

Words from the Co-Presidents

It is not surprising that Jews as a group do not recognize Valentine's Day. After all, Valentine's Day originated as a Christian feast day honoring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine, although it has become a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance, love and friendship in many regions of the world.

But the desire to celebrate love and friendship is a universal trait. In modern-day Israel, we understand that Tu B'Av, the fifteenth day of Av (usually occurring in August), is gradually becoming a Day of Love, slightly resembling Valentine's Day as commonly observed in English-speaking countries. BSBI has not had a Tu B'Av celebration, at least not yet.



As it happens, though, we do have our own tradition of celebrating friendship each January and February. Each year, the Sisterhood and Brotherhood organizations in our community take over a Shabbat service. Sisterhood and Brotherhood members lead significant portions of the service. Sisterhood usually provides a speaker; Brotherhood joins its Shabbat celebration with a World Wide Wrap of tefillin the following day. Both organizations usually sponsor a lunch afterward, although both have been forced by the Omicron surge to forego community lunches this year.

Sisterhood and Brotherhood are among the best examples of our members coming together on a voluntary basis to pursue religious, social, educational and social action opportunities. At their core, they are groups of friends sharing common interests and doing good for our community at the same time. We would not recognize our shul without them.

In the doldrums of Omicron and the heart of winter, we could all use reminding of our friends in the BSBI community. We hope you enjoy Sisterhood and Brotherhood shabbatot, and that, this year, they inspire you to make a special effort to reach out to friends, both those you see frequently and those you do not, to remind them that you care. Make a phone call or send a card; include a fond memory and a hope of things to come. You can create your own joy and share it with others. You may make a lasting impact on people you are lucky enough to call friends.

This Date in Jewish History

Shevat 30 **-** 1 Adar 27

- **30** Shevat *Der Judenstaat*, by Theodor Herzl, was published on this date in 1896. This book started modern political Zionism and led, fifty years later, to the establishment of the State of Israel.
- **8 Adar 1** Yahrzeit of Zacharias Frankel. He was the theologian who first created the philosophy of what would eventually become Conservative Judaism. He died on this date in 1875.
- 13 Adar 1 The Jewish Theological Seminary received its charter on this date in 1902.
- **26** Adar 1 The Jews of Newport, RI, purchased land for a cemetery in 1677, one hundred years before the land for the Touro Synagogue was purchased. In most Jewish communities, the purchase of a cemetery always comes before the building of a synagogue.

Faith, Hope, Prayer

"How can people be so dumb?"

Admit it, how many times have you said this while reading the news in the last twelve months? Every day it becomes more obvious that our position is correct, and the other side is completely crazy. Everything we read seems to point to this conclusion. Every story we hear online or in the media affirms that those who are on the other side of any issue are completely out of their minds. How is it possible that so many people have no idea how to really solve the problems this country faces?



As the cartoon character Pogo (long, long ago) once said, "We have met the enemy and he is us!"

When was the last time you read an article that you disagreed with and actually finished the article before you threw it down in disgust? When was the last time you had a real conversation about something important with someone whom you disagree with and not let it devolve into a shouting match? Why is it so hard to try and understand a point of view that is different from our own?

A Rabbi was watching two brothers play in the yard. The younger one said to the older one, "I bet I am taller than you!" The older brother said, "No, clearly I am taller. Just stand next to me and you will see." The younger one protested, "Well, you have had two years to grow ahead of me. Here, stand in the ditch and we can correct for our age difference." The Rabbi then interrupted. "Why have your brother stand in a ditch, why does your point of view require lowering your opponent? It would have the same effect if you yourself stood on a chair. Don't put your brother down; raise yourself up."


If you want to win a debate on an issue, learn the facts, not talking points. Focus on what makes your idea better rather than putting down the ideas of others. And when all else fails, there is the advice of the sage, Rabbi Shimon ben Gamaliel, in the Talmud. "Throughout my life, I was raised among scholars, and I have discovered that there is nothing that makes a person more beautiful than silence...Excess speech leads to sin."

Getting mad does not prove anything. Anger breeds more anger. Violence leads to more violence. In *Pirke Avot*, Rabbi Yehoshua teaches, "The begrudging eye, the evil impulse, and hatred of your fellow human being will ruin a person's life." Pushing someone down only shows how short your ideas are.

But the great sage Hillel, a man noted for his kindness and his even temper, teaches, "Do not withdraw from the community. Do not be sure of yourself until the day of your death. Don't judge your fellow human being until you stand in his place ..."

