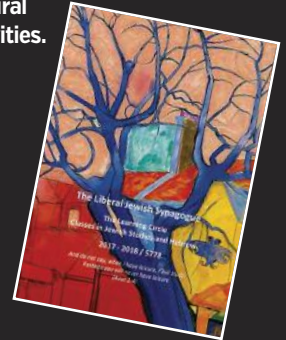



Caring for traditions (and members' data)

LJS Chairman Sue Head considers the project to catalogue the writings of Rabbi John Rayner – and the need to ensure the security of the information we hold about members

I am writing this in August, both looking ahead to the September edition of the newsletter and back to our July Council meeting.

In July we welcomed the new Council members – Sylvia Churba, David Davidson, Chris Godbold and Alex Weiss – to their first meeting following the AGM. We have a very nice tradition which was started by Michael Hart, our previous Chairman, of welcoming the new Council with a prayer in front of the open ark in the sanctuary. By starting in this way, we remind ourselves of our underlying beliefs as progressive Jews and of our desire to build towards a better future.

At the July meeting, we were given a briefing on a particularly important element of our responsibilities. This is Data Protection and how we, as a community of members, should ensure compliance under the Data Protection Act. This is undoubtedly a key area for The LJS, guaranteeing that care is taken with people's personal data. The information we received will be disseminated to members of staff and chairs of committees

and formulated into a policy setting out our practice. Clearly, this is a crucial subject for us to get right and we are grateful to Jacob Head for giving us the facts we need.

Council also received a report from Rabbi Pfertzel on the progress of the John Rayner Project. The purpose of this project is to create an online annotated bibliography of the writings, sermons and correspondence of Rabbi John Rayner and to develop an education module based on his teachings on ethics.

Rabbi Pfertzel has been working on this for the past year and reports that he has been amazed at the enormous scope of the material. Given the large number of sermons and lectures, Rabbi Pfertzel is primarily concentrating on just these first of all, leaving decisions to be taken later about Rabbi Rayner's other writings.

Rabbi Pfertzel will continue developing this project for one day each week, combining it with his new job as Rabbi of Kingston Liberal Synagogue. We are all pleased that this gives us a continuing working relationship with Rabbi Pfertzel,

rather than his disappearing completely to south of the river!

A word of thanks to Lysa Schwartz, our interim Executive Director, for overseeing the renovation of the kitchen during August and to the caretakers who have had to work with the logistical problems of having builders on site.

Council returns to its regular monthly meetings in September, when our first focus will be on planning for the year ahead.

September also brings the start of the High Holy Days with *Rosh Hashanah*, New Year 5778, on Wednesday evening, 20 September. Please check you have paid your subscription in order to receive your High Holy Day tickets!

Are we all to be judged for the horrors of the past year?

After a traumatic year, Rabbi Alexandra Wright looks forward to a restoration of decency and hope during the High Holy Days

This is never an easy message to write. In spite of louring skies, London is quiet, schools are out and there is a sense of letting go of the intensity of the past few months of work, of relentless bad news and allowing oneself a few days to read, to walk, to enjoy a new part of the country, to learn the contours of a different landscape.

In many ways, the spiritual landscape of the *Yamim Nora'im* – the High Holy Days – through which we journey during the month of Tishri, is both familiar and different. There are the steep gradients of remorse and repentance, the whale-back hills of judgment and the gentler inclines of forgiveness and remembrance.

It is in the weeks before *Rosh Hashanah*, in the month of Ellul, that we look for signposts that take us into this distinctive topography of the Tishri festivals: remember your past deeds, return to God, judge yourself, forgive those who have wronged you and seek forgiveness from those whom you have wronged.

Affirm the sanctity of life and turn back. Turn back to God whom you have forsaken, who takes you back with love and mercy.

But the journey is not easy. For the signposts of remembrance take us to days in the past year of pain and depression: Manchester, Westminster Bridge, London Bridge, Borough Market – scarred sites of terrorist atrocities, where lost lives are mourned and the wounded all but forgotten. And to a world further afield in Afghanistan, Egypt, France, Iraq, Israel, Pakistan, Somalia, Sudan and Syria, and countless other

places, where terrorist outrages and massacres have claimed, and go on to claim on a daily basis, their dead and injured. Will history count the cost of lives lost in this 30-year war of the 21st century?

These are the events that remain in my memory of the past year. These – and the terrible fire of Grenfell Tower – where we have stopped, unaccountably, counting the dead. Are these the

things for which we are judged? And for which we should atone? Are we, in some way, collectively responsible for these shocking events that have happened here, in our own country, in our own city and even beyond? Are we accountable for poverty and oppression, for fire and famine?

