Faith, Hope, and Prayer



This year, Pesach has a deeper meaning for Jews than in past years. Most of the time we talk about Pesach as the journey from slavery to freedom; how our people were cruelly enslaved, how Pharoah would not let us

go, and how God (Moses is not mentioned in the Haggadah) with a strong arm fought on our behalf until we were free.

But this year is different. I know, "Why is this year different from all other years?" This year the discussion around our table is less about slavery and more about refugees. We understand that our people came to Egypt as economic refugees fleeing famine. Once they were out of Egypt, our people were still considered refugees from Egypt. We had no land of our own; our land was taken over by the Canaanites. We needed permission to traverse part of our journey from other nations and we were unwanted everywhere we turned. One of the first things that happened to our people, once they were out of Egypt, was being attacked from behind, in our weakest spot, by desert marauders in order to harass and loot the wandering refugees. This was our first encounter with the Amalekites. For their nasty attack when we were at our weakest moment, we were eventually commanded to wipe out that entire nation.

Think for a moment about refugees from the many countries who are traveling to the southern border of the United States. Think about how they are taken advantage of by narcotic cartels who see them as easy targets, by bandits who rob them of their few possessions, and the guides who take their money to get them to the border but leave them without food or water in the desert, or who lock them in trucks that are abandoned on the side of the road. But we don't need to just concentrate on our southern border. Refugees from Africa make a dangerous crossing of the Mediterranean Sea to get to a better life in Europe, and refugees from Lebanon and Syria are fleeing dire poverty and civil war. Rohingya refugees who are thrown out of Thailand because they are Muslem are now living in squalid refugee camps, one of which just burned down, leaving people with nothing. And of course, the Ukrainians are fleeing war in their own country.

The situation with refugees is perhaps more dire today than at any other time in recent history. This Pesach we need to remember the commandment to love the stranger because we were once strangers in the land of Egypt. We need to help the refugees of the world because we understand, after 2000 years without a homeland, what it means to be without a home. Our Social Action committee is working with CIRC (Connecticut Immigration and Refugee Coalition) to help resettle refugees in our state. We also work with HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society) which have done this work for over 100 years in the United States. Both organizations are in constant need of help; both need money and household items.

Let us spend some time at our Seder table thinking about our people as refugees and what we can do to help the refugees of today. The Jewish People, more than most, know what it means to be a refugee. As God stretched out the divine hand to help us, so too, we must stretch out our hands to those who need our help.

This was completely foreign to me. Not because we had a big family, but growing up with seders at my grandparents' apartment in the Bronx, the door was always open — and not just for Elijah. If my grandfather heard that someone didn't have somewhere to go for the seder, he would extend the invitation, and then tell my grandmother to prepare a bit more food. Our seders were always full.

And in the interest of having a "full seder," I hope that many of you will consider joining us for our Community Seder at BSBI on the second night of Pesach. Jack & Dawn Steigelfest, our Immediate Past Co-Presidents, have organized our community seders in the past, and we're so very lucky that they're taking the reins again this year.

Won't you join us?

It's on April 6th, and we're even starting early this year to make it more kid/family friendly. The seder will begin at 5:45, and the seder meal will be served around 7.

So whether or not you're planning your "escape plan" from a family gathering, think about our Community Seder. We'd love to have you ... the door is open.

B'dikat Hametz, The Search for Leaven Tuesday, April 4th at your home

After the house has been thoroughly cleaned and prepared for Pesach, we search again for any crumbs that may have been

missed; this serves as an educational ritual. Several pieces of hametz are "planted" around the house and then "found." This



is done in a ritualistic manner utilizing a feather, a wooden spoon, and a candle. The prayers to precede and follow the search may be found in your Haggadah. Be sure to include your children or grandchildren in this fun ritual.

Preparing for the Seder

Make sure to start your preparations early enough. Invite as a guest someone who is far from his or her home.

- Have uniform Haggadot for everyone at the table so all can participate in the seder without difficulty. These Haggadot are in addition to the decorative ones, or ones of special interest.
- Select, in advance, sections of the Haggadah to be assigned for individual reading in English by those who may not be able to follow the Hebrew.
- Rehearse *mah nishtanah* with the child who will ask the four questions.
- Suggest that one of the children prepare a talk for the seder on freedom in modern times. A token gift can be given in appreciation.
- A Jewish book or other Jewish item is an appropriate gift for the child finding the afikoman.

Focus On Freedom

It is interesting that the very holiday that celebrates freedom is the holiday that has us so encumbered by many laws. We think that freedom is about doing whatever we want. This is just not so. We live in a society and in a culture that limit us in



so many ways in order for us to be able to live together without the pain, frustration, and worry that are so much a part of living a social life. We have freedom of speech, but we still can't call out "Fire!" in a crowded building. We can move about freely, but our freedom ends where the body of our neighbor begins. We can do whatever we want, but we still can't hurt another person, steal from them, publicly embarrass them, or hurt their animals or property. These laws are designed so that we can live together without the many issues that arise when one person must interact with another.

But freedom is also a privilege that we all too often forget. We are so used to being free that we can't imagine what life might be without it. Slavery is still all too common in our world. According to a report, at any nail salon it is possible that the people working there are not free, that they owe money to the people who own the shop and somehow they never earn enough to buy their way to freedom. Their "owners" move them from shop to shop so they never learn that they can live their lives any other way.

