

## Letter from Jennifer Sauer and Cipora O. Schwartz

Dear Barnert family,

We are pleased to have had the opportunity to plan this milestone year of events in honor of Barnert Temple's 175th anniversary. On this journey, we revisited our rich history, relished our present, and imagined our future. We are gratified to have engaged so many members as both leaders and participants throughout this momentous, year-long celebration.

In 1790, then-President George Washington wrote a letter to the Touro Synagogue in Newport, RI, establishing freedom of religion for every American. In this document, he declared:

"May the children of the stock of Abraham who dwell in this land continue to merit and enjoy the goodwill of the other inhabitants while every one shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree and there shall be none to make him afraid."

For Jews living in America at that time, this statement—coming from the highest office in the land—gave unequivocal permission to all who resided here, regardless of their religious beliefs, to live and pray as they chose without judgment or penalty.

This public assertion laid the groundwork for the founding of B'nai Jeshurun in 1847 in Paterson, NJ, establishing our roots as the first Jewish congregation in the state. Thanks to the vision and generosity of Nathan Barnert, our shared priorities of *Torah*, social justice, philanthropy, and service to all communities has continued to live at the heart of what defines us as a Reform Jewish congregation. Our commitment to *tikkun olam* (repair of the world) has never wavered.

For the European Jews who immigrated to Paterson

in the latter part of the 1800s seeking a better life in a country where they were free to practice Judaism without question, our evolution was miraculous! From *minyans* in private homes to organized services in larger assembly spaces, and eventually our own synagogue on Straight St., Barnert Temple's forward trajectory in what was the first industrial city of our then-young nation was unstoppable!

And here we are today, almost 500 families! ...continuing our strong tradition of study, worship, and service to others—*Torah*, avodah, and g'milut chasadim.

By showing up to participate in our anniversary events, hundreds of members demonstrated their appreciation and understanding that 175 years is a major achievement for us, for our children and grandchildren, and especially for all American Jews.

Our long-lasting success as a vibrant Reform Jewish community is a testament to the dedication of our long history of outstanding clergy and devoted congregants as well as to the relevance we have sustained in the community-at-large over almost two centuries.

We are thankful to everyone who has played a role over these 175 years in what some now call the #barnerteffect—that special, intangible something that emanates throughout the building.

From clergy and staff to our most senior congregants and our youngest preschoolers—we are an extended family! How blessed we are.

**Torah (learning):** Jewish learning is at the core of Jewish living at Barnert. Students in our preschool and Jewish Journey Project learn in innovative and dynamic programs that are rooted in Jewish tradition, and bring Jewish learning and living to life with content that makes Judaism relevant, accessible, and meaningful. We continue to hear from you, our parents, that our Jewish youth education is a primary draw to our sacred community. We give our young people Jewish knowledge and tools to navigate our inherently complicated world within the uniquely loving and fun Barnert community. This empowers our next generation!

And, of course, Jewish learning is not just for our youth. There are many formal and informal opportunities for adults to learn and develop language and tools that bring Judaism to life for all ages and stages. As we prepare to begin a new Jewish year, please look for our adult-education opportunities. Learning is a lifelong process and journey, and we create our Jewish future by continuing to learn and grow as Jewish adults.

**Avodah** (worship): Avodah is not simply prayer. Avodah happens through ritual and community, showing up for holy days and lifecycles, and coming together in times of joy, sadness, and the everyday moments of living. Our renovated space will ensure that **everyone** can participate fully in our gatherings — something that is not possible in our current space. Gathered in brighter spaces that facilitate face-to-face interactions and provide dedicated areas for service leaders, musicians, and participants of all physical abilities, we will continue to create impactful and meaningful Jewish ritual experiences.

During our *Shabbat* celebration of our demi-semi-cept-centennial (say it with me!) in December, we had a taste of the myriad ritual styles that Barnert members have experienced throughout our 175 years. Barnert has survived longer than any other Jewish congregation in New Jersey by innovating and adapting to meet the evolving needs of our community. I can't wait to be in our new sanctuary with you as we continue our rich tradition of ritual, musical innovation, and worship that grows with us and gently nudges us forward.

