Words from the Co-Presidents

Hanukkah, which derives from the Hebrew word meaning "to dedicate," commemorates the success of the Maccabean revolt against the Syrian Greek regime that had taken control of Judea in the Second Century before the common era. As the legend goes, when the Jews rededicated the Temple, there was only enough pure olive oil for the Temple's lamp to last one day, but the oil miraculously lasted the eight days it took to locate more. Jews have been celebrating the eight-day Festival of Lights ever since.

In many households, it is common to exchange gifts each day of the holiday. Here at BSBI, we feel like we have already received the equivalent of eight gifts in the past few months. They include:



- The arrival of the equipment necessary to complete phase II of the HVAC project in time for the High Holidays
- Securing Eversource's help in connecting the power necessary to complete phase II despite hurricane delays
- Installation of professional live stream system in time for the High Holidays
- The ability to accommodate everyone who wanted to attend High Holiday services in person
- Finding a new High Holiday Cantor who enhanced our holiday experience
- A return to in-person events, including B'nai Mitzvah, a Comedy Show, and the ability to enjoy breaking bread together
- Finding new help for Judy in the office in light of Tova's departure
- That all of this occurred without a COVID outbreak that jeopardized the health of our congregation

Some of these may seem miraculous, but most were accomplished through the efforts of people, fellow members of this congregation and staff, with a bit of help from above.

We do not celebrate Hanukkah in the hope of getting presents (although who doesn't like presents). We celebrate the freedom to worship imbedded in the Hanukkah story and the light in the darkness of winter that promises the return of warmer and longer days. We also hope you share the warm feeling that comes from the resilience and successes of this congregation in difficult times.


This Date in Jewish History 27 Kisley – 27 Tevet

- **27 Kislev** Shmuel Yosef Agnon and Nelly Sachs won the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1966, the first international recognition of a Hebrew writer.
- **6 Tevet** Dr. Sabato Morais started a new seminary in New York on this date in 1887. It would be the predecessor of the Jewish Theological Seminary. Of the eight students, one was Joseph Hertz, who would go on to be the Chief Rabbi of the British Empire.
- **15 Tevet** Prime Minister Menachim Begin and President Anwar el-Sadat met in Ismailia, Egypt in 1977 to discuss peace between the two countries.
- **15 Tevet** *Yahrzeit* of Rabbi Marshall T. Meyer, who brought Conservative Judaism to much of South America, and who revitalized Congregation Adath Yeshurun in New York City.
- **18 Tevet** *Yahrzeit* of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, one of the most important Jewish philosophers of the 20th century.
- **24 Tevet** *Yahrzeit* of Rabbi Isaac Klein, author of modern Handbook of Religious Jewish Practice for the Conservative Jewish community.

Faith, Hope, Prayer

It's December. For Jews, it is hardly "the most wonderful time of the year." We are celebrating Hanukkah at the beginning of the month and BSBI will host our Sixth Annual Jazz Festival on December 4th. Both are joyful events that are celebrated in December. But ever since Thanksgiving, another wonderful day celebrated by the Jewish community, all the rest of our country is focused on Christmas.

For years, the Jewish community wrestled with the "December Dilemma," i.e., how to navigate Christmas and everything that is connected to it. It is not just the interfaith families that have to make decisions how to steer through two very unequal holidays. Any Jewish family not very connected to their Judaism has trouble figuring out how to address this time of year. This year Hanukkah and Christmas are almost a month apart. There will be even less



So, what are Jews supposed to do for Christmas? The short answer is nothing. It is just not our holiday. We do decorations at Sukkot time. We give gifts to the poor on Purim. We celebrate our redemption on Pesach. If we try and co-opt Christmas for our Jewish homes, it would not be a celebration of Christmas, but for Christians, it would be offensive.

Yet just because we don't celebrate Christmas, does not mean we can't celebrate the holiday with our Christian neighbors. If a neighbor needs help selecting, bringing home, or decorating a tree for their home, there is nothing wrong with helping them celebrate their holiday. If we are invited to a holiday party, or receive a gift of Christmas cookies, or even get a Christmas card or two, we have not violated any aspect of our Judaism. If we have Christian relatives who invite us for Christmas at their home, there is no reason to separate ourselves from our family. While we should not bring Christmas into our homes, we can enjoy this holiday with those who do celebrate the holiday. Just as there is no crime in inviting Christians to our home to see Hanukkah lights and to enjoy latkes, there is no harm in being invited to join in a Christmas celebration (although Judaism does say to always pay attention to Shabbat and Kashrut).