Pesach is the one week a year that we affirm our freedom and affirm its value in our life. At the Seder we eat unleavened bread, the bread that slaves eat. We eat bitter herbs to remember the bitterness of slavery. We eat *haroset* to recall the mortar and bricks we were required to use to build cities for those who enslaved us. There is more that we should also remember: that our children, our babies, were thrown into the river so that we should not become "too numerous" for our masters. Sometimes our children were used to fill in the spaces between the bricks if a brick was not available. Sometimes our fellow Jews were whipped in anger, but they bore the lashes so that the old and the children should not have to suffer the lash.

Slavery may have changed, but freedom is still the same. The face of slavery is different; those who enslave others can still create evil in the world. Perhaps the worst slavery is when we enslave ourselves to bad habits, addictions, and anything that keeps us away from the people and places we love. The Hebrew word for Egypt is "Mitzraiyim." The word implies being stuck in a narrow place and we are unable to get out. Each of us has our own personal narrow place where we are stuck in life. Pesach is the time when we see where we are stuck, and we begin to move our lives so we can be free.

Let us commit this Pesach to work for freedom for modern slaves and for our own personal freedom from whatever has us stuck in life.

As Passover approaches, please check the various books about Passover in the Library. All Passover books have the call number 243.2 in both the Adult and Children's Library.

Some interesting facts that you might have not known about Passover:

- 1. It's one of the oldest holidays. The events that shaped the Passover holiday took place more than 3,500 years ago. That adds up to a lot of breadless days.
- 2. It's considered the most popular Jewish holiday. According to the Pew Portrait of American Jews, it's the most widely celebrated holiday among Jews (more than Yom Kippur and Hanukkah). Only about 23% of people surveyed said they attend religious services, but 70% said they take part in Passover Seders.
- 3. The date it's celebrated changes every year. Like many Jewish holidays, the date changes from year to year because it is dictated by the Jewish calendar. Passover begins on the 15th day of Nisan, which is the first month of the Jewish year.
- 4. The plate also includes two cooked items. The bone and egg have several meanings. A bone (zeroah) symbolizing the lamb offered as sacrifice at the Temple in Jerusalem and a hard-boiled egg to represent mourning the sacrifice. There is also a theory that the egg and bone represent Moses and Aaron, the two people responsible for getting the Jews out of Egypt.
- 5. Matzah is the sixth part of the Seder plate. At the start of the meal, a single piece of matzah is broken and called "the bread of affliction" to symbolize the meager rations given to the slaves. The matzah is also eaten because the people fleeing Egypt did not have time to wait for their dough to rise before making their escape.
- 6. The last day celebrates the arrival at the Red Sea. The final day of Passover celebrates when the freed slaves made it to the Red Sea, where Moses parted the water to help them get across. There is a tradition of women and girls lighting candles to commemorate this event.
- 7. Charoset ice cream exists. Ben & Jerry's makes a Kosher for Passover charoset ice cream flavor that's only sold in Israel. The flavor is described as "vanilla-based with apples, cinnamon, and lots of walnuts."
- 8. Kathmandu hosts the largest Seder every year. The world's largest Passover Seder takes place in Kathmandu, Nepal. Over 1,000 attendees from all over the world flock to the dinner where they bring in 1,000 bottles of kosher wine, 1,100 pounds of matzo, and a ton of other food from New York and Israel.
- 9. The world's largest matzah ball came from Arizona. Over 1,000 eggs, 25 pounds of chicken fat, and 125 pounds of matzo meal were used to create the world's largest matzah ball at a Jewish Food Festival in Tucson, Arizona back in 2010. It weighed 488 pounds.
- 10. There's also a Second Passover. Second Passover is held on the 14th day of the Hebrew month of Iyar, which is considered a make-up day for people who couldn't celebrate Passover the first time around.

A TEACHING MOMENT FROM RABBI ALAN

Liberate Yourself!

It is easy to become preoccupied with physical preparations for Passover, overlooking the spiritual side. The reality is that, in Judaism, the physical and spiritual aspects of observance are equally important. While you are organizing and scrubbing, take time to consider why you're taking all this extra trouble. What's this holiday about, anyway?

The answer is Freedom!

Everyone knows the ancient story of the liberation of the Hebrew slaves—the Exodus. But as we prepare for our Festival of Freedom, we should extend the meaning of liberty into modern life.

There are two types of freedom: freedom from and freedom to. Freedom from is the freedom from outside restriction—other people telling us what to do. Freedom to is being free to do something. The Torah tells us both are important. Moses tells Pharaoh: "Let my people go!" That is freedom from oppression and limitation. But mostly we forget the rest of the sentence: "Let my people go so that they may serve God!"

Besides thinking about what you want to be free from, think about what you want to be free to do: to have a more meaningful job; to have more love in your life; to feel healthier; or, as the Torah suggests, to do a better job of serving God in your life.



Once we know what we want to be free to do, we can figure out what we need to get free from in order to make that possible. Perhaps you need to be free from the wrong job, a poor relationship or circle of friends, a wrong set of beliefs. The external situation won't change until we liberate ourselves by having a clear picture of our situation and the right outlook.

There are good reasons to accept some constraints on our freedom. We accept the limitations of a job because we appreciate either the work itself or the money that we receive. We accept the boundaries on marriage because we appreciate the deeper love that can blossom within those rules. We accept the limitations of religion because we find meaning in those restrictions.

This Passover, figure out what you want to be free to do—the positive side, the goal. Then figure out what you need to get free from to be able to reach that goal.

May this Passover be a time when God helps liberate you, as God liberated our ancestors, thus enabling each of us to be free to pursue our dreams!

Jody and I wish all our members and the Jewish community a happy and meaningful Passover.





A Word From Our Brotherhood President



IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require

significant lead time to process the paper work, so

advanced planning may be necessary.

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
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
