Dear Chaverim/Chaverot-

Chanukah begins at sundown Thursday, December 7th and ends by sundown Friday, December 15th. Even though in Judaism it is considered a minor holiday it is one many Jews love to celebrate. In Israel it's a special time to spend with family, eat fried foods like latke's and sufganiot (jelly filled donuts) and light the Chanukiah (9 candle Menorah).

The historical origin dates back to 167 BCE in the land of Judea during the rule of King Antiochus IV of the Seleucid Empire. King Antiochus made it illegal for Jews to practice their religion. If anyone tried, they were killed. It was not a good time to be Jewish. Sadly, something we'd get very used to through out history. The Greeks even took over the Temple in Jerusalem and destroyed everything inside.

Finally, having had enough Judah the Maccabee (who was the eldest son of the priest Mattityahu) gathered a small group to fight back against the King and his army. It wasn't going to be easy. King Antiochus' army was massive and strong. They had all of the modern weapons. In the end Judah the Maccabee and his small group of fighters won. It was a miracle. In the Fall of 164 the Temple was rededicated back to the Jews.

The story of Chanukah is one about resilience, bravery and perseverance. It was our first fight for religious freedom. It's about the miracle of the underdog being able to overtake their oppressor. All of which are the plots of many great movies. Since October 7th there have been many heartbreaking stories told. Sharing in the light of this holiday I want to tell you about a more recent story. It's about bravery, impossible chances, incredible James Bond driving AND miracles. It took place in Israel on Shabbat morning October 7th on Moshav Ein Habesor. This moshav is just 4 miles from the Gaza Strip AND was right in the heat of the terrorist attacks. After reading this article think about the similarities to the story of Chanukah. Imagine Judah Maccabee giving his first hand account and how many "MacGyver" moments he must have had. Reflect on the Maccabee's and those men in the moshav...how was it they persevered with all of the odds against them?

Through out our history there have been numerous stories of survival and bravery. That's not new. However when the events happen so long ago, it can be hard to relate. The story in this article is a modern day example of G-d's presence and G-d's ability to give us strength in impossible situations. Miracles happen. Survival is in our DNA. Proof is in our 5784 years of existence. Heart-stopping accounts of bravery emerge from a town that repelled Hamas onslaught by Sue Surkes, 15 October 2023 THE TIMES OF ISRAEL

Stunning stories of bravery are emerging from Ein Habesor, a moshav near the Gaza Strip, which include a hard-fought and ultimately successful battle against Hamas terrorists and a terrifying race to get a wounded fighter to a hospital with Gaza gunmen on motorcycles in pursuit, shooting at the car. The resistance put up by dozens of residents of the small community, with only four M16 assault rifles and some pistols between them, evidently convinced the terrorists to give up and go wreak carnage elsewhere. Two moshavniks were injured, none were killed, and the terror squads that invaded Israel from the Gaza Strip at 6:30 a.m. on Saturday did not breach Ein Habesor, about 4 miles from Gaza Strip.

That Moshav Ein Habesor was able to defend itself was, ironically, thanks to a spate of car thefts that had prompted the expansion of the community's defense unit from a dozen people to 78. To ambush would-be car thieves, groups patrolled the perimeter fence nightly. On Saturday morning, Yariv Ganei Levin from the defense unit awoke to what he called "extreme" shelling from Gaza. The team's WhatsApp group was filled with video clips of a truck full of terrorists, which he first discounted as fake news. That was until he snuck to look out at route 232, which runs along the western side of the moshav, and saw a truck "with six, or eight, terrorists, armed with RPGs" — shoulder-launched, rocket-propelled grenade launchers.

"I went in the direction of the [front gate] and heard crazy shooting," he recalled. "I saw three figures in the bushes. I lay on the ground. It took me time until I opened fire. I didn't know if they were from our forces." "They were crouching, and then I saw bandannas on their heads. I opened a whole magazine [of bullets] on them, I replaced the magazine, and then I got a bullet in the shoulder. I thought a wasp had stung me and I felt heat in my back." "Some of our guys were at the gate and shouted that I'd been injured," Ganei Levin went on. "I lay down on my back with my face towards the fence and continued to shoot while shuffling backward." Ganei Levin managed to get to some greenhouses near the gate to take shelter where he was finally rescued and treated.

A second unit member, Eldad Gepner, 48, was hit by a bullet in the shoulder as he fought by the gate. His brother Yftach, 44, was standing nearby holding a rock because he had no weapon. Yftach Gepner, a resident of Ein Habesor and a senior lecturer at Tel Aviv University's Medicine Faculty, spoke with The Times of Israel and described the attack. "The whole moshav only had four M16 rifles," Gepner said, pausing from time to time to take deep breaths as he relived the nightmare. Some months ago, local Bedouin had stolen weapons from the moshav armory and the army had decided to take most of the long guns away.

