In My Opinion

Revelation is an Important Element of Our Lives



Forty-nine days after the beginning of Passover we celebrate Shavuot, which means "weeks." It took seven weeks for the Israelites, after leaving Egypt, to reach an important destination in their journey to freedom. After wandering for forty-nine days, Mount Sinai was finally in sight. It is there where the most important event in the history of the Jewish people happened. Even greater than the birth of the State of Israel, and that was at the very top. At Mount Sinai, God gave us what will make the Jewish people unique. It is from this event that we are known as the chosen people.

Shavuot is a time of great joy and celebration, as we reflect on the journey of the Jewish people and the profound meaning of the Torah in our lives. It was at the moment of Divine Revelation at Mount Sinai that we received our laws, traditions, and values. As the word implies, a revelation is experiencing or discovering something we didn't previously know or see or feel.

The giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai was a pivotal moment in Jewish history. It was a moment of revelation, where the Jewish people were given the tools to understand the meaning of their existence and their role in the world. The Torah is not just a set of laws or rules, but a guide to living a meaningful and purposeful life.

The Torah was given to us as a community. And it is as a community that we will survive. Shavuot is a reminder that if we want to continue to be a people, we need to be part of a community. We act together and we evolve together.

This Shavuot, let's reaffirm the mystery of Revelation with the gift of acceptance. We accept the gift of being Jewish and we act upon it as a community. It is through moments of revelation that we discover the incredible. When was the last time you experienced a moment of revelation? It is not easy. Like the Israelites in the desert, we need to be at the right place at the right moment. However, every day can be a time to receive revelation. When we experience the beauty of life and the feeling of love, we receive revelation. When we help someone, we reveal the Divine within ourselves. Revelation is finding who we are and how we can become even better. It is to find out all that is yet to make us better and happier. We can reveal our happiness to the world by accepting the humanity in all of us.

I strongly believe that there is so much more to be revealed in our world, minds, and of course in our spirits. We just need, as the Israelites did, to walk the journey to the place where we will experience life in its plenitude. This time of the year, when flowers start growing and days become longer, let's take a moment and experience the revelation of our lives...ourselves.

When the Angels Left the Old Country by Sacha Lam- What happens when Good Omens meets An American Tail. Uriel and Ashl are the resident angel and demon of their tiny shtetl in Eastern Europe. When one of the many young people from their town who are immigrating to America goes missing, Uriel and Ashl take it upon themselves to investigate. Their journey leads them from their little town across the ocean to the big city, where supernatural mayhem and hijinks ensue.




Spinning Silver by Naomi Novik- A reimagining of Rumpelstiltskin which weaves the classic fairy tale with Eastern and Jewish folklore to build a rich fantasy version of medieval Europe. When her father's failure to collect on the debts from his money lending business leaves her family on the edge of poverty, Miryem takes matters into her own hands. Her reputation for turning silver into gold attracts the attention of the king of the mystical Staryk, and she is thrust into a world of magic, intrigue, and peril.



Unholy Land by Lavie Tidhar- Did you know that Theodore Herzl proposed a plan to establish a Jewish state in Uganda? Unholy Land explores a parallel universe where this plan came to fruition. When mediocre author Lior Tirosh returns to his African homeland of Palestina to visit his ailing father, it soon becomes clear that something isn't quite right. As the boundaries between realities begin to erode, Lior struggles to discover which version of the Jewish State he belongs in.



The Golem and the Jinni by Helene Wecker- Chava is a golem created by a disgraced Rabbi to be a perfect wife. When her husband dies on the journey to America, she finds herself left to her own devices in New York City. There, she forms an unlikely friendship with Ahmad, a jinni who is accidentally released after centuries of confinement in a tin flask. If you like your fantasy with a little romance, this twist on the immigrant tale is for you.



The City Beautiful by Aden Polydoros-A murder mystery set in Chicago during the 1893 World's Fair with a supernatural twist. A series of murders of young Jewish boys goes mostly disregarded by Chicago police. When Alter's roommate Yakov becomes the latest victim, Alter is possessed by Yakov's dybbuk, and forced to solve and avenge his friend's murder before he is completely subsumed.

DID YOU KNOW .. . DID YOU KNOW THAT AFTER THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION FEW OF THE FORMER CITIZENS RETURNED AND NEWPORT NEVER RECAINED ITS FORMER PROMINENCE. WITH A DECLINING POPULATION, AND MANY BUILDINGS DESTROYED, THE SYNAGOGUE WAS USED FOR PUBLIC PURPOSES AS WELL AS RELIGIOUS ONES. FROM 1781 to 1784 THE RHODE ISLAND GENERAL ASSEMBLY MET HERE, AS WELL AS THE RHODE SUPREME COURT. ... IN 1790 PRESIDENT GEORGE WASHINGTON MADE THE 5 DAY JOURNEY FROM NEW YORK, AND SPOKE AT THE CONG. YESHUAT ISRAEL'S SYNAGOGUE, IN HOPES OF GETTING SUPPORT FOR THE FIRST 10 AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION. ON HIS RE-TURN TO NEW YORK HE WROTE A LETTER OF THANKS TO THE CONGREGATION. PART OF THE LETTER READ: THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES, WHICH GIVES TO BIGOTRY NO SPINCTION TO PERSECUTION NO ASSISTANCE REQUIRE THAT THEY WHO LIVE UNDER ITS PROTECTION SHOULD DEMEAN THEMSELVES AS GOOD CITIZENS.

NOT LONG AFTER, WITH MOST OF THE CONGREGATION HAVING MOVED TO NEW YORK, TITLE OF THE SYNAGOGYE PASSED INTO THE HONDS OF N.Y.'S CONG. SHEARITH ISRAEL AS TRUSTEES. WITH THE NEWPORT SYNAGOGUE RARELY USED AND IN GREAT DISREPAIR IT APPEARED AS IT WERE DOOMED ... BUT, LIKE THEIR FATHER; ISAAC, HIS SONS ABRAHAM AND JUDAH TUDBO LOVED THE SYNAGOGUE. THESE 2 BROTHERS. WHO WERE 2 OF AMERICA'S GREATEST PHILANTHROPISTS. GAVE SUBSTANTIAL MONIES TO THE STATE TO MAINTAIN THE SYNAGOUE, THE CEMETERY AND OTHER PUBLIC BUILDINGS IN NEW-PORT ... AND IT WAS THE STATE THAT REFERRED TO IT AS TOURD SYNAGOCUE. THEN IN 1883 WITH AN INFLUX OF JEWISH IMMIGRATION IN THE SYNAGOOUS WAS ONCE AGAIN ACTIVATED, AND IN 1946 IT WAS DERLARED A NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE!

THIS SIMPLE BUILDING WITH ITS BEAUTIFUL INTERIOR WILL CELEBRATE ITS 250 ANNIVERARY THIS DEC. 2.
