THE RABBI COMES CLOSE TO JUMPING OFF THE DEEP END ... WHY IS HE WRITING ABOUT CHRISTMAS, THE SIMON FAMILY CHRISTMAS TREE AND IN JANUARY?

This is a true story. No names have been changed. I tell this story in some form or another every year because technically, you will think this is a sto-

ry about Christmas, Chanukkah, and the Simon family Christmas tree. It's much deeper than that. And it's the story of my first religious revelation. God did not speak to me in 1964, but in 1964, my Christmas tree did.

In 1964, I was fifteen years old. Even though I am living in Oakland (5 minutes from Berkeley), the craziness, the frenzy, and controversies of the 1960's have not really begun. It was a simple life. I got my haircut every two weeks. even if I didn't need it. The biggest excitement of my life in 1964 was the monthly arrival of NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC magazine. Without going into graphic detail, NG had pictures, color pictures, lots of color pictures.

I was a third generation Classical Reform Jew. My temple was one of the oldest Classical Reform temples in the country. My Rabbi only had a few mantras-"We are Americans, we love America. We are proud to be Jewish, but we are not crazies who want to move to Israel. Do you want to be a better Jew? Then be a better American! In America, our neighbors have Christmas trees. IT IS OK FOR JEWS TO HAVE A CHRISTMAS TREE."

For many years, our family had a real tree, not some phony aluminum job. Every Jewish person I knew had a tree, and we decorated our tree with lights, ornaments and blue and white tinsel. We didn't have a Baby Jesus or a Cross on the top of the tree, because we were Americans. Besides, it was only a tree. So, we made latkes and Christmas cookies. We ate Chanukah gelt and Christmas candy. I got double presents- Chanukah and Christmas. What a life! And then, in that December of 1964, disaster struck, and

my perfect holiday world was destroyed, all because of Rick Tomasco.

Rick was a Senior at Bishop Odowd high school- the preeminent elite Catholic high school for boys. As I remember, he was very committed to his faith, and he took it very seriously. He was very interested discussing the differences between Judaism and Christianity, but our discussions never became too deep because when he asked questions about Judaism I had very few answers. I didn't know much about Judaism and frankly, I wasn't interested. When I was 15 only three things interested me- 1) How to meet girls, 2) How to persuade girls to go out with me, and 3) How to get girls to make out with me.

As Christmas approached in 1964, I proudly showed Rick our beautiful tree. He didn't say much but I could tell he was angry and/or confused about the Simon tree. I tried to explain to him that the tree was secular- it is just a tree-what is the big deal? Just look around, I said, and see how Christmas had become one big secular national holiday. I remember him patiently explaining in detail the religious significance of the tree. The tree represented the resurrection and immortality of Jesus-and the wood used for his crucifixion. It turns out that everything connected to the tree as well as all the symbols of Christmas had religious importance.

I remember him asking why would a Jew take a religious symbol of another faith and make those religious symbol secular? I don't remember what I answered, but I'm sure that my answer was vague, ignorant, embarrassing or a combination of all of the above.

Here now comes my religious revelation- It began in 1964, but I would not fully comprehend its complete meaning until I was in Rabbinical School 15 years later.

know what is happening.



The revelation was this--in my theft of his religious symbols, in my fumbling attempt to create a secular holiday called Christmanukah, as I cannibalized his holiday (searching for the parts I wanted and could use) I displayed profound ignorance and disrespect for Christianity as well as disrespect for Judaism. In 1979, I finally understood that Rick's questions boiled down to one big religious question. WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO YOU TO BE A JEW? In 1964, I had no answer for him or for myself. And in 1979, I now understood the words of Rabbi Harold Schulweiss, who wrote, "being different is hard enough but to be different for no apparent reason – THE REWARD IS WORSE THAN THE PUNISHMENT."

Soon after Christmas, I posed Rick's questions to my mother. She had no clear or convincing answer as to why we needed a tree. But in 1965, one year later, there was no tree in our living room. There was no big

discussion, but the tree was gone, never to re-appear in our house.

Friends, this is my story-it is not your story. I tell you this because if you wish to quote or "cannibalize" my words so you can use them as a sword to attack others-this is not fair to me or anyone. I love this story because at its heart the story and Chanukah raise serious questions -WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A JEW? ARE WE CONTINUING TO GROW JEWISHLY? And here is one final question for all parent and grandparents-What kinds of messages (or mixed-up mesaages) are

we sending to our children/ grandchildren via our religious behavior?

Crafting Your Legacy Through a Donor Advised Fund

A donor advised fund (DAF) is a personal philanthropic fund that allows you to donate to multiple charities and causes over a period of years while receiving an income tax deduction at the time the fund is established. A DAF allows you to make charitable gifts to Temple Beth- El and the other charities of your choice when you feel the time is right.

A DAF can be established with TOP Jewish Foundation or the Community Foundation, a division of the United Way of Volusia and Flagler Counties. Temple Beth-El works well with both organizations and donations can be made in the form of cash, securities or other assets.

Here's how it works:

When you are ready to discuss your philanthropic goals, contact David Sacks at 386-561-7165 discuss your goals and objectives. These discussions are strictly confidential.

