Nourish your Jewish soul!

In our Summer issue of *connect*, I'm usually reminding you that Judaism does not take summer off. This month, a reminder that we don't take winter off either! There's plenty to do at THZ and at home Jewishly during the cold and snowy time of the year.

We start with Hanukkah. At THZ, we had our **Hanukkah Kol Bo** service on Friday night, December 16. We featured Hanukkah songs and there were *sufganiyot* for all!

On the 18th, our Beit Midrash learned about Hanukkah all morning long through crafts and music. On Shabbat Hanukkah, the 23rd and 24th, we will sing Hallel, remembering that this is how the first Hanukkah was celebrated, with the same Psalms of Praise we sing at Sukkot.

Why Sukkot? According to the Second Book of Maccabees (written before the First Book of Maccabees — go figure!), the first Hanukkah was a delayed celebration of Sukkot, complete with lulav and etrog, since

during Sukkot, the Maccabees were busy fighting against the Syrian-Greeks for their freedom. At home, don't forget to light your *hanukkiyot* — the candles go in right to left (the Hebrew way), and are lit left to right, so that the newest candle is always lit first.

Shabbat Shirah is February 4. Beit Midrash families will be at our Shabbat morning services, and we'll use a special family liturgy. The Adult Choir will be there, as well. Everyone will sing my setting of Song of the Sea, which tells the story of the Exodus using the special trope melody for the Torah portion. All are welcome to come celebrate the story of our redemption!

February 6 is not just Karen Weiss' birthday — it is **Tu BiSh'vat** — the New Year for Trees. It may not feel like tree-planting weather in Canada, but it is the beginning of spring in Eretz Yisrael. To celebrate, make a donation to plant a tree in Israel, plant some parsley seeds at home that will be ready to use for

your Pesach Seder, and eat some of the seven species that come from Israel — wheat, barley, figs, dates, pomegranates, grapes, and olives. We can celebrate the bounty of nature even in the depths of winter, anticipating the beauty of spring in Canada.

Finally, Purim! On March 6, we will hold our first Purim Carnival in three years, along with our amazing Purim Shpiel, *Little Shpiel of Horrors!* Don't worry about the title parents; it's kid-friendly as always! This year, our Executive Director Rachel Saslove will join the cast!

And of course, you can always join us for Shabbat services, morning and evening, or for Torah Study, Lunch & Learn, or the many other wonderful programs THZ offers.

So bundle up, put on your boots, and get over to Har Zion to warm up spiritually and nourish your Jewish soul.

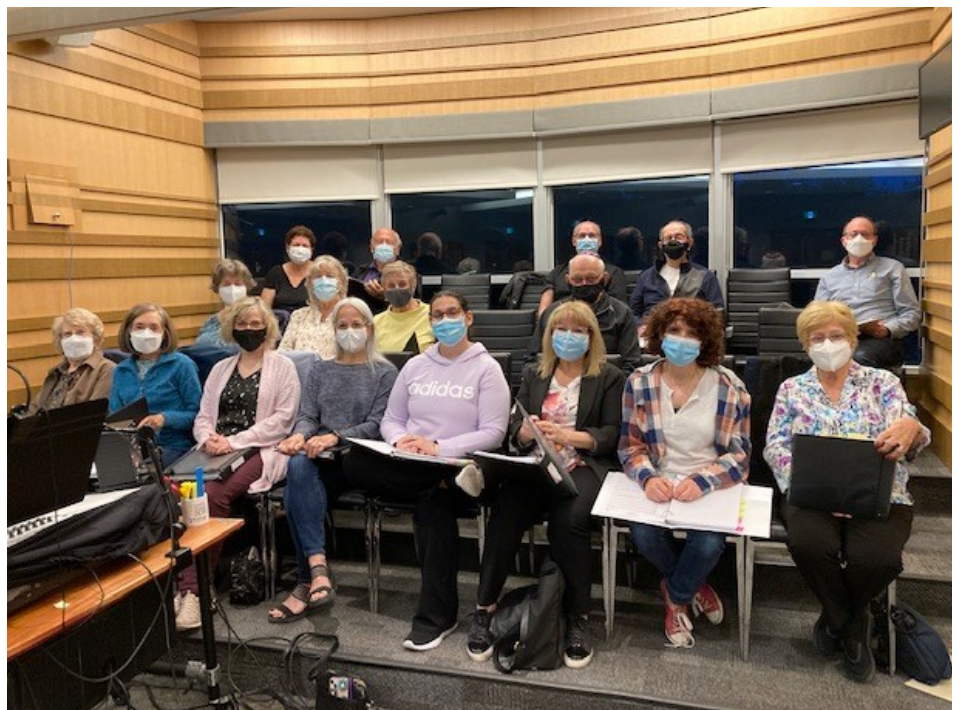
Finally, this New Year 5783 in 2022, the choir was back where they belong, seated in the choir bay. The sound of

