The "Bissell" Lunch, December 24th, 2023

The Inner City Pastoral Ministry (ICPM) has served lunch every Sunday since 1978 to the people of Edmonton's inner city. Different churches take turns through the year, supplying the food and servers.

In the mid 1990's we found out that the Sunday before Christmas was the most difficult one for which to find volunteers, and the Jewish community stepped up. For the first few years we prepared everything at Beth Shalom (BS), and then developed a different method, with individuals making sandwiches at home. COVID put an end to that.

Thanks to the generosity of BS and Temple Beth Ora (TBO) we handed out 200 bag lunches on December 24. A wonderful new addition this year was that 7 kids from TBO's B'nai Mitzvah class assembled the bags at one family's house. They created an assembly line to stuff the 200 lunch bags with a juice box, a protein bar, a tuna or chicken snack, cheese strings, a bag of chips and hand warmers. They made quick work of it while having fun! The class and their parents then took time to visit over snacks.

Before COVID we would supply 15 servers for the lunch, often teens and their parents, so this is a welcome return to family involvement.

The ICPM Sunday service was an interfaith event, with Indigenous Knowledge Keeper Verna and her family offering prayers, teachings and a smudge. Mt. Olivet Lutheran Church sent two volunteers and made a connection with a local restaurant that sent box lunches. "Our" food items can last several days so everything worked out very well.

Huge thanks to Tony R., Shelley W. and Bruce B. for handing out food and drink, and Linda H. for once again donating and delivering and oranges and bananas.

For the first time ever we are short a few hundred dollars, it's not too late to be part of this important mitzvah. Donations sent to BS will receive a tax receipt.

A Message from your Rabbi, Steven Schwarzman

You may have seen the meme going around each year around now that says something like "New Year? We did that three months ago". Of course, the Jewish year starts in Tishrei, more or less in September. So when the civil calendar starts over in January, what might be a good way for us Jews to mark the occasion?



On the one hand, it's not our holiday. The Romans, who invented this calendar, were not our friends. On the other hand, it's what most of the world uses, and for most people, it has lost any religious significance and is now mostly a secular day.

All in all, the beginning of a new secular year can serve, if we allow it to, as a reminder to reflect on how well we are doing as human beings and specifically as Jewish human beings. We all did a lot of reflecting on that in Tishrei, as we do each year. But whatever its origins, the beginning of a new secular year can also serve as a prompt to think about whether we are really investing our time and energy where we should be.

And all the more so in this existential moment in Jewish history, when Israel continues its fight for the safety of all its citizens and we here in Canada are forced to consider our own safety and sense of belonging in the face of public displays of hatred to Jews and Israel.

So, give some thought, as part of a periodic spiritual checkup, to how you really want to spend your time as compared with how you're actually spending it. We should all live till 120, in good health, but life, in this world at least, is finite. If there's a gap between what we know we ought to be doing and what we're actually doing, this is as good a time as any to remedy that.

Enjoy winter, whether here in Edmonton or in warmer places!



It is with extreme sadness that I record the recent passing of our matriarch, Shirley Goldberg. For over half a century, first as Beth Shalom's rebbetzin and subsequently as one of our Kehila's most Judaically informed congregants, Shirley was Beth Shalom's Jewish conscience and the Edmonton Jewish community's humourist.

During her many years in Edmonton, spiritual leaders changed several times, and each was nourished by Shirley's intellect, knowledge and, of course, her exemplary Kosher cooking and hospitality. Shirley was a "giver". She gave with her heart, her soul, and her chequebook in supporting Jews and Judaism regardless of denomination. Some have said, and I tend to agree, that Shirley's commitment and contribution to Judaism and to Edmonton Jewry was unmatched and may never again be matched. I shall miss her. Congregation Beth Shalom will miss her. The Edmonton Jewish community and its many organizations will miss her. But none should or will ever forget her. May the many memories of Shirley Goldberg, of blessed memory, be forever a blessing to and for us all.

USCJ 2023 General Assembly.

I recently attended via Zoom the General Assembly of our parent body, the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism (USCJ). While there was minimal opportunity to engage with USCJ staff or other 100+ attendees, the theme of the assembly, "What once worked... does not now." resonated with my thoughts about our shul. When the recorded details of the general assembly have been published and are available on-line, I'll provide more details. However, in the interim, the presentations facilitated the following reflections about what Beth Shalom is and what we strive to be:

Beth Shalom's membership continues to be strong, however,

... our dues and donations revenue have been diminishing annually.

