
Faith, Hope and Prayer

After my high school graduation, when I went off to college, I began to realize that nothing in my life was going to be the same. The friends that I thought would be in my life forever moved on to other colleges and other cities. Decisions that I thought I had made about my future were suddenly up in the air as I tried to focus on what was really important in my life. For the first time, I really had no idea where my future would take me.

As I approach my retirement, I find I am in a similar situation. Many of my friends have retired and moved to other locations, or are still traveling around the country. Decisions that have guided my life for over 40 years are suddenly up in the air again. Once again, I have no idea where the future will be taking me.

It is, therefore, with a measure of both sadness and excitement, that my time has come to retire from the active rabbinate. This year will mark 40 years since my ordination in 1983. I have voted to let women be rabbis. I have seen the publication of three siddurim by our movement, each one better than the one before. My rabbinical school has had four chancellors and built two libraries. Today they only house a collection of rare books; the library is stored away and most of the volumes are available in digital format. I watched as cantors moved from old world music to modern music, to instrumental music, to spiritual music. I have watched the world move away from

religion, not realizing that we all need religion far more than we think.



I consider myself far ahead of my colleagues who just could not adjust to computers and the internet. My own children, rabbis themselves, are amazed that I have kept up with the world over the last 40 years. They have taught me to speak in gender-neutral terms, to not make assumptions about the lifestyle of the people I meet, and how to avoid microaggression in my speech. I am always looking to improve my rabbinic skills. It was never about me. It was always how I could serve the Jewish people and to serve God the best way I know how.

Now I am back to where I started over 40 years ago: not sure what the future holds. Not sure about what my life will look like in the near future. Now I have grandchildren to play with. Places to visit that I have long wished to see. Maybe to mentor a younger colleague as once I was mentored. God knows what the future is all about and, as always, I leave myself in God's hands.

This July I will begin the last year of my contract with BSBI. We will have one more chance to circle through the Jewish year together. It will then be time for another rabbi to pick up and carry our congregation forward. We have lots of time, over the next year and a half, to share some last special moments. And we still have lots of work to do together. I am looking forward for this last year together and waiting to learn what the year beyond will hold.

Beth Sholom B'nai Israel features an extensive collection of children's and teen's books. The collection is divided into 3 categories: JE, J and YA. The classifications are defined as follows: JE are Juvenile Easy Readers, and are mostly picture books, with usually a few lines of print. They're read-aloud books that a parent would read



print. They're read-aloud books that a parent would read to a child. J books are for younger children, but books that they can probably read themselves. YA are Young Adult books. They're generally chapter books, often about subjects that are more appropriate for grades 5 and up.

Several new books have been added to our collection:

Goodnight Sh'ma – JE 262 JUL – A little boy says the Sh'ma before he goes to bed.

Pinky Bloom and the Case of the Silent Shofar – YA F PRE – Penina "Pinky" Bloom is starting a pet-sitting business, which means she has even more cases than usual on her plate: a missing pet, a suspicious pet shop employee, and her dad's strangely silent shofar.

When Lightnin' Struck - YA F ROS - In Odessa, Texas, in 1927, eleven-year-old James is dealing with his family's streak of misfortunes, battling a school bully, and searching for his purpose in life when a family secret changes everything.

The Topsy-Turvy Bus – JE F PAN – Join a busload of kids on the Topsy-Turvy Bus as it travels around the country teaching communities the importance of taking care of the Earth

Hannah G. Solomon Dared to Make a Difference – YA 323 LIN – When Hannah G. Solomon looked around Chicago, the city where she was born, she saw unfairness all around her. When she grew up, she founded the National Council of Jewish Women — the first organization to unite Jewish women around the country—and fought to make life better for others

A Queen to the Rescue — YA B CHU — This picture book biography tells the story of Henrietta Szold, founder of the charity Hadassah. Disturbed by the prejudice and lack of opportunities she saw Jewish immigrants endure in the late 19th century, she opened a night school to teach English. In 1912 she founded Hadassah to provide Palestinian children of all faiths with much-needed food, health care, and education. Inspired by the Jewish story of Esther, she worked tirelessly to rescue Jewish children from Germany and the Soviet Union, saving over 11,000 children and finding them safe homes. Henrietta's story provides a model for social justice and how to work for it, no matter the obstacles.

The Stars will be my Nightlight – JE 243 HAL – When a boy and his mother spend the night in the sukkah and it begins to rain, she gently reassures her son that the sukkah will protect them just as it did their ancestors when they left Egypt.

Mrs. Noah's Doves – J F YOL – Mrs. Noah nurses injured birds and brings them on board the ark when the heavy rains come, saving a special mission for the doves.

Not only were the latkes and cookies delicious (hearty thanks to our latke makers and cookie bakers), but the entertainment, provided by the religious school students, was the highlight of the evening. The children sang the blessings outside as the menorah was lit, and then joined together on-stage for a medley of Hanukkah tunes, accompanied by Rabbi Alan Lefkowitz on guitar. That was followed by a delightful rap, "Judy Maccabee," composed by one of the students, which encouraged the audience to join in. To say that everyone was "kvelling" would be an understatement. Our gratitude to Rabbi Alan and his students for a delightful evening.

Thanks to the efforts of the synagogue Programming Committee, Room 1 has been repurposed into a comfortable lounge. It is the perfect spot to wait for children in the religious school, have a small meeting, or simply have a space to work or sit and chat with others.





