Meet Cantor Amelia Lavranchuk

I am thrilled to be joining the clergy team at Temple Avodah. After a challenging and rewarding summer as part of the Jewish life team at Eisner Camp, it is wonderful to finally get to know this amazing community. My family and I are so grateful for the incredibly warm welcome we have received and are looking forward to meeting more of the congregation in the coming weeks.

In May 2020, I was ordained as a cantor and received my Master of Arts in Religious Education at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. I come to Temple Avodah from East End Temple in Manhattan, where I served as music educator, teaching religious school and leading youth services. I currently live in Forest Hills, Queens, with my fiancée Abi and our cats Macy and Liam. In my free time, I enjoy reading and watching science fiction and drawing. I root hard for the Mets, and sometimes enjoy that as well.

As a person of eclectic interests and hobbies, one of my favorite parts of being a cantor is the huge variety of things I get to do as part of my job. During the year I

spent teaching elementary school, I found the tools and strategies of differentiated learning—creating learning experiences that are adaptable to students' wide variety

of needs and preferences—particularly exciting and valuable. I love drawing on this experience in my work with religious school students, b'nei mitzvah and adult learners. Being a cantor also gives me the opportunity to geek out about languages, particularly Hebrew, German and Yiddish. For my senior project at HUC-JIR, I catalogued over one hundred Yiddish folk songs from the Bund and the Jewish labor movement, and would be overjoyed to talk about it with anyone who has the slightest interest.



Another part of being a cantor that I love is getting to know people and building relationships. From casual chats to lifecycle events to pastoral counseling, I believe relationships the core of what cantors do. Being a community organizer, my favorite way of building relationships is with one-on-one meetings. I am hoping to get the chance to meet with many of you soon, either virtually or in person. I will be scheduling office hours and drop-in hours very soon, so please stay tuned!

HIGH HOLIDAY INFORMATION

Anyone over 2 must be properly masked when entering the building.

For those 12 and older, please have either your Vaccine Card or Excelsior Pass as proof of vaccination.

SEPT 6: Monday night Erev Rosh Hashanah services will commence at 7 pm for anyone 12 and older with proof of vaccine. For this service only, no children under 12 can attend, as they are not vaccinated.

SEPT 7: Tuesday morning services will start at 9:30 and are open to anyone 12 and older with proof of vaccines **AND** children under 12 when accompanied by a vaccinated adult. A designated family area will be used for the safety of all concerned.

The 11:30 Tuesday Family service has been rescheduled to 12:30 and will be **ZOOM ONLY**. The new service will be conducted by Rabbi and Cantor.

SEPT 8: Wednesday services will start at 10:00 – protocols are the same as Tuesday - see above

Links will be sent to all members for the streaming services and the zoom Family Service, as well as links to online books. Books are also available to pick up in the office with a \$50 per book, fully refundable deposit - separate books for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

We are constantly working to make the services as safe as possible for all of our congregants, taking into account up-to-date guidelines. Information regarding Yom Kippur will be sent out and available once finalized.

For the health and safety of all Temple members, a notice of Temple Avodah COVID-19 protocols was prepared by an Ad Hoc committee convened to address this issue.

JEWES FOR REFUGEES

This is a recent message from HIAS (formerly Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society):

Earlier this year, HIAS began preparations to help resettle thousands of Afghans who, because they worked with U.S. forces, were qualified to enter the U.S. on Special Immigrant Visas (SIVs).

This week, with the development of the humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan, that work became much more urgent. We are now focused on helping a sudden influx of SIVs and countless others who have been evacuated as they flee from violence and persecution.

HIAS has already sent staff to Fort Lee in Virginia to assist in processing Afghans as they land. This on-the-ground work is essential to helping arrivals begin their new

lives. According to Yalda Afif, a HIAS Program Manager, "as an Afghan woman who has worked with a large number of Afghans who have come here on Special Immigrant Visas, I can tell you how terrifying the situation is for them back home and how bewildering it is when they arrive in America."

Right now, HIAS is working with resettlement partners across the country to scale up capacity. We have years of experience helping resettle SIVs, including those from Afghanistan. Some of the vital services our network provides include food, housing assistance, job training, gender-based violence counseling, and more. The need for these services will only grow as more people from Afghanistan and elsewhere arrive in the U.S.

Religious School News

The start of a new school year is always exciting, even in these challenging times. The prospect of new possibilities helps us to move forward and be hopeful. At our Religious School, we are always exploring ways to engage our students. These are just some of the new things we will be doing this year:

Music/Tefilla: Cantor Amelia Lavranchuk will be meeting weekly with each grade, teaching songs and adding a joyful dimension to our school day. We are reinstating weekly tefillah (prayer) and will be inviting our younger grades to join us in order to familiarize them with communal prayer and foster a sense of Kehillah (community).

B'Yachad-Family Education Workshops: B'Yachad means together and this year parents will have the opportunity to learn together with their children. Over the course of the school year, each grade will participate in a workshop during school hours. Workshops will range from 'Creating a Jewish Bedtime,' 'Shabbatland' and 'Sanctuary Treasure Hunt' for our younger grades to 'What's in a Name?,' 'Becoming a Mitzvah Maven (Expert)' and 'Brachot/Blessing-Fest' for our older students.

Ivrit/Hebrew: We will be introducing more Hebrew conversation in the classroom in order to reinforce Hebrew as a living, vital language (not just for prayer). Hearing and speaking Hebrew will also facilitate learning. Additionally, to familiarize our students with their Hebrew names, we will begin using these names in the classroom. If a child does not have a Hebrew name, their parents can speak to the Rabbi to choose one.

As I write this article, our plan is to meet in person, taking all the precautions that will be necessary to keep our students and faculty safe. I will keep you updated.
