From the Rabbi's Desk...

I pray that as you read these words, the world around you is peaceful and filled with hope. Because as I write this message, I am still reeling from what I will call a pogrom on our democracy. As we all know, last month began with

terrorists forcing their way into the Capitol and threatening what should have been a peaceful formalization of the electoral vote process. Five people died because of that riot, including a police officer who was beaten to death by the terrorists.

Yet I sit here knowing that when you read this, our President-elect will have been sworn into office, the transition will be over and the new administration will be working on getting the vaccine to more of us as rapidly as possible. Hopefully more in our community will have already received the vaccine. Possibly the strain on our hospitals has lessened a little and fewer people are dying daily from this dreaded virus.

I envision less divisiveness between Republicans and Democrats. Sure, we will have different opinions on how best to solve the challenges facing our country. We have our own ideas how to resolve the issue of growing numbers of undocumented persons who want to live in the U.S. and how to control our borders. We all know there is too much waste in our government spending and struggle how to fix this problem. We agree that there are many who need assistance but differ on how best to serve their needs.

As a rabbi I accept our different approaches to all these challenges. The old rabbinic story explains how the rabbi says, "You are right," to one person, and "You who have an opposite answer are right as well." We learn best when we listen to each other and learn from those with different opinions. In Pirke Avot, from the Talmud we learn "Who is wise? It is the person who learns from everyone they meet." Are we open to listening and learning, even with those with whom we may disagree?

We have experienced a tremendously difficult period in our lives. With the ongoing struggle with Covid-19 and our country's political divisiveness, as well as economic challenges, and climate issues, each of us could be suffering from depression. I find the best way to overcome the sense of being overwhelmed is looking around me and picking one issue to tackle face on. If I can make one thing better, I feel a sense of accomplishment. If I can help one person I spark my inner joy. If I can just check off one thing on my list of what I can do to make my immediate world a little safer, a little better, or a little healthier, then I begin to draw myself away from that feeling of despair.

Yes, I am an optimist because I know that each day has been created anew with endless opportunities to improve our existence. What will I learn today? Who might I assist? What spark can I light that will brighten those around me? If you feel you need help finding your own spark, please call me. Maybe we can figure it out together. I have found that having someone assist me eases just about every task I have ever attempted. Sometimes I lead, and sometimes I follow. But with others around me, I never feel lost or alone.

I truly believe God created this world to be a place of healing. If we work together to bring that healing, it will flow through us as well, uplifting our hearts and souls. I pray we bring healing to one another as we heal ourselves. Amen.





From our President Dan Nussbaum, President Board of Trustees

We have had half a dozen Saturday afternoon sessions of Se'udah Shelishit,

literally the *Third Meal of Shabba*t. Each session is an hour of conversation, followed by Havdalah, the fiveminute service that ends Shabbat. We've discussed the life and teachings of Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, Jewish music from the Renaissance, from the Balkans, and from Leonard Cohen. We are currently discussing Jewish medical ethics, including: historic and contemporary views on the balance between faith and spiritual beliefs, and the guidance, advice and practices of medical professionals; what are the guiding principles of Jewish Medical ethics?; how does this apply in some current controversies like vaccine distribution, end of life treatments, and organ transplants? If there are topics that you're interested in -- especially if there is a topic that you'd be willing to lead -- please call me. Our objective is simple: shared concerns and open discussion.

We continue our fundraising efforts, as part of what I call "budget repair operations" during this Covid time. Shout-outs go to Malina Breaux, Arlene Krebs, Shel Lyons, and others who are focused on the Religious School, for their enthusiasm and focus. Many thanks also go to all the doctors and lawyers who recently "stood tall and provided generous support when asked." I encourage everyone, consistent with your ability to contribute, to consider additional support in these challenging times. Please respond enthusiastically and generously.

Here's an update on our work to enhance our synagogue's safety and security, supported by a grant from the California OES, led by our safety and security committee (Michael Marshall, Marshal Blatt, Alex Bordetsky, Lenny Popky, Michael Krasner, and Vic Feuerstein) and coordinated by Abby King, and Julie Chase. A vulnerability study by California OES, as well as conversations with other synagogues and security experts formed the basis for our successful grant application. This was followed by the OES grant of

\$200,000 in February of 2020. The committee, along with Julie Chase, identified vendors, submitted requests for proposals for three efforts (doors and locks, video/access, and outdoor lighting), carefully reviewed proposals, met with multiple vendors for each project, checked references, and made vendor selections. Once vendors were selected, the committee and staff negotiated terms, refined requirements, and secured a legal review of each contract. We have approved contracts for the replacement or repair of doors and locks and for applying a security film to all the CBI windows. We are now ready to move forward on the next projects, namely, supply of cameras, access control, burglar and fire alarm systems, panic buttons, and improved outdoor lighting for our parking lot, building, and back field. I sincerely thank all who have been part of this continuing complex project.



Easy Hamantaschen

A favorite treat for the Purim holiday! A tip: cover the dough and refrigerate overnight.

