



THE MELTON CORE CURRICULUM

Melton's signature two-year learning experience consists of comprehensive survey courses which integrate Jewish history, religion, ethics, literature, theology, and contemporary Jewish life. **Until further notice, all classes take place virtually using Zoom.**

Year One – Melton Core Curriculum is currently being revised and will be divided into **10-lesson trimesters**. Louisville Melton will offer the first segment in the Spring of 2021, Trimester-3.

The Ethics of Jewish Living – How do Jewish teachings shed light on contemporary issues: the environment, interpersonal relationships, end-of-life decisions, and stem-cell research? This course offers multiple ancient and modern Jewish approaches to conducting our lives.

TRIMESTER-1 SEPT. 1 - NOV. 12, 2020 10 LESSONS

From Sinai to Seinfeld: Jews and Their Jokes. (10 lessons) Examining a treasury of ancient and modern Jewish jokes as our texts, this course explores the evolving concerns, styles, preoccupations and values of the Jewish people that lie buried deep in words that make us laugh.

TRIMESTER-2 NOV. 17, 2020 – FEB. 11, 2021

Trimester-2 courses are 10 lessons except for Beyond Borders which is 20 lessons.

Social Justice: The Heart of Judaism in Theory & Practice. Designed by Ruth Messinger, this course explores how social justice goes beyond addressing short-term needs and looks at the structural causes of injustice. Topics include issues related to poverty, immigration, and environmental degradation. Students are encouraged to identify issues particular to their own communities to explore in greater depth.

Commentaries on Jewish and Christian Sacred Texts. (**Louisville Melton Original) Within just a few decades after the fall of the Second Temple, rabbinic commentaries on Torah and Christian interpretations of its emerging canon of scripture contributed to profound separations in their respective theologies. This course is designed to introduce some of the central teachings of the two faiths in the early common era, to examine how modern Jewish and Christian scholars are re-engaging texts of the time, and to explore how our own efforts at midrash can enhance interfaith relationships.

Jewish Medical Ethics: A 21st Century Discussion Within the field of ethics, one of the most challenging frontiers is medical ethics. While contemporary medical knowledge preserves life, modern advances have raised moral and ethical dilemmas related to the sanctity and dignity of life – issues whose scope was unimaginable a generation ago. Written by Rabbi Elliot Dorff, PhD, this course explores Jewish approaches to several 21st century ethical issues, including cloning, surrogate motherhood, genetic identity, assisted suicide, and genetic manipulation.
