



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Never again: Our duty to remember

Kol HaKavod to Jill Yablonsky for her meaningful and beautifully written article on page 8 in this newsletter. Her message about remembrance is so important and relevant—so much so, that I am writing on a similar topic this month.

Once again, our Yom HaShoah commemoration, which will take place on April 8 at 7 p.m., will be streamed online. This ritual, which is such an important part of Har Zion's calendar, will be different this year. Cantor Littman, Eleanor, and I will share music; we will have a testimony from Cantor Littman's mom, who is a child of survivors; our pre-B'nai Mitzvah students will recall the names of the children from Michle, our adopted town, who did not live long enough to celebrate their B'nai Mitzvah; and we will have participation from nine of my clergy colleagues, who will contribute video readings.

In my previous congregation, in Chester, Connecticut, I was the only rabbi in our region. All of my clergy colleagues were Christian ministers and priests. They were good friends and we all offered each other support in difficult times. I am blessed to have similar relationships here in Toronto thanks to MOSAIC Interfaith, and the Greater Toronto Interfaith Clergy Curling Club. In Chester, those colleagues came to our Yom HaShoah commemoration every year and participated with us—sharing our pain and promising, as we do, never to forget, and to work for an end to genocide and hate throughout our world. I am honoured that my friends here will join us to do the same, though not in person yet. When asked, they all jumped at the chance to participate. They will share our link with their communities, who will join us as well.

God willing, we will once again be together soon in person, celebrating, mourning, worshipping, feasting, and remembering. Until then, fulfill your duty to remember by joining us on our livestream on April 8 at 7 p.m. Though you'll see us and we won't see you, we will all feel each other's presence, bringing us together in spirit, if not in body.

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Pandemic Purim ponderings

ast year, Purim 5780, I was the guest →speaker at the Schwartz-Reisman ICC LGBTQ Purim celebration, and this was the last time I attended any "normal" event. That evening I wasn't feeling too well and by the time I gave my presentation, spoke with guests, and ate dinner, I had no voice left. I should add that I rarely, if ever, lose my voice... thank goodness, poo poo poo, knock on wood (yes, I know it's not a Jewish thing) - however, feel free to enclose any bubbameise here so I can avoid putting a kinehura on myself... but seriously, I literally could not speak by the time I came home. The following morning, I had a very difficult time with my regular Shabbat schedule: leading services; reading all of the Torah portions; giving a d'var torah; and class that followed services during Kiddush. What made this more stressful was the fact that I had a very important interview scheduled for the following day at Temple Har Zion. How could I possibly show up to an interview without a voice? My parents told me in no uncertain terms that I should NOT cancel my interview. I'm a good Jewish daughter and always follow their advice (most of the time, ever since I turned 40). I went to my interview, and it was obviously the right decision!

Purim looked a lot different last year, but I must say that this year's Purim was a whole lot more fun than I could have ever anticipated! You might have noticed that I don't have the best laugh it's rather loud, sometimes obnoxious. My sisters long ago told me they would never again go with me to see a comedy at the movie theatre, but I love to laugh! Who doesn't?! This year, despite the overall disappointment, sadness, and frustration of not being able to be with loved ones and my THZ congregants, I laughed really hard. The Rabbi in a hazmat suit throwing cleaning materials off the bimah had me close to tears. Then, later that evening, Alyssa decided to watch a few minutes of the Shpiel to see how it looked on screen (I think

she just wanted to see how many times I messed up the lyrics she had worked so hard with me to write). While Alyssa watched, I laughed so much I cried when I overheard Eleanor telling Queen Esther (me) to put on her robe at least 10 times (those glass dividers are more soundproof than you would think). I legitimately had a blast!

It was really something special to see King Achashverosh (Eleanor) holding up a gigantic Q-tip while singing about Queen Esther needing to go for a COVID test, Haman (Rabbi) stamping his foot with such gusto that I thought he was going to put it right through the bimah, singing a duet with Mordechai (Jessie) who I could only see a reflection of in the glass surrounding us, and then being completely blown away when Mordy transformed music I didn't know if I liked, into something absolutely beautiful.

I hope Purim brought you as much delight as it did for me. I can only imagine how much more joy and laughter we will have when you are part of the Shpiel next year!

