## **TIMES OF JOY AND TIMES OF SADNESS**

We all look forward to celebrations with our family and friends. The joy that we experience is a major part of our lives, as it should be. Yet, we know that life has with it sorrow as well. As it is in our personal lives, so too is it in our Jewish cycle of holidays and commemorations.

I love the tremendous joy that we can experience through our holidays. I also realize that there are the times when we need to remember the tragic events that shaped our people's history. Every summer, we arrive at the time when we remember the tremendous tragedy of the destruction of our holy Temple, the loss of Israel, and the exile of the Jewish people throughout the world. Although, thank G-d, we now have the vibrant modern state of Israel, we do realize every day that there is no peace in the land, nor rest for our brothers and sisters, who must keep guard against terrorism.

Thus, when we arrive at the Three Weeks, which begin July 5<sup>th</sup>, we have customs which remind us that we are entering a time of recalling the sad events of our people. These include the custom to: postpone weddings until after Tisha B'Av, not attend public celebrations that have music and musical presentations, and not getting a haircut.

Tisha B'Av occurs at the very end of these three weeks. It is a major fast day, commemorating the destruction of the holy Temple in Jerusalem (First and Second Temples), and all the terrible tragedies that occurred in its wake.

The last nine days of this three week period, The Nine Days, we have the custom to not eat meat or drink wine, except on Shabbat. Then, on Tisha B'Av the same restrictions of Yom Kippur apply. If you have any questions, please ask me.

This year, Motzei Shabbat, Saturday evening, July 25<sup>th</sup>, at 9:30pm - A time to weep and a time to laugh; a time of wailing and a time of dancing - we will hold Tisha B'Av services, at which time we will read the Biblical book of Lamentations when we retell and relive the aftermath of the Temple's destruction. We delay putting on Tallit and Tefillin on Sunday until the afternoon. We will have a Sunday service at 7:00pm, July 26<sup>th</sup>.

Why all of this? I believe that there is, indeed, in the words of Ecclesiastes 3:4 "a time to rejoice and a time to mourn." My hope is that our remembering our sad tragedies will spur us to build and rebuild, to double our efforts in supporting Israel and to strive to live the ideal of loving one another.

Our sages taught us that the Second Temple was destroyed because of Sinat Chinam, causeless hatred. The antidote to this is unconditional love. In a very famous quote, Rav Aharon Kook, one of the greatest Rabbis of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and Chief Rabbi of Israel, said: "If we were destroyed, and the world with us, due to baseless hatred, then we shall rebuild ourselves, and the world with us, with baseless love —*ahavat chinam*. (*Orot HaKodesh* vol. III, p. 324).

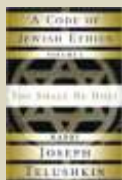

## THE LEGACY OF BITTERSWEET MOORS

REVEALED by Tami Hoffman and Nancee Lougheed-Kirk

"Bittersweet Moors" is an odd name for the neighborhood in which the synagogue resides, don't you think? Elsa Jakob, friend of Congregation B'nai Jacob who lives in Brookline, Massachusetts, certainly thinks so and has inquired about its origins on three separate occasions over the past three years. Her latest note (included with a yahrzeit donation) reads, "No one responded to my question about the unusual name of 'Bittersweet Moors' in your address. Doesn't anyone but me care to know?" The truth is, a few years ago we did ask a member of B'nai Jacob who lives in the neighborhood but the member did not know the answer, and neither did the Allen County Historical Society more recently. Elsa's curiosity persisted, however, and thanks to a timely connection, we now have some credible and fascinating information to pass along to Elsa and to share with our congregation and community.

As it turns out, last fall during the High Holidays, Bittersweet Moors resident, Nancee Lougheed-Kirk, (pronounced "Lock-heed") contacted Rabbi Kornspan requesting the favor of the use of our parking lot in anticipation of a large gathering at her home. Rabbi obliged and afterwards Nancee showed her appreciation by making a generous donation to B'nai Jacob. When our secretary, Tami Hoffman, made Rabbi aware of Elsa's communications this spring, Rabbi remembered his earlier conversation with this friendly neighbor and suggested she may know something. A Google search of "Lougheed and Bittersweet Moors" confirmed that Nancee Lougheed-Kirk

was indeed the daughter of the late Cook O.P. Lougheed, the local man who developed Bittersweet Moors residential community and other communities within Allen County.

It took a little while for Tami and Nancee to connect but, once they did, their conversation revealed a charming story worth telling.

Bittersweet Moors has a unique heritage directly connected to the Lougheed Family. The route to visiting Nancee's maternal grandparents farm passed the intersection of U.S. 24 and State Road 18, near Marion, IN. At the corner stood a gas station where large bundles of Bittersweet were sold in the fall, when the plant produces colorful fruit that split open to reveal orange berries. Nancee's mother loved the color orange and so her family would stop at the station and her Dad would purchase Bittersweet for her Mom. Nancee's Dad noted the potential of a certain parcel of ground located along this route to her grandparents home.

In the early 1960's, while the family was walking the property (where Bittersweet Moors neighborhood now resides) in anticipation of purchasing and developing it, large amounts of Bittersweet were found.

*"At the time this land was in the middle of nowhere and no one would have thought that anyone would want to live this far from town. But Daddy was a visionary, and it was Mother*

*who christened the area Bittersweet, having observed the pervasive orange-berried blooming Bittersweet bushes. The name Lougheed is Scottish\*, 'Lough' meaning 'lake' and 'heed' meaning 'land or meadow'. The term 'Moors' was added because it is a Scottish word that refers to a tract of open, rolling land, usually covered with heather and with game preserves. So, it was Mother's idea to call the neighborhood Bittersweet Moors."*

\*Cook Lougheed's great grandfather, Robert Lougheed (born in 1822), was the youngest son of 12 and the only living male heir since all of his siblings were sisters. He came over from Scotland with four of his sisters and eventually settled in Ohio.

One of Cook Lougheed's businesses was an earth moving company called Earth, Inc. In order to keep his workers busy during the winter months,

Mr. Lougheed had them excavate an existing three acre pond into the present twenty-five acre lake. A large lighted fountain was placed in the southern bowl of Lough Bittersweet and the lake was stocked with fish. It is known today as one of the best Bass fishing holes in the area. (Unfortunately, or fortunately as the case may be, lake use is restricted to homeowners and their registered guests, as is the recreational clubhouse and pool.)

*"The land was once part of the Redding Maple Sugar Farm. Many old galvanized buckets and spickets were frequently found in the early days of development."*

Cook envisioned a recreational community and also put a walking path around the lake. The path is exactly one mile and many people can be seen using it for exercise and enjoyment.

*"Daddy was an entrepreneur and Bittersweet Moors was the first neighborhood in the area planned around a man-made lake. I hope your congregation will feel welcome to walk around the lake...it truly is a delightful experience in the early evenings. Devon\* and I love the therapeutic tenure of water. In fact, we have a small pontoon boat and we love to go out and fish with the grandkids. Devon even takes his laptop out and works while anchored not far from the fountain. I guess we feel as if Daddy gave us a little slice of Heaven, right here on Earth."*

\*Devon Kirk owns a commercial construction company that has built many of the concrete steps leading down to Lough Bittersweet.

Because Cook Lougheed took care to preserve as many trees as possible leaving much of the Bittersweet lands unspoiled, the area contains wide arrays

of natural, indigenous foliage, flora, and fauna. The residents are fortunate to observe the following native animals: swans, ducks, geese, heron, cranes, beaver, badgers, fox, deer, raccoons, hawks, owls, eagles, woodpeckers, woodchucks, chipmunks, squirrels, opossum, muskrats, frogs, and turtles. An occasional coyote cry is not an unusual sound. One of the most spectacular sights is that of the Snow Geese who make Lough Bittersweet their customary seasonal stop as they migrate.



Ever the travelers, Cook and his wife Jeannie visited their Scottish homeland studying the battlements, keeps and fortifications of Scotland's medieval castles. The large grey stone towers gracing the boulevard at Bittersweet Moors entrance mimic those of an old Scottish castle and are a legacy to some of the Lougheeds' overseas visits. The large heavy iron chains attached to the towers were actually salvaged from a ship wrecked along the coastal waterways of Scotland within firing range of one of the more ancient castles!



Back in the 1960's, the city of Fort Wayne was changing-out the street lamps that had lined the older sectors of Downtown. Cook, as always, was

thinking "outside the box" and saw an opportunity to marry nostalgia with cost efficiency. He purchased the vintage street lamps, which are the same ones that illuminate the streets of Bittersweet Moors today. Fifty years later, they are considered valuable antiques that add allure to the neighborhood.



Nancee's parents insisted that she and her siblings, Scott and April, decide on the names of all of the streets in Bittersweet Moors, with one stipulation - they had to be the names of flowering shrubs. If you take a stroll through the Moors, you will see that the three children accepted the challenge and chose many beautiful names, such as Weigela Court, Snowberry Drive, Coralberry Court, Magnolia Drive and the like.

In the early days before the land surrounding Lough Bittersweet was developed, the family would hunt mushrooms, camping at "Lougheed Point", a spot that afforded the best view of the area. Nancee roasted her first marshmallow on a stick when her Brownie Troop had campouts there. The Lougheed Family's ancestral home currently sits on the Point.



In 1997, Nancee and Devon purchased a home on Lough Bittersweet directly across from the Point. They renovated

and enlarged the home to reflect Nancee's love of all things Victorian. The project took five long years after which Nancee said to Devon, "We need to give this place a name". So, in keeping with the tradition of flowering shrubs and Nancee's love of Roses, the Kirks appropriately named their home "Kirk Rose Manor". The manor takes a southerly view of the lake and its architecture is distinctively Victorian amidst the surrounding homes. Ironically, the sir name 'Kirk' is also Scottish, meaning "church".



After the Moors were completed, the Loughdees went on to develop other Bittersweet communities – the Glens, Woods, and the Dells where the Street of Dreams was held. Each of these communities has its own unique waterway attraction whether it be a series of ponds connected by a system of locks and dams, other lake forms or a scenic river flowing behind the homes.

*"It was middle brother, Scott, who engineered the streets and walkways around the lake. Bittersweet Moors became the prototype for subsequent additions with connecting waterways and walking paths."* - Nancee Loughheed-Kirk

Each Bittersweet section also has its own intricate laid out pathway system curving throughout the respective divisions, as well as connecting each to the other. It is possible to walk from the entrance of the Moors to Brigadoon on Liberty Mills Road. These pathways and streets now connect to the Aboite Trails and then hook onto the River Greenway making it possible to walk, bicycle, jog, or even rollerblade from the entrance to Bittersweet Moors all the way to New Haven!

So we see that simple curiosity about the origins of a name leads to a wealth of knowledge and a stronger connection with the community surrounding B'nai Jacob! We hope you enjoyed learning as much as we did in this endeavor, thanks to Elsa Jakob's insistence for an answer and to Nancee Loughheed-Kirk for sharing her family's legacy.