We look out into our troubled world searching for some kind of moral bearing, a compass that might direct or provide us with a response to the tragedies and atrocities which beset our universe. We seek leadership and direction, certainty and truth that will reveal the world as we believe it ought to be.

Rosh Hashanah takes us back to beginnings, to the darkness and watery chaos of unformed life. Rabbi Eliezer's statement, 'In the month of Tishri the world was created,' is not simply a mythological gloss to the meaning of the festival, but something more profound. In the midst of our moral uncertainty and confusion, we go back to a starting point, to a simple stage of being able to tell our story from the very beginning. The *Yamim Nora'im* help to put behind us all the tawdriness and superficiality of our lives; they remove from our lips those thousand

words of gossip and slander, of meaningless platitudes and resentments. They eradicate the treachery and waste in our lives and disentangle us from the complexities of our relationships and allow us to become like a newborn, discovering ourselves and the world about us as though it is something new and unseen.

The festivals ask us the simple question: what have we done with our life? There are few days in the Jewish year when we stand quite as alone as we do on *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur*, scrutinising the truth of the past year, facing, as the *machzor* says, 'the many blemishes which disfigure us: greed and envy, self-pity and self-indulgence, cruelty and callousness, prejudice and arrogance, hatred and destructiveness.' These are the things that damage and estrange us from each other, that drive away hope and a sense that there is a divine presence deep within us guiding us towards decency and goodness.

One *Shabbat* morning as the summer term was coming to an end, the teacher of the youngest pupils in Rimon, our religion school, entrusted me with the task of showing the children the ark and the *Sifrei Torah* and all their precious appurtenances. When we had put away the scroll and closed the ark, I led them to the place where Anish Kapoor's *Shoah* memorial is positioned, a massive, brooding dark stone

directly opposite the *aron ha-kodesh* in the front foyer of the synagogue. I said nothing, only that I wished to show them something special, and we stood as they examined this silent stone, as though it had been mined from some ancient quarry, thousands of years old. What did they see and feel as they touched its rough edges and stroked its smooth, hollowed out centre?

One saw a mirror, reflecting everything around her; another felt the weight of its sadness that reminded her of the death of her grandmother; yet another saw deep inside its dark cavity, God's dwelling place.

As we enter these Days of Awe, let us do so with honesty and humility, holding up a mirror to ourselves, reaching out with empathy and kindness to those in distress, seeking forgiveness from those we have wronged and finding in the deepest recesses of our heart the strength to pray: 'O God, listen to our prayers and supplications from your heavenly dwelling place, and pardon Your people who have sinned against You for all the transgressions that they have committed against You...' (1 Kings 8:49-50).

May you and all your dear ones be inscribed for a peaceful and healthy *Shanah Tovah*.

Caroline Weiss writes about her experience as a volunteer with Save a Child's Heart (SACH) in Israel

Before I arrived at Save a Child's Heart I had only read about the charity online and heard about it from a friend who had volunteered there previously. I didn't know what it would be like to live here for two weeks and spend all my time with these inspiring children. It's been so interesting to learn about different cultures and people's lives in Africa as I didn't know much about them before.

All the mums here are so caring, and always offer us food from their native country (which has always been delicious!) It's eye-opening to see such caring people when

they are going through something so difficult in their lives.

I have learnt so much from these children and it's going to be incredibly difficult saying goodbye. It has also been amazing seeing some children go through surgery and then come back to the house, allowing me to see how successful the surgeries are and how fast the kids recover. Social media and the internet can show you what a charity is like through information and videos, but after living in the Save a Child's Heart house with all the children and some of their guardians I fully

understood what incredible work the charity undertakes and how it impacts on the children's and mothers' lives.

I loved building these relationships and learning about their lives in their own countries. This charity allows these incredible and inspiring children to have a future they deserve.

From 26 September to 12 December

Classical Hebrew

Beginners with Susannah Alexander

This class is designed for beginners who want to learn to read and decipher the prayer book. No previous knowledge of Hebrew is required. Three-term course.

Next steps in biblical Hebrew with Sally Gold

This class is for those who would like to practise guided reading, at their own pace, of simple Hebrew from the *Siddur* and the Hebrew Bible. We will gradually build reading skills and knowledge of vocabulary and simple grammar at an unhurried and manageable pace. The class allows plenty of time to gain, revise and consolidate using texts from the *Siddur* and some simple exercises which help with progressive understanding and confidence.

Saul: an unsuitable case for a king, with Rabbi Alexandra Wright

The Book of Samuel includes the stories of the first king of Israel, a complex character, not altogether suited for kingship, as well as the rise of King David from simple shepherd boy. These stories are told in consummate narrative form. The Hebrew is not too difficult. The class aims to improve your reading, widen your vocabulary and build knowledge of grammatical forms.

