
Message from Rabbi Berkman

Courage

This past December 18th, a huge violent mob of anti-Israel protestors took over Penn Station in New York City. The protestors had already torn through Grand Central Terminal and the Port Authority. They outnumbered police who had tried to block them from entering the station until a side entrance was located and the crowd rushed in. Calls of "from the river to the sea", "free Palestine" and other genocidal rally chants were shouted by protestors as they rampaged through the station. All this was recorded on social media.

Walking through the station at the time was a Jewish man whose picture and video appeared on X (formally Twitter). The video is striking. It depicts the man, draped in an Israeli flag, surrounded by

masked and menacing protestors. A verbal confrontation ensues wherein the man can be heard telling the protestors that they are cowards for hiding behind their masks. The encounter becomes heated, and NYPD intervene. Not caught on the video was the officer telling the man that he had to remove the Israeli flag – for his own safety. The image of a solitary Jew, wearing the blue and white flag of Israel, standing amidst a sea of hate-filled protestors is jarring. It also captures how many of us feel today in our own workspaces, at our colleges, even among groups of friends with whom we once shared so much in common.



Last November, ten busses from Rockland County drove down to Washington DC to join what became the largest pro-Israel gathering in American history. The power of standing shoulder to shoulder with thousands of other Jews and Israel loving non-Jewish allies, was exhilarating. It was just what we needed at the time. But what we need now is much more difficult. As the world calls on Israel to abort its mission to destroy Hamas, as Israel is condemned for doing what any other nation would have done after the horrendous acts of barbarism brought to its doorstep on October 7th, what is needed now is for each one of us to be ready for our own Elisha Wiesel moment. As his father famously stated: "the State of Israel is the only thing that will keep the Holocaust from happening again." Each one of us has a role to play in combating the distortion of history, misinformation, and antisemitism. Sometimes we are called on to speak the truth even when we stand alone. But when we display courage in the face of darkness, our words and our actions are amplified a hundredfold.

Message from President Jonathan Goldberg

Happy New Year! And just when I got used to writing 5784 on my checks. (Sorry, couldn't resist.)

As we enter this new year, we are at a place I never thought I would experience-here in the United States and especially here in New York. I think many of us, perhaps for the first time, are not just hearing about anti-Semitism but actually FEELING it (and unfortunately, maybe even experiencing it first hand).

It's bad enough when we turn on the news to hear about Israel's fight for security and remain hopeful for the safe rescue of the over 100 hostages, but now to witness the almost daily pubic displays of hatred. miscast as "protests" or "calls for peace" in our own backyards. It is not just the college campuses around the country where we see such behavior, but more and more in the public square, like transportation hubs and the streets of cities everywhere.

It's amazing how all of these so-called peace rallies call for an end to Israeli "aggression" with no mention of the safe release of innocent Israeli children and grandparents. Just how it's amazing how the groups who are the loudest to (rightly) condemn violence against women and children are deafening with their silence when Jews are the victims.

I grew up with stories, common among us, of how my great grandparents came to America from Eastern Europe in order to make a new life in a country that was so welcoming and allowed people of all races, religions and background in the great "melting pot" across the ocean. Of course, that was a bit of fiction, as we know there has always been bigotry and ignorance.

But despite the difficulties, America became my family's home and allowed us to live as proud Jews. But October 7, 2023 became a wake-up call to many of us. For reasons beyond me, a brazen terrorist attack against civilians did not cause a universal outcry of condemnation the way we all (and I mean ALL) rallied together 22 years ago in the wake of 9/11. Yes, many of our leaders and much of the American public immediately came to Israel's defense, but we saw and continue to see, the reaction from many others.

While many politicians spoke forcefully about Israel's right to self-defense, many now question it. Or wish to put "limits" on it. But worst of all is the rhetoric-all of it wrong, all of it out of hatred. Words like "colonizers" and "genocide" and "resistance". Chants of "From the river to the sea". They can couch it however they wish, but it most often comes from the place of "Get the Jews out of their homeland by whatever means are necessary".

It's a scary time for all of us-because the next logical step of getting Jews out of Israel would be getting Jews out of well, everywhere. Including here in the United States.

But-this is now a new year. A time to make it clear that we aren't going anywhere. Not in Israel, not in America. And what we can do here is show support for the Jewish community. Be involved, come to services, be part of leadership. We can still live our everyday lives of working, parenting and being part of the general community. But also make sure we remain a vibrant, visible Jewish community as well.

Lovers of Zion

"Torah shall come from Zion, the word of Gd from Jerusalem" (Isaiah 2:3)

The prophet Isaiah wrote these words more than 2700 years ago. We sing these words in the beginning of the Torah service every Monday, Thursday, Shabbat morning and Shabbat afternoon. The word "Zion" appears 152 times in the Bible (Tanach), beginning with 2 Samuel 5:7. In the Tanach (Bible) the name Zion is important because it is the place where Gd lives.

The "Hope" (Hatikvah) of all Jews who live in the diaspora to live in the Land of Israel became a political movement in the 19th century. The goal of Zionism to create a national homeland for Jews in the Land of Israel is based on historical ties and religious tradition that connected the Jewish people to Palestine. Finally, on May 14, 1948 (5 Iyar 5708) the dream of Zionism and of all Jews was realized!






The innovative IDF has been training Navy warriors in ground force military operations so they too can help in the war against Hamas.