David will put you in touch with TOP or the Community Foundation who will draft a DAF agreement for you to review. The agreement documents your gift and ensures that your donation is directed to the Temple and other charities of your choice.

You can make donations to Temple Beth-El and the other charities of your choice from your DAF on a one-time or multiyear basis.

After your lifetime, your DAF can continue to operate and make distributions or the remaining assets can be distributed to the Temple and the other charities you designate as your final beneficiary.

We encourage you to speak with your attorney or tax advisor about establishing a DAF and other ways to ensure your legacy as this article should not be construed as tax or legal advice.

7 Concrete Ways You Can Help Israel

Following are ideas provided by our Interim Senior Rabbi Jim Simon:

- 1. <u>TZEDAKAH-</u>There are many worthy organizations in Israel that benefit from your generosity. Before you donate to an Israeli charity, make sure you know who the primary sponsor is. Do not forget to use CHARITY NAVIGATOR. I personally recommend your <u>gift</u> be sent to the Volusia/Flagler Jewish Federation, since all Jewish Federations in the USA are currently raising funds via one single unified campaign. The Reform, Conservative and Reconstructionst movements are also part of this unified campaign.
- 2. BROADEN YOUR KNOWLEDGE ABOUT ZIONISM, ANTI-SEMITISM and the MODERN STATE OF ISRAEL. **Two outstanding histories are Howard Sachar's**, *A HISTORY OF ISRAEL*, **and Walter Lacquer's** *A History of Zionism*. A great book on Anti-**Semitism is Prager and Telushkin's** *WHY THE JEWS? THE REASON FOR ANTI-SEMITISM*.
- 3. <u>BUY ISRAELI PRODUCTS wherever/whenever you can.</u> If it is made in <u>Israel</u>, you are helping Israel's economy.
- 4. <u>STAY INFORMED ON DAY-TO-DAY DEVELOPMENTS IN ISRAEL</u> Two good sources are the Jewish Telegraphic Agency (JTA) and the Jerusalem Post online edition. If you have Spectrum cable then you have the JEWISH BROADCAST NETWORK on Channel 198/199. JBN features many news programs from Israel
- 5. ARE YOU OR ANYONE YOU KNOW GOING TO ISRAEL? Whether the trip is next month or in June, go online to find out how you can buy/send/bring scarce medical items very much needed in Israel. IF YOU OR A FRIEND ARE GOING to Israel there are many volunteer organizations that would be thrilled to have your help for a day, two or three.
- 6. ISRAEL BONDS!!!! A great way to help Israel. When you buy Bonds, you are making a moral investment in Israel. Go to the Israel Bonds website and discover many different options you have to buy Bonds. Why not buy an Israel Bond in honor of the upcoming 2026 Bar Mitzvah of your (less than) favorite grand- nephew, SCHMENDRICK?
- 7. WRITE YOUR US REPRESENTATIVE AND/ LOCAL STATE REPRESENTATIVE ...WHY? It can be very help-ful. Congressional Representatives are the best to contact about Israel. Your state representatives in Tallahasee are the ones to contact about Anti-Semitism since they have oversight/authority whenever issues of anti-semitism arise. Since all elected officials get many phone calls and e-mails, a hand-written note may have more impact.

The Jewish Queens of Comedy

If Jewish men were the Kings of Comedy then, indubitably, the Jewish women were the Queens. Comedy has been a systemically miso-

gynistic field both because of the way men monopolized creative control and because the content of many comedian's acts are deeply disparaging of women. Consequently, comedy has been such a difficult field for women, especially Jewish

forced their way into a hostile industry leading the way for Joan Rivers, Roseanne Barr, Sara Silverman, Gilda Radner, Amy Schumer, Selma Diamond, Totie Fields, Belle Barth, Pearl Williams, Bea Arthur, Estelle Getty, Judy Holliday, Madeline Kahn, Lisa Kudrow, Elaine May, Molly Picon, Maya Rudolph, Phyllis Diller and others.

Arguably, the first famous Jewish Female comedian in America was Fannie Brice. She did not conform to American ideals of "white beauty". She modeled herself into a professional female Jew creating characterizations that reflected the difficulties of assimilation. Brice played on several major aspects of the Jewess ste-

reotype. In particular, the way she juxtaposed the staging of her infantile jesters, the erotic inappropriateness of her body and her glamorous sophistication in real life. She was an extremely popular star who set the template for generations of female entertainers.

Jewish women on stage emphasized the excessive flexible knowledgeable physicality of the Jewess in their public personae. They are remarkable for making spectacles of themselves and giving voice to women who have traditionally been silenced in and by mainstream entertainment.

The routines of these women were as a way to ridicule and deflate themselves and their mainly Jewish audience. They always referred to themselves as "Dirty" rather than obscene. Conventional wisdom says that as women, in our society, age, they disappear from the public sphere and effectively become invisible - but not Jewish comediennes. They gain, not only, the perspective to laugh, but also the freedom to do so, and in this laughter is the potential for transgressive cultural criticism. They constantly adapt and change their comic personae as they

age and turn their routines outward challenging societal expectations about women's comedy.

Like their male counterparts they have demonstrated a superb wit, wonderful verbal skills and the masterful use of irony, satire and mockery. 
