Executive Message

What an eventful month since I've become president! We've celebrated a B'nai Mitzvah here, a Bat Mitzvah with B'nai Zion, learned from our congregation about everything from the chapters for 929 to allegory in horror movies, unveiled the headstone of Maxine Levine, and seen the last work day for two staff members. One thing I love about this congregation is how people step up to help and to share their skills with the community. For those less familiar, I want to share ways you can get involved.

While Board members are approved at the annual meeting, spots on committees are always open to anyone in the community. Ritual Committee helps the Rabbi with planning services and holidays, sets standards for celebrating bar/bat/b'nai mitzvah and other life cycle events, and discusses how halacha is understood by our congregation. Membership Committee works with potential members on their path to joining our congregation, as well as listening to existing members to ensure we're meeting their needs. Education Committee is involved with both the children's education and programming as well as adult learning opportunities. We have a Chevra Kadisha, or burial society, for men and for women. These are the volunteers who help prepare those we have lost for burial. Related, our **Cemetery** Committee, which maintains the grounds of our cemetery to show kavod for all those who have been buried in our grounds at Walnut and Yale. House and Grounds deals with the maintenance and upkeep of our building, including projects to make us more energy-efficient as when we converted

the bathrooms to motion-detection lights and swapped the kind of bulbs used in the sanctuary. Our **Chesed** Committee reaches out to our members who are unable to come to the synagogue, and those who have notified the synagogue they want hospital or nursing home visits. There's more, but we'll talk about that next month.

Beyond that, we use volunteers everywhere, from the garden to the kitchen and everywhere in between. If one of these committees seems like something you would like to help with, or you know of something you can help with not listed here, please contact me or Rabbi Sydni.

Message from Rabbi Sydni

[The artisans] said to Moses, "The people are bringing more than is needed for the tasks entailed in the work that Adonai has commanded to be done." [...] Their efforts had been more than enough for all the tasks to be done (Exodus 36:6,8).

Imagine - just imagine if all of our efforts for our modern mishkan, Congregation Agudath Achim, were not just enough but more than enough for all of the tasks that needed to be done! The Biblical people Israel are notorious for getting a whole lot wrong, but in Exodus Ch. 36, one of our recent 929 readings, the people Israel get it right. Not only do the people Israel give more than enough to build the mishkan, but also, they never doubt that the mishkan will be built to all of its detailed specifications. These former slaves, situated at the bottom of a mountain, in the middle of the desert, bring to full life and color an architectural structure, priestly clothing, and utensils made from precious metals, intricate needlework, and the skins of sea creatures. If the people Israel can produce such a house for God, the least we can do is imagine what our modern mishkan might look like in a world in which we had unlimited resources.

For practical reasons, when we plan for the present and future of Agudath Achim, we speak in terms of using or conserving hundreds of dollars. We often ask, how many months or years will this purchase take away from or contribute to our future at Agudath Achim?

Now, I want us to think in terms of that endless giving during the time of the Tabernacle. If we had infinite funds, volunteers, and a guarantee that our synagogue would survive for decades to come, what would you envision for Agudath Achim? Considering how we're used to thinking, this may be a challenging thought experiment. However, every single time we plan anything, our conversation must include that

discussion of the ideal. Whenever we consider that ideal, the only factors at play should be what we see as our ideal community, space, and schedule at Agudath Achim.

While our synagogue is wonderful as it is, I still envision remodeled, accessible restrooms. I envision a full-time Jewish homeschool pod housed at Agudath Achim, with active, creative secular and Jewish learning. I even visualize a truly all-night learning session for Shavuot, with snack breaks for cheesecake, an ice cream bar, sugary cereals with milk, and more. Truly, some of my dreams for the synagogue don't require a whole lot of money or extra resources. However, I probably would not have thought about them if I was only focused on our limits, without thinking about our great possibilities.

You probably have grand ideas about this synagogue that have never occurred to me or to any of our leadership. I hope I speak for all of us when I say that we want to hear those dreams, those ideas. Some of them may be programs or policies that existed at Agudath Achim in the past, some may be practices learned from other Jewish communities, and some may be entirely your own. Without any ifs or buts, let's begin to share our greatest hopes for this community. Later, we can focus on our real limits and boundaries. For now, though, the bigger we dream, the more our present and future community members may be inspired to give even more time, energy, and funds. Perhaps one day, our community will have more resources than we could ever need!

Monday, July 18 - Friday, July 22 9:00am - 2:00pm