"Eldad got hurt, he passed his M16 onto a friend, and he called out to me. I went in my Tesla to get him," he said. "I moved the controls into performance mode [for maximum acceleration], as I understood we had to move fast. But we couldn't go from the front gate." "We drove to the back gate, which is closer to Soroka Hospital [in the city of Beersheba, a roughly 45-minute drive west] and I tried to reach the main road [Route 242] via a dirt path." "My brother warned me that there might be a lot of terrorists out there. I told him to lie down on his back," said the doctor.

"When I got to route 242, I looked to the left. It was clear. I turned right onto the road, and in front of me, I saw two pickup trucks with about ten terrorists in each one and about five motorbikes each with two men," he said. "I didn't understand what I was seeing. They started shooting at us. I had no weapon. I was dressed in shorts," he recalled. "I reversed onto the dust track and drove backward for about 100 meters at 60 kilometers an hour, with two motorcycles chasing and shooting at us." "They shot at the car battery," he said and Eldad got hit, in the back and the buttock. "He was in enormous pain." "I did a crazy turn and drove at speed 90mph back towards the moshav's back gate," he said.

Once back at the moshav, another fighter, Raz Shapira, turned up with an ambulance. Eldad was in unstable condition at this stage. Shapira told Ynet, "We wanted to take him to the hospital on Route 241. We were talking with the switchboard at the Magen David Adom emergency service. They told us 'Don't even think about going on the road, everyone on the road is dying." "So we turned around. The whole road from the Magen Junction [north of the moshav] was full of damaged cars. The terrorists were lying by the side of the road, shooting at any car that passed and killing the drivers," Shapira said. He continued, "On the way, I was getting locations and recordings from people at the party in Re'im begging us to come and rescue them." Hamas gunmen were mowing down young adults at an all-night party near the Gaza border, eventually killing over 260 of them.

Police officers told Shapira they were caught up in a gunfight, Shapira recalled, "and that it was hell and that their ammunition was running out."

Shapira and Gepner were able to reach Habadim City, a massive IDF training base south of Beersheba, and to get Eldad transferred to an intensive care ambulance and taken to Soroka Hospital. "He's in a lot of pain, but he'll be fine," Gepner said Friday, insisting that The Times of Israel convey a message to the world.

Gepner said: "I live here with all the friends I've known since kindergarten. I have a beautiful home."

Until the Hamas invasion on October 7, there was a feeling that there was no safer place in the world, he said. "My 8-year-old can walk alone at night with zero concern that something will happen." Gepner is determined to revive that tranquility. "We created a beautiful place here at Moshav Ein Habesor, and soon, we will be even stronger." "We have come through wars, and we will get through this one because we have no other choice," he said. "This the only country for the Jews."

"Anachnu Maccabim!"- We are the Maccabees - our students enthusiastically repeat each time we meet during the month of Kislev. Chanukah commemorates the Maccabees' military victory over the Syrian/Greeks and the rededication of the Beit Hamikdash, the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. The golden seven-branched menorah, one of the earliest Jewish symbols, mentioned twenty-seven times in the Torah, and today part of the emblem of the State of Israel was lit each day in the Temple with pure olive. The oil was kept in a container, sealed with the stamp of the Kohen Gadol, the High Priest. We all know the story of how a small cruse of consecrated oil was found and kept the menorah lit for eight days. This rededication, called hanukkat hamizbeyah, is the source of the word Hanukkah, and provides an opportune time to rededicate ourselves to our families, our Jewish values and identity and our connection to the larger Jewish community.

Today, we celebrate Chanukah in our homes. The major mitzvah is lighting of the hanukkiah, the eight-branched menorah with an additional holder for the shamash (server) which we use to light all the other candles. We are also encouraged to 'publicize the miracle' by placing a hanukkiah (preferably electric) in our windows so those passing by can see it. I wonder if we will feel comfortable doing that this year. I'm reminded of an incident that occurred in Billings, Montana in 1993. The entire town came together to display hanukkiahs in their windows in support and solidarity of a Jewish family whose home had been vandalized after displaying a hanukkiah in their window. The Christmas Menorahs is a compelling story of how each person's small act of kindness can bring some light into the world.

Teaching our students the story of Chanukah has obviously taken on a new meaning this year. We reinforce the resilience of our people and our obligation to '...be a light among the nations.' We will celebrate even stronger this year our joy and pride in being Jewish!

Sewage project construction on Sunrise nears its end

If your commute on Sunrise Highway has been interrupted by construction, there's good news: It's almost finished.

Construction crews are in the final stages of installing over 10 miles of pipe systems along Sunrise to connect two water-treatment facilities. The project, called Bay Park Conveyance, began in the summer of 2021, with the goal of eliminating excessive nitrogen pollution in Nassau County's Western Bays. The construction is now 77 percent completed, according to the Long Island Regional Planning Council.

