Growing up, my summers always included long car trips to Pittsburgh or Chicago to visit family. We would stay a couple of weeks, play with cousins, and really deepened relationships that continue to flourish today. I couldn't believe so many Jewish people lived in each neighborhood I visited.

Living in Birmingham, where the Jewish population was smaller, I had a different sense of belonging than in each of those larger cities. Synagogues and Shuls seemed to be everywhere and within walking distance in Chicago. Just the opposite of Birmingham, where there was one synagogue representing each branch of Judaism, similar to what exists in Chattanooga today; and churches were within walking distance everywhere in Birmingham.

I went to Jewish day camp at Michiana Shores, where numerous families had summer houses, and everyone around seemed to be Jewish. I went to Jewish day camp in Birmingham as well, and that continued to reinforce my love of being Jewish. Both camps created friendships that exist today.

Life was so different in the 1950's. Jews were not allowed to live in certain areas, so my friends and I lived relatively close to one another. High school sororities and fraternities did not allow Jewish members. I did not have non-Jewish friends. My parents did not have non-Jewish friends. Few, if any, teenagers dated non-Jews, and few married non-Jews.

That doesn't seem to be the case in today's world. So many of the changes are welcome. We have friends from many different walks of life and religious affiliations. Our world has expanded. However, I need my connection to Judaism, and I hope you do as well. I love the idea of questioning. I feel that our connection to our history continues, and I do not want that to end. I love that Rosh Hashanah brings back the Jewish memories of my parents, aunts and uncles and extended family getting together.

Here, in Chattanooga, I only have my husband, two daughters, and one grandson. But I do have my Mizpah family. And I think a congregational family is very special. I have developed close relationships with congregants of all generations. I thank you for recreating the feeling of family nearby. I believe we have a number of members who feel as I do.

So, as I finish my message, I hope you have a wonderful summer, filled with family and friends. And come see your Mizpah family at one of the many activities, services, and events coming up.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR RABBI...

Welcome to August. This is the month that finds rabbis asking themselves as the High Holy Days approach, "Whatever shall I say?" However, I do believe what I will say Is far less important than what you will say.

I do not say this to discount the value of the messages from the bimah, but the holidays do not exist for the rabbis. The holidays are for the people. At best, my words can stir a feeling, feed your knowledge, or inspire you toward a good path; every single one of

us has a message. The challenge for the month of Elul - which begins the evening of August 17th and lasts until Rosh Hashanah on the 15th of September – is in our search for that message. And to be clear: the message I encourage us to find is not the one we will say to each other, the obligatory "L'shanah tovah" or even heartfelt confessions.

The message I am writing about is the source of all messages we will speak during the holidays: the message we need to say to ourselves. Before we can confess to friends and loved ones, or to God, we need first to confess to ourselves. The Prophet Jeremiah tells us (11:20) that "God tests our hearts and minds." Here "heart" can be read as the truth we want to *believe*, but "mind" can be the truth we need to *know*. Therefore, we would do well to follow the Talmud's advice (Baba Batra 60b), "Beautify yourself (with truth) before you can demand beauty (of truthfulness) from others."

We all live with divides between heart and mind; unless we unify them, our confession - in Hebrew "viduy" or "self-knowledge" - will be lacking. Our tradition personifies the struggle with a powerful and familiar metaphor: the Pharaoh. When God tells Moses "Come to Pharaoh (Exodus 10:1)" rather than "Go to Pharaoh," we learn that Pharaoh is the very powerful thing that stands between us and God.


A spiritual reading of this text directs us to be aware that we each have an "inner Pharaoh," meaning that the only one who stands between us and ourselves is us. Rabbi Mordecai Finley tells about a time in rabbinical school when his class was challenged and asked, "why were they becoming rabbis?" After each student had answered, the wise teacher pointed out, "That's what you tell others. I hope you don't believe that is the whole answer." What followed, as Finley recounts, was a very deep opening of the heart, including some hidden wounds, and a discovery that each one had personal hidden truths, and hidden motivations; each of their stories had much in common, including the joy and the pain. Rabbi Finley believes they came away better rabbis, and better people for pushing through the block that kept truth hidden even from themselves. They had to overcome their inner Pharaohs to find the right message.

A story is told of a great Chasidic master whose student had travelled a long way to see him. When asked why he was there, the student answered, "To find God." The teacher responded, "You are wasting your time, for God is everywhere." The despondent student asked, "Then why should I have come?" The master's answer, "Simple. To find yourself."

Let this be our goal in the coming days, approaching Elul, during Elul and into Selichot, and through the High Holy Days: to seek out the hidden truths. Let us defeat our inner Pharaohs and discover the message we need ourselves to know. We can celebrate ourselves when deserved and confess, even though our hearts may be hiding a truth. We can do this to make our *Teshuvah* (repentance) ring true, from the innermost source, and radiate throughout the world.