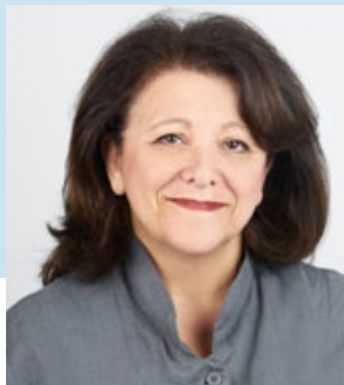


their strength, their determination, and their courage, even through the barriers of the facemasks presented a powerful message.

Transformation and Sustainability

Temple Har Zion has a new Strategic Plan to guide us over the next 3-5 years. The plan is about the transformation needed to ensure that our THZ community is sustainable.

Part 1 identifies the strategic priorities for Temple, the findings that support those priorities and some suggested action to be taken.

Part 2 of this work is about delivering on initiatives that address these strategic priorities.

That's where you come in, because we can't do it alone.

In order to both develop and execute on a 3-5 year action plan, we'll need lots of help from volunteers across our community. That help can come in many different forms — research, review and analysis; a conversation; participation in a planning session; coordinating an event, a project or initiative. Some forms of help will take a day, some several days, some over a few months.

Everyone has distinct expertise, experience and creativity. We need that to get this work done.

The Plan lays out six strategic priorities to move our community towards sustainability. The priorities are based on the findings drawn from the research and analysis undertaken by our Strategic Planning Committee.

1: Embrace Diversity (racial/ethnic, sexual orientation, and interfaith)

Why?

- THZ prides itself in welcoming interfaith families, but it is not clear that there are adequate programs and focused resources to support this.
- There are other diverse groups (e.g., racial, sexual orientation) who do not feel that THZ meets their needs, as expressed by prospective and existing members. Other congregations appear to be ahead of us in their focus on these areas.

2: Develop a New Funding Model

Why?

- The current contribution schedule is not viable as older members (paying higher dues) are retiring/losing a spouse and dropping lower on the grid. Many newer members enter on the lower levels of the grid. Some in the middle-aged cohort are paying less than in the past due to lack of engagement and poor perception of “value for money”.

3: Attract and Engage Younger Members

Why?

- While we need to remain relevant to our existing members, our current membership skews heavily towards older seniors, which does not reflect

the demographics of the broader Jewish community, and which is not sustainable in the long run.

- We're not attracting the younger members and young families that are needed for long-term sustainability.

4: Increase our Focus on Tikkun Olam and Israel

Why?

- Members are “neutral” on THZ's ability to inspire commitment and engagement with social action issues and Israel. An increased focus on social justice and climate change would make the Temple more attractive to younger cohorts. This group also seeks a more balanced approach to matters affecting Israel.

5: Improve Responsiveness to Members and their Needs

Why?

- Existing membership is happy with services and programs, but younger cohorts are looking for a community experience beyond worship.
- While virtual and hybrid have worked for many members through the pandemic, most are looking for a return to in-person experience for worship while maintaining virtual/hybrid options for programs.
- Worship services are valued and are an assumed element of membership, but they are not the key to building

community and social experiences which middle and younger cohorts are seeking.

Everyone has something to offer associated with delivering on one or more of these priorities.

Your presence on the phone instead of at the hospital (because I insisted, for fear of COVID) during Emile's last moments was so important to us. While listening to your beautiful voice chanting the Bereshit and others, Emile went peacefully into God's arms. Once again, while on holiday, you conducted the *Havdalah* and Celebration of Life services we held for Emile. God bless you for your loving heart. Thanks. Like Emile, I truly love you lots.

