Dvar Torah from Rabbi Mimran: Yitro Unknown History of the 10 Commandments

Dear Congregation,

There is some intriguing history about the Ten Commandments you may not be familiar with. It begins with the little-known fact that there was a time when the Ten Commandments were read prior to and together with the Shema (Mishnah Tamid 5:1). We also have independent evidence for this from ancient manuscripts and texts. There is the 'Nash Papyrus' fragments from the second century BCE and Tefillin discovered with the Dead Sea Scrolls, which both contained the Ten Commandments alongside the Shema. In addition, both the Babylonian and Jerusalem Talmud's mention that some sought to introduce the Ten Commandments into the prayers, and that the rabbis had to issue a ruling against doing so. So, the custom of including the Ten Commandments as part of the Shema was once widespread, but it was later systematically opposed by the sages. Why did they object to it? The Talmud says it was because of the "claim of the sectarians." Simply put, Jewish sectarians argued that only the Ten Commandments were binding. The rabbis were therefore opposed to any custom that would give special prominence to the Ten **Commandments** since the sectarians were pointing to such customs as proof that they were treated differently from the other commands. By removing them from the prayer book, the rabbis hoped to silence such claims. The question then arose, given that we do not say the Ten Commandments during public prayer, should we stand when they are being read from the Torah (whether on Shavuot or from Parshat Yitro and Vaetchanan)? Maimonides ruled that it was forbidden to stand during their reading. His reasoning? That same logic. It should be given no special prominence. However even in Egypt during his time as Rabbi, Jewish communities stood while the Ten Commandments were being read. Even though they knew their acts could be misconstrued by heretics, our nation was too attached to that great epiphany – the only time in history G-d spoke to an entire people – to treat it like any other passage in the Torah.
