A MESSAGE FROM YOUR RABBI...

We all know the Jewish new year was in early Autumn. The secular new year, aka January 1st, falls much closer to another Jewish New Year, Tu Bishevat, the New Year for the trees. While at this time of year, we in Chattanooga see most of our trees barren, their leaves long since shed, and hopefully picked up by city workers, we no less look to our trees for inspiration as a source for celebration. We remember the trees in full bloom knowing they will soon bud again, gradually filling our fields of vision with green, the color of life. This on-going cycle, whether in anticipation of harvest, as it was for our ancestors in Israel, or for us in anticipation of a verdant Spring, is a reminder to embrace the moment, while also thinking about the future.

At Mizpah, we are entering 2024, building on successes of the past and even adding some new programs that already promise to bear fruit, brightening our Winter and carrying us toward Summer. On the horizon, I will be teaching a 3-part introduction to "Kabbala, the Seeds of Jewish Mysticism." Based on recent interest in our "Pirke Avot's Greatest Hits" Lunch and Learn and the excitement around piloting the new Torah Commentary being developed by the CCAR, we see renewed interest in adult learning opportunities. Many more will follow. We will also, mostly for fun, have improvisation classes for our Mizpah community called "Whose Temple Is It Anyway?" It is something we have never tried before, and, in addition to developing our quick thinking and group building skills (yes, I am participating), we will inject humor and Yiddishkeit into this discipline we are honing together.

Also, after six years, I am also hearing rumblings that some members want to make my wish come true of creating a band to play contemporary Jewish music during services. It may not happen right away, and it won't be every week, but there is much to look forward to with this project. In the field of Social Action, we are providing new opportunities to become more aware of the many agencies we can partner with, like The Bethlehem Center that we recently toured, learning about their work fighting poverty and connecting families with needed resources. On the horizon are more projects like helping inmates who have served their time to re-enter society - and more.

Richard III may have thought Winter was "of miscontent." However, at Mizpah, we see Winter as a time to "develop content." January and Tu Bishevat will launch us toward Passover and Shavuot, when we eat green vegetables and

celebrate first fruits, respectively. The world is not evergreen, but is ever in the process of getting to green.

Now, I would be remiss if I did not address some of the real darkness that we, the Jewish people are experiencing this Winter. Between Simchat Torah and now, Israel has been healing from a vicious terrorist attack, and has been engaged in a costly war. We continue to pray for Israel, the safe return of the remaining hostages, and a cessation of hostilities that includes assurances of Israel's ongoing existence and security. Too many innocent lives have been lost while antisemitism and anti-Zionism are on the rise. Beyond our words and donations and all those ways we can show our support directly to our brothers and sisters in Israel, our best answer to this conflict and its fallout is to continue to be openly and proudly Jewish, praying, celebrating, learning, experiencing, and joyfully embracing our heritage that has survived many dark seasons, emerging with new life and promise for the future. Ecclesiastes teaches, "God makes everything beautiful in its time." The world always is always on the verge of more beauty. May it come soon and may it endure.



Mizpah Grants - Submitted by **David Israel**, VP of Administration

Mizpah Congregation has received two (2) grants this year. One from the Federal Government (thanks to our Mizpah Security Committee), and one from the State of Tennessee (thanks to the Federation).

\$150,000 Federal Grant from Homeland Security to help facilitate security changes to Mizpah's building. Thank you **Richard Waxler, Frank Miller, Vicki Lewis, Gary Chazen and Andy Hodes** for all your hard work. The following work has been approved by the Federal Government:

- (1) Exterior Doors: Install Three forced entry-resistant exterior doors with hardware. Will provide a physical barrier to deny/delay an attacker.
- (2) Interior Doors Install 3 formed entry-resistant interior doors with hardware. Will create safe rooms to help prevent unauthorized persons from harming occupants.
- (3) 8 Concrete barriers, 32 metal Bollards.
- (4) Exterior Lighting, Install 6 high-grade security lights on building and parking lot to improve protection and CCTV operation.
- (5) Radio communications will acquire 5 NFPA compliant radio units to react to physical security.
- (6) Fencing, Approx 150 feet 6 feet high installed. Address hostile or unauthorized access.
- (7) Planning: develop plans to further increase preparedness for likely terrorist attempts.
- (8) Administration, keeping program and financial reports.

\$16,764 TN Department of Safety & Homeland Security - Houses of Worship Security Grant to help with security personnel for Mizpah Congregation, B'nai Zion Congregation and Machanooga. Thank you **Michael Dzik** for helping to obtain this grant. The grant was for our building security. We were able to split this to pay for off duty police officers for all three organizations.

SOCIAL ACTION

For January, we are going to partner with **Chattanooga Endeavors**, which helps individuals with community reentry after incarceration. One of their campaigns is to ask people to write letters/send cards to those in the system of care. More on this later.

Here is a synopsis of this organization:

Established in 1988 as Dismas House of Chattanooga and the first reentry program in East Tennessee, Chattanooga Endeavors has consistently provided innovative solutions to the unique challenges faced by people while they are incarcerated and as they strive to rebuild their lives when they come home. The organization's initial contact with those it serves is