Sometimes we tend to forget thanking people like Jaye Goldberg and Sarah Greene who are the backbone and first line support services at THZ. Jaye's smooth and willing help to writing and coordinating what needed to be addressed after Emile passed was a source of relief and comfort. This includes the monumental amount and efforts of Sarah, tribute cards, etc. My thanks specifically is not for the few tasks I mentioned, but for their warmth, comforting presence, respect and understanding during a difficult time, and also whenever I have interacted with them.

Is there a better way to learn about Israeli inventions than through the famous game of Monopoly?

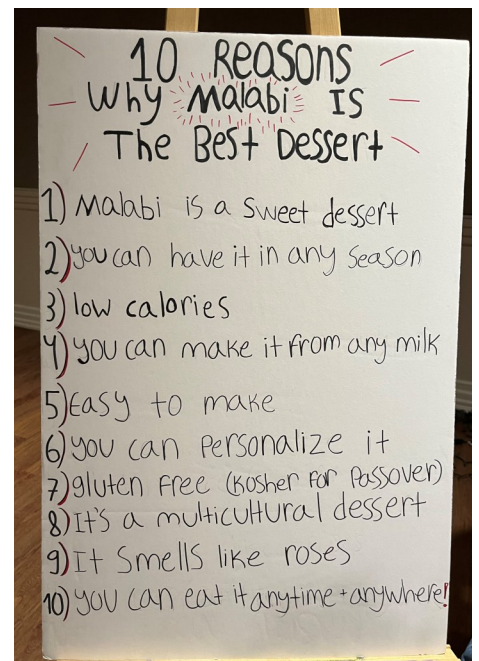


We opened the program with a human-sized monopoly board. The participants were the tokens of the game and every part of the board

THZ Heals Together

On Sunday May 1, 2022, Susan Albaum, a long-time THZ member and educator, and I led our first **THZ Heals Together** Grief Group.

Susan, who is currently enrolled in a graduate program leading to licensure as a psychotherapist, and I had spent months discussing how many people who had lost a loved one during the pandemic seemed to be struggling in more complex ways.

Grieving is a complicated process, and mourning is as unique as the person who is grieving. Adding to the isolation of grieving was that during the height of the pandemic, there was no way to comfort those dying alone in hospitals, nursing homes and hospice facilities, who otherwise would have been surrounded by loved ones. Most obvious had been how the pandemic forced us to change how we comfort the sick and their families, bury our loved ones and grieve for them. It forced us to find other ways to “attend” funerals and mourning rituals. For the first time in our lives, the intuitive and helpful rituals we practice as Jews were not possible in the same way.

These challenges made it vital for us to begin what we imagined to be the first of many programs connected to

THZ Heals Together. We hoped this support group would address the many challenges experienced during this exceptionally challenging time and lend support while lessening isolation within our community.

From May through December, our group met once a month, except during the High Holy Days in September. After our second meeting, the group decided that we would no longer have the group open to new participants.

Each session began with an opening meditation, a *niggun*, an explanation of group purpose and boundaries, a check-in, a presented topic, and individual sharing. After an introductory session, we began by defining the concepts of spirituality and religion, such as how the language we use for these concepts can be broadened or impacted by grief and loss, and the importance of respecting each other’s understanding and use of this language. We went on to explore how spiritual practices may have been positively or negatively impacted by loss, may improve or hinder our emotional and spiritual health and our ability to cope, and the need to identify and develop additional spiritual tools and practices that can positively impact our lives.

In late August, we discussed ways to better prepare for and cope with grief during the High Holy Days. This included having members consider different ways they may wish to bring their loved one’s memory or favourite ritual to this year’s holiday. They ultimately discovered that although their loved one would not be present, they would not be forgotten. Every meeting hoped to allow members to gain a source of strength from each other and leave a bit stronger and less burdened by their loss. At our final meeting held this month, our group led with sharing personal mementos of their loved ones and ended with a closing ceremony together.

One of the more valuable goals of grief work is assisting the bereaved in internalizing the best elements of the lost person or situation. I believe that each group member has begun this challenging work and will continue navigating through their loss, ultimately being strengthened by it.

Beginning in February, our THZ Heals Together group will reopen to new members. Should you or a loved one wish to get more information about the group, or if you would like to register, it isn’t too soon to sign up. Please get in touch with my assistant, Sarah Greene, at sarah@harzion.ca.

