Message from our President

As I write this we are getting ready to end the month of Shevat and move into Adar, and from February to March. This year, it struck me how often things mirror each other in our calendar and the secular one, and in our every-day life. Before we are able to celebrate Purim, we pass the yahrzeit of Moses, which this year will fall on February 28th. Moses's yahrzeit is a date we also tend to talk about the chevra kadisha, the burial society. These are the people from our community who help prepare our loved ones for burial, and sit with them, usually in the synagogue library until the burial. I've served on our women's chevra kadisha for a number of years, and every single time I'm awed by our tiny community's ability to come together and care for each other. Another way we show our care for each other happened earlier this month when a number of congregants (including myself and Rabbi Sydni) were ill or had illness in their homes, letting us know that they wouldn't be at services. I want to reassure everyone that we don't anticipate having to cancel services on any kind of a regular basis, and that I appreciate the number of people who are concerned about keeping our congregation healthy. Even so, we're always happy to see your faces in the building. We're coming into a time of seeing a lot of each other. We have Purim just a few days after this message comes out, and then we start getting ready for Passover. Please talk to the office if you would like to help with kashering our kitchen or preparing meals for Passover. If you are going out of town and would be willing to pick up food marked for Passover for the synagogue or other congregants, please let me or Rabbi Sydni know. The night we meet in our social hall for seder second night we start counting up to the date we received the Torah, and somewhere during that count, it will be a year since I became your president. I thank you all for the opportunity to serve this community and as always, would love to hear your ideas for programming or fundraising.

Revealing the Hidden - Costumes on Purim

Will you choose to dress up as Esther or Haman? Freddy Mercury or a pirate? The possibilities for dressing up on Purim are endless! But why dress up at all on the holiday of Purim? The possible answers to that question are endless, too!

One answer lies in the Purim *mitzvah* of *matanot la-evyonim*, gifts to the poor. When everyone dresses up, identities are hidden, and people can anonymously give and ask for assistance. For another perspective on the practice of dressing up, Purim, like <u>Hanukah</u>, is a holiday focused on *pirsumei nisa*, publicizing the miracle. We publicize the miracle of surviving Haman's decree against us with a public reading of the book of Esther, with a *raucous*, hard-to-miss celebration, and with lavish costumes. Dressing up also mirrors the moment in the book of Esther in which Mordekhai dresses up in the King's royal garments (Esther 6:11), a moment highlighted with a special tune when we read the Megillah. It has also been suggested (see articles below) that costume wearing was originally inspired, in part, by the Mardi Gras celebrations that have happened at this same time of year for centuries!

For a more spiritual take on wearing costumes on Purim, we turn to the book of Esther's motif of hiding. Esther's name contains the Hebrew root that means "to hide," <code>samekh - tav - resh</code>. Throughout the story, she hides her Jewish identity, only to save the Jewish people by revealing that identity to her husband, the King. So, too, God's identity is hidden throughout the book of Esther. Even though God's name never shows up, praying and fasting occur throughout the book, and we can see God's invisible hand guiding Esther and Mordekhai through their rescue of the Jewish people. Even with God's seeming absence, one Talmudic midrash (Shabbat 88a) claims that the moment when the Jews "upheld and accepted" the holiday of Purim (Esther 9:27) is also the moment the Jews truly upheld and accepted the Torah as given by God at Mount Sinai. Just as we wear costumes to hide our own identities, the book of Esther acts as a mask for God's Presence throughout the great span of history. By wearing costumes on Purim, we remind ourselves to watch for the hidden Presence of God in our every relationship and experience.

As you wear a costume on Purim this year, I challenge you to ask yourself two questions. First, where has God been hidden in your life? Perhaps you're missing a blessing or two underneath the mundane. Second, what are you hiding that longs to be revealed? As Esther's reveal of her Judaism frees the Jewish people from their prescribed death, perhaps your reveal will make way for some new freedom in your life. For whatever reason you choose to dress up, <u>Hag Purim Sameah</u>.

I look forward to celebrating with you at our Covered Dish Dinner and Megillah Reading on Monday, March 6, at 6:30pm!