"The construction crews have been working on that the last few weeks," Andrew Fera, the project director from the state Department of Environmental Conservation, said of the final phase of construction along Sunrise Highway. "We certainly hope that we can get this complete by the end of November."

The Long Beach portion of the larger Bay Park Conveyance Project will soon be underway as well. The project will move treated water from the South Shore Water Reclamation Facility, in East Rockaway, to the Cedar Creek Water Pollution Control Plant outfall pipe. The plant currently discharges about 50 million gallons of water into Reynolds Channel each day.

The treated water will be conveyed by a twomile-long force main from the water reclamation facility to the aqueduct underneath Sunrise Highway, a seven-mile-long stretch of which has been the focus of the reconstruction work.

The Long Beach portion involves the decommissioning of the city's wastewater treatment plant and converting it to a pump station that will send the city's sewage to the Water Reclamation Facility for treatment. According to the city, this project will eliminate about 75 million gallons a day of

Temple Avodah raises \$33,000 in aid for Israel

Oceanside comes together for fundraising dinner

With Israel's war against Hamas raging on, Temple Avodah, in Oceanside, hosted a major fundraising event in support of Israel on Nov. 9, and the synagogue has raised about \$33,000 since the start of the conflict over a month ago.

Temple Avodah organized the fundraising dinner with Kenny Kombert, of Kombert Caterers, and all of the proceeds are going to help the Jewish state.

"Every single person serving food volunteered their time, and I really can't say enough about how much this means not only to Israel but also to us as Temple Avodah," Matt Phillips, temple president, said.

More than 100 community members came together for the \$180-per-person dinner and cocktail fundraiser. Temple Avodah Rabbi Jeshayahu "Shai" Beloosesky explained that the price of admission held a deeper significance. In Judaism, the number 18 is considered lucky. The Hebrew word "chai" means life, and the numerical value of its letters is eight and 10, adding

up to 18. Giving gifts in multiples of 18 symbolically signifies giving the gift of life.

"One hundred eighty for one person, we can eat several dinners in a week, but it's not about the food, it's about supporting the State of Israel, now at this moment," the rabbi said.

Since the Oct. 7 attack on Israel by Hamas, Israelis near the Gaza Strip have required aid. Roughly 1,200 Israelis were killed during the attack and more than 5,000 were injured. Under the direction of Rabbi Beloosesky, the temple will send relief to the Friends of Israel Defense Forces, and emergency medical services such as United Hatzalah and Magen David Adom.

"It's one thing for people from Temple Avodah to come, but it's another for the community to come," Phillips said. "I can't overstate how good it is that so many people are supporting Israal."

Nearly six weeks into the war, according to the U.S. State Department, Hamas continued to hold roughly 200 hostages. In

Israel's military response, thousands have reportedly been killed in Gaza, where an estimated 600 Americans remain trapped, officials said.

During the fundraiser, community members paid their respects to the 1,400 Israeli soldiers and citizens who have been killed. Videos were played, updating those in attendance about the current state of affairs in Israel, as well as a video f Broadway performers who had recorded a version of "Bring Him Home" from "Les Misérables" in a tribute to those who remained captive. The names and ages of the victims ran along the bottom of the video, which concluded with a collage of

the victims' faces

As the conflict plays out, numerous hate crimes and antisemitic incidents have been reported across the globe.

"We saw that people have started to give support, also non-Jewish people, which is very good, although you can see at the same time antisemitism, which is ridiculous," Beloosesky said.

The temple's fundraiser took place on the 85th anniversary of Kristallnacht, or "the Night of Broken Glass," when the Nazis carried out a wave of antisemitic violence on Nov. 9 and 10, 1938, which led up to the Holocaust.

For Rabbi Beloosesky, the events taking place in Israel have been especially stressful because his four sons and exwife are there. Three of his sons and his ex-wife are currently in the Israel Defense Forces, and due to the war, his youngest son, who is in 12th grade, is working.

"It's difficult," the rabbi said. "I'm worried. I have my anxiety and my stress. I have two of them on the front lines, and one is in the Air Force. Since there is no school, the pupils are at work, and my youngest one is working in agriculture. The situation is difficult, and it's going to be a long war. I don't have the right words, to say how I feel."

The rabbi served in Israel's military for 29 years, rising to assistant to the military secretary to the prime minister and minister of defense under late Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin. His 84-year-old mother is also in Israel with his sister, in

the city of Rishon LeTsiyon, living in a shelter amid the conflict.

"When the missiles come at night, they have to run to the shelter," the rabbi said. "A lot of people in Israel get hurt or wounded because they're running, especially at an older age. The situation is difficult."

The rabbi added that he believes the

conflict will not be resolved quickly but appreciates the support that Israel has received from the United States and in Oceanside.

"We're here to support him," Marian Keilson, the immediate past president of Temple Avodah, said. "He doesn't have them at his fingertips, but we're trying to support him as best we can."






