Yehuda's Leadership

A Letter From Rabbi Mimran

Dear Congregation,

Yehuda, from whom we all derive our national identity as 'Yehudim', is cast in a split-screen narrative with Yosef starting in Chapter 37. The text of the Torah toggles back and forth between Yosef's travails in Egypt and Yehuda's own life, all leading to the finale at the beginning of our Parsha, when Yehuda confronts Yosef, and demands mercy for Binyamin. Let us very briefly analyze Yehuda's life's trajectory.

As his three older brothers were ineligible for the leadership role (for various reasons), Yehuda became the family's de facto leader. Yet, one of his first acts as leader was to commandeer the sale of Yosef, which on his level was a grave sin. True leadership is the polar opposite; to take responsibility not only for one's own actions but also others'!

Twenty-two years later, the episode with Binyamin provides Yehuda with an opportunity to show leadership. When beseeching to Egypt's vice premier (Yosef), Yehuda uses the singular language of 'Arvut', demonstrating his halakhic and moral responsibility for his youngest brother Binyamin. After failing to protect Rachel's eldest (Yosef) when he had the chance, he made sure to correct that mistake now. As noted by our Sages, Yehuda is prepared to stake his entire spiritual future on his ability to successfully protect Binyamin. Yehuda pleads with Yosef, and then confronts him, offering himself as a slave to save his brother.

Yosef, so deeply moved by Yehuda's personal transformation, redemption of character, from the orchestrator of his sale two decades before to the heroic protector of Binyamin, finally breaks down, and reveals himself to his brothers.

Rarely does life afford us the opportunity to directly correct a moral failing of the magnitude of the abandonment of one's brother. In this sense, Yehuda was fortunate indeed. Yet, the fact that Yehuda had prepared himself for that moment, had undertaken the painful personal steps to live up to his name, literally meaning to admit or confess the truth, is entirely to his credit. When Binyamin's life was on the line, Yehuda was ready to act with great moral courage, to lead by taking responsibility for his brother. It was his finest hour.

Let us live up to our namesake's noble legacy and show true leadership by taking responsibility and helping those around us and by recognizing and learning from our misjudgments.