Gemilut Chasadim (acts of loving kindness):
Our third pillar is our commitment to engaging in acts of kindness and generosity. Our involvement in ongoing

## A Message From Craig Solomon



It's overcast, breezy, and cool in Portland, Maine — a welcome break from the sticky New Jersey summer. Stacey and I drove the 320 miles to stay here tonight, Thursday, July 20, as a jumping-off point to see our daughter at camp for tomorrow's visiting day. She seems to be having a great summer — her sixth, best, and last at the camp she loves. She looks great and is

all smiles in the many pictures the camp posts each week. (What did parents do before camps provided proof-of-life shots?) Still, we can't wait to see her and to hold her, and to look into her eyes and know that our girl is "okay." After visiting day we'll drive back to Portland for the night, then drive 370 miles back

to New Jersey, passing our home on the way to see our son, who is spending much of the summer at an academic program in Lawrenceville.

The kids are having a great time, but it's been an odd summer for Stacey and me. With both kids away from



home for the first time in years, we were surprised at how much we missed them, and how things felt somehow off-balance without them. On the upside, we've had some nice time together and have marveled at how much the kids spoke of missing each other.

As the days have ticked by, we have been reminded of how quickly time is passing. In a year our boy will be off to college, and our girl will be a rising high school junior looking for her first summer job. For now, we savor that in a few weeks they'll both be home, we'll be doing a bit of traveling together as a family (and I with some friends to Wyoming's Wind River Range, my other synagogue), and then back to the usual rhythms of the fall: school, work, the High Holy Days . . . but this time with the knowledge that this will likely be the last year we are all living under the same roof.

For both of our kids, probably like many of yours, their first "away from home" experiences were at Barnert. (Sometimes clichés are simply true: those days feel like yesterday.) For 15 years, Barnert has been an essential part of our lives — at varying distances from the center, but never far off and always within reach.

In the year since I was fortunate enough to become president of the congregation, I've come to learn much about the many roles that Barnert plays in the lives of our congregants, and the ways that people find meaning in our community, often unexpectedly: a renewed sense of purpose, connection, a newfound desire to be a part of something larger than oneself, intellectual stimulation, solace, (re)discovering Judaism, fun and friendship, or simply a feeling that Barnert is "good for my family." At one point or another, Stacey and I have had all of these experiences. I imagine that the desire for these experiences is just part of being human, of being alive. And life happens at Barnert.

Lives happen. You only have to pay attention. And as I write this (now back home in New Jersey), it occurs to me that there is little that is unique about our family's experience. Our family simply is one among many, stretching back generations, whose lives have happened, in part, at Barnert. And if you are reading this, know that some part of your life is happening here, too. That you are part of a community with deep roots and a long, rich history. Regardless of the depth of your connection or involvement — whatever those words mean to you — you are a part of this history.

If you are a long-time member or if you've been a part of the phenomenal growth we've experienced over the last few years (we are now solidly over 500 member families), your pickups and dropoffs, the laughs you've shared in the atrium or at Barnert events, committees and toy drives, religious school and *B'nai Mitzvot*, late-night meetings, friendships, loss, and celebrations . . . all of these moments, these aspects of your lives, are bound up in our history, and they all move us towards a single destination: a future that will be here before we know it.

To be sure, our community has a bright future to look forward to:

Our Lifelong Learning programs (preschool, JJP, adult learning), continue to grow and provide best-in-class opportunities for spiritual, ethical, emotional, and intellectual growth for students of all ages.

Through careful planning and management of our finances, along with the generous support of congregants through Barnert's Annual Fund ("Free Will"), we are in a solid financial position.

The years-long effort to renew the sanctuary, lobby, and library (the Building Together Campaign) will culminate in a groundbreaking soon after the High Holy Days, with work to be mostly complete by *Rosh Hashanah*, 2024. This project is a gift to ourselves, to our kids, and to our community's future — a future that will be here before we know it. This is an opportunity to write that future.

## 175th Anniversary Events

#### **Kickoff Shabbat**

On Friday, December 16, 2022, we kicked off Barnert's 175th anniversary with a very special *Shabbat*. Past Temple Presidents as well as special guests Mayor André



Sayegh of Paterson, Mayor Charles Kahwaty of Franklin Lakes, Congressman Bill Pascrell (9th District), and Bergen County Commissioner Tracy Zur joined the congregation to celebrate Barnert's rich history through words, music,



and food. The service chronologically traced the evolution of Reform Judaism in liturgy and melody starting with traditional prayers circa 1847, and ending with the familiar prayers and music we typically use today. Others who participated in the service included past Barnert clergy Rabbi Elyse Frishman and Cantor Sheila Pearl; Past President of WUPJ, Rabbi Danny Freelander; President of the URJ, Rabbi Rick Jacobs; the Barnert Temple Adult Choir and the Barnert Tempos Youth Choir. Select members both with deep roots as well as those who more recently planted seeds here at Barnert spoke about their unique Barnert experience as well. This uplifting and inspirational evening was topped off with an Oneg for the ages with popular homemade desserts from decades past, including many from Sumptuous Specialties, the Barnert Sisterhood cookbook from the 1970s.

