From the Rabbi's Desk

This past month my cousin Pavel Fuchs died. While I recognize that deaths occur around the world every day, my fear is we are losing the last members of those who actually survived WWII concentration camps. Few remain who can serve as

first person witnesses to the holocaust.

Pavel was just a child when he was taken to Terezin. Born in Prague, Pavel was one of about 100 children who survived the horrors of that concentration camp. His early childhood experiences left him angry with God and his Jewish roots. But the person I met in 1969 was filled with love for life and the world around him. He was married, had a daughter and a few years later would welcome a son. He loved the outdoors and sports. He enjoyed spending time with his few remaining relatives; my grandmother, my parents, and my siblings and me. As a child Pavel had lost all his classmates and his friends. The government took all the family property. He left Czechoslovakia to study engineering at the University of Washington and never returned.

It wasn't until many decades later that Pavel was willing to share some of what he experienced with me. Despite all his suffering as a child and all that he had lost, or maybe because of it, Pavel appreciated all the blessings around him. While Pavel had lost his ability to observe Judaism, he fully appreciated the wonders of the world around him. Pavel loved the mountains and was an avid skier. He played tennis and enjoyed swimming. He was happy hiking or boating or just enjoying nature.

I have met few people who were as upbeat or positive as Pavel. He loved to laugh. When I came home from college with facial hair, he painted a mustache on his face. He shared bad jokes that made his children groan. He was blessed with seven grandchildren who he adored.

I hope we can all learn from Pavel. Despite tremendous suffering in his childhood and losing so much at a young age, Pavel taught all of us how to celebrate the world and blessings all around us. He was one of the most positive people I have ever met. He taught his children the value of counting all our blessings. He shared that same lesson with his grandchildren. His lesson is one we should all embrace; life must be appreciated and celebrated. Amen.



From Cantor Alisa

I was swimming recently when it began to rain, first gently and then more heavily, a steamy mist rising from the lanes of fellow swimmers. I find the water to be especially calming these days as the war in Israel and Gaza weighs heavily on my heart. As we

continue to navigate the fear, trauma, and grief of October 7th, the ensuing events, and the unrecognizable world that has been unfolding ever since, sometimes I feel numb, almost paralyzed. But the physical sensation of cold rain on my skin as I moved through the water on this rainy day was liberating somehow, freeing me momentarily from my worry, ushering in a sense of renewal and a feeling of being at one with the elements in the here and now.

I noticed a woman in one of the lanes, not swimming, but dancing. Every time I took a breath, I could see her moving freely in uninhibited play and delight, raising her arms to the gray skies, bowing, twirling, bending side to side. The expression on her face could only be described as pure joy. Her mouth was moving at times. Was she praying, I wondered? Her freedom and joy were intoxicating, and I began to laugh, which surprised me because my laughter feels so far away these days. As I began to laugh, another swimmer, usually more stern-faced, also broke into a smile. Someone was dancing in the pool with little regard for who was watching!


This joyful woman and I exited the pool at the same time, and I was able to share my experience and thank her for the infusion of joy she gave to me. "What are you doing, may I ask?" "Oh," she said, "everything I can do to muster my joy to combat everything else going on in the world." It reminded me that I was not alone—that we are not alone—with the intensity and weight of the emotions that we are all carrying. I followed her to the crowded hot tub where she began to tell us about the "laughing yoga" she does every day. She explained that scientific studies show that the brain doesn't know the difference between real and contrived laughter and that, in both cases, we produce D.O.S.E—dopamine, oxytocin, serotonin and endorphins—hormones that reduce stress and produce a sense of elation and well-being.

With excitement, she asked if we'd like to try it... "Let's laugh for one minute," she said, "beginning now!" Before we knew it, a group of strangers were laughing together for no reason. We could all feel the benefit, even after just one minute. The youngest among us, who seemed most

resistant at first, commented that it was easier than she thought, especially listening to the laughter of others. This got me thinking that no matter how I feel, I have more agency than I realize, especially when I feel like I am teetering on the edge of despair and uncertainty. And though my deep concern for our world is ever present, I am reminded that I am also capable of joy and sharing it with others in these dark times.

