is the time to reach into your pocket and give generously. If you live near a street corner where someone regularly asks for resources, Purim is the time to pause and give just a little more than you might normally.

At Agudath Achim, we're beginning to organize a food drive to kick off on Purim, to donate rather than dispose of the bread products we still have lying around before Passover. At the beginning of March, the Jewish Federation of Northwest Louisiana is hosting a talk from Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger, during which we'll learn even more ways to give to our community. And of course, whether on Purim or any other day of the year, if you have any other ideas to inspire our community to give back, we would appreciate your input.

This Purim, may our actions reflect that eternal truth that our laughter and our happiness depends on the joy of those in our community, not just our friends and family. Hag Sameah! Happy Purim!

Asymptomatic people are actually the biggest spreaders of Covid. So far, the masks and social distancing seem to be working. Upcoming Architectural & Artistic Changes

It was announced last year that Agudath Achim had been awarded a grant from Homeland Security to make our home a more secure and comfortable place to be. As part of that grant, the following items are going to be incorporated:

- 1. A new video surveillance system.
- 2. An electronic pass key system for access to the building for members.
- 3. Forty-year old doors will be replaced with steel components.
- 4. Expenses for security guards during services reimbursed.

The most noticeable and concerning to most members might be the glass doors at the front and back of the foyer that will be going away. Steel doors that are not transparent and less inviting may be an issue to some. Conversations have started to make a plain steel door into a canvas for inviting and welcoming art. Jonathan Goodman is working with us to create such an entry. We have all seen his work in the library and been pleased with the results. We believe there will be sufficient funds in the grant and donated to make these new doors inviting and welcoming to the general public. The time frame for completion of this project will take us into the summer months when we hope to be back in our building and the pandemic threat lessened.
