Message from the Board Chair and Executive Director

When we began the 2021-2022 term in July 2021, the Board of Trustees identified three primary goals: hire a rabbi, find a new home, and increase membership. We have succeeded in one of the three and are hard at work on the other two. Rabbi Katie Mizrahi officially starts in September 2022 as our new rabbi. The Rabbi Search Committee, led by Susan Spero and Jeff Haber, with the help of Talia Winokur, David Gordon, Judy Reaven, and Sandy Goldman, did a remarkable job. They interviewed several candidates and put together an announcement for a new rabbi that our central organization said was one of the best ones that they had seen. We are eternally grateful for their hard work. THANK YOU!

In this Annual Report and at the Annual Meeting, you will learn more about our Facility Task Force and Facility Exploratory Team in 2021 up through the present time. We owe many thanks to Allan Wallis, Chair of both groups, for his outstanding leadership and hope that we will have a more definitive answer to where we will be living as an organization within the next few months.

Our last goal of increasing membership proves to be the most complicated. The Board of Trustees had a full-day membership summit in February to address this goal. We discussed new approaches to this problem. We have assigned two groups to thoroughly explore our declining membership issue and make proposals to address the situation. The Dues Task Force, led by Bob Stephens and Janet Sherman,





is exploring new and innovative ways to fund B'nai. It is clear that the old system of asking for dues from our members does not work for everyone, and we believe it has been one of the reasons that younger families are not joining as fast as we had hoped. And the Membership Task Force, led by Bob Stephens and Linda Treibitz, has been hard at work developing new ideas on how we can attract new families. Both task forces will be presenting their recommendations: first at our May 24 Board Meeting and then to our members at our Annual Meeting.

In addition to these four working groups, we have had enormous success with three other programs. Our adult educational program, A Year of Learning, sponsored by the Grynberg Family Foundation and led by Debbie Goodman, has presented vital programming that addressed women's rights, race equity, and more. Please refer to the rest of the Annual Report for more information about A Year of Learning.

Next is our My Mitzvah program, launched in 2021, led by Risa Aqua with Hal Aqua. In the first year of this program, Risa and Hal (with some help from Sarah Kaplan Gould) are working with nine students to prepare them for their B'nai Mitzvot. In creating My Mitzvah, Risa's vision was that students from diverse backgrounds and levels of knowledge train together toward individual and shared goals while families find a welcoming, non-judgmental place to grow Jewishly in community with others. By all accounts, My Mitzvah fulfills this vision, and we look forward to continuing success in this program.

The third accomplishment is the efforts of Zeik Saidman and Marilyn Winokur in the tremendous success of Coloradans for the Common Good, a broad-based, non-partisan organization focused on working for social justice in Colorado. As a member of CCG, B'nai Havurah is proud to work with more than 25 other interfaith groups (including congregations, labor unions, education associations, and others) who have achieved so much in promoting democracy and fair treatment of all citizens. Look for CCG's 2021 highlights and their goals in this Annual Report.

We thank all of our members for their belief in B'nai Havurah and invite you to join us as we look forward to the upcoming term, welcome Rabbi Katie Mizrahi, and build a more sustainable future for our wonderful community.

Report from Hal Aqua, Cantorial Ritual Director

To state the obvious, 2021 was a year of challenges for our community, coming as it did in the second year of the global pandemic. The calendar year began with the unprecedented jolt of January 6, and that evening B'nai Havurah members gathered via Zoom to find comfort in community, with Rabbi Evette and me leading us in discussion, prayer, meditation, and song... not as good as meeting in person, but far better than doing nothing.

When I think of describing our community's spiritual and social life in 2021, that phrase – far better than doing nothing – is an apt descriptor of the way we came together last year. Keeping our attention on the ever-shifting demands of COVID protocols, we held Shabbat services, sometimes in person, sometimes virtually;

we met in person for b'nai mitzvahs and funerals and on Zoom for shiva services; and as we became more attuned to rapidly-changing technology, we developed a hybrid approach to our gatherings, an approach that we continue to refine and improve upon today. It's been a steep learning curve, but we're doing it together.

A few of my favorite moments from 2021: a Zoom Purim celebration with a mask contest and a rapid-fire Megillah retelling (in English); a pre-Pesach community seder at Highlands Church to share our traditions with new friends and perhaps future partners; a last-minute shift from in-person to mostly-virtual High Holy Days services at Highlands; celebrating Second Day Rosh Hashanah outdoors with friends from Beth Evergreen and B'nai Chaim at a lovely mountain park; and walking with a Torah scroll in a joyful all-ages group from B'nai to nearby Lollipop Lake (in Garland Park) on Simchat Torah.

