Cheshvan, the Month of Shabbat

A number of years ago, I was talking to a group of preschoolers and mentioned that the next holiday after Sukkot and Shemini Atzeret-Simchat Torah is Hanukkah. I explained that Cheshvan, the month between Tishrei (with Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Sh'mini Atzeret-Simchat Torah) and Kislev (with Hanukkah), is called "Mar-Cheshvan" ("Bitter Cheshvan") by the rabbis of the Talmud. The rabbis say that Cheshvan is bitter because it doesn't have any holidays. One precocious student piped up: "But, Rabbi Gorban, what about Shabbat?"

Shabbat, that simple and unassuming but wonderful holiday that comes every week. It happens so often that it is easy to pass over it (sorry...that was a terrible pun). Who wants to go to services or cook a festive meal again after spending so much time at services and preparing for all the other holidays? In opposition to this tendency, the rabbis of the Talmud suggest that the rituals and holidays that come frequently take precedence over those that come less

frequently (Berakhot 51b). Shabbat, according to this view, is more important than the other holidays. There are even some holidays that will never fall on Friday, Saturday, or Sunday because they might overshadow Shabbat or conflict with the preparations for Shabbat. But in a packed Jewish holiday season, Shabbat can feel more like a burden than a relief. It's one more holiday to prepare for, it's one more day to have to be at the temple.

And that's why I love Cheshvan, regardless of how it feels about not having any special holidays. Without the distractions of the other holidays, Shabbat feels like a special day—a time to celebrate family and community, a time for rest and fun, and a time of peace.

This year, we even have a number of special Shabbatot during the month of Cheshvan (and early Kislev), with guests like Cantor Lauren Bandman, our own Joey Breslau, Jewish rock artist Dan Nichols, and, of course, our Mostly Musical Shabbat with our Temple Sinai Band. I look forward to celebrating Shabbat with you!

NOTES FROM PRIDE TRIBE BY SUSAN BLACKMAN

WHAT ARE THOSE PRONOUNS WE SEE AFTER NAMES ON ZOOM SCREENS OR EMAIL SIGNATURES?

Let's take a look at pronouns with the help of *Keshet*, a national organization that works for the full equality of all LGBTQ+ Jews and our families in Jewish life.

- Sexual Orientation describes a pattern of emotional, romantic, and/or sexual attractions (e.g., lesbian, gay, bisexual, straight, asexual).
- Sex refers to a set of biological attributes (male/female).
- Gender refers to socially constructed roles, behaviors, expressions, and identities for girls, boys, men, and women.
- Gender Identity describes an individual's understanding of their own gender.
- Transgender is an umbrella term for anyone who
 identifies as a gender that is different from the sex
 they were assigned at birth.
- Non-binary is an umbrella term for those who
 identify as neither male nor female exclusively, or
 who falls outside the gender binary (male/female).

This is where pronouns become important.

My middle child identifies as non-binary and uses the pronouns they/them.



So what happens when I make a mistake? I apologize, correct myself, and keep talking. (It gets easier.)

At Temple Sinai, we can start using these pronouns now— Sunshine Figlio, our Program Coordinator, identifies as non-binary and uses they/them.

To support those who identify as non-binary and/or trans, we can put our own pronouns after our names on Zoom, in emails, or on name tags to show that we respect each other's identities and to create a welcoming space for people of all genders and gender identities.

FALK LIBRARY NEWS: COOKBOOKS

Temple Sinai has a rich association with food. First, there was the much missed Jewish Food Festival, our present Brotherhood Brunches, two published cookbooks—Incredible Edibles (1991) and more recently, From Our Kitchen to Yours (2016). Currently, WoTS cooks once a month through Zoom or with in-person kitchen culinary feats. But, let us not overlook the cookbook collection available for take-out (pun intended) from the Falk Library.

Leading those visiting food recipe history, we have the Jewish American Cookbook (1946) by Regina Frishwasser, Editor, Recipe Department of the Jewish Daily Forward. It has 1600 recipes "to bring our favorite foods in the easiest possible way to those that want them." The Holocaust Survivor Cookbook (2007, 5th edition) was a project to benefit poor and hungry Israelis. It visits survivors' stories and gives their recipes for traditional foods, sweets, and specialties from many countries. Inside the Jewish Bakery, by Stanley Ginsberg and Norman Berg, explores recipes and memories from the golden age of Jewish baking—when small bakeries were important as a community hub of Ashkenazi baking tradition. It contains great visuals for shaping a bagel, knotting a challah, and colored photos that make you remember savory and sweet treats from childhood.

Gil Marks presents a treasury of vegetarian dishes from Jewish communities throughout the world in *Olive Trees* and Honey. It discusses traditions as a mosaic of Jewish

communities with seasonings and flavors important to Jewish cuisines and vegetarian foods for special occasions and Jewish holidays. It won the IACP cookbook award as well as the James Beard Foundation Book Award.

Traveling to Sephardic culture, we have Jerusalem A Cookbook by Yotam Ottolenghi and Sami Tamimi. This book has many wonderful photos of daily life and the particular dishes featured. It allows a view of Arabic cuisine and the counterpart Sephardic dishes from the Levant. Such dishes as kibbeh, shakshuka, butternut squash with tahini spread, fattoush, mixed grill, stuffed eggplant with lamb and pine nuts, hot yogurt and barley soup, give pause to discovering Jerusalem complex food culture.

Lastly, Israeli Soul by Michael Solomonov and Steven Cook takes you on a photographic tour of Israel, with detailed photos of recipes and moves around from savory to sweet to falafel, pita bread, sabich, shawarma, hummus and hummus toppings, malabi, labneh tart, ma'amoul cookies, and drinks and cold treats.

These are only some of the cookbooks on the shelves of the Falk Library. So, step up and place a take-out order!!




