

There is an interesting backstory to KKBE's most recent trip to Israel, a joint venture with First (Scots) Presbyterian Church in January of 2016. When the national body of the Presbyterian Church, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), only narrowly voted not to divest from Israel – a vote that has unfortunately gone the other way in other liberal Protestant churches – Rev. Massie and Rabbi Alexander asked one another: What can we do to strengthen the ties of our communities (a) to Israel, and (b) to one another? The result was a trip that seeks to connect with both Jewish and Christian sites in Israel, as well as organizations in Israel that are doing the same kind of justice work in which our two congregations are engaged here in Charleston. Contrary to popular conceptions of the Judeo-Christian God, the God of the Hebrew scriptures is portrayed as one whose decisions can be altered by public opinion, Israelite or non-Israelite, and who repents concerning God's past actions. In other words, the God of the Hebrew Bible is very much concerned with God's reputation and acknowledges God's mistakes. This talk will consider some of the key biblical texts that speak to these issues of reputation and repentance and we will discuss their impact on Jewish tradition. 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“I Don’t Roll on Shabbos”: Jewish Themes in the Films of the Coen Brothers

Joel and Ethan Coen, two nice Jewish boys from Minnesota, have, over the course of their 30-year film career, invented some of the richest and most provocative Jewish characters ever seen on screen (Bernie Bernbaum from *Miller’s Crossing*, Walter Sobchak from *The Big Lebowski*, the title character in *Barton Fink*). And with their 2009 black comedy, *A Serious Man*, the Coens have made one of the profoundest explorations of Jewish themes ever put on film.

This lecture and discussion is led by Elijah Siegler, chair of the department of Religious Studies at College of Charleston, who has recently edited a book on religion in the films of the Coen Brothers.

Golem and the Jinni, Helene Wecker

Drawing on both Jewish and Arab folk mythology, this novel presents an immigrant tale turned on its head. Chava, the golem, is created to be a bride whose husband dies en route to America. The jinni, Ahmad, is released by a tinsmith. Each must learn to navigate New York City in 1899 and eventually they meet one another.

Fields of Exile, Nora Gold

Judith, a graduate student in Canada, who has recently moved after a ten year period of living in Israel, confronts the dissonance of being a peace activist in Israel with the anti-Israel sentiment common on many North American university campuses. Winner of the 2015 Canadian Jewish Literary Award for best novel.

Waveland, Simone Zelitch

A novel telling the story of Beth Fine - a white, Jewish woman who joins other Northern volunteers during Freedom Summer in 1964. Narrated by Beth, as told in her later years to her daughter, Tamar, this novel explores the complicated dynamics of a young woman wanting to challenge injustice.

The Hilltop, Assaf Gavron

Set in a West Bank settlement, two brothers - one religious and the other entrepreneurial - clash when Roni, the entrepreneurial brother, plans to market the olive oil made in the Palestinian village next door bringing this under-the-radar settlement community into the spotlight. Winner of the 2013 Bernstein Prize for Israeli fiction written by authors under 50.

Boys in the Boat, Daniel James Brown

A non-fiction account of the rowing team from the University of Washington who were the unlikely winners of the gold medal at the 1936 Olympics.

The New Machzor

(High Holy Day Prayer Book): Up Close and Personal

When: Dates TBD (3 sessions – one/month in June, July and August)

KKBE is thrilled to introduce a new High Holy Day prayer book this fall: *Mishkan HaNefesh*, used by many Reform congregations this past fall to nearly resounding positive reviews. The new 2-volume set follows much of the same formatting of *Mishkan T'filah*, the prayer book we currently use for Shabbat services. There are multiple choices for English readings, representing a plurality of theologies; all Hebrew prayers and songs are transliterated into English characters for all to be able to follow along and participate; language is either gender-neutral or gender-inclusive; and there are notes and explanations that can provide a fuller understanding of the worship experience for those who are interested. It was the unanimous recommendation of the Ritual Committee, with the approval of the Board, that KKBE adopt this new prayer book with the continuing hope of making our High Holy Day services as meaningful and spiritual as possible for our entire community.

This three-part workshop is designed to help all who wish to gain a familiarity with some of the books' new features. The June session will look at Rosh Hashanah liturgy, the July session will look at Yom Kippur, and the August session will focus specifically on music.