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Remembrance: A Jewish imperative

When I was a child, on long drives up to the family cottage, there was a landmark I always watched out for: A rock face, high up on a hill on the side of the highway. It had a giant, flat face, as if it had been cleanly cleaved from a much larger rock. Like a giant granite shelf, it hung out over the hill below. It could be stood upon - if one were inclined to climb that high - but it could not be accessed from below. On this magnificent rock face, in bright orange neon letters, were three simple words: CHRIS WAS HERE.

I was obsessed with it. Not only was it a sign that we were in the final stretch of our long drive, but more than that, it occupied my time as I pondered how exactly 'Chris' was able to leave his mark on that rock. Literally.

In hindsight, the better question was not how he did it, but why? I believe the answer is in the words themselves: Chris was here. Here on this rock face, yes, but on a more spiritual level, Chris was here on this earth. And he wanted us all to know it.

The desire to be remembered is powerful and universal. It's in our genes. It's the reason people carve their initials in trees, place their hands in cement – and apparently spray paint their name on rock faces. We want to leave our mark. We want to be remembered.

The act of remembering is similarly powerful. Jewish faith – and Jewish identity – are predicated on remembrance. Our religion and our people are founded on the collective memory of the revelation at Sinai. The late American Jewish scholar Yosef Hayim Yerushalmi argued that the Jewish people are unique in elevating the act of remembering to a religious imperative. If there is a secret to Judaism's survival, he said, it must surely be Judaism's success in making individuals remember things that never happened to them.

The Torah commands us to remember six significant events specifically. There is a Jewish tradition to recite these six memories every day at the conclusion of morning prayers: 1) the exodus from Egypt, 2) the revelation at Sinai, 3) Amalek's attack in Israel, 4) rebellion in the desert, 5) Miriam's negative speech and punishment, and 6) the Sabbath day - to remember and sanctify it.

Each of these six remembrances serves as a lesson. The exodus from Egypt is a reminder of the evils of slavery and that all people are meant to be free. The revelation at Sinai - when God gave Moses the Ten Commandments - is the source of our moral code and reminds us of our commitment to live by that code. Amalek's attack on Israel reminds us of the human capacity for hate and cruelty. The story of the Golden Calf is a warning about worshipping false idols. The story of Miriam - who spoke badly of her brother Moses, was stricken with a disease and only cured when Moses pleaded to God on her behalf - reminds us of the power of words and how we should never speak ill of others. Finally, the Sabbath remind us of the need for rest and a weekly cessation of work.

Rabbi Dr. Raphael Zarum, Dean of the London School of Jewish Studies, points out that these six remembrances can be divided in to two sub-groups. Three teach positive lessons - the values of freedom, ethics and rest - and three provide warnings - the dangers of hate, idolization and slander. According to Zarum, if we represent the three positive lessons as the three corners of an upward-facing triangle, and the three warnings as the three corners of a downward-facing triangle, the two can be overlaid to create a hexagram, a Star of David, which has been the symbol of the Jewish people for generations and is the centrepiece of the flag of Israel. The Star of David then serves as a pointed reminder of these six memories.

Yizkor

No examination of remembrance in Judaism is complete without a look at Yizkor. In a religion built upon communal memory, Yizkor stands out as something unique. It is the one moment in the Jewish liturgical calendar when what matters most is not communal but individual memory. While we come together in a communal space, our experience of memorializing is very personal. Each of us stands personally consumed by memories of loved ones who have been lost to us.

Rabbi Shoshana Boyd Gelfand, former chief executive of the United Kingdom Movement for Reform Judaism, has written extensively on memory and memorializing in Judaism. In her works, she examines the irony of Yizkor:

"Yizkor encourages an evolution of our own private ongoing relationship with someone we've lost. Each time we recite Yizkor and remember, we deepen the parts of the relationship that sustain us, while forgetting those characteristics that do not. Forgetting is a necessary part of the process by which we maintain meaningful memories."

Grief is the knowledge we can no longer have a physical relationship with the people we have lost; solace is the comfort we find in continuing to have a meaningful, spiritual relationship through our memory of them. In this way, memories of our loved ones help to keep them alive. Remembrance spawns everlasting life.

So, while some, like Chris, may be inspired to grand acts to leave behind a physical reminder of themselves, the true and everlasting marks are the invisible ones on hearts and minds – those we leave, and those left on us: Memories.

May the memory of those lost to us always be a blessing.




THE COLOR OF LOVE