As always, should you or your loved one wish to speak to me directly, I welcome you to reach out. You can grab me at a kiddush, or call/email me any time.

Due to feedback from the group, starting in February, we will meet twice monthly instead of once. The hope in meeting more regularly is to allow for a more cohesive group, and for the group itself to be a larger support as they navigate loss that may have occurred anytime from at

least six months before to as far away as a lifetime.

We know grief is a process, not a destination; there is no clear start or end point.

My theological understanding has consistently held that we are stronger together than we are when we stand alone. Judaism teaches us that we must be with each other.

In its first chapters, the Torah teaches us Eve was created in

response to Adam's loneliness. *"It is not good for the human to be alone,"* God realized. *"I will make for him an ezer kenegdo, a worthy helper"* to stand beside him. She will fill the void. When we respond to the burdens of another and stand before others to guard them against loneliness, we become not only more human but also more divine. We are stronger together.

School Tours

A few times a month, Rabbi Weiss and I welcome in groups of Grade 11 students from Catholic High Schools to learn about Judaism as part of their World Religions studies. Each time, these students bring new questions and interesting insights. More often than not, it is their first time entering a synagogue and meeting someone Jewish.

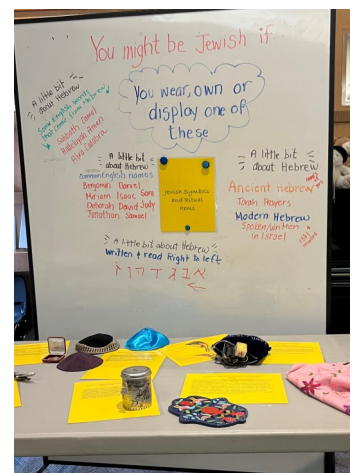
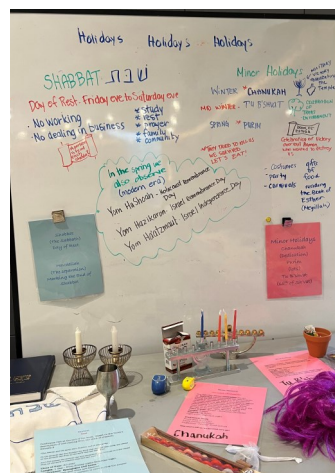
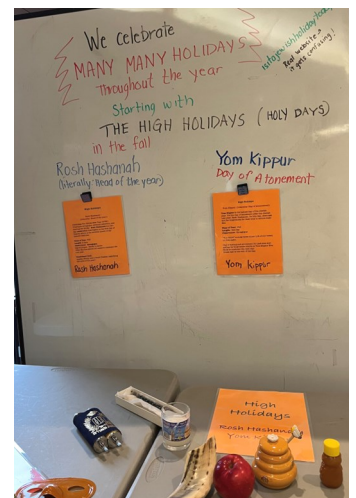
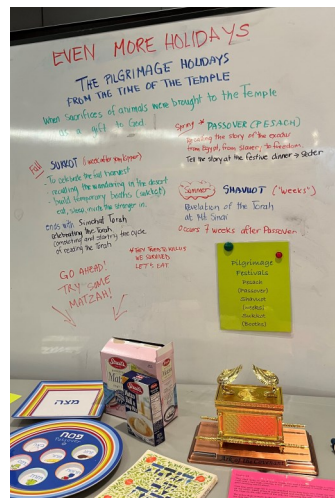
When I lead the tour, I like to start the presentation with a few questions of my own — *“What is the most important Jewish holiday?”* (No, not Hanukkah). *“If 100 people represent the world’s population, how many do you think are Jewish?”* (The answers have ranged from 50 to 1.) My answer is “an arm”. 2/10 of 1 %.

In our hour together, I share with them the story of our people, from biblical to modern times, our ties to Israel, our holidays and Jewish lifecycle rituals.

They get to see a Torah up close and engage with some of the everyday ritual items that are common to us, but new to them. We talk about the Shoah and our burden of having to deal with antisemitism in the past and now. I also impart the joy of being Jewish.

The time with these groups is personally very rewarding and I look forward to bringing them in to Temple Har Zion. Our hope is that each visit to our home brings some insight and understanding of who we are and helps to build bridges between our communities.
