

Faith, Hope and Prayer

"What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell as sweet." This is a famous line from Shakespeare's play, Romeo and Juliet. It is true, names are just a convention we use to identify specific things in our world. But Juliet knew, as we all know, that personal names are serious business. Movie stars change their names to look better on a marquee. Jews have been known to change their names to fit in better with the society in which they live. When a couple gets married, the change in names (or not) can tell us a lot about the kind of relationship they are building.





In both cases, people do not bear just their given name; the full name carries the names of the parents as well. Rather than a surname, Judaism recognizes each "David" "Sarah" or "Shmuel" by adding ben/bat and the name of the father and the mother as well. It is not enough to just know our given name; we need to know where we come from. My Hebrew name is Moshe Shmuel ben Eliezer v'Sheindle; I was named after my grandmother's father. But I was not that Moshe Shmuel; I was the son of Eliezer and Sheindle, so while I carried his name forward, I also carry the hopes and dreams of my parents. We had a family Bible in our house, and it contained all the Hebrew names of three generations.

It is important to know our full Hebrew/Jewish/Yiddish names. We use it at all formal Jewish moments: when called to the Torah, when we are sick and prayers are offered on our behalf, at weddings and at funerals. Maybe we think of ourselves as American, but behind the scenes we are also Jews, and we need to know the name we carry in that world as well.

If you know your full Hebrew name, great! You honor your parents in two ways, for the name they gave you and for the family they created for you. If you don't know your Hebrew name, now is a good time to ask family members who might know it to remind you of who you are. It changes nothing of our personality, but it reminds us of our heritage. If we have children, it is important that they know their Hebrew name and our names as well, because our name is a part of their name. There are cases where parents forgot or neglected to give their children Hebrew names. It is never too late. Come see your Rabbi, and we can figure out together what the best path for your family should be. Wherever you go in the world, your Hebrew name will connect you to the local Jewish community. Hebrew names are a powerful part of who we are. We should not neglect them. They make the rose of life smell even sweeter.

Now that the pandemic is waning, we can no longer count minyan attendees on Zoom, as part of the ten required. And while you may get a sense of self-satisfaction by doing this ... think about how meaningful and impactful it would be to the one who's waiting for that tenth person to walk in so they can say Kaddish. What a Mitzvah! You can sign up for Jewry Duty on our website.


Please, consider adding these to your list of resolutions ... well, the list of ones you don't break by January 2nd.

Rabbi Leon Wind Religious School Update

A Teaching Moment from Rabbi Alan

THE SHABBAT CANDLES

A young girl went to Hebrew school for the first time. Her grandparents wanted her to learn about the beauty of being Jewish. From the first day, the young girl liked Hebrew school. Each day she learned something new and was very excited.

One day she came home from school wanting to share what she had learned about Shabbat. "Mommy, Mommy, guess what I learned in Hebrew school today?" she began. "We learned that G-d made the world in six days and rested on the seventh day. You know what, Mommy? We should rest on Shabbat too." The mother patiently listened to her daughter and then said, "What you've learned is very nice, but we don't do things that way."

Another day the young girl came home and excitedly told her mother, "Mommy, today I learned that on Erev Shabbat the whole family eats dinner together, Shabbat candles are lit, and Kiddush is said because Shabbat is such a special day. And do you know what else? The whole family talks and sings together." The mother listened to her daughter and explained, "We are very busy during the weekend and don't have time to do those things."

A week later the young girl burst into the house on Sunday afternoon after Hebrew school and told her father, "Daddy, today I learned the Bracha to say over the Shabbat candles. I'm going to light candles on Shabbat the way Bubbie and Zadie would do." The father answered, "Oh, don't do that—it's so old-fashioned! There's no point in lighting candles."

Now the young girl was sure that if her parents could see the beauty of the Shabbat candles, they would understand what she felt. So, all week she thought, and thought, and thought some more, until she decided what to do.



On Friday afternoon she rushed home from school, cleaned the house, and swept the floors (as best a little girl could). She set the table with a clean white tablecloth, napkins, and dishes. Then she went to set up the candles for Shabbat. She knew where they were kept, up on the third shelf of the kitchen cabinet. So, she climbed up onto the countertop, opened the cabinet, and took down two Shabbat candles. They were in their own glass holders. She placed them on the table on a sheet of silver foil. Everything was ready for her parents. She knew they would be surprised and would finally understand what she was trying to tell them.

The sun was getting lower and lower in the sky, and she remembered that her teacher at Hebrew School told her that the candles had to be lit before sundown. It was getting late, and the little girl was waiting for her mother, but soon it would be too late. The little girl prepared to light the Shabbat candles. She covered her eyes and began, "Baruch atah Adoshem ..." She turned and saw both her parents standing in the dining room staring at her. She smiled and said, "I lit these candles for you because I love you." Then she heard her mother cry, "What are you doing? Those are yahrzeit candles!"

There are two lessons we can learn from this little story. The first one is that Shabbat is for families to be together. Our wise tradition tells us that parents and children should take time each week to relax and share a meal. Why not do it on Friday night? Erev Shabbat is a wonderful time for families to light candles, sing the brachot, and share a pleasant evening. Even little children can join in preparing for Shabbat—although they don't have to do it all themselves!

The second lesson is aimed more at parents. If we do not share the beauty, wonder, and warmth of our traditions with our children, then symbolically we are teaching them that it's okay for our traditions to fade away. As in the story, the children will light yahrzeit candles for Judaism; our rich and meaningful history will be just a passing thought to them.

Wishing you all a safe and happy winter full of the warmth of Jewish traditions!



Brotherhood's January Speaker: Jeremy Pressman

The January meeting will be on January 8th, 2023.

Our speaker will be Professor Jeremy Pressman from UConn. Jeremy Pressman writes about international relations, protests, the Arab-Israeli conflict, Middle East politics, and U.S. foreign policy. He co-founded and co-directs the Crowd Counting Consortium, an event counting project that has tallied and made publicly available data on all manner of protests in the U.S. since 2017. Pressman received his Ph.D. in political science from MIT and previously worked at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He has held fellowships at Harvard University, Brandeis University, the University of Sydney, the Humanities Institute at the UConn, and the Norwegian Nobel Institute, where he was a Fulbright fellow. As always, our meeting starts with morning services at 9:00 a.m. followed by breakfast and business meeting for members. After the business meeting, the congregation is welcome to join us to hear the speaker and a zoom link will also be provided.

On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.