As the Hebrew month of Adar approaches—the month of Purim—its teaching is to draw on our inner joy, especially in the face of evil, to drink and laugh until we can't distinguish between villain and hero and to acknowledge that, no matter what mask we wear, we have all been both victims and perpetrators. And though joy feels particularly challenging right now, we actively look for the blessings around us and remember that our joy and happiness are essential to our well-being as we navigate our collective future.

May we take the time to refresh and renew our joy—whether it be walking in nature, joining with community on Shabbat, celebrating the New Moon with friends, or simply laughing for no reason with a group of strangers in the rain. — Cantor Alisa

Safety and Security at Congregation Beth Israel

With the Israel/Hamas war continuing, and antisemitism reemerging, the

Security Team, and the Board of Trustees at CBI want to update you with regards to what is happening with Security at CBI.

We have a working security relationship with the Jewish Community Federation of San Francisco. For example, this past September, the Federation's Director of Community Security visited CBI and reviewed the building and grounds from a safety perspective. His assessment was a positive one.

This past December, CBI, like over 90 other synagogues in California, received a non-specific and non-credible email bomb threat, mirroring those sent to hundreds of synagogues in other states. The FBI said this wave of emails appears to be connected and likely originates from outside the United States.

It has been determined that the Synagogues who have been recipients of these emails are not at increased risk. To date, none of these email threats has involved any credible risk of harm to congregants at any of the synagogues that received the emails.

This campaign of fake email threats is intended to unnerve us. We can thwart this effort by seeing it for what it is: harassment and intimidation.

As you might be concerned, CBI is doing all that it can to keep our Temple secure.

We have a Security Team.

We have had two security training seminars in 2023. One seminar was focused on general security. Our second security seminar was focused on First Aid and CPR, and our instructors were a team from Cal Fire.

CBI has a professional security presence during Shabbat services, Hesed Academy, and multiple special events.

We are working on a dialogue with local law enforcement.

The well-known teaching of Rebbe Nachman of Breslov is as relevant now as it has ever been: the most important thing is not to fear at all, and more to the point, not to make ourselves afraid.

We are doing what we can. For those that are interested, please reach out to the members of Congregation Beth Israel Security Team.

Meet Bob Fenton and Debra Givner

Robert Fenton and Debra Givner moved to the Monterey Peninsula from Southern California in 1999 with their two children, then-seven-year-old Jessica and five-year-old Jake. Debra accepted employment that year with MPUSD as an elementary school teacher. Bob entered retirement but continued to be a small business owner.

They were drawn to the area before they came to the Peninsula, a feeling which was encouraged when Debra and her mother, Sonia, interviewed Rabbi Greenbaum to determine if they felt comfortable joining the CBI community. It has been incredibly welcoming and has remained so for many years. Today, both Bob and Debra enjoy daily hikes through many of the spectacular spots on the Peninsula.

Debra grew up in a small town in Ohio which had a Conservative synagogue. In those days at her synagogue, women did not have Bat Mitzvahs. When they joined CBI, one of the first things Debra did was to enroll in the adult B'nai Mitzvah class. Her Bat Mitzvah was an incredible experience for her, as well as the family.

Bob, meanwhile, became a good friend of the Rabbi. He has been very involved in CBI as a member of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Board for close to twenty years, as well as in Adult Education and the Jewish Federation. Some of the memorable speakers that Bob arranged to come to our community were Natan Sharansky, Debra Lipstadt, and Ambassador Gilad Erdan. In addition, Bob was one of the founders of the Carmel Jewish Film Festival.

Debra and Bob love to travel. In the past 20 years they have traveled to more than 90 countries. Debra retired from teaching in 2018 but she worked as a volunteer for another year in one of their friends' daughter's classrooms. Debra was honored as a volunteer of the year by Monterey Peninsula Unified School District for her service.

Their daughter Jessica and her husband, Mike, live in San Francisco with their 18-month-old, Lily Sol Porter. Debra loves being a Bubbie and spends at least two weeks each month with them — if there was a Bubbie of the Year award, Debra would win. Their son, Jake, lives in mid-valley with his dog, Dirk, and has worked for the Homeless Coalition of Monterey County. They often visit, and Dirk loves to spend time with Kona, the shelter dog Debra rescued during the pandemic.

Bob's three older sons live in the Los Angeles area. His oldest son, Ethan, and his wife Rachael have two sons aged 10 and 13 years old. Bob and Debra look forward to spending time with them and with more grandchildren in the future.


