A Message from Rabbi Simon

FOUR NEW QUESTIONS TO ASK AT YOUR SEDER

As you get ready for your Pesach seder (or sedarim, if you are having or attending two) may I suggest four additional/new questions which will spark some interesting discus-

sions around the Passover table? I leave it to your discretion as to how and when these questions should be raised. When the Hagadah asks, Mah Nishtanah Ha Laila Ha Zeh?, we can answer: this night is different because we are asking new questions that help us explore what Passover means to us in our life, in 2024.

- 1. Question #1 Getting rid of the hametz in your life? Most of us know that we are forbidden to consume hametz (anything with leaven) during Passover. We are also commanded to remove all hametz from our homes as well. While it is true that the primary definition of the word hametz is "puffed up" (which is what the leaven does) the word hametz also has the meaning of sour or bitter. It is this secondary meaning that gives rise to our question. If we are to get rid of food hametz from our homes, is it possible that we are also COMMANDED TO RID OURSELVES OF THOSE THINGS THAT MAKE US BITTER/SOUR HUMAN BE-INGS? Another way to ask this is- what prevents you from becoming a more happy, contended, and grateful human being? Are you too filled up with the chametz of resentment and bitterness?
- 2. Question #2 What are our modern Plaques? In the Hagadah we recall the 10 plagues that God visited on the Egyptians. Assuming that a plaque is designed to devastate and overwhelm us, what do you think are the worst modern plagues that threaten us? And, to add an additional challenge to the question, are there certain human qualities that people exhibit that, to your mind, have the potential to plague us as a society?
- **3. Question #3** The Paschal lamb gave up his life so you could put his shankbone on your Seder plate. What are you willing to sacrifice?

The lamb that was offered up to God as a sacrifice was called a korban- which translates as "coming close to something". As we offered up/sacrificed our valuable lamb to God, we gave up something important in order to get closer to God. What are you willing to give up/sacrifice to come closer to your wife, husband, parent, or child?

4. Question #4 - The contemporary QUESTION no one wants to ask! If you remember, Pharaoh wanted to destroy the Hebrews because he felt they had the capacity to be disloyal to him. So, in 2024, the question becomes, if you are a Democrat, are you disloyal to Judaism, a "bad" Jew? And if you are a Republican, do you feel you are uniquely loyal to Judaism, a "good" Jew? Do all of you Democrats hate Israel? If you are a Republican, why are you at the same table with the "bad and disloyal" Jews?

I hope these questions will enliven your Seder and enrich your Passover observance.

UKRAINE: A JEW ISH PARADOX

As much of the world expresses sorrow and solidarity with the Ukrainian people and its admirations for its president Volodymyr

Zelensky, the irony of history abounds. It is a source of near incredulity that the same recurrent site of mass violence against Jews is home to a fledgling democracy and an unlikely and inspiring Jewish president.



Ukraine was one of Europe's most incorrigibly anti-Semitic countries and in the 1930's and 1940's was a blood land for Jews orchestrating some of the darkest and tragic pages in the history of the Jewish communities of Ukraine.

Beginning with the 1648-49 Cossack uprising led by Bohdan Khmelnytsky, and then more than a century later the massacres carried out by Ivan Gonta, Ukraine really began to escalate its hatred of Jews. During the 19th century waves of anti-Jewish pogroms occurred in the midst of extraordinary political upheaval unleashed by the assassination of Tsar Alexander II and the failed 1st Russian

Revolution in 1905. Then, there was the exceptionally brutal Russian Civil War in 1917 in which more than 100,000 Jews were murdered in the towns and cities of Ukraine, as different armies and troops vied to control the territories of the former Russian Empire.

The culmination of the darkness came during World War II when the Germans invaded the Soviet Union in 1941. They came with special forces called "Einsatzgruppen". Their sole purpose was to kill all civilians perceived to be enemies of Nazi Germany, especially the Jews. They were assisted by thousands of Ukrainians who relished in the extermination of their Jewish neighbors. Most were shot to death close to where they lived, not deported to camps. The most infamous was the massacre at Babi Yar, where 33,771 Jewish men, women and children were forced to dig the pits, then shot at close range and dumped in the vast ravine. An estimated one and a half million Jews were killed in Ukraine from 1941-1944. The holocaust remains the most somber page in the history of the Jews in that region. The great writer Vasily Grossman described a Ukraine in which "there are no Jews nowhere.... stillness, silence, a people have been murdered".





And yet, this is the Ukraine that is the homeland of Volodymyr Zelensky, the Churchillian president, elected in a landslide. A Jewish hero, the descendant of holocaust survivors, who had, at the outset, nothing to take on the Russian giant but just his country's hard-won liberty. A glorious stand straight out of a biblical tale, a modern day David taking on Putin's Goliath.

The Brotherhood wishes all a good and meaningful Passover.

What is Chametz?

Chametz (also spelled "hametz" or "chometz") is any food product made from wheat, barley, rye, oats or spelt that has come into contact with water and been allowed to ferment and "rise."

In practice, just about anything made from these grains—other than Passover Matzah, which is carefully controlled to avoid leavening—is to be considered chametz. This includes flour (even before it is mixed with water), cake, cookies, pasta, breads, and items that have *chametz* as an ingredient, like malt.

With Passover around the corner there are my Maxwell House Haggadahs? How did my grandmother make her matzo balls so fluffy? At whose house will we celebrate the second seder this year? Even with all these questions (and more!) crowding for attention in my brain, this year I cannot stop thinking

about the opportunities Passover presents to educate the children of our community. After all, consider what Moses himself is said to have imparted to the Israelites on the eve of the very first Passover: in the 12th and 13th chapters of Exodus, Moses three times reverted to the themes of children, education and the distant future.

"And when your children ask you, What does this ceremony mean to you?" (Exodus 12:26)

"On that day tell your son, I do this because of what the Lord did for me when I came out of Egypt." (13:8)

"In days to come, when your son asks you, What does this mean?" (13:14)

That's right: in the midst of our people's liberation from are so many things to think about. Where Egypt Moses spoke not just about freedom but also about education. Rather than focus on the here and now he had his sights set on the distant future, not on adults, but on children. In so doing he recognized that the miraculous events that led to the Exodus would soon fade out of memory if we don't actively work to remember them.

> More than 3000 years later, Passover remains our people's preeminent opportunity to teach our children about their heritage and religion. So yes, while recipes and routines may be what we first think of as the holiday approaches, I think it is important to remember that the purpose of these rites and rituals is to light a fire in our children that will continue to burn long into adulthood. In other words, while we should certainly enjoy the food, friendship, and family that this time of year engenders, we should also take the time to provide our children with the deeper meanings and history that underpin our Seders. So this year, as you sit down with your family to read through the Haggadah, eat karpas, and sing Dayenu, I hope you will take the time to continue the work of discussing the importance of these and other traditions to the next generation.



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
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
