Faith, Hope, Prayer



Today I got my first dose of the COVID 19 vaccination. This means that by the second week of the Omer, I will have full immunity from this terrible disease that has separated us from our families, confined us to our homes and prevented us from being together as a congregation and as a community. If all of us who are able to be vaccinated were to do so as quickly as possible, it would

help us reopen our community and bring us all back together again.

Everyone is talking about "getting back to normal" but I don't think that we will ever be able to do things quite the way we did them before. Technology has come too far, and we have come to rely on it more than ever to connect with those who are far away. We have overcome the barriers of distance in ways we were never able to do before. Will offices move out of our homes? Will schools always use some forms of distance learning? Will a Bar or Bat Mitzvah, or even a funeral, need to be connected to family and friends who are far away?

And yet there are some things that will require us to be together. We have gone too long without the reading and study of Torah on Shabbat. While we have discussed many topics of interest based on the weekly parsha, we still need to hear the words of Torah chanted in the synagogue and to celebrate together the birthdays, anniversaries, and other passages of life with prayer, music, and the smiles of friends. Being able to sing together (which cannot be done on Zoom) and then to share a lunch, these are the simple pleasures that I hope we can return to soon. I, for one, will love turning off my phone and computer for Shabbat and Jewish Holidays and appreciate not having to return to them until after Havdalah.

The world has changed. It always is changing. This pandemic made some of the changes happen faster. Other things that might have changed were put on hold for the year. I think that all of us have changed as well. The pandemic taught us to appreciate who we are, how we are connected and the limits of what the internet can do. I am looking forward to having everyone back in their seats in the synagogue soon, but I am also looking forward to sharing a cookie, some hallah and kiddush after the service. The time may not be for a few months yet, but I look forward to when we can all bask in the light that already shines at the end of this tunnel.

Words from the Co-Presidents



We were not surprised to see a chart during the Sandals Lecture in March showing that Passover is the most celebrated of Jewish holidays. About 70% of all Jews (about 80% of Conservative Jews) participate in a Seder each year. In our experience, Passover also tends to inspire more comments than other holidays. People express appreciation for the

sense of community that comes with Seder attendance. Most seem considerably less enthusiastic about the dietary restrictions.

The data shared by the presenters during the lecture tended to reflect this dichotomy. Many Jews are happy to identify as Jewish. Not so many are inclined to follow Jewish law, support Jewish charities, or belong to Jewish organizations. Participation is particularly low with younger people. The numbers follow similar trends among people of other religions. The presenters did a fantastic job in explaining the facts. They were appropriately cautious in predicting what those facts might mean for the future.

BSBI is not immune from these trends. As with the Jewish community in whole, it is difficult to predict what this will mean for our long term future. We recently went through a Mid Term Planning process that helped us understand what we can expect for the next few years. BSBI expects to pursue a longer term strategic planning process to address the future.

Through the foresight and generosity of BSBI members past and present, including many of you, BSBI is much better situated to weather whatever comes than many other organizations. We have an endowment that provides generous support for our activities. We have many members who give added funds each year. We have plans to increase outreach. We watch our expenses carefully. And most of all, we continue to gather, in times of joy and sorrow, to share our lives and provide a supportive community. Each of us can help to sustain and grow that community by introducing it to our friends and others who may be interested in the same things that interest us. There is an old saying that predictions are difficult, especially about the future. A strong foundation for the future can grow from our best efforts in the present.

MEETING GOALS

When I begin the religious school year, I always set out with certain specific goals in mind.

For those who are learning to read Hebrew, my first goal is that by Chanukah, the students will be leading the Chanukah candle blessings; my next goal is that by Passover, the students will chant the 4 questions on Passover, and that by the end of the school year, they will be able to lead certain parts of the Friday evening service and know the Israel National Anthem, Hatikvah. I know that the parents are proud when their children take on these amazing feats.

For the older children, the goal is more about relevancy, deeper understandings of what participation in our services mean, as well as understanding the various symbols associated with our prayers, our holidays and our relationship with our Creator, as well as beginning to develop as sense of their own spirituality.

Most of the month of March was spent learning to understand the symbols of the Seder. I want our students to bring their understanding and add to their family sedarim at home.

Knowing that having a green on the seder plate represents our new season of spring, serving as a reminder to look outside to notice the world around us, to notice that the trees are beginning to bud and that little green leaves begin to break the soil, even if there is still snow, to show us the aliveness of the earth and to stand in awe. After all, standing in awe of what happens in front of us is how we begin to experience and understand our sense of spirituality. We then talk about dipping the greens into salt water, which represent tears of being a beaten slave.

Mixing the season of new hope with the sadness of tears reminds us that life is filled with moments of hope as well as moments of sadness. Same with mixing the charoset, the sweet mixture of nuts, apples, wine, and cinnamon, reminding us of the clay used to make brick by the slaves, maror/bitter herb/ horseradish, reminding us that slavery is bitter. We are also reminded that there are those who are still experiencing slavery in the world today. We cannot be totally free until everyone is free. As the words "Social justice" are major buzz words these days, we as Jews have always held them as deep Jewish values.

