Hoshana Rabba

The last day of Sukkot is called Hoshana Rabba, The Great Pleading. On each day of Sukkot, we pray for abundant water as we circle the synagogue. On the last day of Sukkot, Hoshana Rabba, we circle the synagogue seven times as we pray that the rain will fall like the leaves of the willow trees that we beat on the floor. Willow branches will be available in advance at the synagogue, so call ahead to pick up your set. Then join us online, on Zoom at 7:00 am on Friday, October 9th for Shacharit as we finish the Sukkot holiday.

Yizkor

There is a Yizkor service at the end of the Sukkot cycle of holidays as there is at the end of all the major holiday cycles on the Jewish calendar. Normally this Yizkor service is done after the Torah Service on Shemini Atzeret. Because we must do this online this year, and for the sake of those who do not use computers on Yom Tov, we will hold our Yizkor service on Friday, October 9th at 12:00 noon. Please bring your Yizkor book that was in your Rosh Hashana bags, and join us on our Zoom link for this annual memorial service.

Shemini Atzeret with A Special Guest Hazzan

This special holiday that is added to the joyful days of Sukkot is a separate holiday of its own. While we consider Sukkot as an international festival, with special offerings for all the nations of the world, Shemini Atzeret is an additional day that we can spend celebrating with God, one extra day. The key moment of the service is the prayer for rain, called "Geshem" that marks the importance of rain in Israel. This prayer at the beginning of the Musaf service will be chanted this year by a guest cantor, **Hazzan Mitchel Kowitz**, who will be joining us by Zoom from his home in St. Paul, MN. We hope you will join us for this special treat. Shemini Atzeret morning Service will begin at 10:00 am on Saturday October 10th.

Simchat Torah

Simchat Torah is "CRAZY HAT NIGHT." We invite everyone to join us virtually wearing their craziest hat. It is a night of fun and celebration of Torah. Because of COVID, this year, Simchat Torah will be observed virtually over Zoom. We will transfer all our joy over finishing our Torah readings and over our beginning again into a special online service, featuring singing and a "tour" of the Torah. Join us for the exciting happening on Simchat Torah night, Saturday, October 10th. The service begins at 6:00 PM.

Simchat Torah Honors

Come virtually celebrate with us on Simchat Torah morning as we complete the annual Torah reading cycle and hasten to begin the new cycle of reading. Our Zoom service will be a blend of tradition and silliness. A venerable tradition on Simchat Torah at the morning service is the special honor the person who has the *aliyah* with which we conclude the Torah cycle. This honor is called *chatan* (Groom) *Torah* and will be bestowed this year on Ron Abrahams, our past president and long-time volunteer both at BSBI and for other good causes in the community. The individual honored with the first Torah reading as we begin the Book of Genesis is called *kalat* (Bride) *B'reishit*. This honor will be bestowed upon Brina Abrahams. Brina is also a special volunteer on our board, in our office, as well as in the Kitchen. (There are many who have only come to shul if they know Brina is baking!!) Normally, on Simchat Torah we do seven processions with the Torah scrolls and dance with them to demonstrate our love of Torah. Because this year it will be a virtual service, we will have aliyot read from the Humash, and everyone will be invited to participate. The service, on Sunday, October 11th begins at 10 AM.

Moshe Daniel Levine, an educator and Rabbinic Fellow at Temple Beth Tikvah, wrote recently in an article entitled, "Synagogues Once Saved Judaism, Now They are Needed to Save Jews", "A recent article by the Forward quotes an extensive survey delineating that individuals belonging to a religious community during this

time feel significantly less lonely than their nonreligious counterparts. It's important to note that this is irrespective of one even attending any sort of events — whether in-person or virtual. Rather, just the sheer act of being a part of a wider mission-driven community — especially a community that exudes as much hope as the Jewish community — can have a positive effect on one's well-being."

During the holiday of Sukkot, we leave our secure homes and eat our meals in the sukkah, a temporary shelter that is often a bit flimsy. We are not architects or builders, but we try our hand and create a place that is "good enough" for the week of the holiday. When it is over, we are glad to be back in our secure homes before the worst of the winter. We appreciate what we have more when we have to do without it for a while. Those of us who lost power during the last storm certainly do not take our electricity for granted anymore.

Some of us may feel similar feelings about BSBI. Our synagogue is always nearby; we can stop by when we need to in order to care for our spiritual needs. Most times we don't think about it much at all. We are proud, when we drive by, that this is "our" synagogue, but many days BSBI never really comes to mind. But during this pandemic, our need to be attached to this community is all the more important. Not just for those who were severely hurt by this plague; through loss of jobs, inability to pay rent, and the family crises that arise when money is tight, and feelings are on edge. But for all of us, isolated in our homes, unable to visit friends, our connection to the synagogue has been a life saver. It is in uncertain times like these that the constant support of our Jewish community can really make a big difference.

I know that at times, BSBI is not always in the front of your mind, but rest assured, you are on the forefront of our minds, you are the reason we keep these doors open, physically and virtually, to be there for you. The support you give us enables us to continue our holy work, to serve, in good times and bad, our Jewish community.

Words from the Co-Presidents



As we sat in the synagogue for High Holiday services last month, we could not help but think of the 12 feet around each of those present as a metaphor for the space between us all during this coronavirus epidemic.

For the majority of those participating over the internet, the space between us was considerable. We were in

different neighborhoods, in different towns, and, in some cases, in different states. By contrast, the space between us sitting in the shul was small, a matter of a few yards.