It is harder where schools and organizations require their Jewish constituents to take part in holiday festivities. It is a struggle to get some schools to let Jewish children sit out the holiday activities. It is important that we share the ideas behind holidays with each other; coercion, however, is unacceptable. Even when government institutions try to be balanced and display several holiday symbols, it is not appropriate to display religious symbols in this country where government is forbidden to promote any one religion.

I do admit that over the course of December, the constant reminders of Christmas, the constant sounds of holiday music, the endless barrage of commercialism as we are implored to buy...buy...buy does get tiresome. I don't get into the shopping stuff, the Black Friday, the after-Christmas sales, the last-minute bargains. Mostly I stay out of the stores.

I feel for my clergy friends who fight like mad at this time of the year to try and get people to focus on the reason for the holiday celebration rather than the commercialism that tends to dominate the airwaves. Hanukkah is about religious freedom. Christmas is about bringing peace on earth. The theology of the holidays is sound; yet the constant barrage of commercials overwhelms the theology.

Christmas and New Year's Day are national holidays. Take a day off. Be respectful of those who celebrate these holidays. Learn about them. Wish your Christian friends a happy holiday. Santa Claus will bring presents and joy to those families who celebrate the day. Santa will not be visiting Jewish chimneys. That is OK. When the family time around the tree on Christmas morning is over and their family dinners are through; when church time and family time are over; there is no reason we can't sit down and watch a football game together.

And that is what makes this country great.

Having a Vision for Your Life

Where there is no vision, the people perish—Proverbs 29:18

In our religious school, many of our discussions examine personal visions. You may be surprised to learn this, but children do have their personal visions, even with their limited experience.

I learned recently about a Google staff member who suggested that rather than asking our kids what they want to "be" when they grow up, we should ask them what problems they wish to solve in the world. I found this conversation to be exciting because the focus of the conversation shifts to "What do I need to learn to be able to achieve that?" In other words, the more our children focus on what they would like to accomplish, the more likely they will be to succeed.

Nobel Laureate Isidor Rabi (Physics) was once asked why he chose to be a scientist. He answered that while most parents would ask their children if they had learned anything at school that day, his mother would greet him with, "Did you ask any good questions in school today?"

When we ask questions, we are on a mission to get an answer. We are motivated to learn and take an active role in our development. Those who ask questions pick up far more information than those who glide passively through their school years. And remember, asking questions is a very Jewish thing to do.

In Proverbs, we learn, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." This is true for nations, for communities, and for individuals. Every nation needs a vision of what it stands for and the role it hopes to play in the world.

If a nation lacks direction, it will ultimately fall into anarchy or under the power of another nation. In contrast, a country that rallies around strong ideals and values will be united and strong, achieving great things both for its people and for the world. The same is true for any community. If it supports strong ideals and values, it will achieve great things.

In the same way, if we as individuals do not know what we stand for or what we want to do with our lives, we can end up in confusion. Without clear direction in our lives, we are not likely to accomplish much. We are all given talents and abilities by God. We are all good at something. It is our job to discover our talents, form a vision, and create a mission for our lives.

When we know what problems we want to solve with our God-given abilities, we are already on our way to making great contributions. When we ask important questions, we are already on our way to becoming full of wisdom.

In this Chanukah season, I want to inspire you to encourage your children's vision and mission for their lives. Let us ask ourselves and our children these questions: What would we like to accomplish? What kind of person would we like to be? How do we want to be remembered? How can we serve God? Let us ask ourselves these questions frequently—and then live the answers.

WHAT DOES CHANUKAH MEAN, AND HOW DO WE SPELL IT ANYWAY? EDUCATION=DEDICATION

The word Chanukah means "dedication." The word comes from the Hebrew word "chinuch" which means "education." Is it any wonder that Jews have a full commitment and dedication to education and learning? The Jewish people have a tremendously full history, but unfortunately, many of us have huge gaps in our learning; we skip from Deuteronomy (the return to the Promised Land and the death of Moses) to the Babylonian exile, to the declaration of the state of Israel in 1948! The history of the Jewish people has made us who we are today. The struggle of the Maccabees to preserve our unique history continues today. As we light the lights of Chanukah, let's dedicate ourselves to knowing, and owning, our history.

By the way, we spell it: chet-nun-vav-kaf-hay!



IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

<u>Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)</u> In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a **perpetual endowment** fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to **Hineni**. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a **perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800** per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.

- Replace the lock under the black weatherproof cover



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
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
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