As we move into the summer and start planning for our 2022 High Holy Days, I look forward with anticipation and positive thoughts to welcoming Rabbi Katie into our community and working with her and our High Holy Days team as we celebrate the coming seasons with intentionality, love, and camaraderie. I know that it will be far, far better than doing nothing.

We began planning for High Holy Days 2021/5782 in April 2021, hoping for a hybrid (in person and on Zoom) approach. As it turned out, just two weeks before Rosh Hashanah, we, with input from our Covid Task Force, decided to offer our services on Zoom only. Report from Debbie Goodman, Program Director

Year of Learning programs have provided B'nai Havurah and the broader community a wide variety of educational and cultural experiences in the last year. The 2021 programming year began with a two-month celebration of Yiddish Culture that included Klezmer concerts and discussions of Yiddish literature facilitated by staff at the Yiddish Book Center. Professor Pamela Nadell of American University was featured in two programs during the year, both of which drew national audiences on Zoom. The programs focused on America's Jewish Women, and The Triangle Shirtwaist Fire and the social justice reforms that followed. Israeli artist Shirel Horovitz did a presentation about Israeli art as a reflection of history and memory; and Rabbi Deborah Waxman, President and CEO of Reconstructing Judaism, spoke about resilience and Jewish practice.

One of the priorities of the Year of Learning is social justice programming, and the recently formed Racial Justice and Awareness Committee has played an integral role in addressing that goal. Learning became the first priority of this group, as reflected in the committee's Mission Statement:

Our goal is to be an open and inclusive congregation. We are committed to educating ourselves and B'nai Havurah about racism, uncovering our own prejudices and privileges. We will work to unlearn our racist patterns, share power and work in coalition to promote racial justice.

Earlier this year, The Racial Justice and Awareness Committee presented a multi-session reading group using Isabel Wilkerson's groundbreaking book *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents*. In the coming year this committee will bring more educational opportunities and programming around racial justice and equity to the B'nai Havurah community.

The Year of Learning programming is made possible by the generosity of the CBG Family Fund and provides the opportunity for B'nai Havurah to bring new programming to the community that requires resources and support not previously available. The B'nai Havurah community has been able to expand and enhance opportunities for learning, collaboration, and celebration as a result of the Year of Learning initiative, with a focus in the last year on Jewish culture, the American Jewish experience, and social and racial justice programming. In the coming year, Year of Learning programs will continue to bring quality experiences, distinguished teachers and cultural celebrations to our community.

Rabbi Katie Mizrahi: Helping to Write the Next Chapter of B'nai Havurah's Evolution

In March of 2021, our Rabbi Search Committee, with the support of Reconstructing Judaism and Rabbi Joel Alpert, embarked on a journey to find our new rabbi. After interviewing six candidates and checking references, the Search Committee recommended that the B'nai Havurah community bring Rabbi Katie Mizrahi to Denver to lead a Shabbaton in December. The community had multiple opportunities to meet and interact with Rabbi Katie.

We are incredibly pleased that Katie Mizrahi will become our new rabbi beginning September 1, 2022, just a few weeks before Rosh Hashanah. Search Committee Co-Chairs Jeff Haber and Susan Spero said, "The members of the Search Committee worked very well together in our desire to create a fair, open, and comprehensive process. Given the overwhelmingly positive feedback from 117 members after our Shabbaton with Rabbi Katie, we believe we have helped B'nai find a wonderful leader to guide us in writing the next chapter in our community's evolution."

We are grateful to our search committee members, Susan Spero, Jeff Haber, Talia Winokur, Dave Gordon, Judy Reaven, and Sandy Goldman, for their work on behalf of our community.

Report from Risa & Hal Aqua, Co-Directors of My Mitzvah

My Mitzvah at B'nai Havurah was a pilot program that started in September 2021. Our class of nine consisted of 5 students from four B'nai Havurah families; two students whose families had left B'nai in the past few years; and two other unaffiliated families who found us through the internet or by word of mouth.

The students came with widely varying amounts of Jewish education and background; all were welcome, and all studied together in class. Most, but not all, students also received private tutoring (not included in our program fee).

Our class met twice monthly; Covid was a challenge, but we did our best. At one of our early classes, which was in person and outdoors, students jumped into learning about the mitzvot by organizing piles of disparate mitzvot typed on strips of paper into various categories. Their enthusiasm and willingness to grapple

with these commandments – some familiar, some obscure, some easier to make sense of than others – set the tone for the rest of the year. The cohort proved to be mature, engaged, and supportive of each other; they felt comfortable and accepted regardless of how much they knew coming in.

The students participated in several Shabbat B'yachad services throughout the year, practicing their prayer/leadership skills and getting a taste of a B'nai Shabbat service.

As we enter the season of B'nai Mitzvah celebrations, we hope our class further gels as a community of friends. We are confident that the celebrations will be varied and meaningful to students, families and community.

