#### Interfaith Commemoration of International Holocaust Remembrance Day at TBTST



Last January 29<sup>th</sup> we had a very important program at TBTST. I am referring to International Holocaust Remembrance Day. I wanted to review that event and give you some context to it as well.

The United Nations General Assembly designated January 27—the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau—as International Holocaust Remembrance Day, a time to remember the six million Jewish victims of the Holocaust and the millions of other victims of Nazi persecution. It is a day for the world, not only the Jewish people, to remember the horrors of the Holocaust and honor its victims.

This day must not be confused with Yom Hashoah, which is observed the 27th day of Nisan on the Hebrew calendar and marks the anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising. Yom Hashoah has been observed since the 1950s as a national holiday in Israel, and Jewish communities around the world commemorate this day as well. As a Jewish congregation, we will continue observing Yom Hashoah, independently of International Holocaust Remembrance Day.

Since International Holocaust Remembrance Day is a day of remembrance for the world, Rabbi Daniela and I wanted to involve our non-Jewish neighbors in this commemoration. That is why we designed a commemoration in the form of an interfaith event, so people of different faiths can learn about the Holocaust and its lessons. And since we wanted this to be a community event, we also invited the leaders of the City of Tamarac to attend and join us in organizing this event. In addition, we joined Steve Siegel in making this event a part of the annual calendar of Kulanu events. Kulanu is an eight-month program, kicking off annually after the High Holidays, dedicated to empowering congregations to address antisemitism and hate in their communities through education, community engagement, and advocacy.

The result of all these efforts was a wonderful evening of community remembrance. We had Mayor Michelle J. Gomez, Commissioner Marlon D. Bolton (District 1), Vice Mayor Morey Wright (District 2), Commissioner Elvin Villalobos (District 3), and Commissioner Kicia Daniel (District 4) in attendance, together with Jemeriah Cooper, Captain of BSO Tamarac District and other police officers.

The speakers for the event were Mayor Gomez, Pastor Bob di Scipio (Hope for All Nations Church), Pastor Bill Davis (Community Christian Church), Pastor Joseph Kim (South Florida Global Methodist Church), and Rabbis Daniela Szuster and Rami Pavolotzky (Temple Beth Torah Sha'aray Tzedek). In addition, a young person from each house of worship read a poem about the Holocaust, and lit a memorial candle together, after listening to Cantor Kramarow's interpretation of the song Eli, Eli.

Since we wanted this to be a community event, we encouraged the pastors to invite their congregants to come. As a result, we had a very nice turnout that represented the different churches, in addition to TBTST. Finally, after the formal program ended, a dessert reception, sponsored by Mayor Michelle Gomez, was served in the social hall, giving everyone an opportunity to mingle and have a good time of camaraderie together.

We think this is an excellent program, because it allows us to educate the community about the Holocaust, provides a platform for people of different faiths to remember the Holocaust together, provides a good opportunity for establishing friendly and working relationships with other houses of worship-and their congregants, and gives our Temple a good opportunity for visibility in the community. We hope we can make this event a yearly commemoration, and we also hope to have even more religious leaders and congregants attending in the coming years.

### **Cantor's Message**

Purim is one of the jolliest times of the year. It is celebrated every year on the 14th of the Hebrew month of Adar (late winter/early spring). It commemorates the salvation of the Jewish people in ancient Persia from Haman's plot "to destroy, kill, and annihilate all the Jews, young and old, infants and women, in a single day."

Those of you who attend Saturday evening services regularly, know that when I lead, I like to play Jewish jeopardy. So here I will pose a few of my Jewish jeopardy Purim questions with all the answers below.

- 1. What is the etymology of the word "Purim"?
- 2. Why do we fast the day before Purim?
- 3. Why do we masquerade on Purim?
- 4. What is Purim Torah?
- 5. Who was thwarted in the 1950s on Purim?
- 6. What war in the 20th century ended on Purim?

#### Answers:

- 1. Purim is a Persian word. Purim means "lots" in ancient Persian. The holiday was thus named since the evil Haman had thrown lots to determine when he would carry out his diabolical scheme.
- 2. It commemorates Esther's fasting and praying to G d that He save His people.
- 3. Many say that we are concealing ourselves behind a costume reflects the way G d operated behind a cloak of natural events.
- 4. It is a humorous and satirical comments in the learned style of Talmudic halakhic comments customarily read, recited from memory, or authored on or for the Jewish holiday of Purim.
- 5. In the early 1950s, Joseph Stalin, the ruthless butcher of millions of innocent people, had bloody plans for dealing with the "Jewish problem" in the U.S.S.R. Just as things were reaching a crisis point in 1953, he suddenly fell ill and died. His illness began . . . on Purim!
- 6. In 1990, Saddam Hussein of Iraq defiantly invaded nearby Kuwait. As pressure ramped up from the international community, his army began firing missiles into Israel. After the U.S.-led forces attacked Iraq, they were quickly victorious, and the hostilities ended . . . on Purim!

