Preparing for the Seder

- ♦ Make sure to start your preparations early enough.
- ♦ Invite as a guest someone who is far from his or her home.
- Have uniform Haggadot for everyone at the table so all can participate in the seder without difficulty. These Haggadot are in addition to the decorative ones, or ones of special interest.
- Select, in advance, sections of the Haggadah to be assigned for individual reading in English by those who may not be able to follow the Hebrew.
- ♦ Rehearse *mah nishtanah* with the child who will ask the four questions.
- Suggest that one of the children prepare a talk for the seder on freedom in modern times. A token gift can be given in appreciation.
- ♦ A Jewish book or other Jewish item is an appropriate gift for the child finding the afikoman.

B'dikat Hametz, The Search for Leaven


Thursday night, April 14th at your home

After the house has been thoroughly cleaned and prepared for Pesach, we search again for any crumbs that may have been missed; this serves as an educational ritual. Several pieces of hametz are "planted" around the house and then "found." This is done in a ritualistic manner utilizing a feather, a wooden spoon and a candle. The prayers to precede and follow the search may be found in your Haggadah. Be sure to include your children or grandchildren in this fun ritual.



Focus On Freedom

It is interesting that the very holiday that celebrates freedom is the holiday that has us so encumbered by many laws. We think that freedom is about doing whatever we want. This is just not so. We live in a society and in a culture that limit us in so many ways in order for us to be able to live together without the pain, the frustration, and worry that are so much a part of living a social life. We have freedom of speech, but we still can't call out "Fire!" in a crowded building. We can move about freely, but our freedom ends where the body of our neighbor begins. We can do whatever we want, but we still can't hurt another person, steal from



them, publicly embarrass them, or hurt their animals or property. These laws are designed so that we can live together without the many issues that arise when one person must interact with another.

But freedom is also a privilege that we all too often forget. We are so used to being free that we can't imagine what life might be without it. Slavery is still all too common in our world. I recently heard a report that at any simple nail salon it is possible that the people working there are not free, that they owe money to the people who own the shop and somehow they never earn enough to buy their way to freedom. Their "owners" move them from shop to shop so they never get to know that they can live their lives any other way.

Pesach is the one week a year that we affirm our freedom and affirm its value in our life. At the Seder we eat unleavened bread, the bread that slaves eat. We eat bitter herbs to remember the bitterness of slavery. We eat *haroset* to recall the mortar and bricks we were required to use to build cities for those who enslaved us. There is more that we should also remember: that our children, our babies, were thrown into the river so that we should not become "too numerous" for our masters. Sometimes our children were used to fill in the spaces between the bricks if a brick was not available. Sometimes our fellow Jews were whipped in anger, but they bore the lashes so that the old and the children should not have to suffer the lash.

Slavery may have changed, but freedom is still the same. The face of slavery is different, so that those who would enslave others can still create more evil in the world. Perhaps the worst slavery is when we enslave ourselves to bad habits, addictions, and anything that keeps us away from the people and places we love. The Hebrew word for Egypt is "Mitzraiyim." The word implies being stuck in a narrow place and we are unable to get out. Each of us has our own personal Mitzraiyim, our own narrow place where we are stuck in life. Pesach is the time when we see where we are stuck, and we begin to move our lives so we can be free.

Let us commit this Pesach to work for freedom for modern slaves and for our own personal freedom from whatever has us stuck in life.

Words from the Co-Presidents

Passover is a celebration of liberation. The holiday commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt.

We have been experiencing our own form of liberation over the past few months. Although we are not emerging from generations of oppression, and our recent liberation does not come "with a strong hand, and an outstretched arm, and with great terror, and with signs and wonders," the slow and steady lifting of COVID pandemic restrictions brings with it a return to freedoms many did not appreciate before they were lost. At BSBI, we are in the process of considering what restrictions we can lift, while maintaining the shul as a reasonably safe place for all. You should expect to hear more in the near future.



But there is much more to the Passover story than the freedom the Israelites ultimately obtained. One aspect in particular mirrors certain activity at BSBI. In Exodus, we learn that Moses was a reluctant leader. He questioned his worthiness and expressed concern about public speaking. At BSBI, our nominations committee sometimes hears similar reasons why people are hesitant to take leadership positions in our shul. But just as the Israelites needed Moses, our community needs you! No one is a perfect leader (believe us, we know), and those who express hesitance often have the combination of intelligence, humility, and competence that makes them invaluable.

BSBI has some openings for positions on our Board of Directors; consider volunteering for one. Even if you are not ready to take on a Board position at this time, there is room for you on one of the many committees that provide input and assistance to the functioning of and programs offered by BSBI. Involvement with BSBI's governance is not just an opportunity to give back to your community. It is also a chance to spend time with friends and share your talents with people who appreciate them. This year, as you enjoy a Passover meal with family and friends, recognize that your freedom to worship is carried out at BSBI, and give some thought to offering to help our community maintain its health and vigor well into the future.

Faith, Hope, Prayer

Passover is a holiday that is rooted in kindness.