Yes, both involved an unnatural separation. Ordinarily, we would be standing in a reception line along with the Rabbi at the end of services, shaking hands with everyone and sharing our personal wishes for the New Year with each of you. In neither case was that possible.

At the same time, in many ways, the space between us when we cannot gather physically is not all that different from the small space between us at shul. We could see familiar faces, hold conversations, and wish each other well. We can do all that through virtual space as well. The major difference is one of routine and convenience. It is familiar and easy to see everyone at the shul over the holidays or through the usual events we like to attend. It can seem awkward and takes effort to connect without the usual structures that bring us together.

We are not all that outgoing. But because of our role as your presidents, we have found ourselves on the phone or the computer with many of you, for one reason or another. We are much better for it. We have never felt isolated from this community. You all share the same connections and people who care for you, but if you have not made that extra effort, not necessary during normal times, you may not feel the sense of community that we do.

Although the pandemic enforces a space between us, for many, that forced separation may only add to an existing issue. Whether it is physical distance, or limited mobility or even just an inability to drive in bad weather, some of the adjustments we have been forced into by the pandemic help to shrink that space between us under any circumstances and will continue to do so in the future.

BSBI offers religious and social programing that provides the opportunity to reduce that sense of space between us. We hope you find something that interests you. If you do not, we'd love to hear your ideas on other things we can offer. Rabbi Konigsburg speaks to people regularly who feel isolated. And you should not hesitate to reach out to any of your Temple friends; you may find that they feel the same as you do. As the old saying goes, to have a friend, be a friend. Nothing is better at reducing that space between us.

Jessie's Garden Update



Rabbi Richard Plavin Library





In his biography, author Adam Begley explores the life of Houdini, the world's greatest escape artist. It is the remarkable story of how an impoverished Hungarian-born rabbi's son achieved global fame as the world's greatest magician and the master of "self liberation."



Harry Houdini was born Ehrich Weiss on March 24, 1874 and died on October 31, 1926. To help support his family, he dropped out of high school, left home, and started a career as a magician. He felt show business would be his ticket out of poverty.

He first attracted notice in vaudeville and then on a tour of Europe, where he challenged police forces to keep him locked up. Soon he extended his repertoire to include chains, ropes slung from skyscrapers, straitjackets under water, and having to escape from and hold his breath inside a sealed milk can with water in it.

Houdini was often booed by Jew haters on his European tours. He was never ashamed to acknowledge that he was a Jew.

In his later years Houdini campaigned against mind readers, mediums, and others who claimed supernatural powers. He argued that they were charlatans who produced all of their effects through natural means and various tricks. He wrote *Miracle Mongers and Their Methods* (1920) and *A Magician Among the Spirits* (1924). Houdini and his wife, however, agreed to conduct an experiment in spiritualism: the first to die was to try to communicate with the survivor. His widow declared the experiment a failure before her death in 1943.

Adam Begley is the author of *Updike* and *The Great Nadar*. He was a Guggenheim Fellow, a Fellow at the Leon Levy Center for Biography, and for many years the books editor of the *New York Observer*.

IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

<u>Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)</u> In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a **perpetual endowment** fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to **Hineni**. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a **perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800** per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.





"Ever Cool" Capital Campaign Goal: \$500,000

Dear Friends,

Beth Sholom B'nai Israel is not a building. But if we have learned anything from our efforts to continue our spiritual, social and communal activities during the current pandemic, it is the importance of having a physical place to share our religious observances, the significant milestones in our lives, our charitable and social work, and our daily gatherings to break bread, share our interests and live as a community. We do the best we can in virtual space. Yet we yearn for the time when we can gather together, truly together, to learn, to pray, to share, to eat, and to laugh and cry. That time is coming soon.

When that time comes, we will need our facility to be functional and ready to fulfill our needs. As you have heard over the last year or more, the aging HVAC system in our building is in desperate need of replacement. Part of it is already broken, and its age prevents obtaining parts to continue its repair. The rest will soon follow. We must do something, and the time to do something is now.

The scope of the HVAC project has been defined, and we are in the process of taking bids. From all of this background work, we know that the cost of this project may approximate \$500,000. That is a very big number. Yet it is achievable if we, as a community, step forward to meet it.

We have established a capital campaign group to plan for the fund raising we need to accomplish this goal. Risa Filkoff, Marshall Grodofsky, and Jay Bigman have met and organized. Based on their exceptional work, we are now ready to move forward with the Ever Cool Campaign. The Ever Cool Campaign will fund this desperately needed project. Any monies received in excess of those needed to replace the HVAC system will go to a dedicated endowment fund for future building needs, including upkeep and maintenance of this system.

BSBI is exploring grants through our utility company, Eversource, to help defray some of the Project cost. But the vast majority of the funding will have to come from you, the members of our BSBI community. Fortunately, we do not start from scratch. Through the foresight of our community leaders decades ago, we have an Endowment Foundation that can provide substantial support. Many of the endowment funds are restricted to particular purposes, but the Endowment Trustees have determined that they can, consistent with their mission, make substantial funds available to help the Ever Cool Campaign, starting with an outright grant of \$50,000. That assistance continues with another \$100,000 matching challenge to all of us. Through this challenge, the Endowment Foundation will match the first \$100,000 in new monies actually received by the Ever Cool Campaign from our members.
