2nd Night Community Passover Seder

Our congregation's Community Passover Seder will be held in our social hall the second night of Passover, **Tuesday, April 23 beginning at 6:00 PM**. This fun, family Seder will be led by Rabbi Bruce Greenbaum and Cantor Alisa Fineman. Much of our time will be spent singing together. We will also take turns reading different parts of the Seder. The rabbi will even bring a few props that will add to our recalling the 10 plagues.

Our dinner will be prepared by one of our favorite caterers, Nicole who has prepared some of our previous Seder meals. Our traditional meal includes matzo ball soup, gefilte fish, chicken and of course a tasty dessert.

This interactive Seder will include our taking turns reading with lots of singing as well. After 2 cups of wine/grape juice, blessings over the various foods, and sharing the Seder story we will take a 30-minute break from our Seder to enjoy our dinner. Then we will continue with the hunt for the Afikomen (prizes for those who find it!). After dinner we finish the second part of the Seder that includes blessings after the meal, two more cups of wine/grape juice and welcoming Elijah to our Seder tables.

From the Rabbi's Desk

This month we celebrate one of my favorite holidays, Passover. I enjoy our family getting together for our Seder (so rarely are we all in the same place these days). It is fun to page through the Haggadah, singing the songs and retelling our Exodus story. I love

sharing a delicious meal (Susan is a fantastic cook) and just being together as a family; and joining with some close friends is always wonderful.

But the message of freedom is what I enjoy most. This is the time of year where we focus on our biblical redemption. We recall that transition from slavery to Egyptian taskmasters to becoming servants of God. We go from building cities for Pharaoh to building a tabernacle for God. Our work evolves from being almost meaningless, to bringing purpose to our very existence.

How many of us today forget to celebrate or take full advantage of our freedom? When was the last time you conscientiously served God? My fear is too many of us have become slaves to our work or struggle to cover the materialism that floods our lives. Day-to-day demands overwhelm us. In one way or another we have enslaved ourselves. How might we break out of this pattern?

Find someone or some worthy organization that needs support and help them. While giving funds might assist them, do more than that. Take some time and physically be present for them. Helping a person will lift both your spirits. Looking into another's eyes while assisting them is like taking a spark within and sharing it, bringing warmth and light. This is something I experience every week when I work at our soup kitchen Abraham's Tent.

Nothing feels better than handing someone a meal who I suspect might be food insufficient. I bask in the smiles and kind comments I receive knowing how much they appreciate the time and effort on their behalf. I know I am bringing some wholeness (think Shalom) to them. While cleaning the kitchen at the end of another shift at the soup kitchen, I see the joy in those who have joined in this effort of serving those in need. At that moment, we have shared the experience of using our freedom to serve God. The sense of satisfaction and contentment is complete. Giving to others has broken our shackles of enslavement. This simple Mitzvah, which we are all free to do, leaves our spirits soaring.

This is the lesson of our Passover holiday. God redeemed us for a purpose. There is a reason God gave us freedom. I pray this season is filled with the joy found in serving God through service to God's creation. Amen.



From Cantor Alisa

Dear Friends,

While writing this message, our Book of Exodus draws to a close. For weeks, the Torah instructs us in the building of the *Mishkan*, a portable sanctuary to carry and know G-d's presence on our ancestors' journey through the

wilderness. In its completion, we are given explicit instructions to honor *Shabbat*— intended to help us rest not only in this physical space, but to help us create a holy space for G-d to dwell within us as well, in all the ways we know or name G-d— a space for wellbeing, divine presence, love, the light of awareness. In our pausing we create a space of awe and wonder, remembering from whom and where all blessings flow, in turn enlivening our gratitude for life, Torah, creation, the gift of each other and so much more.

