#### From the Rabbi's Desk

This is not the Shofar message I hoped to share. My original message talked about seeing God in everyone we meet and treating everyone with kindness. But then Hamas attacked. As I write this, over 1200 Israelis have been slaughtered. Over 3000 have been wounded.

Approximately 150 people have been captured and forced into Gaza. This was not a military action. Hamas did not attack military targets. They attacked towns and *kibbutzim*. They murdered more than 260 young people attending a music festival in celebration of *Sukkot*. IDF units who liberated Israel's south found babies shot dead in their cribs. Some babies and children were decapitated. Some of the hostages have been savagely raped.

There can be no excuses for these atrocities. There is no defense of Hamas' actions. Those who try to justify the attack are simply wrong. One reporter stated that Hamas is fighting for a better life for those living in Gaza. That is simply not true. Hamas cares nothing about the Palestinians living in Gaza. For almost 20 years, they have used billions in foreign aid to build tunnels and amass weapons, not to improve the lives of Palestinians. They use civilians as human shields. They place rocket launchers in school playgrounds and on the rooftops of apartment buildings. They force Israelis to attack residential neighborhoods and then cynically accuse Israel of striking civilian targets. Those living in Gaza are not allowed to speak out against the Hamas leadership under threat of death. Just read the Hamas charter-- their main goal, which has never changed, is to kill Jews and destroy Israel.

The weeks and months ahead are going to be extremely painful. Israel will do the world—and the Palestinian peoplea favor by destroying Hamas and ending their brutal regime. But in doing so, many Palestinian civilians will suffer and some will die. While Israel never purposely targets civilians, civilians will be killed as they will be used by Hamas as human shields. But there is a huge difference between Israel and Hamas. Israel cherishes human life. Israel's goal is to free both Israeli citizens and Palestinian citizens from Hamas' tyranny.

Sadly, many around us will not understand or make the distinction between Israel's actions and the brutality of Hamas. Please join me in reminding them that the difference is simple. Israelis, the IDF, and Jews around the world cherish all human life. Hamas stands for hatred and destruction. We, unlike Hamas, pray for peace and wellbeing for all. We grieve today for our brothers and sisters in Israel after the most barbaric assault on Jews since the Holocaust. We acknowledge all the suffering that will arise out of Hamas' savage assault, and, as Jews, we dedicate ourselves anew to a strong and secure Israel living in peace with its neighbors and to a better future for all people in the Middle East and beyond.

May God continue to watch over Israel and protect the IDF soldiers as they fight to stop those who do not value life. Amen.



#### **From Cantor Alisa**

Dear Friends, I struggle to find a place to begin as extremists around the world are creating such profound loss and pain. On *Simchat Torah*, the "season of our joy", we were horrified and stunned as we learned of Hamas's brutal attack on innocent civilians in Israel, declaring war.

But, on Sunday morning at Congregation Beth Israel, Rabbi Bruce insisted that Hamas would not deter or come between us and our holy gatherings. Reeling with shock, we showed up in great numbers to hold services and bless our new and youngest students as they stood beneath a great prayer shawl, receiving tiny Torah scrolls. As our adults took our holy scrolls from the ark we paraded around the sanctuary, singing songs to celebrate the gift of Torah to our people and to the world. Forming a great circle, congregants gently held and supported the parchment as Rabbi Bruce began unrolling the Torah around our sanctuary. Chanting from the end of Torah—the end of *Moshe's* life and leadership in *D'varim* (Deuteronomy)—we immediately moved to the very beginning as our soon-to-be Bar Mitzvah, Richie Baguio, chanted the first day of creation from *B'reisheet* (Genesis).

From where I stood and sang on the bima that morning, I could see every shining face, every child's smile, the pride our parents take in their children, the beauty and strength of our intergenerational congregation, and our dear Rabbi bravely holding it all together. This day set aside for joy, for potential and new beginnings, will now carry with it the memory of a nightmare. How do we do it? How is it possible to hold such mixed and contradictory emotions? Rebbe Nachman of Bretzlav taught, "The whole world is a very narrow bridge; the most essential thing is not to be afraid." For me, this means that we must not be paralyzed by fear or despair when our world becomes a dangerous place. And so, we show up like we did on Simchat Torah, and at our community vigil later that evening. We do it together, pour out our feelings through prayer, care for each other, educate one another, donate to righteous causes, work to end tyranny, and continue to love, celebrate and talk with our children.