We don't usually think of Pesach that way. When we think about Pesach we think about matza and Passover foods. We think about a long Seder and a family dinner. We think about Moses and Pharaoh and the struggle between them. We think about plagues and the death of the Egyptian first-born. We think about the victory of the Israelite slaves over the army of Egypt at the shore of the Reed Sea. Kindness is not the first thing we think about when it comes to Pesach.



But that is the way it is with kindness. It hides in the background where we hardly notice it, yet it is so often the fuel of every important human interaction.

We start with two midwives, who perform the first recorded act of civil disobedience, telling Pharaoh that there is no way for the Hebrew babies to be killed. There is Pharaoh's daughter, who takes in the infant Moses to raise as her own. There is Miriam, who watches over her brother when he is set adrift on the Nile. There is Moses, who defends the women who are harassed at the well. There is Jethro, who takes in the fugitive Moses. And then we who open our doors to those in need to eat at our Seder. We give the youngest child a part in our Seder so he or she will feel included. We take drops of wine from our cup of joy to remember those who died so we could be free. The entire prayer of Dayenu is about all the many acts of kindness that God did for us on our road to the Promised Land.

I know that Pesach is a stressful time of year. There is so much to do to get ready for this holiday. There are weeks of work to do to get our homes and kitchens ready. There is Hametz to remove and a Seder to plan. We need to sell our hametz and donate to Maot Hittim, so all families can have matza for Pesach. At this time of year acts of kindness go really far. Offering a helping hand, making an extra stop to help someone else, saying a kind word, helping someone deal with the stress, whatever it is that we can do, it will be remembered and appreciated for a very long time.

My family and I wish everyone a safe, healthy, and happy Pesach.

This Date in Jewish History 29 Adar II - 29 April

- **29 Adar II** On this date in 1957, the first immigrants to Israel to enter at the port of Eilat on a Jewish charter boat arrived
- **4 Nisan** The first performance of a Yiddish operetta marks the establishment of Yiddish theater in America in 1885
- **9 Nisan -** Yahrzeit of Saul Lieberman one of the greatest modern Talmudic scholars
- 17 Nisan The Jewish Welfare Board was established on this date in 1917 to provide for the cultural and religious needs of Jews in America's Armed Services.
- 28 Nisan Isador Straus and his wife both die on this day in 1912 with the sinking of the *Titanic*. On this same date in 1979 the peace treaty between Egypt and Israel went into effect.

How to Plan Your Seder: A Teaching Moment from Rabbi Alan

We all want our children to feel positive about being Jewish. A little bit of planning will create an warm and upbeat Seder experience. Anyone I have ever met who loved being Jewish, fondly remembers Zayde (grandfather) presiding over the Seder, or Bubbie (grandmother) lighting holiday candles . . . We are all links in that chain that goes back to the Exodus!

But how do we create a kid-friendly Seder?

First, remember that the Seder is for everyone. We learn by questioning, so encourage your children to ask questions. The Seder begins with the Four Questions, traditionally asked by the youngest child. When a person asks a question, they will be inclined to hear the answer!

Be excited about the Seder! You are your children's role model. Do you look forward to Pesach? Remind yourself that your feelings and actions create the atmosphere for this special holiday.

Your children may already know many of the songs and melodies for Passover—some of the ones you grew up with, some new ones. Encourage them to participate in the singing, and be willing to learn from them.

Choose a Haggadah that reflects your personal outlook. Did you grow up with the Maxwell House Haggadah? There are lots of new Haggadot with fun and creative ways to make the Seder more engaging for children (and adults!).

Get Passover story books for the kids now! Read them the stories before Pesach. This is way to share our tradition before the holiday.

Make a list of questions for discussion at the table. Passover marks the birth of the Jewish people. It is a time to reflect on the meaning, value, and implications of being Jewish. Here are some ideas—you will probably think of more:


- On a scale of 1-10, how important is being Jewish to you? Please explain.
- If you thought the existence of Israel was in danger, would you risk your life to help save it?
- What do you like about being Jewish? What don't you like?
- Is it important for your children to have Jewish friends? Why?
- Why is Pharaoh so stubborn? What would a good leader do?
- Why frogs?

Don't skip over the Ten Plagues. A Jewish story says that when the Egyptians drowned, the angels in heaven began to sing in praise of God. As God looked down on the waters closing over the Egyptians, God cried out, "How can you sing when My children are drowning?" Judaism teaches us that all people are children of God, even those enemies who would seek to destroy us. At this point of the Seder, we remove a drop of wine from our cups for each of the ten plagues. We do not allow ourselves to drink a full measure; our own lives are diminished by the recollection of this catastrophe. We express remorse that the Egyptians had to suffer such a terrible punishment. By removing these ten drops of wine, we mourn the loss of the Egyptians and express sorrow over their destruction.

For this Pesach: Be creative, add your own ideas and games, and decide what you want to be free to do. Then figure out what you need to get free *from* to reach that goal. May this Passover be a time when God, as your partner, helps to liberate you, so that you are able to be free to pursue your dreams!

IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

<u>Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)</u> In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a **perpetual endowment** fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to **Hineni**. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a **perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800** per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.

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
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