Goals and Vision for 2022

Next year's cohort is beginning to take shape already. There are fewer B'nai children in the next class – just 2 or 3 – but we have been receiving many inquiries, and are optimistic that we'll have many more students this year.

We look forward to working with Rabbi Katie when she comes on board. We have not yet talked about what roles she would like to take on and what directions she would like the program to take in the future. Sarah Kaplan Gould has agreed to continue, and to expand her roles as teacher, tutor and curriculum developer.

Things we hope to continue: Welcoming families who don't want a cookie-cutter approach to B'nai Mitzvah; empowering children to approach Torah and prayer in the bold and inquisitive way we do here at B'nai Havurah; providing a Jewish community to unaffiliated Jews while augmenting B'nai Havurah's small current Youth Education cohort.

Things we hope to do better: More creative prayer-writing and interpretation; more integration of Mitzvah Projects into our group classes; more family gatherings (we had very few this year due to Covid).

All in all, it's been an amazing year of learning for students and staff alike. Energized and optimistic, we look forward to an even better year in 2022-23.

Adult Education

Coloradans for the Common Good

In 2018, B'nai Havurah became a member of Coloradans for the Common Good*, meeting all the requirements of Positioning B'nai, our social justice policy. CCG's 29 broad-based, non-partisan organizational members (congregations, unions, civic groups) work together to tackle local issues across lines that often divide our communities. CCG's leadership development also trains ordinary people to have a powerful voice in decisions that affect their lives.

2021 CCG Highlights:

- Supported preschool workers in Jefferson County as they organized to form a union
- Stood with UFCW Local 7 members during their successful strike for fair wages and safe conditions at King Soopers
- Collaborated with farm workers and allies to increase protections for agricultural workers
- Gathered 250 people in Jefferson County to secure commitments from school board candidates to increase wages for workers in JeffCo Public Schools
- Worked with the National Gun Safety Consortium and got commitments from the CO State Patrol and Boulder County Sheriff's Department to test and evaluate innovative gun safety devices

Havurah B'kavod Jose Diaz represents B'nai Havurah as an active member of Colorado Faith Communities United to End Gun Violence (CFCU)*, a multifaith coalition of more than 40 congregations working together to reduce Colorado's rising gun death rate.

As diverse faith communities, CFCU works to reduce injuries, deaths, and the resulting grief caused by the improper use of firearms — whether suicidal, accidental, or criminal. They work together in areas where they can be most effective, including legislative advocacy, public health initiatives, public awareness, and increased engagement of our faith communities.

Facility Task Force/Exploratory Team

During 2019-2020 the Facilities Task Force identified 19 churches that B'nai Havurah might lease space from. Members of the FTF researched the churches and visited most of them. The most promising was Central Christian Church, where we had held High Holy Days services for eight consecutive years.

The Board appointed an Exploratory Team to engage in negotiations with Central Christian Church. The Exploratory Team met with representatives from Central Christian Church from January through March of 2020, after which they determined that there was no basis for further negotiations.

At this point, consideration turned to leasing commercial space. We quickly determined that this option wasn't financially viable.

A new lead came to us via Carla Sciaky. She had been working with a performance group rehearsing at Highlands Church (1700 S. Grant).

Carla liked the building and Pastor Jenny and thought there might be a good fit for the facility and values (e.g., actively engaged in social justice issues.)

The FTF met at Highlands
Church on October 14 to
tour the 28,000-square-foot
building. There was a general
feeling that this could be
a good fit. Ben Honigman
reactivated an Exploratory Team
to engage in negotiations with
Highlands. The first meeting of
the Exploratory Team with the
Highland's counterpart took
place on January 31 of this
year. Those meetings continue.

Statement of 2021 Financial Activities

2021 was another challenging year for B'nai Havurah. We did not have the benefit of the PPP Grant and we lost members. Even so, our assets grew to \$1,417,864 as of 12/31/2021. Total Ordinary Income was \$420,686 which was 87% of Budget and resulted in a deficit of \$66,079. Nonetheless, including Other Net Income from



our Restricted Funds and Investments, we ended the year \$61,075 in the black. It is the strength of our Restricted Fund donations and other investments that are keeping us in the black.

Membership Dues were only \$9.5K under Budget. Other Half donations were strong at \$12K+ over Budget. Youth Education (not anticipating Carol's departure and smaller class sizes) and our April Fundraiser (revenue fell short) accounted for \$37K less revenue than planned. Due to the pandemic and careful budget management, Ordinary Expenses were lower than expected and we ended the year at 96% of Budget.

In conclusion, our finances remain strong for now. However, B'nai Havurah will need to implement strategies for retaining members, attracting new families, and other revenue-generating activities in order to support an ongoing vibrant community.






