

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR RABBI...

The month of March begins with the great holiday of Purim, sometimes known as the "festival of masks." This may just be the perfect month for Purim since March "comes in like a lion and out like a lamb." That is to say, the month has two distinct identities, acting as a bridge between the violent Winter weather and the gentler Spring. And we could wonder, "which is the mask?" Is March a lion later pretending to be a lamb, or vice-versa. If the Purim story from the Book of Esther is our guide, the latter must be the case, as the true identity, like Esther's, is revealed at the end. So, March must be the gentle lamb, masquerading as a lion. In its heart is

an invitation to April showers that will bring about May flowers, but following February, March cannot immediately reveal its purpose. So, is it a lion or a lamb? Again, guided by the Book of Esther, we conclude, it is actually both. A mask does not necessarily hide the wearer's identity. It can actually serve to reveal some hidden part of the wearer's being. As Oscar Wilde writes, "Give [a man] a mask, and he will tell you the truth." In the story of Esther, she is the fairest maiden in all of Persia, though timid and unsure of herself. She never stops being Jewish, though her "mask," allows her to access courage which had been hiding dormant inside of her. Underneath her mask, she becomes emboldened, discovers her powerful truth, and exercises her greatest strength when the mask comes off. Every aspect of Esther's being is unified as the beautiful, brave, strong, Jewish woman who, as Queen of Persia, can wield power to save her people. Esther's mask reveals more than it hides, and for the better. On the other hand, a mask can allow less desirable traits to emerge. A midrash about the wicked Haman tells us he had very humble, if not noble beginnings as a hairdresser (BT Megillah 16a). While there is nothing wrong with ambition, Haman's desire for political influence is fueled by an authoritarian impulse. He masks his ordinary origins and positions himself as an adviser to the King. With his meeker persona hidden from view, he leverages his position to attempt genocide against a people who will not bow to him. The midrash ultimately strips Haman of his mask when he is forced to dress and style Mordecai for a royal parade. And here is the twist, the ultimate lesson: Mordecai reassures Haman that it cannot be that bad returning to his former self. At this point in the story, the worst has not happened. With some reflection, Haman could recognize the ugliness his mask has revealed. Unfortunately, he chooses the path of wickedness over the path of return. We can learn from this story to be ever-conscious of what we reveal when we wear a masks, and if, like Esther, we reveal our better faces, we embrace the discovery. But, if the mask helps us discover things we do not like, we have a chance for change. The mask may reveal truth, but like Esther, we control our destiny.

Have a Happy Purim and a wonderful March.

May it be more like lamb than lion.

March 26-April 1

The S.S. Adolph S. Ochs (1943-1968) was a "Liberty" ship, a merchant vessel. Built in only 24 days, the Ochs carried grain from Canada to Britain and iron ore from Cyprus to Germany. It also called on South American ports. The U.S. Maritime Commission mass-produced 2,700 Liberty ships to transport cargo and troops during World War II. Many were named after prominent Americans such as Mr. Ochs. He was among a handful of Jews honored with namesake Liberty ships.

Following decommission, the nameplate was presented in 1973 to Och's daughter **Iphigene** Ochs Sulzberger (1892-1990). Her February 26 - March 4 yahrzeit is above. The nameplate is on display in the Museum of the New York Times, the paper founded by Mr. Ochs, who also founded the Chattanooga Times, and was the principal benefactor of our Mizpah Temple.