Beth Shalom is blessed to have a small but dedicated cohort of dedicated, regular service attendees, however.

- ... attendance at minyan, Shabbat, and High Holiday services is weak.
- ... new ways of engaging with members by providing meaningful and accessible Conservative Judaism need to be developed and implemented.

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Beth Shalom, at its current location, has a justifiably proud 70+ years of tradition, however,

... to be sustainable, Beth Shalom needs a renewed focus on meeting the current and emergent needs of all our members not just on the committed few who regularly attend services

... as stated at the general assembly, "We need to take Judaism to where people are."

Beth Shalom's Board of Directors care deeply about the shul, however,

... the role of Board members needs to be revisited and new leaders with a futuristic vision need to be identified and encouraged to accept Board and Committee leadership roles.

Beth Shalom's vision and mission statements have not changed substantially in many years. While providing consistency and continuity, members' perceptions, and acceptance of organized religion as a critical part of their Jewish life, has changed significantly, therefore,

... to be sustainable, Beth Shalom needs to have a new or at least a renewed focus on making Conservative Judaism more meaningful and accessible especially to the younger cohort among our members and to the youth who will hopefully be the future synagogue attendees and leaders of Conservative Judaism in Edmonton.

...as noted at the general assembly, it is critical, for each shul to develop a new **value proposition** to present to current and potential members that will enhance both the meaning and benefits associated with membership and being actively engaged in our Kehila's prayer services, programs, and social activities.

The costs associated with manufacturing **Yahrzeit Plaques** and maintaining the memorial boards in the sanctuary continue to climb. In turn, Edmonton Beth Shalom adjusts the fees we assess for the purchase of a yahrzeit plaque from time-to-time.

In 2022, we began inviting members who have purchased a yahrzeit plaque on our newest memorial board to make a \$180 donation to reserve one spot adjacent to the plaque just purchased, so that the only fees owing will be the cost for casting and shipping the additional plaque.

Going forward, in the interest of aligning the fee our office assesses for the purchase of yahrzeit plaques with the reservation fee introduced in 2022, Edmonton Beth Shalom will separate the fee assessed for the purchase of the plaques into two portions:

A charitable receipt will be issued for each portion of the fee.

In Taipeh, back in 1953, the new Old China Hands addressed him respectfully as General, while the real Old China Hands called him Morris (and sometimes Moishe). You could find him 'most any afternoon in the lounge of the Friends of China Club, a big, bland man, looking a bit like a statue of Buddha come to life and talking in a curious combination of Cockney and Canadian about days on the mainland now half-forgotten—about the revolutionaries and the war lords, the patriots and the puppets, the compradores and the Communists, the gun runners, the opium smugglers, the imperialists, the adventurers. There was always a crowd clustered about him, for the big, bland man had known them all; and he too, at one time or another, had been a revolutionary and a patriot, a gun runner and an adventurer. Those were legendary days—days of chaos, yet of hope—and he, too, was a legend.

Until his capture by the Japanese on Boxing Day 1941, Morris Abraham Cohen, a Jew born in the slums of Whitechapel, had been a general in the Chinese Army.

Charles Drage, a retired commander in the Royal Navy and a friend of Cohen's for thirty years...tells his story. It's a fabulous story, and Drage tells it best when he lets Cohen tell it, which, fortunately, is just about as often as possible.

Morris Abraham Cohen was born on August 3, 1889. His parents were immigrants from Poland. "They were an old-fashioned, strictly orthodox couple and they kept up all the old customs," Drage quotes him as saying. "When my mother married she sheared her hair and for the rest of her life she wore a wig, the *sheitel*. My father was the churchwarden, or *gabai*, of our synagogue and on Saturdays he would walk there along Commercial Road wearing his shiny top hat, his black cutaway coat, and low waistcoat which showed a fine expanse of white shirt. It was a sin for grownups to carry anything on the Sabbath and so I would walk beside him with the velvet bag that held his prayer shawl, the *tallis*; and when he met his friends and said 'Sholom,' 'Peace be unto you,' in his deep voice, I felt very proud.

