CELEBRATE ROCKDALE'S BICENTENNIAL WITH A TRIP TO ISRAEL!

Our entire Rockdale Temple family looks forward to the coming year, 2023–24/5784, in which we'll celebrate 200 years of our *Kehal Kodesh*—sacred community. There will be a myriad of opportunities to celebrate, learn, reflect, and come together to mark this milestone. Looking to the end of this landmark year, there will be a truly unique opportunity to rejoice together—with a congregational trip to Israel!

After waiting eight long years, our Cincinnati Jewish community will once again be traveling together on a community mission to Israel, July 7–16, 2024! Rockdale, along with other congregations and a few organizations, will have our own buses and itinerary, coming together as a congregational family to experience the trip of a lifetime.

Registration will open on April 30, 2023, with an early bird discount offered to those who register in the first month. Thanks to the Jewish Foundation of Cincinnati, generous subsidies are available of \$4,000/traveler with a \$12,000 household maximum. We anticipate the ground cost of the trip to be about \$6,000/traveler, not including airfare. I am working to create an exciting itinerary with our community's tour company, J², and look forward to sharing it with you soon.

Whether you're ready to sign on the dotted line, interested in the trip, or just curious, here are a few next steps:

- 2. Attend an informational meeting for Rockdale members on Wednesday, May 3rd.
- 3. Talk to friends and family about traveling together!

In the Book of Nehemiah, we hear of the first ever public Torah reading. It describes a scene where Torah is read and translated, ensuring all in attendance had a sense of its teaching. After the reading, it says, "*Ezra opened the scroll in the sight of all the people.*" (Neh 8:5) This is the foundation for the ritual of *hagbah*, of lifting the Torah for all to see.

For many people, they don't usually see the inside of a Torah scroll closely aside from lifecycle moments of B'nei Mitzvah and Confirmation. A few weeks ago at our family retreat at Hueston Woods, we opened the Torah scroll and lifted it up during our Torah reading. While this is a Sephardic practice and not usually one our primarily-Ashkenazic community engages (except for Simchat Torah when we unroll the whole Torah scroll), as Rabbi Kahan and I chanted *Shirat HaYam*, the Song of the Sea, we wanted everyone to see what it looked like in Torah. This is the text that our member, Magnus Knudsen, is lifting up on our front cover.

Why does it matter if we hear the words of Torah being chanted that we also need to see them? I would suggest two reasons: The first being that this practice meets the needs of both oral and visual learners; to hear and see in order to know and understand. The second is that being witness to Torah is an honor, a moment of distinction that truly belongs to us all as we claim its teachings and meaning in our own lives.

The Festival of Shavuot celebrates the powerful moment of receiving Torah and encourages us to embrace and be inspired by the wisdom Jewish tradition has to offer. The observance of Shavuot typically includes a late-night study in addition to our festival worship. This reflects the very first Torah reading by lifting up the importance of not just reciting the words, but actually hearing them in accessible ways and having a sense of their meaning.

As we celebrate Shavuot at the end of May, we are excited to engage in some wonderful Torah learning with poet, liturgist and scholar, Alden Solovy. His new book, *These Words: Poetic Midrash On The Language Of Torah*, ties in beautifully with our study theme for this year exploring the art of translation. Rather than a late-night study, we hope you join us for a Shavuot Sunrise Study & Breakfast on Friday, May 26 at 9am, followed by our Shavuot Festival Morning & Yizkor Memorial Service at 10:30am.

As I like to say, "It's good Torah!" Looking forward to our study and celebration in May!

As Rockdale Temple enters our 199th year, we are less than a year away from our official 200th anniversary in January 2024! Our Bicentennial festivities will begin on September 30, 2023 on the afternoon of Sukkot, and our gala anniversary celebration weekend will be January 26–28, 2024. On behalf of the Bicentennial Campaign Committee chaired by Dr. David Schwartz and Josh Shapiro, I am pleased to announce that our Bicentennial Campaign to endow the Senior Rabbi position has reached and exceeded our \$1,000,000 goal. We began the quiet phase of the campaign in the late Fall of 2021, and met overwhelming success thanks to our dedicated campaign solicitors and our generous congregants and friends of Rockdale. To those of you who have already contributed, thank you for your support of this important initiative. If you have not yet made a donation, we hope you will help us reach our next goal of 100% congregational participation. We want everyone to be included!

I hope you had the opportunity to take our Congregational Survey to determine our members' skills, talents, hobbies, and passions, and to let us know how you would like to be engaged and involved, especially as we approach our 200th anniversary year. If you haven't already completed the survey, please take a few minutes to do so. We hope you will also indicate in which of our many affinity groups and committees you would like to participate. We have wonderful ways to involve everyone, from our youngest FoRT (Families of Rockdale Temple) members to our Seniors (ages 75+) who have been enjoying monthly programming. We recently received a generous grant from the Jewish Home of Cincinnati to enhance our programs and transportation for Rockdale's Seniors, especially leading up to and during our Bicentennial year.

