Dear Chaverim/Chaverot-

A person goes through many transitions in a lifetime. The child going into kindergarten... A child graduating...The student moving into their college dorm... AND THEN there are the <u>parents</u> of the child attending kindergarten, graduating or moving into a new dorm. Each can bring it's own fears and/or excitement. Each being a rite of passage requiring soul searching, self reflection and mixed emotions. Ritual transitions such as a brit bat, brit milah, a bat or bar mitzvah and a wedding can also be filled with the same reactions. However often with ritual transitions there is a built in support system with the inclusion of family and friends.

Torah is filled with many examples of transition. We can read about the marking of the seasons, individual growth/change, destruction and conquering. Most of all we learn about our ancestor's resilience. The book of Deuteronomy is almost entirely about Moses reflecting on the Israelite's dramatic passage through the wilderness for forty years. Even though most listening to Moses' speech were born later in the journey, the message of perseverance is clear. Think about those many Israelites listening to Moses speak about finally having a land of their own. How must they have felt about finally settling down when all they knew was being nomadic? What must it have felt like to be at the border of the Promised Land ready for their new beginning? Even with all of their concerns they continued to move forward for a better life. They had faith tomorrow would be better.

Whether we like it or not transition is a part of life. When it happens it's OK to be anxious, sad, frustrated and even mad. We are all human and it's necessary to work through our many emotions. Often it's difficult to think rationally during those times. Our history of worry and panic goes way back, you see. I suppose it's in our genes.

In one month we will be transitioning to the new year of 5784. We stand on the shoulders of many ancestors. They struggled. They wavered. They endured. But most of all they kept moving towards a better tomorrow. We have over five thousand years of proof of their perseverance. This month take time to reflect on your own transitions. Be proud of yourself for not giving up. Acknowledge the person you were before and then today. Lastly, thank those who were around you during those times. Let them know how appreciative you were/are for their support.

In Hebrew the word emunah means: to trust and have faith (in G-d). There is something helpful in letting the universe take over what we cannot control. May all of you surround yourselves with EMUNAH to help in whatever journey you are taking at this time. It's only temporary and you will persist.

Summer Reading: Jewish Graphic Novels


Summer is not over yet, and there's still time to get your summer reading on in August! If you're looking for something a little different, you might want to try a graphic novel. Jewish authors and illustrators have played a major role in graphic storytelling since the Golden Age of Comics, and have increasingly employed this medium to tell explicitly Jewish stories. Whether you want a classic superhero tale, an historical thriller or a witty family drama, there is a book on this list for you!

*Note: While kids love graphic novels, all of these books contain adult themes. I would recommend parents preview any of these books to determine if they are appropriate for their children.






- 1. A Bintel Brief, written and illustrated by Liana Fink. Fink paints a portrait of turn of the century Jewish life in New York City based on letters from the Yiddish Daily Forward's popular advice column, A Bintel Brief. Through these letters and conversations with the ghost of their editor Abraham Cahan, the protagonist unpacks her relationship with her city's past.
- 2. Whistle, written by E. Lockhart, illustrated by Manuel Preitano. A new DC Comics storyline set in Gotham City, Whistle introduces Willow Zimmerman, a highschooler struggling to advocate for her neglected neighborhood while caring for her sick mother. After an attack by Gotham's notorious Killer Croc, Willow finds she has developed a strange connection with her dog Leibowitz that grants them both superpowers. But can she use these powers to support her family while also defending her neighborhood?



3. El Illuminado, written by Ilan Stavans, illustrated by Steve Sheinkin. In Santa Fe, a murder mystery leads to a Da Vinci Code-style quest to uncover the secret past of the Southwest's Crypto-Jewish community. This gripping tale keeps the reader on the edge of their seat while also informing about the real history of conversos seeking refuge from the Inquisition in the New World.



4. Chasing Echoes, written and illustrated by Dan Goldman and George Schall. The descendents of Holocaust survivor Szulim Bloom take a trip to Poland to search for lost family history. Though they seek to better understand the past, the real challenge this family faces is finding a way to understand each other.



5. A Contract with God, written and illustrated by Will Eisner. This collection of four interwoven tenement tales is often credited with popularizing the term "graphic novel," and was one of the earliest works to blend comic-style art and literary story-telling. Based in part on Eisner's own experience growing up in Brooklyn's tenements, the stories document the melodrama of life in a poor Jewish New York City neighborhood during the depression era.



