A Message From Rabbi Rachel Steiner

Faces Familiar and Unfamiliar



We expected to slip in and out of services without being noticed at our first Barnert Shabbat. Though I had been formally hired as the new assistant rabbi, I had not yet started my service to this congregation. I had met only those on my search committee. Dan and I decided to come check out Shabbat services here at the place we would soon make our spiritual home.

We walked quietly into the sanctuary, seated ourselves in the back row and prepared to participate as anonymous attendees. Within five minutes of sitting down, the couple in front of us turned around, noticed that we were

people they did not know, and warmly introduced themselves, welcoming us to Barnert. I was shocked.

Barnert members really did live the mission of the synagogue! Someone I had never met had looked into my eyes, offering an opening for learning each other's stories. I was even more excited than I had been to begin serving this sacred community.

Fast forward a month or so to July 2, 2010, my first *Shabbat* (and first day!) as a rabbi here at Barnert. It was an outdoor summer service with perfect weather as I stood before a patio filled with people I couldn't wait to get to know. So many eyes to look into, so many stories to care for.

I am now lucky enough to be in my seventh year as one of your rabbis. Seven is a special number in our tradition. Seven days of creation, seven agricultural species of Israel, the seven branches of the *menorah* that stood in the Temple, and a seven-year cycle of renewal called *shemitah*, the sabbatical year. The *Torah* designates every seventh year as one when the Israelites take a break from their agricultural work, to share the land's harvest equally and to use the time to renew and reset physically, emotionally and spiritually.

This is our first shemitah year together and I hope to take the essence of this radical check-in to do just that with each of you. During these past seven years I have been blessed to hear countless stories in moments of

great joy, deep sadness, and in everything that falls along the way. I am profoundly grateful for every conversation. And yet there are many members of Barnert whose stories are still unknown to me, so many conversations waiting to unfold.

For our ancestors, this sabbatical year was spent learning and growing. They were busy with *Torah* study, we think, engaging in the kinds of discussions that lead to asking necessary questions and revealing the *Torah*'s sacred guidance for living productive, connected, Jewish lives.

Let us do the same this year.

We can learn together at *Torah* Study on *Shabbat* mornings. This year, for the first time, our opening session of *Torah* Study (Saturday, September 10 at 9:30 am) will be an "open house" for those familiar and unfamiliar with our *Shabbat* gatherings, a chance for anyone and everyone (even if you've never engaged in any kind of Jewish learning)

to come check out what we do on Shabbat mornings. We begin with a yummy breakfast and continue with our study. It's a gift we give to each other.

We can also begin our sacred conversations as we talk after *Shabbat* services, when you come to Barnert with your children for Religious School or JJPBT, in my office, or out for coffee.

One of my goals this year is to spend more time getting to know even more people, to look more deeply into your eyes. I have set aside time to do this — how will we begin?

When I remember my very first *Shabbat* at Barnert, I am continually impressed by one important detail. The person who

welcomed us was not a rabbi, not the president, not an usher or even a board member. It was someone who had come to *Shabbat*, had turned around and noticed someone they did not know, and who decided to say hello.

That couple has since moved away. But the ethic of our welcoming, engaged, Jewish community at Barnert is alive and well. I hope it will allow us to get to know each other better this year. And, even more importantly, the next time you notice a face unfamiliar to you, introduce yourself and say hello. You never know where the conversation may go.

A Message From Sara Losch

There's Something About "Third-Borns"



I don't know who said this first, but I have to agree. There is something different about "third-borns." Full disclosure: I myself am a proud third-born. I'm the child who swears that the oldest has two photo albums documenting her precious childhood, the second has a book and a half, and I, the third: two adorable photos!

Don't cry for me, Argentina! My parents assure me that by the

time I came along, they'd had enough practice to "get it right." And from my perspective — minus the lack of photographic evidence — they got my upbringing JUST RIGHT!