"By the time I was four I'd learned to play truant from home without being caught and I used to hang around Gardiner's Corner and watch the world go by. . . . "

Morris was an incorrigible. He graduated from truancy to stealing firewood, and from that to stirring up business for a glazier by throwing rocks through windows. ("He paid us a commission of a halfpenny on every pane he mended.") At eight, he was fighting professionally, under the name of "Cockney Cohen," in the People's Arcade and in the back of a blacksmith's shop. (He got two shillings for his first fight.) He stumbled into trouble with the police, and went straight for a time by acting as a shill for a streetcorner swindler named Harry the Gonof, who sold purses, but he didn't go straight for long. At ten, he was arrested as "a person suspected of attempting to pick pockets." He was committed to a reform school, the Hayes Industrial School, run by the Jewish Board of Guardians, the Spanish and Portuguese Congregations, and the United Synagogue.

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Morris was released from the reform school when he reached the age of sixteen, and his family sent him to work on a ranch in Western Canada with five sovereigns and this advice— "Always remember the words of the wise Rabbi Koretz."

In 1905, Western Canada still was the Wild West. Morris learned how to ride a horse, roll a seven, palm an ace, and deal from the bottom of the deck. More important, he became a dead shot with either hand, and he made a friend, an elderly Chinese named Mah Sam, who ran a chop-suey joint in Saskatoon and was a leading supporter of Sun Yat-sen in Canada. Through Mah Sam, he met other Chinese, and eventually he joined the Tsing Chung-hui, a tong pledged to Dr. Sun and the destruction of the Manchu dynasty. When Dr. Sun made a visit to Canada to preach the cause of the Chinese Revolution, he became his bodyguard. The road to China lay ahead—but he didn't know it yet for there was a detour on the way, World War I.

Morris joined the Royal Canadian Army, made sergeant, and was twice wounded in action, once badly. He went AWOL from the hospital after the Armistice and lost his stripes, but the flags were flying when he returned to Canada and the bands were playing. And his Chinese friends were waiting. Dr. Sun "needed someone he could trust absolutely—a foreigner who'd keep right outside Chinese internal politics and who'd look after his personal safety. . . ."

In August 1922, Morris landed in Shanghai with eight guns in his luggage. He was now thirty-three, a colonel in the Chinese Army, and aide-de-camp to Dr. Sun.

Morris not only served as Dr. Sun's bodyguard, he also did undercover work, handled economic negotiations, and helped smuggle guns for him. And since there was a civil war raging, he did a bit of fighting on the side. Soon he was known throughout China as "Two-Gun Cohen." And when Dr. Sun died, he became General Cohen.

There was trouble with the war lords and trouble with the Communists and trouble with the Japanese. Morris's life was a life of turbulence and intrigue, complete with a sultry, stupid White Russian, in the pay of the Japs, who sought to entice him into working for the Greater East Asia Co-prosperity Sphere.

"I've always wanted to meet you, General Cohen," she told him. "May I call you Morris? You see, although we've never actually talked to each other before, I feel I know you quite well from all the *wonderful* stories I've heard about you. And now I've seen you in the flesh, I can believe *all* those stories. You know, Morris, you've got what they call sex-appeal."

"Mme. Snoopoff," as Morris dubbed her, didn't get very far.

Morris was in Hong Kong when the Japs captured the city. He was thrown into Stanley Prison Camp, beaten and tortured, then beaten again. One day he was dragged into the interrogation room and made to kneel. "The officer who . . . was the biggest beast of the lot jerked his great two-handed samurai sword out of its scabbard, swung it up and said, 'Put your head forward!'

"I muttered 'Shema Yisrael, Adonai Elohenu, Adonai Ehad.' Aloud I said with what I really thought would be my last breath, 'Get on with it, you lousy bastard!' "All I got was a kick in the ribs that knocked me clean over on my side. . . . "The next thing that came along was that we were released. . . ."

Morris was in Taipeh in 1953 refreshing his memories of "The Life and Times of Two-Gun Cohen." Now, with the book written, he's back in Canada—but he's "Two-Gun Cohen" no longer. After his release from Stanley, he met and married a Montreal couturière. Call him Mr. Cohen.