Recently, a congregant who is newer to Cincinnati and Rockdale asked me why we refer to our congregation as "Rockdale" Temple. I explained that our fourth home, built in 1906, was located in South Avondale at the corner of Rockdale and Harvey Avenues, and eventually, members began referring to it as Rockdale Temple. So even when we moved to our next congregational home on Ridge Road in 1969, the Rockdale name for our historic congregation remained.

Included in this issue are our plans for Purim, Passover, Shavuot, and Confirmation this Spring. I look forward to seeing you at Rockdale throughout the next few months.

Message from Executive Virector Lisa Schneider





As lifelong members, our Rockdale Temple has always played an important role in the life of our family. Lori's parents, Sue and Skip Richard, set the example especially with Sue becoming Rockdale's first woman President. As young girls, Sally and Lori would almost look forward to Religious School at "Old" Rockdale as mom usually picked us up with a bag of White Castles! Those were the very early days when we sang in the choir with Student Rabbi Mark Goldman as our choir leader.

From "Old" Rockdale to "New" Rockdale, we have enjoyed seeing our family photos along the photo hallway. Observing the Women of Rockdale create, taste test, and publish the In the Beginning cookbooks brought a sense of pride in what Rockdale could make happen. Jim's devotion to Judaism led to conversion study with the celebration ceremony in New York City by Rabbi Richard S. Chapin, fellow alumnus of Lori's Hamilton/Kirkland College. Through our NYC travels and Jersey life, it always brought us joy to find previous Rockdale Religious School teachers—now Rabbis—at each town we chose as home until we returned to Cincinnati.

Shortly after we returned to Cincinnati, sadness entered our family when Lori's brother Eddie was killed in an automobile accident. Rabbi Mark Goldman came to Cincinnati prior to his installation to officiate at Eddie's funeral—a somber, meaningful memory for us all that was blessed with kindness. And who lived on the same street as us at our first Cincinnati home but Rabbi Randi Musnitsky, one of Rockdale's rabbinic interns and

then Assistant Rabbi! Our second Cincinnati home also brought a great rabbinic connection. The boys' favorite babysitter was Shena—now Rabbi Shena Potter Jaffee. I remember well the moment when teenage Shena shared her future hopes and dreams and knowing that the rabbinate would likely be a part of her path. Those were great early years.

Becoming involved with Rockdale seemed obvious! Involvement was key through participation on various Rockdale committees including




elementary, high school, and adult education, social action (yes, Rabbi Sissy Coran, z"l, and Lori came up with the ongoing annual event of Mitzvahpalooza!), and our Board of Directors. We raised all three of our sons at Rockdale. Lifecycle events including weddings (Rabbi Norman Cohen married us), Bar Mitzvahs (and Lori an adult B'nai Mitzvah with Rabbi Coran's, z"l, first group in 2008), Confirmations, and so on. Sharing the observance of Shabbat and the practice of yoga with our Shal-OM yoga circle brought a sense of community for those who sought an alternative spiritual connection under our Rockdale roof or by Zoom in our sacred homes. 

Meet The Congregants: The Shaiman Family by Linda CHATTERJEE

When Jason and Amy Shaiman visited Rockdale with their son, Teddy, for Purim in 2017, they felt immediately welcome, finding the atmosphere to be very relaxed without pressure to join. They had been "Shul-shopping" and were impressed that the Rockdale Community cared about people and accepted everyone.

The Shaimans reside in Oxford, OH where Jason is the Curator of Exhibitions at the Art Museum at Miami University. He was born in Brooklyn, New York, but grew up in the suburbs of Philadelphia. His parents encouraged him and his brother to go through the Bar Mitzvah experience, even though they considered themselves more spiritual than religious and were not regular attendees at their congregation. After becoming Bar Mitzvah, Jason said he was "done". He chuckles that his brother was interested enough in religion to continue through Confirmation but is not religious now, whereas Jason now happily keeps a Kosher home. Jason went on to study Art History at a state college in Pennsylvania, before graduate work at the University of South Carolina. He accepted his current position at the museum in 2010.

As Jason settled into life in Oxford, numerous people asked him if he knew a delightful Jewish woman who worked on campus. Friends were also recommending Jason to Amy, and of course they were right. The marriage was "bashert".

Amy was born in Cleveland, OH, her father's hometown, but she grew up in suburban Minneapolis with visits to Cincinnati, her mother's hometown. In 1987, she started studying Chemistry at Miami but was inspired to switch to Comparative Religion, and later attended Hebrew Union College. She enjoyed working in various congregations across the country from Montana to Ohio, including tutoring B'nei Mitzvah students at Wise Temple. Her first year at HUC was spent in Israel. It was Amy's first visit to Israel and she loved it. During Passover that year, Amy was invited to a family Seder where the custom was to share stories. The father shared stories of his own military experience with his daughter who was about to start her military service. He had never told her those stories before, and Amy found it very moving. Her own grandfather had fought in WW2 and her great-grandfather in WWI but they had never talked about it. "It pulls people together," she says, and when she returned to Cincinnati, she served as a Chaplain Candidate in the Naval Reserves.

