

Each plot is \$3600.

All members in good standing, contributing sustaining
dues, and maintaining a minimum two year membership
with Temple Shalom will be offered the
Member Price of \$1800 per plot.

Information on Jewish Burial within Sons of Israel Client and Mortuary Use

The deceased is not embalmed and should be placed in a shroud
(linen or cotton is acceptable).

Caskets are strongly recommended and must be wooden with no metal
or plastic. Fabric, filling and pillow should be removed from the casket.
If there is no casket, the shroud must have handles and a shroud board
must be used under the body. The shroud and board must be
compatible with the Evergreen lowering system. Both the shroud and
board must be kosher.

Evergreen is committed to keeping its workers safe and reserves the
right to refuse to handle the body if all safety guidelines have not been
met.

Urns must be biodegradable and the interment of cremated remains is
only allowed in the Beit Shalom (non-orthodox) section of the
cemetery.

Urns may not be placed inside a casket; they can be in the same plot
but must be separated by dirt.

Flowers at the cemetery are not consistent with Jewish tradition.
Instead, stones are placed on top of the headstone.

There is no clergy fee for Temple Shalom members. The mortuary is
responsible for checking with the Temple Shalom office to see if the
client is a member in good standing at the time of death in order to
know whether to charge a clergy fee.

Allowing the body to return to the earth at a rate determined by God is
a core concept in Jewish burial customs. In accordance with this
concept, we do not allow vaults or liners in Sons of Israel.