A highlight of the afternoon was a special presentation by Jennifer Sauer and Cipora O. Schwartz, the co-chairs of our 175th



anniversary celebration, which included a short musical performance. A rendition of We'll Be Here Tomorrow, adapted from "The Grand Tour" by Jerry Herman was originally performed as part of a musical cabaret at Barnert Temple in 1981. It was a precursor to the "Survival Drive" which followed shortly thereafter to raise money for Barnert's eventual move in 1987

#### "Slice of Paterson" Bus Tour

Paterson, New Jersey, is where the Barnert origin story began, so touring Paterson as part of our 175th anniversary was a no-brainer. On April 30, 2023, 53 enthusiastic



Barnert members (past and present) donned their rain gear and boarded a charter bus to experience Paterson through the eyes of tour guide Richard Polton, a former Barnert member and avid Paterson historian. His narration throughout the day was accented by personal stories and lively reflections from several in the group who grew up in Paterson and/or raised their families at both the Straight St. and Derrom Ave Barnert locations. There were many opportunities to see various landmarks significant to

the Barnert community as well as to Paterson history. Highlights included the Great Falls where the tour group was met in a torrential downpour by Paterson Mayor André Sayegh and his wife, Farhanna; the multi-faceted



Paterson Museum; and Barnert Temple's Derrom Avenue location (now the Islamic Center of Passaic County). The visit with members of the Islamic Center was especially meaningful as a new connection was forged between Barnert and the leaders of this community. The "Patersonians" on the tour also took a walk down memory lane as they stood in the space that had served as their Jewish home for decades.

We offer a special thank you to the Islamic Center of Passaic County for opening their doors to us and allowing us to share stories and history about our community and the Derrom Avenue location.

#### **Centerville (Clifton) Cemetery Rededication**

On April 16, 2023, current and former members of Barnert, along with elected officials from Clifton, came



together to rededicate Barnert Temple's original cemetery in Clifton, NJ, known as the Centerville Cemetery. At its inception in 1847, purchasing land for a Jewish cemetery was the first order of business for the newly incorporated Congregation B'nai Jeshurun (now commonly referred to as Barnert Temple). Attendees learned about the history of this sacred site and the work completed to preserve the location and headstones and headstone fragments that (Continued on next page)



remain. They also recited kaddish for the first members of our congregation who are buried there. Many in attendance had never been to this site or knew little about it, and the day proved to be moving and insightful and a poignant reminder of our obligation as a community to

care for those in our community, even after they are no longer with us.





## Creating Spaces That Reflect Our Values and Move Us Forward

At a meeting last month of the Building Together Campaign Committee, our discussion moved to the recent *Bar Mitzvah* of a third-generation Barnert teen whose grandfather uses a wheelchair. Because of the



physical limitations of our sanctuary and *bima*, this teen's grandfather, a beloved member of our community, was unable to join his grandson on the *bima* for this *simcha* and milestone. This was a poignant reminder that renovating our spaces is about more than cosmetics. This transformative and essential work is inspired by the loving, vibrant, and accessible Judaism we strive to live at Barnert. Our new spaces will embody this vision and who we are as a community.

Our beloved sanctuary and gathering spaces, while cherished, are not all they should be, and not all they need to be. For many years, we have implemented workarounds for the physical limitations of our building. However, this fall, we will be breaking ground and finally embarking on this transformative journey.

## A Space to Encourage Interaction and Elevate Our Worship Experience

Our renovated sanctuary will be bright, inspiring, flexible, and accessible. Our walls will be covered with light acoustic tiles that brighten and soften the space. The new flooring will also brighten the space and support enhanced acoustics. The central skylight and stained-glass windows behind the *bima* will continue to brighten our space but without causing visual discomfort as they have in the past. Our new seating will accommodate people of all sizes and make it easier for parents seated with young children. The shift away from fixed pews to specially designed chairs for our sanctuary will also allow



us to easily reconfigure our space for special programs and provide easier access for those using walkers and wheelchairs. The three-sided configuration of our seating will also allow for visibility and interaction among congregants in addition to the clergy and others on the bima. Our new bima will be lower and will include a ramp, making it accessible to individuals of all abilities.

