

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT...

Dear Fellow Congregants,

Today is *Shavuot* and I am in Twinsburg, Ohio, visiting my son, **Aaron**, and his family. They had invited us to come up for *Pesach*, but we could not make it this year, so we chose to come up Memorial Day weekend which happens to coincide with Shavuot.

I read comments from **Danny Cohn**, Director of the Birmingham Jewish Federation. I love the way he expresses himself, and I am borrowing his words. "Shavuot is a holiday that highlights the importance of learning and education. The holiday serves as a reminder that we should strive to learn and grow, both intellectually and spiritually. Shavuot reminds us to keep studying and exploring. Our Shabbat morning Torah Study attracts a number of our congregants who continue to do just that. Shavuot is also a holiday that celebrates diversity and inclusivity. According to Jewish tradition, the Torah was given to the entire Jewish community, regardless of their background or social status." **Rabbi Lewis** as well as **Debra Dubow** and our Social Action committee represent Mizpah supporting those whose personal identities have been questioned or ridiculed by others.

Nature and the harvest are also commemorated on Shavuot. In today's world, where environmental issues such as climate change and pollution are major concerns, Shavuot reminds us of our responsibility to care for the planet and its resources. Little actions like recycling or gardening contribute to this responsibility.

Shavuot also emphasizes renewal and transformation. Judaism teaches that the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai marked a significant turning point in Jewish history, and it represented a new beginning for the Jewish people. Shavuot reminds us that we have the power to change and transform our lives, and we can embrace new beginnings with optimism and hope. **Rabbi Lewis and Susan Caminez** have retooled the First Friday Family Shabbat. If you have not attended one recently, I encourage you to join us in a celebratory event involving not only adults but also our youngest members.

I know everyone will want to attend the Temple Annual Meeting, which is Sunday, June 30 at 3:00 pm. As I complete my first year as your President, I want to share some thoughts with you, our wonderful congregation. This was the first year Mizpah operated free of Covid restrictions. B'nai Zion operated within our building, and our staff was able to accommodate their needs in addition to our own. Our Board and committee chairs have been dedicated to our mission, and we have had numerous religious, social action, security, and social action programs. **Rabbi Lewis** and our staff were agile and creative as they fielded unexpected challenges, and I am so appreciative to have witnessed their dedication and hard work.

As we enter fiscal year 2024, we will need your financial support. I look forward to a campaign to restore the windows in our sanctuary. **Gary Chazen** is chairing this committee; when you hear from someone on his committee, please say yes. Don't wait – call him! We also need your presence at one or more of the many activities we will be offering.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR RABBI...

In his recent Netflix comedy special, John Mulaney accidentally touched on an important Jewish value. While he was mining comedy from some very dark and absurd observations, he talked about what it was like, when he was a child, to lose a loved one during summer vacation. He noted the extra attention he might have received from teachers and classmates, attention he did not get. It was actually rather funny, but beneath the humor was tragedy. What he really noted was what it was like to feel Relatively alone, without a community of support. We have arbitrarily constructed



seasons in the year that bring us together: "the school year," "programming years," which tend to be constructed around the school calendars, and "times for vacations," which we all need. That said, when our communities of support are constructed around these calendars, it opens the possibility to be separated from our communities at times when we might most need them. Mulaney's joke highlighted how much he needed his teachers and school friends, in addition to his family, to help him in a difficult time; it called to mind this ever important, and ever true teaching from Rabbi Hillel in Pirke Avot (2:4), "Al tifrosh min hatzibbur - Do not separate yourself from the community." There are reasons not to isolate ourselves. We need people to share our joys, to celebrate with, whether Shabbat, holidays, or great simchas. And we need people to share our burdens, whether tragedy, illness, or loss. No season or program year ought to prevent us from having that support. By the way, it is not always about what you think you need, but also who might actually need you to be present. Sometimes we ask ourselves what we will get out of an experience, but Hillel also wants us to be thoughtful of what others might gain from our being there.

And so here is my point: Mizpah is open year-round. Machanooga and Hebrew school have wound down. We may be in that holiday lull between Shavuot and Rosh Hashanah, but Mizpah is still very much a meeting point for community. Shabbat is every week. We gather for services and First Friday dinners. We will even experience a second Shabbatery Lottery on July 14th. We will have Torah study on Saturdays and services that follow. Torah on Tap continues on June 10 with "The Monsters of Judaism." Lunch and Learn is being relaunched on three Wednesdays in June (7, 14, and 21) studying the origins, tenets, and platforms of Reform Judaism. Mah Jongg continues as does the Book Club. There are many more opportunities to engage and stay close to our community. We want to make it easy as possible to heed Hillel's advice, not to separate from your community, so that, in the event you need them for highs, lows, or anything in between, a community, an extended family of congregation will be there for you. It will likewise be possible for you to be there for others. And yes, Zoom will be up and running for many of these events.