Prep: 15 mins Cook: 12 mins

Total: 27 mins **Yield:** 24

cookies



Ingredients

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- ¾ cup vegetable oil
- 2 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- ½ cup orange juice
- 5 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 cup fruit preserves, any flavor

Directions

Step 1

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease cookie sheets.

• Step 2

In a large bowl, beat the eggs and sugar until lightly and fluffy. Stir in the oil, vanilla and orange juice. Combine the flour and baking powder; stir into the batter to form a stiff dough. If dough is not stiff enough to roll out, stir in more flour. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough out to 1/4 inch in thickness. Cut into circles using a cookie cutter or the rim or a drinking glass. Place cookies 2 inches apart onto the prepared cookie sheets. Spoon about 2 teaspoons of preserves into the center of each one. Pinch the edges to form three corners.

• Step 3

Bake for 12 to 15 minutes in the preheated oven, or until lightly browned. Allow cookies to cool for 1 minute on the cookie sheet before removing to wire racks to cool completely.

E=mc2 and Spiritual Energy

Because we have been trained in western thought, founded in science, it can seem to create an unbridgeable schism to reconcile the concept of God, Torah, and Judaism with our modern world.

Thanks to Einstein (who was also Jewish), a relationship between matter and energy was put into a scientific formula, E=mc2. In this formula it is saying that a tiny bit of matter can become a tremendous amount of energy. This scientific equation also gives us a way to explain the two universes, the physical and the spiritual.

There are two parts within each human, the physical, temporal body and the non-corporeal yet potentially immortal soul. As we have explored previously, the Torah teaches us that humans, and humans alone, were created with this unique duality. We have two components, our physical bodies and our non-physical soul, or 'neshama', which is made 'in the likeness of HaShem'. Our physical self exists in the physical world and is governed by the laws of physics, such as gravity.

Each of us also has a soul, a 'neshama', that exists within us, yet is part of a dimension we will call the 'spiritual dimension'. In this co-existing reality different 'laws' apply. Instead of gravity, there is 'holiness'; instead of electromagnetism there is 'blessing'; instead of the strong and weak atomic forces there is 'morality' and 'mitzvot'. Now here comes the really interesting part...

The concept of 'mitzvot', often little actions, seem to many outsiders as anachronistic. Remember, in the scientific equation of E=mc2, a tiny bit of matter unleashes a huge amount of energy. This is how the God-Torah system works too. Let's look at a simple example.

A small action, like taking 10 seconds to say a blessing before eating, has a tremendous impact in the **spiritual dimension**. This 'spiritual energy' has the ability not only to strengthen our **neshama**, but it also taps into (creates, or channels) a positive energy that can enter this physical world. **Think of it as a conduit to harness spiritual energy**. Using our science metaphor, saying a blessing is like converting a tiny bit of matter to energy... a lot of energy.

When we compare this set of ideas to that of science and Einstein's formula, it no longer seems so far-fetched. When expressed in scientific terms it is easy for us to accept, mostly because we have been trained to accept things called 'science'. In the new scientific field of 'quantum theory' we now see that one thing can instantaneously affect another thing, even though they are not connected and, in fact, are separated by great distances. We accept this phenomenon, even though it

shakes the foundations of our prior understanding of physics. Even though we can't quite explain how it works, we accept it and investigate further, to make it understandable.

If we can open ourselves up to the concept that we have a non-corporeal aspect to who we are, the rest of the steps are easy. The Torah, which is the guidebook on how to elevate ordinary physical actions to 'holiness', tells us how to convert, in effect, 'matter' into 'energy'. More precisely it instructs us how to harness spiritual energy through very simple physical acts. Just as a speck of matter can become a large amount of energy (in this physical world), tiny actions can produce, or harness, a large amount of this spiritual energy.

We know HaShem wants us to connect to 'spiritual energy', as we are commanded,

"....you shall be holy, for I, HaShem your God, am holy." (Leviticus [Vayera] 19:2)

Many of us struggle to tap into our deeper self, to let our soul express itself. We intrinsically are aware of our duality, and each of us has experienced the 'God moments', or the 'connected to the universe' moments, where we feel connected to everything... even if just for a moment. The Torah, and many of the mitzvot, are designed to channel the physical part of ourselves so it can be in balance with the energy (ethereal) part of ourself, our **neshama**.

So much of western thought unfortunately sets up a tension between science and HaShem. Of course, in reality we know that many top scientists actually move *closer* to HaShem as they move deeper into their scientific fields. Said a different way, as scientists learn more in their field, whether it be physics, chemistry, biology... it seems like our universe, as well as each of us, is carefully designed and not random.

The Torah gives us more direct insight, of how to *empower our neshama*, such as,

"And you shall love HaShem with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your might."

(Deuteronomy [Devarim] 6:5), and

"....you shall love your neighbor as yourself, I am HaShem"

(Leviticus [Vayikra] 19:18).

Our soul, our neshama, is a conduit that connects us spiritually to humanity and to HaShem. The spiritual energy is something each of us can harness, when we open ourselves up to it. The Torah tells us how. It really is that simple.

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