Below are Gennady's remarks spoken at the service explaining why he did not have the opportunity to do this sooner in life. We at Temple Avodah are so glad we provided the mechanism for him to obtain this dream he had for so long. If anyone has a similar desire, or to pursue an adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah, contact Rabbi Shai.

An adult Bnai Mitzvah class will begin in the fall.

WHY NAMING NOW?

So, Rabbi Goren recently asked me: "Why are you choosing to embrace your Hebrew name now? It's a good question - After all, it has been quite a few days since I was 8 days old.

I grew up in the Soviet Union. There was this infamous line on our USSR passports: Line 5 – the "Nationality" line. This wasn't about citizenship, which was Soviet for everyone. No, this was about ethnicity, about identity. And for people like me, it said "Jew" or "Hebrew". It was a label that singled us out and made us "the other". It brought awareness of our Jewish identity, coupled with anxiety and limitations.

Here I am now, all grown up, no longer in the old country, but in beautiful Oceanside, New York, United States - after all these years, finally in a position to take a small step to reconnect with my Jewish roots. Every bit of our tradition and history that I've learned has drawn me closer to my heritage. So, embracing a Hebrew name isn't just about adopting a new label, it's about reclaiming a part of my identity.

The Third Lubavicher Rebbe told a story about a Hasidic businessman living in Tsarist Russia. He would wear his traditional garb at home but adopt business attire for his trips. I believe that he wasn't abandoning his heritage but was adapting to survive without losing his faith. This mirrors the question many of us face: "Which one is the REAL you?" - the traditional one or the one in the modern garments?

That questioning, that deep desire to know - that's sort of what I've been doing my whole life. I am just becoming older and wiser and realizing this now.

I don't have to hide my Jewish identity anymore. We left that behind and I am eternally grateful for the United States. "God Bless America" are not just words in my family.

So, why now? Simply because I am ready. Throughout my life, there's always been this quiet yearning within me, a longing to connect more profoundly with my Jewish roots. I am Jewish. I am proud of my heritage. And I realized that it's time for me to take this small step to claim it.

When you get to choose your Hebrew name as an adult, it offers a unique opportunity. You're not just given a name, but you get to choose one that resonates with you, one that carries the weight of meaning, of personal significance. I chose the name "Gershon." It's a name that holds two-fold significance for me. Phonetically, it's very close to my (maternal) grandfather's name and a tribute to him. There's another layer to it. The name "Gershon" translates to "a stranger there" - an immigrant if you will. It speaks to the experience I had for much of my life. It's a nod to my journey, to the challenges I faced, and the strength I found within myself to overcome them.

Today, as I embrace my new name, Gershon, I feel a stronger connection to my Jewish identity, my heritage, and my past. I'm reclaiming a part of me that I couldn't fully express all those years ago. I want to show to my kids in particular that this part, your Jewish soul - is important.

Throughout history, we Jews have been strangers in many lands. We've faced powerful empires like the Assyrians, Babylonians, the list goes on and on. Guess what, - The Assyrian Empire, the Babylonian Empire, the Third Reich, even the Soviet Union itself, they've all crumbled, but we're still here. We've weathered adversities and stood resilient through millennia, and we continue to stand tall today.

As I take my Hebrew name, I feel a deep sense of pride in being part of this enduring lineage. It reminds me that we're not just the sum of our past, but also the architects of our future.

Thank you for being a part of my journey.

COURT OF APPEALS, WHERE HE
SERVED AS CHIEF JUSTICE FROM
1921-1932 AND GAINED FAME
FOR HIS MANY LANDMARK DECISIONS.

- 4. HAD STRONG ZIONIST FEELINGS.
- 5. SERVED ON THE BOARD OF THE AMERICAN JEWISH CONGRESS.
- 6. OFTEN STATED HOW PROUD HE WAS OF HIS JEWISH HERITAGE, AND HIS SEPHARDIC ANCESTORS WHO FOUGHT IN THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

CARDOZO DIED IN 1938 AND WAS BURIED IN BETH OLAM CEMETERY, BROOKLYN... NOT FAR FROM THE GRAVE OF HIS FAMOUS ANCESTOR-THE POET, EMMA LAZARUS.
