

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A Message from Rabbi Frishman

A Lifelong Partnership With Israel



ear Friends,

When I was eight years old, someone asked me to sketch a map of the world. I drew a circle: on the left side was the USA, and on the right, I split the hemispheres with England on top and Israel on bottom, with some ocean in-between. From my education thus far,

the world was composed of America, England and Israel.

Already at the age of 8, Israel was imprinted in my imagination. Thank you to my parents and Religious School teachers!¹

I can't imagine a world without Israel. But our relationship with Israel is complex.

Consider the dynamic of a healthy marriage. Time deepens awareness of difference, including irritation and frustration — *but also* strengthens friendship, understanding, support and love. A profound relationship is deep *and* imperfect. Though imperfect, it is *not* fragile. A true friendship lasts through diapers and despair, family and financial woes.

How does one develop a lifelong partnership with Israel?

This season kicks off several ways to engage. This spring, two powerful and important speakers will join us to share two essential perspectives on Israel.

On Sunday March 29 at 11am, we welcome Senator Bob Menendez, perhaps the strongest Senatorial friend of Israel. A previous chair and current member of the Senator Committee on Foreign Relations, Senator Menendez will talk with us about the Middle East, the peace process, ISIS and Iran's nuclear program. We're incredibly fortunate to have such an expert in our midst. Please prepare your questions! We'll be gathering them in advance for the Senator to consider.

On Sunday, April 29 at 9am, we'll be joined by Lesley Sachs, the Executive Director of Women of the Wall. Do you recall when I was detained by the Israeli police for wearing my *tallis* at the Western Wall? Since then, Supreme Court legislation is beginning to address issues of women's equality. But there's a great deal more to be done. Sachs will share her experience fighting discrimination and advocating for equality and religious pluralism in Israel.

We also encourage your engagement with three key players on the Israel-American scene: AIPAC, the American Jewish Committee and J Street. I urge your involvement with at least one of these groups; I'm confident that at least one will address your questions and concerns about Israel, and our nation's relationship with her, and offer you ways to participate. *Look further within this Magazine for information on each*.² Stay tuned for gatherings at Barnert and in Barnert homes for opportunities to learn more about these friends of Israel.

For those of you familiar with AIPAC, the AJC and J-Street, you might ask me why I support them all. Certainly J Street and AIPAC offer opposite approaches. Since my love for Israel runs deep, I believe it's important to ask hard questions about Israel's political choices, even as I view American financial and military support essential for Israel's survival. These three organizations provide multiple perspectives, and push either Israel or our government to be more responsive.

Finally, we'd like to do more to support our college students who are being bombarded by the BDS Movement — the massive Palestinian-based effort to harm Israel through boycott, divestment, and sanction. There are two aspects: academic boycott of Israeli universities and Israeli faculty; and economic pressure on companies and investors who do business in Israel to divest.

Last summer, many of us shared concern about the anti-Israel demonstrations at Boulder Run. I tried to engage them in dialogue and they refused to talk with me — in essence, they said they had the right to be there, and I could bring my own counter-signs if I chose! I believe that there is anti-Semitism at the heart of these protests; with so many more people in the region who are harmed or murdered, the focus on Israel is misrepresented and wrong.

¹ In high school I lived in Israel for 6 months on the **EIE program**, which our Barnert students still can attend. I've lived in Israel for as much as a year, and traveled there over 20 times.

EIE is a four month superb high school program in Israel. Students live in dorms and combine formal academics with experiential learning, touring, engaging in social action, deepening Jewish commitment. Additional Reform Jewish youth opportunities include **Israel Mitzvah Corps**, a summer-long community service learning program bringing young American Jews, Israelis and Arabs together; and **NFTY-in-Israel**, a 6 week tour of Israel preceded by a trip to Poland. *Scholarships are offered; and we are always seeking benefactors!*

A Message from the President

Personal Connections to Israel - Welcome Noa



s American Reform Jews, Israel plays a dual role in our minds. We make strong spiritual connections to ancient Israel through our prayers and our study of Torah. We stay connected to modern Israel through our visits, our ties to friends and family who may live there, the news media and our support of Israel, whether

it's as simple as planting a tree in memory of a loved one or making larger donations to causes close to our hearts. And of course, our concern for the safety and well-being of all

Israelis knows no bounds these days. For me and Leonard, though, we have few personal connections to Israel — no family there at all, no close lifelong friends — until now. (Our children, Becca and Ethan, however, have been fortunate to have made their own connections to Israelis through their travels with NFTY and their summer experiences at Camp Eisner.)

Last month my family was able to deepen our personal connection to Israel by welcoming a new friend from Israel into our lives. Barnert was asked to participate in a new program with the Jerusalem campus of HUC (Hebrew Union College) in which an Israeli rabbinical student would come here to the States to learn about American Reform synagogues. My family, together with Alice Heffner and Alan Lieber, eagerly agreed to co-host a student, who would then spend two weeks shadowing Rabbi Frishman, attending all of her meetings, classes, services and programs. On a very cold and icy Wednesday a few weeks ago, Noa Mazor landed here from Jerusalem. Noa is one of those people who takes no time at all to warm up to. She's bright and fun and insightful and easy-going. We connected instantly. While the purpose of her visit was for her to learn about us, we were able to learn about her and to be inspired by her teachings. At Shabbat worship on Friday, February 13, she participated in the service by presenting the *d'var* and by co-teaching a new song with Vlad Lappin. If you missed the service, you can find it on our website in the archived livestreaming services. And even better — Noa will be joining us again in the Fall for a few weeks. I hope you'll have an opportunity to meet her and to join her at Shabbat Services

when she comes back. For our part, I've personally guaranteed that the weather will be much more agreeable when she comes here next time (she was a good sport and did not seem bothered a bit by our frozen tundra).

As for the icing on the cake, it turns out that Noa and I share similar political values and were at the very same event a year ago November when I went to Israel to participate in the Women of the Wall's 25th Anniversary gala and prayer session at the Western Wall. I wrote about this experience last year — a thousand women from this country and Israel gathering together to pray, wearing tallit, in defiance of the ultra-Orthodox rabbis who control access to the wall and insist on treating women as second class citizens. Noa eagerly scanned through my pictures from that event and

pointed out her friends. Although I don't have a picture of her from that time, she identified her tallit being held aloft in the exuberant crowd. We were there together in a common cause and now fate has drawn us together again — how extraordinary! I told her of Rabbi Frishman's experience at the Wall the year before when she was detained and made headlines in the New York Times. Noa was there too, and could not have imagined then that she and Rabbi Frishman would end up as teacher and student, as rabbinical colleagues, as mentor and friend. It is a small world indeed!

We have a few wonderful opportunities coming up in the next few months to help deepen our understanding and connections to Israel. On March 29, Senator Bob Menendez will come to Barnert and share with us his insight into Middle East affairs and how this relates to Israel. And on Sunday April 19 the Executive Director of Women of the Wall, Lesley Sachs, will speak to us about the struggle for women's rights and pluralism in Israel. I hope you'll join me and Len at these programs — both will be extraordinary.

Not much time is needed, and especially if you haven't had a chance to get involved in a committee here at Barnert, this might be an easy way to start!)

A Message from Sara Losch

Much More Than the Blue Pushka Box



The most effective way to learn about any subject is to do so through experiential methods. A goal of our Religious School curriculum is to have students learn that Torah teaches us that we must protect animals (*tzar baalei chayim*). Students are more likely to retain the lesson if they are


actually caring for classroom pets and visiting a farm. Though

we do have animals in the school, our Mitzvah Mall brings to life many of our *mitzvot* as students meet people whose days are spent caring for animals, feeding the hungry (*ma'achil r'evim*), or honoring the elderly (*kibbud z'kaynim*). Over the years, we have proven that the Mitzvah Mall experience too is educationally effective, as students retain pieces of the experience for years.

A fundamental aspect of a healthy Jewish identity is a relation-

ship to Israel as the historical homeland and the spiritual inheritance of the Jewish people. A fundamental aspect of a healthy Reform Jewish identity is a commitment to advancing the cause of religious pluralism within the modern State of Israel. These goals, too, are part of our Religious School curriculum. Of course, traveling to Israel is the single most successful method of realizing these goals. Yet, the vast majority of Jews are not having this experience.

Only a generation ago, it was common for many families to travel to Israel as part of a Temple trip with the Rabbi, or as a Bar/t Mitzvah celebration. As they did then, today's students still look forward to peer-teen experiences with their sleepaway camps (especially the Reform camps: Eisner, Crane Lake and Harlam), on high school semesters abroad through EIE, and as college students on free ten-day trips to Israel through Taglit-Birthright. (Ask us for more information on all of these programs.)



My fantasy is to fill a plane with Barnert families and travel through *eretzYisrael*—the land of Israel experiencing the people, walking the stones of history, studying in the places we read about in Torah, meeting Israeli entrepreneurs, eating Israeli food (!!). My life changed in so many ways every time I went to Israel. I was different each time. Israel was different each time. I am hungry to go back, to go home. It does not need to be a fantasy. Rabbi Frishman is planning a

congregational trip in 2016. Interested? E-mail her at rabbifrish@barnerttemple.org.

WHY YOUR VOTE COUNTS IN THE WORLD ZIONIST ORGANIZATION ELECTIONS

Today, Israel is at a crossroads. Much is at stake when it comes to women's rights, freedom of worship, and peace in the region.

As Reform Jews, we share a commitment to egalitarian worship, to a wide welcome to those who wish to embrace Judaism, to K'lal Yisrael – the many voices of the Jewish people united as one. We work together to foster a Jewish peoplehood and state in which the ideals of pluralism, equality and peace help to secure prosperous, fulfilling Jewish lives for us all. And yet, the challenges of Jewish identity and Women's Rights that many experienced in the United States are now a greater challenge in modern day Israel.

Your vote for in ARZA (Association of Reform Zionists in America) in the World Zionist Organization's Congress will strengthen the voices for fairness in Israel. GREEN TIP OF THE MONTH

Don't forget about our feathered friends!

Help the birds get through snowy winters by providing housing, food and water. Many birds do not head south for winter and spend time here year-round. Snowy winters make it that much harder for our birds to survive winter safely.

Hang a couple of bird houses in your yard to give birds a warm, safe place to spend the winter. Fill feeders with seed and you will provide the birds a good source of protein and fat during the long winter months.

People don't often realize that birds need a fresh, clean source of water even during winter — a heated bird bath will help insure the birds have access to water all year round, especially this time of year when it can be particularly hard to find.

Add these things to your yard and you will be amazed how many different species of birds you will attract — even during the cold, dark days of winter!
