A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT...

1 Tishrei, 5784 September 15, 20230

Good evening! Shana Tovah! I can't believe it has been a year since I last spoke to all of you. And what a year it has been! I am excited to let you know we presently have 219 members. If you have joined Mizpah since last Rosh Hashanah, please stand up! Everyone look around, and if you see someone you do not know, please reach out to them at this evening's board sponsored reception after services.

Our Board is functioning and strong. We now have a children's service in which children can attend without parents. This has been a challenge in the past, but has been corrected with the help of **Edie Weiss** and **Susan Caminez**. Classes are continuing and for the first time in many years, Rabbi Lewis will be offering a confirmation class, and more lunch and learns. **Marissa Street** has organized the youth group, and they have a board in which to make decisions. **Jen Lewis** has taken on the sole role of being the Rosh for Machanooga, and most of the teachers are from Mizpah, which I think reflects the Judaism we strive to practice.

I have had conversations with some of our long time congregants who feel connected to our Mizpah community although rarely attend events. I wonder about these congregants' reasons for belonging. Perhaps it is because being a member of the Mizpah community gives you an immediate family. An opportunity to see long known friends. An opportunity to feel our Judaism in whatever way we choose. I love the comfort I receive when I know we have so much in common, yet so many very different interests. I believe we do show up for the activities our membership does offer.

We have two very different events coming up. On September 30, **Bob Marlowe and Marcia Noe** have invited us to their home for a discussion of the movie, **Oppenheimer**. Looking at the ethics involved should intrigue all of us. Six weeks later we have our fantastic Emily Nelson Rodgers concerton November 5th organized by **Herb Cohn**, and sponsored by the Cohn/Cohen Families.

Unfortunately, today's world is not as gentle as we would like, and anti-semitism is on the rise. Through the diligent work of Richard Waxler and Frank Miller, we have received a federal grant of \$150,000 towards further securing our building. We also have received a \$16,000 grant from the state of Tennessee to specifically pay for security personnel. In addition, we have congregants watching the cameras and assisting with observation outside during our services tonight, tomorrow, Kol Nidre, and all during the day of Yom Kippur. Thank you for being a member of our Mizpah Community!

This has been a great opportunity for me, and I hope you feel the same way. This is the abridged version of what I wanted to say since we are nearing the end of the service. You can read more in my article this month.

We have so many members participating in various activities and a few who participate in most. **Mahjong** on Mondays, **Mussar** on Wednesdays as well as **Machanooga** meet-ups.

Our **Birgenthal Kindertransport Chapel** was dedicated this past year, through the help of **Austin Center** and **Mike Birgenthal**, whose grandmother was on one of the survivors on the kindertransport train. Mike's father spoke powerfully at the dedication.

Bev Coulter has done an unbelievable job getting our rolls up to date and encouraging all of us to pledge what we can. So far we have more pledges than this time last year. She has worked diligently for our temple for years, while simultaneously caring for her dear late husband, Steve.

Jed Mescon has continued to bring in unusual speakers and programs, highlighting not only Mizpah members, but others in our community. If you missed the intriguing conversations with **Juniper Russo**, **Ernest Craw**, or **Deborah Levine**, you missed a treat.

Mizpah is where you can experience your Judaism as you participate in those functions which most interest you. Do you like the rituals of religious service? **Rabbi Lewis** has worked diligently to create services that are meaningful with thoughtful lessons and prayer. Perhaps, you like to cook or bake. **David Israel**, in addition to having helped update communications as well as being my right hand man as vp of administration has been preparing First Friday meals because he likes to cook. **Linda Spector**, **Lynn Howard**, **Paula Israel**, and **Leta Berger usually bring in a heavenly dessert. Ivan Dominguez** made a Cuban meal one night and it was delicious. **Ruth Longway** prepared Ukrainian one night, and it was delicious. She also is organizing the reception after our November concert, and if you have not yet bought a sponsorship or individual ticket, I encourage you to come for the outstanding music and reception after.

This is **Herb Cohn's** last year to be Mizpah's fundraising chair. **Holly and Skip Schwartz** and **Lee and Iris Abelson**, **and Aaron and Jen Lincove** have agreed to work together for the 2024/2025 Fiscal year on tackling this challenge to our budget. If you have any ideas, or suggestions, please contact one of them.

Perhaps you like to organize. We had Judy Sachsman, Alexis Street, John and Vicki Steinberg, and Andy Hodes volunteer to coordinate our congregational Break-the-Fast after closing services Yom Kippur Day.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR RABBI...

