

Free Books for Jewish Children PJ Library and PJ Our Way

PJ Library is for children ages 6 months to 8 years. **PJ Our Way** is for children ages 9-11. Sign your child up for either program and you will receive (older kids choose) a book a month. Each book, is geared towards a specific age. Families with Judaism as part of their lives are welcome to sign up. All Jewish families are welcome, whatever your background, knowledge, family make-up, or observance may be.

The PJ Library program originated with the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. It relies on partnerships with local philanthropists and is administrated by local Jewish organizations. Both programs are designed to help children and their families explore core Jewish values and traditions. The original concept was to provide bedtime story books for parents to read to their children (PJ = pajamas), but with the recent addition of the program for older children (PJ Our way) this concept has been taken to a whole new level. PJ Library sends Jewish children's books and music every month to more than 500,000 children and their families in North America and is growing every month.

About “PJ Library” the program for younger children.

Books for PJ Library are chosen from among the very best of Jewish children's books. A committee of writers, early childhood professionals, and Jewish content specialists seek out compelling stories, captivating illustrations, and diverse perspectives on Jewish customs and practice. Through an extensive evaluation process, the committee selects books for every age group. Many of the books selected to be included in PJ Library have received awards including Caldecott Medals and the Sydney Taylor Book awards, given to the best of Jewish children's literature.

About “PJ Our Way” the program for older children.

The kids choose their own books. The choices are on a website geared to the children in this age group. The **PJ Our Way Website** is a completely safe and moderated space, perfect for acclimating older kids to using the web independently. Every month, from the 1st to the 10th of the month kids visit this website to choose a book from a selection of four high-quality titles that have been reviewed by a panel of PJ educators, parents, and kids. The website has summaries, reviews, and video trailers created by the members themselves. Kids can participate in monthly interviews and challenges, post their own reviews or videos, and comment on blog posts.


On the Parent Blog, parents are invited to read about each book and find suggestions for family conversations. These blog posts give parents tools to help children make book choices that are appropriate for them. The books are carefully selected by top national Jewish educators, with an eye on books that are joyful, highly engaging, and represent the best Jewish children's literature available.

If congregant families are signed up the **CBS Conrey library** will also receive a copy every month of the book selection. A few of these are temporarily located on a table in the library.


Synopsis: In this winning story, the memory of a young man's long-forgotten accordion playing resurfaces when his great-grandson comes upon his instrument.



Written by Liz Suneby Diane Heiman, Illustrated by Laurel Molk








The Shabbat Box Ages: 4 to 5 Years