A Teaching Moment from Rabbi Alan: New Year for the Trees

Judaism provides another New Year celebration: Tu BiShvat, the new year for trees. It has ancient origins, though at first rabbinic writing paid it little attention.

The Mishnah speaks of a new year for trees in the Hebrew month of Shvat—a date setting the beginning of the year's agricultural cycle. However, Tu BiShvat did not remain simply an agricultural anniversary. It came to be regarded as the day of Divine judgment on trees, when the fate of the trees was decided in heaven. Would they flourish and grow? Would they wither and shrink? Would they suffer from adverse weather and harmful insects, or would they stand up to all dangers? The language seems to echo the U-Netaneh Tokef passage of the High Holy Day liturgy.

In Judaism, trees were treated with great respect and even honor. Human life was likened to a tree. The Torah was called a Tree of Life (Etz Chaim). It was forbidden to dwell in a place where there were no trees. There was a custom to plant a cedar sapling when a boy was born, and a cypress on the birth of a girl: the cedar symbolized height and strength, the cypress tenderness and fragrance. As the children grew, they carefully tended their trees; and it was their own trees which were eventually used for their marriage canopy.

In the Diaspora, Tu BiShvat is celebrated as a tribute to the Holy Land. The day has become a feast-day for eating fruit, especially the types of fruit known in Israel. In Jewish mysticism, eating fruit on this day is a means of atoning for Adam's sin of eating the forbidden fruit. Everywhere, even in wintry northern regions such as New England, Tu BiShvat recalls the beloved homeland and symbolizes faith in the tree-like stability and indestructibility of the people of Israel.



For modern Israel, Tu BiShvat has become an ecological holiday, recognizing not only the beauty and dignity of trees, but their practical value in turning back the wilderness and bringing about the day when people shall say, "This land that was desolate has become like the Garden of Eden!"

We will be celebrating Tu BiShvat in our school on Thursday, February 2, as we will be learning about the value of trees and gifts of Israeli treats. On this day of celebration, it will be spring in Israel, and a reminder that spring will soon return to us as well.



Pesach Project Kicking off for an Eighth Year!

Last year, with your generous support, the Pesach Project netted an incredible \$10,193!! This initiative allows you to greet your fellow synagogue members with wishes for a sweet and joyous holiday. We will be asking you to continue this tradition, and later this month will be soliciting your participation online and via the mail. The details will be explained both in an email and in a letter to you.

On your behalf, we were able to fulfill the Passover mandate to feed the hungry in our midst. We were able to donate funds to Mazon and Leket. The remaining money went to our Sisterhood to further all the good work they do for our congregation.

Mazon is the Jewish Response to Hunger, a national nonprofit that works to end hunger among people of all faiths and backgrounds. Mazon, which means food in Hebrew, employs advocacy and education to raise awareness about the prevalence of hunger. Mazon also gives grants to anti-hunger organizations working on behalf of hungry people throughout America and Israel, including our own local food banks.

Leket is the largest food bank in Israel. It sources, collects and redistributes fresh quality perishables from farms, hotels, military bases and catering halls. Leket works with 195 nonprofits to provide nutritious food to over 175,000 Israelis weekly.

Our contributions to these anti-hunger organizations at Pesach fulfill the commandment of Maot Hittim, literally wheat money, which demands that we attend to the needs of the hungry at this time of our celebration of freedom. In the words of the Haggadah, "Let all who are hungry come and eat." This is especially important this year as various world events including COVID, inflation, and the war in Ukraine have had a devastating economic impact on many people worldwide. The donation DEADLINE is **March 29, 2023** so that we can get the greeting sent to everyone before the start of Pesach.



Leave a Jewish Legacy



The BSBI Endowment Board of Trustees has periodically published Bulletin articles about Legacy Giving and our collective obligations to sustain, nurture and grow current programs and institutions for ourselves and for future generations.

As we move from 2022 to 2023 in the secular calendar, the BSBI Endowment Board of Trustees would like to thank our prior, present and potential donors and supporters. Prior Bulletin articles have discussed our collaboration with the Jewish Community Foundation. This collaboration allows us to offer charitable annuities and charitable remainder trusts as other options for our donors. The Jewish Community Foundation can also provide continuity of philanthropy to support Jewish causes in the future. Our working relationship with the Jewish Community Foundation had never been better and will continue to strengthen as we moved forward together.

The New Year is an opportune time to review some of the ways you can give to the BSBI Endowment. It is also a good time to be certain that your Will reflects your wishes and values with regards to the disposition of your assets at the time of death. A bequest to the BSBI Endowment can be made in your Will either as a specific dollar amount or as a percentage of assets. The BSBI Endowment may be the beneficiary of an existing paid up life insurance policy. Alternatively, a new life insurance policy can be purchased with the BSBI Endowment named as the beneficiary. Under certain circumstances the premiums for such a policy may be deductable to the extent provided by law. Loved ones can be memorialized with gifts to the Endowment.

In the past we have reviewed the use of QCDs [Qualified Charitable Distributions] from IRAs, Keogh, 403B or 401K plans if the owner of the assets is over 701/2 years of age. It is also possible to leave IRA assets to the Endowment at the time of death regardless of age. The residual of an estate can also be bequeathed to the Endowment.

During the last calendar year the BSBI Endowment had provided periodic educational opportunities about charitable giving and how you can help us sustain the institutions and programs that have helped enrich Jewish life East of the River.

IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.