At our Torah study on Saturday mornings and at our monthly "Lunch with the Clergy," I cherish the gifts we bring one another as we reflect on what it means to "build a holy space." As the building of the *Mishkan* is finalized, our ancestors were so inspired to contribute, day after day, that their gifts overflowed and overwhelmed the artisans. Moses actually had to tell them to stop! Can you imagine receiving too many gifts? What is it about this *Mishkan*, this holy space, that inspired and compelled the Israelites to give so generously? What moves us to come together, to give of ourselves and build our holy space here at CBI?

As we know, many of our members make significant financial contributions, while many others tirelessly volunteer their time and skills on a regular basis. Just showing up is an offering—the offering of our being, our presence—whether it be for Shabbat and holiday services, special guest speakers, social events, or Pilates and Zumba classes. By doing so, we make connections, create fellowship, welcome the stranger and uplift those facing hardships. There are so many ways our members build this holy community. When our hearts are so moved, every offering, every gift, every person makes a difference as we build this place together.

Hine mah tov—Indeed, how good it is when we dwell together at CBI, a most beautiful space because of our individual and collective offerings that make CBI the

community it is and all that it can be. It's amazing to think we exist because of each other, serving not only the Jewish community, but our greater community as well.

V'chol chacham lev— "wise hearted people"— may we continue in the ways of our ancient mothers and fathers and know that all our gifts matter—our presence, our wisdom, our voices, our skills, our caring and contributions of all kinds— and may our gifts continue to flow. As it says in our morning prayers: Ashrei yoshvei veitecha; od y'hal'lucha selah— "Happy and rich are those who dwell in your house; we will sing our thanks and praises to You forever." May it be so for all of us. Chazak, chazak v'nitchazek— may we be strong and strengthen one another as we move forward on our journey as Congregation Beth Israel.

Counting the Omer— the period from Passover to

Shavuot From Freedom to Revelation

At Passover, we remember and experience the spiritual rebirth of the Jewish people, leaving *Mitzrayim*—"The Narrow Place"— for the freedom and expansiveness of the wilderness. Just as our ancestors had to navigate the confines of slavery, our journey toward freedom and a more expansive consciousness is not easy either and in these turbulent and emotionally fraught times, we can feel especially challenged. Our journey is both an individual and a collective one, for are any of us truly free if others remain enslaved?

Our Jewish calendar provides us with an opportunity to explore and improve upon our relationships with one another, and through those encounters, our relationship with G-d as we know G-d—the divine, the light of awareness. Originally a grain harvest festival for our biblical ancestors at Passover time, our sages innovated a way to count by way of a spiritual practice we can liken to an "inner-pilgrimage".

The rebbes taught that each day is unique and will never come again. This practice reminds us that our journey to freedom is ongoing. As a free people, we have the choice to make each day count, to make our lives count, to remember that everyone counts, enabling us to see the divine in all beings. May the Counting of the Omer help us illuminate our path as human beings so we can truly be a

light unto the nations and to those around us, realizing a world of justice and freedom for all.





Each year CBI supports the 12K run at the Big Sur International Marathon. This year, the marathon is on Sunday, April 28. We assist with 6 stations along the 12K route in Point Lobos. We commit to 12 volunteers and in doing so receive a donation of over \$1000.

We meet at the mouth of Carmel Valley at 6am and walk to Point Lobos, approximately 2.2 miles, and set up at the 5 stations along the race route inside the park and 1 station at the entrance. The race starts at 7:35. The racers show up a little while after that. Our job is to make sure they don't get lost or make a wrong turn and to cheer them on. The final racers are usually out of Point Lobos by 10am. Then we will walk back to our cars.

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Meet the Cantor Family

Hi, we are the Cantor family, Ilene, Neil, and Robby. We moved to the Monterey/Carmel area in stages. On our first visit to the area in February 2022, Neil, Robby, and myself (Ilene) stopped by Congregation Beth Israel and met with Rabbi Bruce to find out more about CBI and the Jewish community in the area. A Jewish community is very important to us, whether it's big or small, and we always want to be involved in the Jewish community where we live.

