From Scott Hoffman Rabbi

Imagine a word which has two entirely opposite meanings. Actually, that's easy—the word "shalom" in Hebrew can mean either "hello" or "good-bye", depending upon the context. Let's try another example – the word "shana", as in the name of the Jewish New Year, Rosh Ha-shana.

Shana can mean "to repeat." For example, the code of Jewish law known as the Mishna, edited about the year 200 CE by Rabbi Judah the Prince, derives from this root. That would seem to be the result of the fact that much of the Mishna's material was preserved and passed down via oral repetition. And the sages mentioned in the Mishna – that is, who lived primarily in the late first and second Christian centuries – were known as "tannaim", with the "t" at the beginning substituting for the "sh".

But as I mentioned, "shana" can also mean precisely the opposite – "to change." There's an old adage that "you need a change of scenery" if you seem burned out in your current circumstances. In Hebrew, we say, "M'shaneh makom, m'shaneh mazal" – "Change your place, change your fortune." Indeed, the High Holidays place a high value upon change, rather than a repeat performance of the previous year.

As we enter our second year together, I often think about what the coming months will bring. Part of me, of course, wants repetition. Those events which we loved, and which are close to our hearts, we must continue to embrace. I look forward to enjoying "Sushi in the Sukkah" on Sukkot, our "Chai-nese dinner" around Chanukkah time, the "Jazz Seder" on Passover and the myriad of educational programs we shared. Topping the list is something which we celebrate every week, namely our wonderful Shabbat services with the best *Kiddush* lunches, often graced by regional favorites like fried chicken or jambalaya.

On the other hand, we will need to embrace change as well. Our "Shul School" enjoyed a good first year back in person, but we should demand that this year be even better. I'm committed to helping Chaviva with this task and I hope all of you are as well. We will need to find alternatives to programs like Limmud which occur only every other year. We must find ways to increase community involvement of our younger members so I won't find myself the "youngest person in the room" at various functions. And most of all, we want to find more and better ways of connecting with you, our members, who are the lifeblood of Shir Chadash.

I started by noting that "shalom" has two meanings, but most of you know that it in fact has three – "hello", "good-bye" and "peace." Similarly, "shana" has a third meaning – "to learn." I would say these should be the two guideposts for Shir Chadash in the coming year – promoting peace and increasing wisdom.

I look forward in 5784 to our success in taking on this communal challenge.

Shana toyah umetukah!

From Chaviva Sands Director of Education & Programming

Dear Shir Chadash Mishpachah,

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are upon us and what better time to evaluate how we live our lives than now. Everyone has a different definition as to what it means to live a good life. Some people believe a good life is characterized by monetary wealth and luxury. Others believe it is wealth of friendship, family, and community. These are two examples I have encountered the most, but there are an innumerable amount of definitions as to what a good life led can really mean, different for every individual.

It has been wonderful working at Shir Chadash this past year. I had the opportunity to provide programming for all members that contribute to their journeys to living their best lives. Through educational and social programming I have seen adults and children take steps to determine how they would like to live their best life. For example, our Young Adults at Shir Chadash program has attracted new members who wish to develop a stronger Jewish identity. I've also spoken with B'nai Mitzvah students expressing their desire to learn more of the service and not limit themselves to only leading Torah service and Musaf. These small decisions lead to the actions that allow us to design and fulfill our ideas of a good life.

I would like to now focus on these small decisions and what drives us to make those decisions. This past summer, while at Ramah Outdoor Adventure in Colorado, I spoke with fellow staff members and campers about what it means for them to live a good life. Intention and living purposefully was brought up by each one of them. It is fitting since they each made the choice to come to Ramah Outdoor Adventure and not the Ramah camp that is specific to their geographical region. Ramah Outdoor Adventure is unlike other Ramah camps. The campers sleep in large canvas tents built on wooden pavilions and they go on challenging camping trips that are appropriate for their age groups. Yes, other Ramah camps go camping, but the oldest age group does not spend nearly two weeks away from camp doing so. These people made the choice to spend the summer challenging themselves. It's a great example of living life with intention and purpose.

Since returning from Ramah Outdoor Adventure and preparing for the High Holidays, I keep thinking about how if I am to live a good life then I must have intention and purpose. So, what are my intentions and purpose for this year? My intentions for this year are to create an incredible Shul School program with an updated curriculum and talented teachers; to continue running creative and educational programming for the wider Shir Chadash community and Greater New Orleans Jewish Community; and to establish a warm and welcoming community where no one will feel out of place. Please take some time to yourself and determine what your intentions and purpose are for this year. I would love to hear about them.



Teen Learning