Aesthetics, design, and function will come together in special elements like a new *ner tamid* (eternal flame above the ark), which will be crafted from art created by Devra Freelander z"I, the late daughter of Rabbi Emerita Elyse Frishman and Rabbi Danny Freelander. Devra's art



was inspired by her connection to the outside world and symbolizes our obligation to care for the earth and one another. Our new ark doors will be made, in part, from the wood of our existing ark doors to keep us connected to the Barnert generations that came before us.

#### **New Spaces to Congregate and Connect**

Our lobby will be expanded and completely transformed into a bright, comfortable space with seating and gathering spaces that allow people to gather, relax, and connect. The raised roof and large glass windows will bring in natural light and the natural beauty of our

Our social hall will be refreshed with new flooring and lighting, and our outdoor patio will be rebuilt and expanded.

Our new youth lounge, named in memory

addition to mothers and grandmothers, will be able to comfortably help children or change diapers. Individuals in wheelchairs will be able to use our facilities with ease.

#### **Enhanced Technology**

A/V experts are providing guidance to make sure our renovated spaces continue to support in-person and remote worship, learning, and celebrations and sound capabilities for a range of events including musical guests. We also hope to leverage enhanced technology, like retractable screens in our sanctuary, to elevate how we learn and worship together. The goal is to not only meet our needs today but to position ourselves to meet our technical and A/V needs as our worship, gathering, and learning styles evolve.

Thanks to the generosity of approximately 130 donors to date, our campaign has raised approximately 4.3 million dollars. This number is impressive, and we are incredibly grateful to each and every person who has chosen to be part of this effort and take on the responsibility of doing what our predecessors did: building a space not only for us but also for the generations to come.

increases in the cost of just about everything, including building materials and labor. As a result, original estimates for the cost of the project — proposed four years ago — had to be increased. An additional \$700,000 is necessary to reach the \$5 million goal to fully realize the vision for our space.

## **Turning Vision Into Reality**

In 2019, our community began the hard work of writing a new chapter in our congregation's 175-year history. It is with great excitement that we will finally break ground on the construction efforts to redesign our gathering and worship areas and create spaces that are inspirational, accessible, and adaptable and which will foster engagement and

connection within our Barnert family. We've developed construction and design plans, and this October, we begin the work of turning the vision for our building into reality!

Barnert has made the choice to remain in our building during the construction project. Anyone who has undergone a construction project in their home or place of work knows that construction can be disruptive and often forces us to do things differently for a period of time. With that said, our construction will follow a phased approach that allows us to keep our schools and building operational during its duration.

Planned Construction Period: One Year, **Beginning October 2023** 

Phase I: Oct. 2023 (estimated duration: four months) Social Hall, Large Meeting Room, and New Gender-**Neutral Bathroom** 

During this phase, we will continue to have full use of our sanctuary and adjacent areas. A sound-proof construction wall will separate the construction

area and keep our building secure. Workers will be entering/exiting our building through designated entrances in the rear of the building.

#### Phase IIa: March 2024 (estimated duration: five months) Sanctuary, Library, Lobby, BarTY Lounge, and Related Areas

As in Phase I, a sound-proof construction wall will be built to separate and contain the construction area. During this time, we will use our renovated social hall for services, simchas, and other gatherings. We'll also be using other non-impacted areas of the building in new and creative ways to allow for gatherings, meetings, etc.

Phase IIb: August 2024 (estimated duration: two months) Renovation of Existing Bathrooms, Completion of Lobby Curtain Wall, and Movable Partition Separating Sanctuary and Social Hall

During the year-long construction, Barnert will be sharing updates to keep our entire community informed about what's happening in our building with this once-in-ageneration project. We will also be creating a space on our website with updated FAQs on the project.

The coming year is sure to be an exciting time! We look forward to seeing you during the High Holy Days as we gather for the final time in our existing sanctuary and celebrate our promising future.




Max and Jacob Rosen, 1910. Jacob Rosen served as Temple president for 12 years.



Barnert Temple's Straight Street location on its 100th anniversary.




In 1860, Congregation B'nai Jeshurun moved to new quarters at 9 Mulberry Street, Paterson, NJ.