As the year begins to wind down, we will focus on Israel and its 73rd year, as well as what it means to be spiritual.

May we all continue to look for ways to make our traditions relevant with understanding and not to see what we do as archaic.

This is our role and what we are asked to do.

This Month in Jewish History By Rabbi Konigsburg 19 Nisan – 18 Iyyar

- **23 Nisan** Hebrew University, which was forced to suspend classes during Israel's War of Independence, resumed classes in temporary quarters on this date in 1949.
- **28 Nisan** Isidor Strauss (co-owner of Macy's) and his wife are among the dead after the sinking of the Titanic on this date in 1933
- **7 lyyar** Nehemiah dedicated the rebuilt walls of Jerusalem after the return of the Jews from Babylonian exile on this date in 443 BCE. Just over 500 years later, in 70 CE, on this same day, the Jewish defenders of Jerusalem would surrender this wall to the Roman army.
- 16 lyyar The US Seventh Army liberated the Dachau concentration camp on this date in 1945.
- 18 lyyar The Israeli Defense Army (Tzahal) was established by law by the Knesset in Israel on this date in 1948.

Dr. Allen Weg is a New Jersey Licensed Psychologist. He is Founder and Executive Director of Stress and Anxiety Services of New Jersey, an independent psychology group practice in Central New Jersey. He has been married for 34 years and has two children in their late 20s. His sister, Micki Starr, is a congregant here at BSBI.

Allen and Micki are "2Gers," second generation holocaust survivors. Their mother of blessed memory, Sylvia, was a survivor of Auschwitz. She died on February 8th, 2021, just two months ago, and would have been 97 years old on March 19th, one week before this year's Passover seders.

This Yom HaShoah presentation, "T'sili," as her family used to call her, is about the life of Allen and Micki's mother before, during, and after the Holocaust. The presentation will highlight photographs of the different eras in Sylvia's life.

Allen will share video snippets of Sylvia's Shoah Foundation interview done in the 1990s, which is now housed in the US Holocaust Memorial Museum in DC and available online. Allen will also share a bit of a video interview from just a year ago, when Allen interviewed his mom about her Holocaust experiences, which was filmed by Allen's son.

The presentation will also rely heavily on several hours of audio interviews that Allen taped of his mom in the very early 1980s.

As a psychologist, Allen will discuss the implications of

being the son of a survivor and will also share what the process was like when he interviewed his mother, as well as his impressions of her as an Interviewee. There will be time for questions.

Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks z"l, formerly Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the Commonwealth for 22 years, was an international religious

leader, philosopher, award-winning author and respected moral voice.

Rabbi Sacks authored over 35 books. The Rabbi Richard Plavin Library is pleased to have two of his books in our collection, *A letter in the scroll:* understanding our Jewish identity and exploring the legacy of the world's oldest religion and Lessons in Leadership: A Weekly Reading of the Jewish Bible.

As a biblical scholar, Rabbi Sacks published a new English translation and commentary for the *Koren Sacks Siddur*, the first new Orthodox siddur in a generation, as well as powerful commentaries for the Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, Pesach, Shavuot and Sukkot *Machzorim*. His *Covenant & Conversation* commentaries on the weekly Torah portion are read in Jewish communities around the world.

Rabbi Koingsburg has referenced Rabbi Lord Sacks in several of the weekly Shabbat morning parshiyot.

Rabbi Sacks, who passed away on 7th November 2020, aged 72 left behind a legacy as one of the greatest Jewish thinkers of the 20th century,

one who bridged the religious and secular world through his

remarkable and ground-breaking canon of work.

I've always figured that each cup is about 16 oz or so...I'm sure many of you agree. Of course, I'm writing this in March as I'm thinking forward to the Passover to come. We're making plans to get the kitchen and the cabinets clean and ready, and I often think about our ancestors. Sent into their homes, with livestock no less, I think about the very real threat that loomed over them. To lock away fearing for your own life is bad enough, but fearing the loss of a child?!? It would only be my wife's strength that would get us through such a time. I can imagine myself huddled with my boys close. And without realizing it, I think that it's just what we've done...each of us huddled away, fearing the loss of a child, our partners, and even ourselves, to the plague that we still now face.

Today, my wife and I decided to allow our first born son to return to in-person learning at school, believing and hoping that he will be protected. As I sat to write this, I realized the parallel, and to be honest, it has left me feeling a bit paralyzed. I've spent the last year with my children huddled so close, and I've lost track of how many times I have pleaded, *HaShem, protect my children from this*. I sincerely hope that soon, we'll come together to daven together, and that our ranks will be mostly as they were when we last met. And even though not all will be with us, I see this eventuality as not just a blessing, but a victory. It's a victory over death that many of our people through time have won. All while we have all lamented the absence in each other's lives, in many ways, what we're experiencing now is very much like a modern-day Passover.

IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

<u>Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)</u> In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a **perpetual endowment** fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to **Hineni**. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a **perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800** per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.