There is a midrash that at the end of the sixth day, when Adam and Eve were created, Adam became frightened as it grew dark, because he had never seen darkness before. He started to weep and cry, and Eve came over and just sat right across from him, and she cried all night long with him until the break of dawn. This powerful image reminds us that dawn will come, that there is always light in the world, even after we experience the deepest darkness. And it's our job, as human

beings, to remind each other that we need one another and that we're not alone— to sit with one another when times are hard, when we are sad or scared, until dawn breaks, and we are ready and able to walk toward the light.

Oseh shalom bimromav—You who are capable of making peace in the highest places, please help awaken the peacemaker in our highest selves, so we can make peace with those around us and be true partners in the continuum of creation, not destruction, here and everywhere on earth. And we say: Amen.

# What's Jewish about Thanksgiving? Lots!

One day in late November a few years ago I ran into a congregant in the hallway of the temple. She wished me a Happy Thanksgiving. Then she said: "Oh wait a minute. I didn't mean to offend you. Do you celebrate Thanksgiving?" I replied: "Of course! Jews celebrate Thanksgiving." She laughed, a little embarrassed, and I wished her a Happy Thanksgiving too.

There are strong historical connections between Judaism and Thanksgiving. Most of the Pilgrims who celebrated the first Thanksgiving were Puritans, a branch of the Protestant faith. The Puritans strongly identified with the historical traditions and customs of the Israelites in the Bible.

In their quest for religious freedom, the Puritans viewed their journey to America as exactly analogous to the exodus of the Israelites from Egypt. England was Egypt, the king was Pharaoh, the Atlantic Ocean their Red Sea, and the Puritans were the Israelites, entering into a new covenant with God in a new Promised Land. In fact, most of the Puritans had Hebrew names and there was even a proposal to make Hebrew the language of the colonies!

Many people believe that the Pilgrims modeled Thanksgiving after the holiday of Sukkot, as they are both harvest festivals that take place in the fall. In Jewish tradition, Sukkot has a dual significance: historical and agricultural. We dwell in booths to remember how our ancestors lived in sukkot for 40 years in the desert. However, the Torah also refers to Sukkot as chag ha'asif, the Festival of the Ingathering. At this time of year in Israel, the harvest was ending and the final fruits and crops were gathered and stored. Sukkot is also known as z'man simchateinu, the time of our rejoicing, as our ancestors gave thanks for the conclusion of the harvest and the bounty of the land.

As close readers of the Bible, the Puritans would have known about Sukkot which may have inspired them to

celebrate Thanksgiving. As Rabbi Elias Lieberman, leader of the Falmouth Jewish Congregation in Massachusetts, put it in this news article:

While we cannot be certain about what motivated those Pilgrim settlers to initiate a feast of thanksgiving, it is likely that they consciously drew on a model well-known to them from the Bible they cherished. Seeing themselves as new Israelites in a new "promised land," the Pilgrims surely found inspiration in the Bible, in the Books of Leviticus and Deuteronomy, in which God commands the ancient Israelites to observe the Feast of Booths—in Hebrew, Sukkot, "To rejoice before Adonai your God" at the time of the fall harvest.

Of course the main theme of the holiday of Thanksgiving comes from the name itself, reminding us of the importance of giving thanks. Saying "thank you" is a primary Jewish value. When a Jew sits down to eat, he or she says: "Blessed are you God, for bringing bread from the earth." To say a blessing over bread affirms that God played a role in creating the universe where the sun rises each day and the rain falls and the growth of food is possible.

The rabbis taught that we are to say 100 blessings a day. This teaching reminds us that no matter how difficult life can be, we all have many blessings such as simply being alive, our health, our loved ones, and friends.

Traditionally we reach the 100 blessings by praying the three daily services plus reciting the blessings before and after we eat. However the rabbis also suggested a few special blessing for us to acknowledge the wonders of everyday.

Upon seeing lightning, one may say: "Blessed are you God, who made the world." When you see the ocean, you can say: "Blessed are you God, who made the great sea." And upon seeing fruit trees in bloom, one may say: "Blessed are you God, who leaves nothing lacking in the world, who created good creatures and beautiful trees, for the benefit of all people."

What about the other 97 blessings? I might suggest that we offer the following words: "Baruch atah Adonai, Blessed are you God," and then insert whatever we have to be thankful for — our family, our friends, our food, our homes, our country, our Jewish State, our synagogue, and any of the myriad of blessings in our lives.

From the historical connections of the Puritans to Sukkot and the Torah, to the primary importance in Judaism of saying thank you to God for all our blessings, Thanksgiving is a holiday steeped in Jewish values.

On this Thanksgiving, when we are gathered around the table, I might suggest that we offer a special blessing: "Baruch atah Adonai, Blessed are you God, who has given us the bounty of food and the blessing of family."