I arrived first in March 2022, from the metro Detroit area. Neil and I lived in Michigan for 30 years. Robby was next when he moved here in July 2022 after he finished 5th grade in elementary school. Neil flew out and visited us every month until he finally moved here last September 2023 right before Rosh Hashana. During our short time here in Monterey/Carmel we moved several times until we found the perfect house (our 3rd) on the 7th green of the golf course at Quail Lodge. It's been an amazing journey. Neil and I are originally from the east coast. Neil was born in Richmond, Va. and I was born in New York City, NY. We met while we were both working for the Associated Press while attending Northeastern University in Boston, MA. We were both Journalism majors and Neil also received a double major in Political Science.

After graduation, I was a TV Anchor for 16 years in 4 U.S. markets - Presque Isle, Maine; Bangor, Maine; Lansing, Michigan; and, Flint, Michigan. Neil, however, went on to attend law school. Neil was accepted into The Thomas M. Cooley School in Lansing, MI the same day I was offered the morning anchor job at the NBC station in Lansing, MI, so we knew it was "bashert" to be in Lansing together. Neil actually made a television commercial and proposed to me while I was on the air during a newscast. I retired from TV in 2005, and now work in the strategic Marketing, Communications and Public Relations field.

Neil is an Attorney and is employed with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. He loves living in Carmel and is currently in the 7th grade at Carmel Middle School. Neil and I were brought up and raised in very active traditional Conservative families and both of our families kept Kosher. We still keep a Kosher home. Chocolate- Caramel Matzo Toffee

Recipe from Marcy Goldman - Adapted by Melissa Clark

Total Time: 50 minutes, plus chilling

Yield: About 2 dozen pieces



Matzo toffee is the Passover-friendly take on <u>saltine toffee</u>. A layered confection of matzo crackers, brown sugar caramel and melted chocolate, you can top it with practically anything you like, from the most elegantly minimal sprinkle of sea salt to a surfeit of nuts, dried fruit, potato chips, or a combination. This recipe, adapted from Marcy Goldman's cookbook "A Treasury of Jewish Holiday Baking," keeps well when stored airtight at room temperature — up to one week, if you haven't finished it by then. —Melissa Clark

INGREDIENTS

4 to 6 sheets matzo, preferably salted sea salt

1 cup/225 grams unsalted butter (2 sticks) 7 ounces chopped bittersweet, milk or white

1½ packed cups/315 grams light brown sugar chocolate, or a combination (about 1 cup)

2 teaspoons vanilla extract Large pinch of fine Toppings, as desired (see note)

PREPARATION

Step 1: Heat oven to 350 degrees. Line a 13-by-18-inch rimmed baking sheet with aluminum foil, allowing it to go up and over the edges of the pan. Line the bottom of the pan with a piece of parchment. Arrange matzo over parchment in an even layer, breaking pieces to fit as necessary.

Step 2: In a medium pot over medium-high heat, bring butter and sugar to a boil, whisking, until thickened and smooth, about 3 minutes. The mixture may separate, and that is O.K. Stir in vanilla and salt. Quickly pour mixture over matzos. Transfer baking sheet to oven and bake until bubbly, about 15 minutes.

Step 3: Remove from oven. Sprinkle chocolate evenly over caramel and let stand until softened, about 5 minutes. Use an offset spatula to spread chocolate smoothly over surface of toffee. If you've used different kinds of chocolate, you can swirl them together decoratively.

Step 4: Immediately sprinkle melted chocolate with desired topping. Transfer baking sheet to refrigerator and chill toffee 1 hour to set chocolate. Break matzo toffee into large pieces for storing and serving.

TIP: The matzo toffee is delicious on its own, but any number of toppings add flavor and flair, such as flaky sea salt, crushed potato chips, chopped dried fruit (cranberries, cherries, apricots, raisins, prunes, dates), chopped nuts (pistachio, walnuts, pecans, almonds), chopped candied ginger or lemon peel, or pomegranate seeds (if using, serve within 1 day).