It is our duty to understand the position of others before we make a case for what we believe. It is our responsibility to really listen to the ideas of others. It is important to always be kind.

A Teaching Moment from Rabbi Alan: Is Twitter antithetical to our tradition?

Many people ask me, "What are you teaching to make Jewish education meaningful?" I respond with three words: breathing, ruach and silence.

I read an article in *Newsweek* magazine by Julia Baird, who professes the merit of silence. In her article "The Devil Loves Cell Phones," she writes: "It is not hard to imagine Hell as a place that is very, very noisy. In *The Screwtape Letters*, C. S. Lewis's Devil detests music and silence. Hell, he crows, is filled with furious noise: 'We will make the whole universe a noise...we have already made great strides in this direction as regards the Earth. The melodies and silences of Heaven will be shouted down in the end."

In the Middle Ages, Christian scholars believed that Satan did not want human beings to be alone with God, or with each other, fully alert and listening. This is why British author Sara Maitland believes the mobile phone is a "major breakthrough for the powers of Hell." It seems that as a whole society we are losing something precious (in our increasingly silence-avoiding culture—especially) in the midst of the clamor and din, the ever-mounting distraction of TV pundits yelling, tweeting, and Instagramming of our Internet age.

We can experience silence in ways so potent they become addictive: the magical quiet of swimming under the water, the uninterrupted hours after midnight, the sweet intimacy of a mother and her baby nursing. We often talk about distraction and the banality of culture that seems to smother deep thought. We tweet sneezes, we blink and record it for our friends, we desire to be the first to speak in class. The anonymity of the Internet has been replaced by hyper-identity. The idea of shutting up and staring at a pile of rocks or sand or blinking stars for hours seems almost counter-cultural.

Within Jewish tradition there are moments for privacy and times for community sharing. This holds true in our prayer settings, as well. The Amidah is a time to stand, think and contemplate. The prayers offered at this juncture of the service are meant to be inaudible to the person standing next to you. It is a time to hear your inner voice and allow God to decipher the meaning of your offering.

Personal thought need not always be public! The words of the Amidah are prescribed by rabbinic tradition as standing in silence, which is not something most of us do well. We fidget and lose concentration, and left to our own devices, our minds wander. The Amidah helps us to embrace silence, to enjoy the

momentary anonymity of blending in with others in the room, standing up but not standing out.

In this cold February month, take a quiet moment to gaze outdoors at the freshly fallen snow perched on the tree limbs and the fresh hippity-hoppity foot tracks of rabbits scurrying about. Take a deep breath of fresh air and listen to the silence. Don't ruin it by going inside to tweet, Facebook, or message your friends about having just done so. Some things are just better left unsaid.


Breathing, ruach and silence are Jewish actions that are being modelled in our school.





The BSBI Endowment Board of Trustees has periodically published Bulletin articles about Legacy Giving and our collective obligations to sustain, nurture and grow current programs and institutions for ourselves and for future generations.

As we move from 2021 to 2022 in the secular calendar, the BSBI Endowment Board of Trustees would like to thank our prior, present and potential donors and supporters. Prior Bulletin articles have discussed our collaboration with the Jewish Community Foundation. This collaboration allows us to offer charitable annuities and charitable remainder trusts as other options for our donors. The Jewish Community Foundation can also provide continuity of philanthropy to support Jewish causes in the future. Our working relationship with the Jewish Community Foundation had never been better and will continue to strengthen as we moved forward together.

The New Year is an opportune time to review some of the ways you can give to the BSBI Endowment. It is also a good time to be certain that your Will reflects your wishes and values with regards to the disposition of your assets at the time of death. A bequest to the BSBI Endowment can be made in your Will either as a specific dollar amount or as a percentage of assets. The BSBI Endowment may be the beneficiary of an existing paid up life insurance policy. Alternatively, a new life insurance policy can be purchased with the BSBI Endowment named as the beneficiary. Under certain circumstances the premiums for such a policy may be deductable to the extent provided by law. Loved ones can be memorialized with gifts to the Endowment.

In the past we have reviewed the use of QCDs [Qualified Charitable Distributions] from IRAs, Keogh, 403B or 401K plans if the owner of the assets qualifies. It is also possible to leave IRA assets to the Endowment at the time of death regardless of age. The residual of an estate can also be bequeathed to the Endowment. Over the years the BSBI Endowment had provided periodic educational opportunities about charitable giving and how you can help us sustain the institutions and programs that have helped enrich Jewish life East of the River.

IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

<u>Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)</u>
In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a **perpetual endowment** fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to **Hineni**. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a **perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800** per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.