So, as we enter summertime, first and foremost, I hope that everyone has a safe and fun summer. For the students on break - going to camps, splashing in the pool, or just enjoying some time off; and for the adults who have the chance to go on vacation, have a wonderful time, and for heaven's sake, use lots of sunscreen. Also, enjoy the many different communities you may get to be a part of, wherever summer takes you. And make sure that your Jewish community remains part of your life.

To sum up the reasons to stay in community regardless of season, I share these words from Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, z"l:

"We find God in community. We develop virtue, strength of character, and a commitment to the common good in community. Community is local. It is society with a human face."

A message from your Temple Administrator...Angela Rickert

As the administrator of Mizpah, I have witnessed the challenges and triumphs that come with maintaining and securing our synagogue. Today, I want to share some updates on our recent endeavors, including the unfortunate delay in our security upgrades, the progress made by **Steve Smith and Betsy Temple** in beautifying our grounds, and exciting upcoming events that you won't want to miss. Additionally, I'll touch upon some personal highlights, such as the celebration of Zaddik's first birthday, the completion of our garden work, and the joy of reconnecting with my Uncle Jr. So, let's delve into the latest happenings at our synagogue.



The safety and security of our Congregation have always been of paramount importance. With the

rise in hate crimes and acts of violence targeting religious institutions, we recognized the need to enhance our security measures. However, due to unforeseen circumstances, our planned security upgrades have been put on a temporary hold. We still have all the security measures we have taken, but just the upgrades have been delayed. We recently discovered some small amounts of plaster bubbling in our sanctuary again. Recognizing the importance of preserving the spiritual ambiance of this sacred space, this is being addressed.

Steve and Betsy have done an amazing job at keeping the outside looking good. Steve began pressure washing

one day at a time. It's a large space, inside and out.

Upcoming events to look forward to: Jed Mescon and Rabbi Lewis are doing an amazing job planning activities to

keep us all connected. Be sure to read your emails and our weekly and weekend email blasts.

On a more personal note, we recently celebrated Zaddik's first birthday, a joyous milestone for our family. Additionally, the completion of our home garden work and witnessing the fruits of our labor has brought a sense of joy to me. I love seeing vegetables grow and produce. Lastly, I must share the news that my Uncle Jr. is again living with Karl and me. Those of you who know him or are acquainted with his colorful personality are probably as shocked as I am. It's a long story, but for now, let's just say it has added an unexpected twist to my life! More to come next time.

MIZPAH'S MOSES

As many things at Mizpah, the statue *Moses*, located in the lower foyer of our sanctuary, the Julius and Bertha Ochs Memorial Temple, has a story also. It was donated to the congregation by **George Washington Ochs-Oakes**, brother of **Adolph S. Ochs** and Chattanooga's second Jewish mayor (1893–1897), in 1929, the year after the Temple buildings were dedicated. The contemporary statue, made of Carrara marble, by Professor P. Passini, is a copy of Michelangelo's *Moses*. The Passini family had been sculptors in Florence since the 14th century and were contemporaries of Michelangelo.

Michelangelo's original *Moses*, finished in 1515, is located at the Basilica di San Pietro in Vincoli (Basilica of Saint Peter in Chains) in the heart of Rome. This church is relatively small and unpretentious on the exterior - by Rome standards - but quite elaborate inside. It contains three things of significance:

- 1. Most importantly, Michelangelo's Moses,
- 2. The chains that allegedly bound Jesus' disciple Peter (Saint Peter, the first pope) in Jerusalem and Rome,
- 3. The intended tomb of Pope Julius II, a very important pope, who was actually buried in St. Peter's Basilica in the Vatican, as was Peter.

Pope Julius II commissioned Michelangelo to do the statue *Moses* for his tomb to be in Saint Peter's Basilica. Due to a falling out with Pope Julius II, Michelangelo's *Moses* was placed in the Basilica of Saint Peter in Chains, the pope's family church. It is not known what the pope paid Michelangelo for the statue, but it certainly was not what it is currently worth on today's Euro!

The horns were due to a mistranslation of the Hebrew word "keren" into Latin from Exodus 34. The word could be translated as "rays of light' or "horns". As a kid growing up at Mizpah, when we were told that the scary gray man was Moses, we felt we were being misled as we knew the horned statue could only be the Devil himself!

The photograph of the original *Moses* is dark because I took it with available light as flash photography is prohibited at the church and because it is over 500 years old.