"And Moses said unto God: 'Oh God, I am not a man of words, neither heretofore, nor since Thou hast spoken unto Thy servant; for I am slow of speech, and of a slow tongue." (Exodus 4:10)

Why is the power of speech such a fundamental value in Jewish culture? We learn that at the beginning, God used spoken words to create the world. God provided us with the understanding that spoken words are a powerful tool. A tool that leads to a change. In the story of Passover, God provides Moses with a revolutionary task – to lead our nation from slavery to freedom. Initially, God arms Moses with only one tool – spoken words.

God trusts Moses' ability to negotiate with Pharaoh, as well as prepare the Israelites for a life-changing journey. However, aware of his own disabilities, Moses did not believe in his power to create this change and therefore argued with God. As a result, God appointed Aaron, Moses' older brother, to speak on Moses' behalf. Can it be that in the process of passing the words from God to Moses and from Moses to Aaron, somehow along the way, the spoken words lost their power? We are all familiar with the children's game "Telephone" when the first child whispers a word in his friend's ear and at the end of the game, the last child tells out aloud the word that he heard, which is in most times not the initial spoken word. Was that the reason that Pharaoh refused to listen and only after the tenth plaque did he agree to let the people go, only to change his mind? Is this the reason for the Israelites' constant doubts and insecurity? Well, your guess will probably be as good as mine. Did God compromise his goal in his attempt to help Moses complete his task? Did Aaron's role helped Moses overcome his fear, or did it contribute to Moses' insecurity? How can we, as parents, help our children to have confidence in themselves? How can we help our children succeed considering obstacles they may face? As parents, we very quickly learn that there is no "magic formula." As parents we can only hope and pray that we are doing the "right thing" and provide our children with the confidence and tools to follow their dreams, face obstacles that come along, and live their lives the way we hope they will.

We would like to introduce you to a new payment method TBTST now offers. Venmo is an easy way to remit your payment to TBTST without paying fees. Should you choose this method of payment, here are the instructions to get started.

#### How to Sign Up and Use Venmo

**1.** Go to the app store on your Smart Phone, search for Venmo and download the app for Apple or Android (**Ven-mo** does not have a Windows app)

2. Open the Venmo app.

**3**.Create your account using your name, email address and cell phone number. Create a secure password (between 8 and 32 characters long). A code will be sent to your phone. Enter the code in the Venmo app.

**4**. Verify your phone number and email address. Add your bank account. Venmo will explain how your bank account will be verified.

**NOTE**: You can enter a credit card into your Venmo account. **However, Venmo will charge a fee if you pay us using a credit card.** If you use your bank account, there will be **no fee** and it is the same as writing a check.

**5**. You will want to adjust the Privacy Settings on your app so that no one can see your transactions. Look for the 3 parallel lines in the upper right corner of the app. Touch that to open the main menu. Touch Settings, then touch Privacy. Finally, change the default settings to Private.

6. Once this is done you can start to use your Venmo account to pay TBTST.

7. To make a payment on your app find the **Pay or Request** button on the home page.

The button will either look like this:



or it will look like **a** pencil and **a** square.

**8**. Type in <u>Venmo@tbtst.org</u> (the "V" in Venmo must be capitalized) in the box that appears. Put in the dollar amount you would like to pay. Please do not forget to fill in the "What's it for?" box so we will know the purpose of your payment. Press the pay button. Look at the bottom of the screen and click Pay Temple Beth Torah Sha'aray Tzedek. You must do this last step, or the transaction will not be completed.

9. Once you have made a payment to TBTST, you will not have to enter the recipient again. Just look at the list of Top People and you should see Temple Beth Torah Sha'aray Tzedek. Click on that and you're ready to pay.

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

Yahrzeit is a Yiddish word, which literally means "time of year" or memorial. Jews of Ashkenazi descent use this term. Sephardim call this commemoration nahala, in Ladino. This custom is widely observed and based on the Jewish tradition of commemorating the death of a relative.

All the Yahrzeit rituals are deeply ingrained in the Jewish life. The common rituals that are performed in the honorable memory of the departed soul include reciting the Kaddish prayer and lighting a Yahrzeit candle.

Yahrzeit also includes the action of donating charity in memory of a deceased loved one. Through the performance of the mitzvah of tzedakah in the name of the departed, the merit of the deed is shared with the soul of the late relative, as their memory is enhanced

Although any amount is deemed appropriate on such an occasion, a gift of CHAI - \$18 - or multiples of 18 - is particularly fitting when pleading for a person's recovery from sickness.

CHAI in Hebrew means life. The two Hebrew letters which constitute the word - CHET and YUD - have the numerical equivalents of eight and ten respectively, together yielding the sum of eighteen.