Exploring Judaism with Rabbi Rachel Benjamin and Student Rabbi Igor Zinkov

Exploring Judaism is for people who wish they knew more about Judaism or would like to brush up their Jewish knowledge. It is for family members who are not Jewish, who would like to understand more about Judaism. It is also an essential programme for people choosing Judaism, by conversion. Class members are encouraged to read materials which will be made available online. The course is designed to offer knowledge about aspects of Judaism, to encourage practical experiences of Liberal Judaism and space for personal reflection within the group.

Tuesday Texts

This friendly group is led by our Rabbis, Dr Dov Softi and Susannah Alexander as we study biblical texts and commentaries and enjoy sessions on Jewish art. Our discussions are lively and relevant to contemporary issues. This year's topics will include Holocaust Theology, as well as a course by our visiting Rabbi, Dr Michael Hilton on 'Adventures in Jewish History', sessions on 'Maimonides and Jewish Rationalism', 'An Introduction in *Kabbalah*' and 'The Creativity of Ashkenazi Jewry'.

Tuesdays 20.00-21.15

7, 14, 21 and 28 November

'Belief and Unbelief' – taught by Dr Jonathan Gorsky

The course is intended to provide an open and tolerant space to explore contemporary issues of belief and unbelief. We will look at the impact of history and culture on our understanding of belief and critically engage with various approaches to the secularisation of British society.

Belief is usually embedded in tradition, but Jewish tradition has been under question since Spinoza – the first modern Jew – challenged its basic assumptions. Jewish tradition in the West has been under different forms of critical assault ever since, from the Enlightenment to feminist critique of its core texts. We will try to find our bearings and look at some contemporary Jewish responses.

Finally, we will introduce some current approaches to the relationship of science and religious belief, including the New Atheists and current controversies in the philosophy of science. We will also look at some approaches from the Christian world and see if they are helpful for modern Judaism.

Jonathan Gorsky graduated in history from Liverpool and Manchester Universities in 1976 and spent a number of years in advanced Jewish study. He was Education Director of the Yakar Centre until 1992 and Education Officer of the Council of Christians and Jews until 2006. In 2007 Jonathan joined Heythrop College as lecturer in Judaism and Jewish-Christian Relations and he was degree convener for the BA (Abrahamic Religions) until the college's closure in 2017.

Torah study and Jewish thought

Half-term: 21 and 28 October

In the autumn term we will be looking at the weekly *Torah* portion, followed by a short session on the thought of the late Rabbi John Rayner. The class will be self-led, with special guests leading a few of the sessions during the term.

The class is open to all interested individuals. No prior knowledge is necessary. While some of us have been studying together for some time, this is a fresh beginning, and anyone interested is very welcome to join in, some of the time, or for the whole term. Beginners' Hebrew with Naomi Brightwell**Half-term: 21 and 28 October**

Naomi Brightwell's class uses Jonathan Romain's *Signs and Wonders* to help complete beginners decode the squiggles and start tackling what they've always been afraid of. With a little bit of grammar, a sprinkling of vocabulary and plenty of off-topic conversations on Jewish food, the structure of the liturgy and anything else that helps us have fun while learning. No previous knowledge required. Previous students have even gone on to lead *Shabbat* morning services.

Moving up in Hebrew with David Strang

The aim of this class is to help students to understand the Hebrew prayers and songs in our services. New students will need basic reading skills but we will spend some time increasing reading fluency. We will also look at the basics of Hebrew grammar using the textbook *Prayerbook Hebrew the Easy Way* which will be available for purchase. We will build up your vocabulary too, and there will be five words a week to learn. We will also start learning how to write the Hebrew letters, using simplified versions of the block letters in the *siddur*.

Intermediate Hebrew with Nitza Spiro

The aim of these sessions is to explore the Hebrew texts which the learners will come across in synagogue services on *Shabbatot* and festivals.

Some of the texts which will be introduced and studied in preparation for each festival (like the Passover *Haggadah*, the Book of Esther, and the Book of Ruth with some verses from the Book of Proverbs) might even be sung at times. Hopefully this knowledge will also be shared with families at home. The class will be working on fluency in reading but at the same time will also be learning about the historical, ethical, philosophical, and ideological messages of the texts. Through such familiarity every student will gain a deeper understanding and sense of identity with our heritage as well as appreciation and love for the Hebrew language.

Yom Kippur Study Sessions**13.15-14.15 IN THE SANCTUARY**

Five experts in five different fields explore their areas of expertise in relation to *Yom Kippur*:
