From the Rabbi's Desk

You should receive this Shofar just a couple weeks before the start of Rosh Hashanah which begins September 15. This year, and even more during this past month, I have noticed the passing of time. For the last part of July and the first part of August I was

blessed with Covid. Because of my asthma, when I first caught it, I struggled with breathing. My doctors put me on paxlovid. What I learned was 20% of those who take paxlovid experience a rebound getting covid a second time. I fell into that category and dealt with a second bout that included more congestion and weakness. Every morning I tested positive and became more frustrated. With Cantor Alisa away, I wondered how I would meet the needs of our CBI community.

I was reminded that I just needed to have faith. CBI lay leaders led Shabbat services and Shabbat study when I was unable to be present. Bar/Bat Mitzvah students agreed to study online with me. And days before a Bar Mitzvah weekend, I finally started testing negative again. Never have I been so excited to be negative! Being positive day after day was exhausting. Work was piling up on my desk. Holy Day sermons were outlined but left unfinished. Prep work for Hesed Academy was delayed. I discovered that patience is not my strong suit. Maybe the lesson I learned from all of this is to value time. Once I was healthy again, I cherished the hours in the day. I had time for calls, time for sermons, time for students and time to be out and about with people.

As I prepare for this New Year 5784, I plan to take advantage of every single day God has given us. While, like you, some time will be wasted doing silly things, I plan on being more appreciative of each day. Healthy, I look forward to interacting in person with my family, with my friends, and with my CBI community. I look forward to work and study and play. I will try to take full advantage of living on the Monterey Peninsula.

Time is passing, but God has blessed each of us with this New Year. Join me in celebrating each minute of each hour of each day of each week of each month. May each breath be filled with health and joy and thanksgiving this New Year.

Susan and my daughters Liotte, Shira and Tani join me in wishing everyone in our congregation a healthy, happy New Year. May we go from strength to strength. Amen.



From Cantor Alisa

Dear CBI Community,

As we enter the season of *Yamim Nora'im*, the Days of Awe, we expand our vulnerability, self-awareness, and compassion by tapping into the wonder of the gift of life and the opportunity to reflect on how live our

lives in the face of our mortality. We turn our focus to *t'shuvah*, the practice of remembering and returning to the deeper truth of who we are.

As I learn with my meditation teachers at the Institute for Jewish Spirituality, I rediscover that I am not only my thoughts and feelings, which are continually changing. I practice witnessing the changing phenomena of body, thoughts, and emotions. The more I do this, the less I am defined or confined by them. I experience the greater freedom that comes with releasing myself from past grudges or judgements that I may hold at any given time, returning to my true nature, able to choose a different path about how I wish to be in relationship with myself and others, becoming more loving and compassionate. This is the gift of t'shuvah—returning to our essential nature—the allowing, present, spacious, beings that we are. In doing so, we cultivate well-being.

This season, may we come to know the work of *t'shuvah* as loving awareness, turning and returning to our essential being as a return to "intimacy with our divine nature and the divinity inherent within all beings" (Rabbi Sam Feinsmith quoting Tara Brach, a contemporary American Buddhist teacher). May we find ways to forgive others, forgive ourselves, and help each other find our way back home to the wholeness and wisdom of who we are.

Below is a poem by Rich Orloff, congregant of Romemu Synagogue in New York City. His words invite us to reflect on our practice of T'shuvah, not with brow beating, but instead with tenderness and compassion.

I am looking forward to bringing in this New Year of the Soul with all of you, Cantor Alisa

May I be more open to love
Recognizing it in its myriad of disguises
Letting it sneak through guarded borders to soothe my wounded soul

May I nurture and encourage others

Hesed Academy (Developing Kind Souls) Reopens September 10!

Even as I type this message, more registrations are coming in for Hesed

Academy, CBI's religious school program. I am excited to continue to serve as CBI's Director of Education with Cantor Alisa Fineman assisting me in all our educational endeavors, including overseeing the B'nai Mitzvah program. We have again engaged a fabulous group of teachers and worked closely with them to create a stimulating curriculum for our children. And I am delighted to announce that Sophie Little has joined Hesed Academy as our new Education Coordinator. With a strong background in youth education and active involvement in her hometown synagogue, Sophie is a wonderful addition to the Hesed Academy team.

Our Kindergarten/First Grade class will study the Jewish Home while the Second/Third Grade class will explore "The Jewish Holiday Treasure Trail." Our Third/Fourth graders will enjoy a wonderful textbook, "Count Me In: Jewish Wisdom in Action," an our Sixth/Seventh grade class will focus on Jewish Decision-Making.

Hesed Academy begins each Sunday at 9:30 am. Each week, all our students will spend time with one of our education specialists (art, cooking, music, and storytelling), join in Tefillah in the sanctuary, and engage in their specific class

curricula. Students in Kindergarten through Third grade will be dismissed at 11:30 am but, for families with older students at Hesed Academy, our younger students may stay for supervised play until 12:30 pm. Our Fourth through Seventh grades continue their studies until 12:30 pm with time for Hebrew study.

Cantor Fineman and Sophie Little are hiring the CBI teens who will assist Hesed Academy as Madrichim (student aides) and reformulating our semi-monthly Aleynu (Eighth through Twelfth grade) curriculum. In response to the great ideas and suggestions from last year's Aleynu students, Aleynu's new curriculum includes a strong social justice component, an arts component, and opportunities for student-directed activities. We hope that all our post-B'nai Mitzvah students take advantage of these wonderful opportunities—please contact me as soon as possible to register your teens in Aleynu.

We remain sensitive to health issues--our classroom windows will be open, we will use air purifiers in every classroom, our sanctuary, and the social hall, and, weather permitting, we will hold classes and activities outdoors.

If you have any questions about Hesed Academy, please call me as I am eager to address your concerns and clarify how we plan to approach our youth education this upcoming school year. May our children all be blessed with growth of body and soul in 5784.

Observance of the Jewish High Holy Days begins with Selichot, traditionally held on the Saturday night before Erev Rosh Hashanah. The mood of Selichot is reflective and, like the entire month of Elul, helps every Jew to set a certain kavanah (intention) for his or her observance of the High Holy Days. Gather in our social hall beginning at 8:00 pm as we join Cantor Alisa Fineman and Rabbi Bruce Greenbaum for an evening of study and reflection.

We begin our Selichot observance in the CBI Social Hall and, at 9:30 pm, we will move into our sanctuary for our Selichot service (the Selichot service will also be available over Zoom). On this evening of study and prayer, we will reflect together on how we turn towards God, teshuvah, during our High Holy Days season. During the Selichot service, we also observe the tradition of replacing our green Torah mantels with white coverings for the High Holy Days. This fall or winter, we're excited to announce that we will host a seminar focused on medical emergencies. This program will provide hands-on training on vital skills like CPR, the use of a Medical Defibrillator, and understanding Exsanguination. Your safety and well-being are our top priorities, and we want to equip you with the knowledge that can make a difference.