In the mid 2000s, she worked for Hillel at Miami, work that included organizing groups of people to visit Israel. She recalls one group with participants from 13 countries. Covid prevented Amy from going back to Israel with Jason and their son, Teddy who was born in 2013, but she hopes to take them soon and show them her favorite places.

The Shaimans enjoy the Kehal Kodesh Family Retreats—Amy teaches the combined 2nd and 3rd grade class and also serves on the In the Beginning Endowment Fund Committee for the Women of Rockdale. Jason is active on the Temple Membership Committee and in The Men of Rockdale group. Teddy looks forward to seeing his Kehal Kodesh friends, especially his 4th grade classmates. Most Friday nights, they stream Rockdale services online and have Shabbat dinner as a family before watching a Star Wars series or playing with Legos, two things that Teddy enjoys. Not all bugs are bad! In fact lots of insects are beneficial to the garden! These helpful bugs aid in decomposing plant material, pollinating crops, and devouring pests. For this reason, you should consider keeping them in your garden or yard. We know the good that comes from common pollinating insects, like bees and butterflies, but there are others who bring benefits such as lacewings (chrysopidae), a native insect found all over North America.

Commonly used in the garden for non-toxic pest control, lacewings are voracious eaters of many soft-bodied insects



that attack plants, such as aphids, small caterpillars, mealybugs, moth eggs, and mites. They are attracted to beneficial plants such as daisies, dandelions, asters, coreopsis, dill and angelica. The Rockdale Environmental Committee will be giving each family from our Kehal Kodesh Religious School Green Lacewings as a last day of Religious School parting gift. Please help us reduce our need for pesticides and introduce the Green Lacewing into your garden, yard, or nearby green space.

Try new actions as we raise environmental awareness!

The Environmental Committee and RUACH (Rockdale's 20s & 30s group) teamed up to maintain the Rockdale hillside. Rockdale members periodically remove invasive plants and replace them with native flowers and trees. Even with limited maintenance, the small restored ecosystem looks very different from the adjacent hillside. Rather than an impenetrable understory of the nonnative and shallow-rooted honeysuckle, you can see an open environment with surprising plant biodiversity including coneflowers, goldenrod, joe pye weed, and milkweed. We know deep-rooted native plants better prevent erosion and slope failures, manage water, and support birds and helpful insects such as bees. The cool, wet Fall is a favorite time to install plants and over-winter seeds. Rather than fret about unpredictable spring weather or hot and dry summers, our plants will sleep all winter and will be well established to grow in the Spring. In addition to a mix of wildflower seeds collected in late Summer in our

area, we installed six more shrubs, including arrowwood

viburnum, fragrant sumac, and lead plant. Native plants





ABORTION ACCESS IS EVERYONE'S CONCERN

Shortly before writing this article, I spoke with a fellow congregant who talked about the last generational fight for abortion access during the 1960s and 1970s. There's a lot about the landscape that has changed in the preceding decades. However, one thing that remains true is that the groups fighting to restrict abortion access then and now, say that they are fighting for Christian values. Of course, these groups do not speak for all Christians. Across many issues, the Justice Collaborative, and the Reform Movement more broadly, have built coalitions with like-minded Christians. However, the Christian groups that are fighting to eliminate access to abortion are pushing to assert a narrow ideology on all of us. There are so many reasons to support abortion access: a pregnant person's right to bodily autonomy, pushing back against patriarchal dominance, increasing access to healthcare, to name only a few. The myriad of issues abortion touches is why this has become such a focus for groups that insist on forcing their ideology on all of us. There's a reason why it seems all Jewish denominations are against a hegemonic view of abortion.

We, as Reform Jews may approach this issue differently from Orthodox Jews, though Jewish law clearly permits and even insists on abortion in certain cases. What unites us, along with many others, is that we do not want one perspective mandated on all of us. In a pluralistic democracy, we all deserve the ability to determine what is the right decision when we are dealing with issues that have differing moralistic perspectives. If you have been in the fight for decades, if you are new to the fight, or if you don't think this is your fight, it is crucial to acknowledge how a hegemonic force exerting their will upon us does not make anyone safer. This is all of our fight because we need to protect pregnant people, and people with wombs, and women, and anyone else who deserves the right to determine what is right for themselves. Abortion is the start of many of the issues we fight for because we cannot allow a single narrow viewpoint to be the law. And so we must draw the line here. So join us in pushing back against hegemonic perspectives. And join with all other minorities and marginalized groups that deserve to make their own determinations about their own bodily autonomy. 