I am going to do a bit of Rosh Hashanah redux. First of all, the Erev service started with a story/joke that did not seem to land. Of my own admission, it was not the funniest Jewish story I have encountered, not even top ten. I, however, like Chelm stories and thought the theme was a good lead-in to the service. Yet, it seems some did not understand the implied context of the Chelm legends with its "wise" men, and the punch line was too subtle, so subtle that punch was barely a tickle. I am about to break a cardinal rule of humor. E.B. White compared explaining a joke to dissecting a frog. "You understand it better, but the frog dies in the process." Alas, here we go. I first confess: I may have just told it wrong. So even if you got the point, but didn't laugh, or if you neither laughed nor got the point, I want to explain because I did find in the story a strong theme.

A man in Chelm comes up with an unsolvable riddle. "What is purple, hangs on a wall, and whistles?" Obviously, no one can answer, so he tells them, it was a whitefish. Conveniently, he reveals that he took a whitefish, painted it purple and hung it on his wall. A trickster, he has stacked the odds entirely in his favor by defying the rules of riddles, basing it on knowledge that only he would have. That's the core of the story. A "wise" man of Chelm demonstrates "wisdom" in a peculiar way that no one would really call wisdom. That is the story trope of Chelm legends. Then, when the trickster is pressed about the whistling, he concedes, "alright, so it doesn't whistle." Again, "wise," but also very much in the acquiescent mold of Jewish humor, "Nu, so you can't have everything." Or in the words of the late rock star Meatloaf, "Two out of three ain't bad." Again, I knew it wasn't THAT funny. But it does have a place in the catalog of Jewish jokes. And here's the rub: it's about expectations that do not get fulfilled. The people expected something purple on a wall that whistles. And I asked, and ask again, what in the previous year did we anticipate, what promise did we see in 5783 that was not realized, and how can we find in ourselves what it takes to make it happen in 5784? We want the new year to whistle with opportunity and success, as always, making each year better than the one before.

I hope that helps, retroactively. Fortunately, the service picked up from that point. Here are a couple more nuggets from the services I hope we can carry with us for the year:

"To reload, reboot and recharge the Jewish New Year, let me share something I learned in Israel. It's a Hebrew word, 'Titchadeish.'... It means, "may you be renewed (by the newness of this experience)." The origins for the term go back to the 16th century. The Shulchan Aruch gives instructions for blessing a new purchase. You know the old joke about asking the rabbi to bless a Ferrari? It's like that, but different. If one has a new piece of clothing, you say, 'T'valah ve-titchadeish,' 'May you wear it and be renewed.' The phrase has been shortened to one word and applies to all sorts of new items. The closest we have in English is, 'use it in good health,' but I find the Hebrew wish to be stronger, not just 'be healthy,' but, 'may you feel renewed vitality.' We find echoes of this in the Avinu Malkeinu, when we say, 'Chadesh aleinu shana tovah.' 'Renew for us a good year.' And in the Sephardic tradition, these words are the prayer for eating apples and honey. Honey, being made up of simple sugars, is the original energy food. So, apples and honey in the new year, is about more than the sweetness of the calendar change. It enables us to burst into the new, feeling revived and confident. I like the idea that, instead of 'L'Shana Tovah,' 'have a good year,' we might say instead, 'Titchadeish!' May this new year bring us all renewed energy, opportunity, health, and success. It would be a little change, and you know what, maybe just one little change is all it would take to begin the new year with new energy."

Here is a bit from the morning service:

"The modern Hebrew poet, Hayim Nacham Bialik, imagined that the more Jews turned away from Judaism, we caused one of *Shechinah's* wings to wither and break. I share this with you today, not because we should see ourselves as guilty, but rather, so we might find hope, if not inspiration. If neglect has broken the wing, then Bialik's words suggest, we have power to heal it. We usually think of God as distant, unknowable. But, if we were to imagine God being close to us, needing us, seeking our love and care, it would both empowering and humbling. We, Reform Jews, have a unique approach to repairing the *Shechinah's* wing. We explore a middle path between science and Torah, between modernity and Jewish life, seeking to weave them together, like the braid of a Havdalah candle. The Havdalah candle helps us to separate the sacred from the ordinary, and it has to be woven carefully. Reform Judaism has wicks of knowledge and tradition tightly wrapped around the center wick of choice. Sometimes we lean too heavily on "choice," often making choices at the expense of the other two wicks of our candle. Thus, we miss out on knowledge, traditions and experiences that could prove to be meaningful. We might do well to lean a little more toward obligation, to focus less on the "I", and more on the "We", to be open to the undiscovered "Us." So let us all in 5784 say "Yes" to Judaism, to raising it up, and to making it soar on the wings *Shechinah*.

I again wish you all a happy, healthy 5784. And look forward to seeing you at October events and beyond.