I've been an educator for 36 years. In both my undergraduate studies in special-needs education, and early-childhood child development in graduate school, I was taught to focus on the individual learning needs of each

child. Good teachers know that there is no cookie cutter, no ditto sheet, and no mold into which every child or adult fits. Over the years, we've come to understand how our EQ (Emotional Quotient) effects our learning, what introverts need to keep their learning and social batteries charged, and how adding different learning modalities to the environment will bring success to even the most oppositional student.

In short, it is clear that our journey through life — experiential,

genetic, even birth order — impacts our success in education.

Childhood experiences color our willingness to enter into new environments, new opportunities, and new relationships. As a community, we at Barnert — lay leaders, rabbis, educators and professional staff — understand this reality. To best provide an environment that will feel easily accessible, we strive to model Jewish values, such as *hachnasat orchim* — welcoming the guest. We are self reflective in order to live by the teachings in Leviticus 19; for example: "Do not put a stumbling block before the blind."

It is this example that brings me back to how we engage our students and their families.

Following several years of self study, it became clear to us that many families are struggling with the burdens of managing their children's very packed lives. The stumbling block in this scenario could be the fixed schedule of our Religious School. Now, two years later, we've launched the Jewish Journey Project Barnert Temple (JJPBT), allowing parents and students to choose courses on the days that

best suit their family. The stumbling block could also be the design of the previous program, in which every student in a particular grade attends the same class in the same time taught in the same way. JJPBT includes courses for mixed grades, in a great variety of subjects, taught in different modalities (discussion, cooking, art, theater), and with a choice of teachers, including both of our rabbis.

In preparation for the JJPBT launch, every family with a child in 3rd-6th grade met with Rabbi Frishman, Rabbi Steiner, or me. During these wonderful discussions, each family member shared their personal Jewish Journey narrative. These were invaluable opportunities for in-depth conversation, during which parents shared a portrait of lives that were formative, compelling, and often spiritual. Of course, there was the baggage we "shlep" from childhood. Through honest dialogue, we were able to validate those feelings (most came from misguided 1970s-style school designs), and identify that it can be tempting to share the baggage with our children.

Ultimately, we acknowledged that focusing on the things we cherish about our own Jewish journeys, our Jewish

connections, is a wonderfully proactive way to not only remove any remaining stumbling blocks, but to illuminate a path for everyone to join us.

We could not be more excited to see the Jewish Journey Project Barnert Temple at work!

Lay and professional staff, working in our Barnert Preschool and Family Center, are also spending time reflecting on best practices for engaging younger families in our Barnert Community. We welcome suggestions and feedback!

As for my own Jewish Journey? I am certain that I'd be a different person had my grandparents not lived across the street from me, offering me endless love and guidance; had I not insisted that my parents send me to Hebrew School; and then, just short of becoming *Bat Mitzvah*, had I not stood my ground and insist, one more time, that I would not participate in a "girl-version modified" *Bat Mitzvah* (I will one day!).

I certainly would not have become a lifelong student of *Torah* and *Talmud* had I not found my way to Barnert Temple, a community so passionate about learning.

And, had I been born first, I wouldn't be me. There really is something about third-borns! (Oh, my mom is a third born too.)

I represent all of the Losch family in wishing you and yours a meaningful, healthy and happy New Year. L'shanah Tovah u'mitukah.



A Special 2016 Mitzvah Mall Thank You!

Our wonderful *Mitzvah* Mall Initiative in 2016 raised money and awareness for many carefully chosen charities. Tremendous work was done by Chairs Sue Klein, Ron Lynn and Eileen Roman, and Co-Chairs Rich Edelman and Mitch Hausman. We also thank all the volunteers for the day of *Mitzvah* Mall, including our caring, curious, and generous students at Barnert! We'd like to share just a few of the many grateful notes that we received in response to *Mitzvah* Mall 2016.

The group **One Can Help** works with court-appointed attorneys and social workers to provide clients at risk with small grants that help break the cycle of deprivation and hopelessness. They step in when money is needed to prevent families caught up in the juvenile court system from spiraling out of control. Founder and President Anne Bader-Martin thanked Barnert Temple for our support:

"...We loved seeing the *Mitzvah* Mall concept you pioneered in action and we truly enjoyed meeting members of your congregation. We especially appreciated having the opportunity to speak with so many adorable children who asked great questions, and who really seemed to understand how different their lives would be if they did not have some of the most basic items that we all take for granted..."

One Can Help used Barnert's donation to help these families in crisis:

\$50 for baby equipment to a father in a homeless shelter, \$75 for camp tuition for a 17-year-old autistic boy, \$100 for transportation passes for a young mother to visit her daughter in foster care, \$200 for a high school student's laptop to enable her to do homework, \$300 for summer school to enable a student to graduate high school on time and go to college, \$500 for storage fees for a mother facing eviction, \$700 for heat and electricity to a newly single mother of three, \$800 for daycare to allow a mother to keep her job during the day until government daycare assistance came through.

And a single mother received \$1,000 for rent assistance. She writes this moving letter:

"One Can Help really saved my life. After becoming homeless, I couldn't afford to get another apartment. ... I was emotionally distraught because I had to stress about how I was going to put my life back together. While I didn't have a place to live, I had sent my five-year-old son to friends in another town and he was crying all the time because he wanted to be with me. ... One Can Help saved me from drowning. By paying for one month of rent, it took a big portion of stress off my shoulders because I didn't lose the apartment I finally found after the costs, including the last month and security deposit, were more than I had. This let me get my foot in the door and set myself up for success. I just am doing so much better now. I have my job, a place to live and my son is very happy to be back with me."

From **Tzimaon**, a grassroots Israeli organization that initiates projects that promote and empower parents and children by focusing on education, enrichment and personal support in refugee neighborhoods in Tel Aviv:

Dear Susan and Patti,

I was very excited to hear from Naomi about your donation. A month ago I adopted a new place of 50 Eritrean kids ages 4–10. The first goal was to raise money for lunch, along with other needs: chairs, tables, refrigerator, TV, game toys and more. HISTORY CORNER

THE STRAIGHT STREET TEMPLE: 1892 TO 1921 (FROM GROUNDBREAKING TO THE ARRIVAL OF RABBI MAX RAISIN)

As noted in the previous installment of The History Corner series, Nathan and Miriam Barnert announced in 1889 that they were going to build a new temple for Congregation B'nai Jeshurun. They deeded land on the southeast corner of Straight Street and Broadway, and provided funds for its construction. This article will identify significant events in our Temple's history during the early years of this magnificent building.

Construction of the Straight Street Temple

• The groundbreaking ceremony was held on October 18, 1892. The *Paterson Evening News* reported the event and noted that the mason work had been awarded to Jas. S. Van Ness for \$13,176 and the carpenter work to J. M. Rogers for \$12,541.¹

- A ceremony for placement of the cornerstone was held on July 12, 1893. It was put in place by ex-Mayor Nathan Barnert and contained issues of the local papers, a copy of the *Hebrew Standard*, a membership list and constitution and by-laws of the congregation, and coins of the present date. About 500 persons attended.²
- Construction took about two years and was completed in the summer of 1894. The dedication took place on September 17, 1894, in time for the High Holidays. The two-towered Moorish building, a popular style for synagogues during the Victorian Era, with a seating capacity of 1,000, a beautiful interior, stained glass and a pipe organ, became a city landmark and the center of Paterson's Jewish activities.

Covenants Required by Nathan Barnert in Temple Deed

- The 1889 deed of transfer stipulated that regular services, chiefly in Hebrew, were to be held every Friday evening and Saturday morning, and that all men were to keep their heads covered. In October 1892 the deed was amended so that the service could read in English as well as Hebrew and that men were not required to cover their heads.
- Although Nathan Barnert was brought up Orthodox, these amendments signaled the shift to Reform Judaism.

EHISTORY CORNER

1900 Visit of President William McKinley - Why Did He Come?

- President McKinley attended the Passover service on Friday evening, April 20, 1900. His participation
 was a result of his friendship with his first vice president,
 Garret Hobart.
- Garret Hobart was a prominent lawyer, resident of Paterson, and a former speaker of the N.J. General Assembly. He served as McKinley's vice president until his death in 1899. He was also a long-term acquaintance of Nathan Barnert.
- In April 1900, President McKinley traveled to New Jersey to visit Jennie Hobart, Garret's widow, in Paterson.

 Nathan Barnert invited the president for a *Sabbath* dinner and to visit the Barnert Temple. The visit to Barnert Temple was kept a secret, and in fact the newspapers reported the president would attend the fair at the Paterson armory that evening.³
- A plaque commemorating the historic event was affixed to the pew occupied by the president. The plaque has been prominently displayed in every Barnert Temple building since then.

Great Paterson Fire of 1902

- In the early morning of February 9, 1902, an overheated stove in a trolley shed caught fire. Fanned by high winds, the blaze consumed most of downtown Paterson—the worst catastrophe in its history. Though only two deaths were attributed to the fire, the toll in property was significant, with 26 city blocks and 459 buildings destroyed (one quarter of the city's structures).
- The St. Joseph Catholic Church and Second Presbyterian Church were consumed by the blaze. In an act of generous community service, Congregation *B'nai Jeshurun* offered its facilities to the Second Presbyterian Church for three years while the church was rebuilt.
- The church was offered complete access to the Barnert Temple sanctuary and classrooms. The *B'nai Jeshurun* Sunday School was changed to a split session so that the Christian Sunday School could use half the classrooms.
- All offers by the church to pay rent or share the cost of gas and maintenance were refused. A magnificent illuminated letter of thanks, signed by the president of the church, its officers and trustees, was given to our temple, It is a precious part of Barnert Temple's history and is proudly displayed in our sanctuary lobby.⁴

Temple Life – The Congregation Evolves (1894 to 1921)

- At the turn of the twentieth century, the congregation was comprised of wealthy professionals, businessmen, and silk manufacturers. At that time, members wore Prince Albert coats, high silk hats, and fashionable Paris gowns at Sabbath services and the High Holy days.
- As the Eastern European immigration wave came to Paterson in the early 1900s, the ethnic make-up of the congregation began to change, and Russian and Polish Jewish names joined those of German origin.
- The choir of B'nai Jeshurun started in 1895 as a paid professional quartet. As the Reform movement grew and its musical liturgy developed, this was changed to a volunteer choir. The choir struggled until 1907 when Jacob Rosen took charge. Rosen, who would later become temple president, had an extensive musical background and often served as cantor at services.
- In 1904 the congregation engaged its first organist, George Benz. He was well loved by the congregation and served well into the 1940s. Mr. Benz, who was a silk weaver before turning to music, was a popular music figure in Paterson and nearby towns. In addition to his Barnert duties, he served as organist and choirmaster for churches in Paterson, Haledon, and the Christ Church in Ridgewood.
- The Sisterhood was founded on November 9, 1915, and by 1920 had over 100 members. The Sisterhood was very active during World War I, contributing to many relief causes and adopting an orphan, Heike Oppen, after the war.
- In 1920, the congregation cemented its ties with Reform Judaism, accepting the Union Prayer Book, the official prayer book of the Reform movement, for general use.
- In 1920, Rabbi Richmond resigned from his post to teach. The temple was in need of fresh new leadership. In May, 1921, Rabbi Max Raisin, a noted speaker, scholar and Hebraist was called from a temple in Brooklyn to take charge of the congregation.

It is noted that in the 20-year period covered by this article (1892 to 1921), Congregation B'nai Jeshurun had eight rabbis, a fairly high turnover. In contrast, in the next 95 years (1921 to 2016) the temple has had only six rabbis. Three of these — Rabbi Max Raisin, Rabbi Martin Freedman, and Rabbi Elyse Frishman representing 85 years of service. Rabbi Max Raisin ushered in a new era for Barnert Temple. Read more about him in a future installment in this series.

At one point, an invitation was extended to attend a Friday-afternoon prayer meeting at the mosque in Midland Park, with their dynamic imam. Everyone is looking forward to the next engagement!

- Sending flowers, plants or balloons from the Barnert Temple Caring Community for various occasions
- Checking in by phone with members who are elderly and live alone and would like this contact


