Faith, Hope, and Prayer

Just for the record, the fact that you might not have enjoyed your Religious School experience does not mean that your children will suffer through it, like you did. The fact that so many people gave up on Jewish learning after their Bar/Bat Mitzvah does not mean that everyone should stop Jewish learning at age 13.

Now that I have that out of the way, the question remains: what can we do, what should we do, to better understand our Judaism? And what role does it play in our lives even though we left learning behind many years ago? I often tell people that what put me on the path of Jewish learning that eventually grew into my life as a rabbi, was the idea that came to me when I was a teenager—that if Judaism was so uninteresting, why did it still exist? As a child, I attended a synagogue with a rabbi who had many great qualities, but educating children was not one of them. What I realized, as a teen, was that something was terribly wrong with my understanding of Judaism, and I needed to know what really made my faith worthwhile. In USY, my youth group, I found experienced teachers who helped me understand what a life of faith is all about. I have never stopped learning about Judaism since. (Thank you, Rabbi Mark Loeb z'l and Richard Friedman for saving me).

Jewish learning is a continuum; as we get older, we learn to examine Torah, prayer, and theology more deeply. We learn to think critically about Jewish law: how can it make our lives better? which parts are no longer appropriate for a modern world? We can try on mitzvot to see what effect they have in our life and how these actions affect others. We find new ways to find God and to understand God. We learn to see the world through Jewish eyes, eyes that see through what is false and destructive, and look ahead to a world where justice, compassion, and peace drive our decisions.

There are mystical secrets in Judaism, but to find them we need to graduate from the prerequisites of learning Torah and Jewish philosophy. We first get grounded in the day-to-day of Jewish life before we can begin to soar into the lofty realms of Jewish mysticism. There is also a level of maturity needed before we are ready to see the miracles behind the miracles.

In short, Judaism is a great treasure that belongs to all of us. It can enrich our lives, it can enrich our relationships, and it can enrich our understanding of the most puzzling and dangerous moments in our lives. For those who had a limited education as a child, it is never too late to come back and claim the treasure that is our faith. Its value is far beyond rubies.

Search Committee

The Rabbi Search—Overview

Dear Congregants,

By now you are all aware that in February, Rabbi Konigsburg announced his decision to retire at the end of the next liturgical year (June 30, 2024). In March, our president, Russ Benblatt, announced to the Board of Directors that he had appointed Mike Turk to head up the Rabbi Search Committee. The committee met in May to organize a timeline and schedule upcoming events, beginning this summer.

Since we are just beginning a complex series of tasks and events, it seems useful to provide a brief outline of what the search process entails, and where we are in that process.

When we conducted our last search, in 2015-16, we had two years' notice of Rabbi Plavin's retirement. This time, though, we have only about a year to find our next rabbi. As a result, we need to undertake a number of tasks within a very few months.

Our contact at United Synagogue tells us that the overall timeline has become compressed since our last search eight years ago; nowadays, rabbis seeking pulpits typically send their applications in October and November, with in-person weekends held in December and January. This is one or two months earlier than in our last search. In order to be proactive, the Search Committee plans to post our job listing with the Rabbinical Assembly in September.

Mike has already notified the RA that we will be seeking a new rabbi to succeed Rabbi Konigsburg. Committee members have also begun updating the lengthy questionnaire which must be submitted to the RA before we can post our job opening. This allows potential candidates to get a sense of our congregation before they decide to apply. The questionnaire requires us to describe our synagogue community in exhaustive detail, from our physical plant (describe the building; describe the sanctuary), to our finances (what salary will we offer the new rabbi?), to our religious services (which Siddur do we use? are our services egalitarian? do any congregants chant Torah and Haftorah?).

Although some of the RA's requirements have loosened up, new seminary graduates are still not eligible to become the sole rabbi of a smaller shul such as BSBI. We can expect that any applicants for our position will be experienced rabbis who have already spent some time in congregations.

In the meantime, the Search Committee needs to gather information from the congregation. This is where you come in! As in our last search, congregants will be asked first to respond to a survey, and then to attend an in-person Community Conversation. Your input and answers to questions will steer the committee's consideration of applicants. The accompanying article will explain this process in more detail.

Search Committee

The Rabbi Search—Congregational Input

Dear Congregants,

The search for a new rabbi is a complex process, but it begins with input from you, the members of BSBI. The Search Committee cannot even begin to compose a job description until we hear from you: your thoughts and priorities. What kind of rabbi do we need for the future of BSBI? What will be his or her most essential skills and characteristics?

We begin with two steps: a survey of your opinions, and an evening of conversation in small groups.

The First Step: A Congregational Survey

The first step in this process is for all members of the congregation to participate in a survey that will help us focus on the most important skills and attributes that we seek in a rabbi. We hope to achieve 100% participation in this survey; your thoughts and opinions are vital to this process.

The survey will be distributed via e-mail to those members who have computer capability; to those who don't, a paper survey will be made available upon request. The survey will be available for two weeks only, from June 6 to June 20. Please respond to the survey when it arrives in your email, and send us your results as soon as possible.

The survey is anonymous, and should take no more than a few minutes to complete. It is a small investment of your time, but it will have a lasting effect on the future of Beth Sholom B'nai Israel. Please fill it out and help shape our future!

The Second Step: An In-Person Conversation

As in our last search, we want to include as many members as possible in an in-person Community Conversation, to be held in late July. We recognize that some of you may be away on vacation at this time; however, the very limited timeline does not permit us to wait until autumn to gather this vital information.

Our Community Conversation will take place after minyan on Monday, July 24. It will be held in person at BSBI. We will gather in the Auditorium for a brief orientation, and then divide into small groups (15 or fewer) for more detailed conversations that will examine in detail which qualities we seek in our new rabbi.

Nu?

The information gleaned from both the survey and the Community Conversation will ensure that our questionnaire and our job listing reflect the priorities and opinions of a broad sample of our congregation, not merely the notions of a small committee. As before, Merle Cohen will organize the Community Conversation.

Because this issue of the *Bulletin* covers June and July, we are giving you this information in as timely a manner as possible. E-blasts and weekly emails will provide more detail as we move forward with this process. But for now, consider the survey and the Community Conversation to be your summer homework!

To clarify: when we get to the point in the process where job candidates will be invited to BSBI to spend Shabbat with us, we will ask the congregation to rate the applicants. But that's a few months down the road; for now, our focus is on the survey and the Conversation.

It is our hope that, with your participation in this process, BSBI will go from strength to strength!

David Alter, Librarian The Inventor's Dilemma: The Remarkable Life of H. Joseph Gerber by David Gerber

This month's book is about the extraordinary life and career of the twentieth-century inventor, technologist, and business magnate H. Joseph Gerber, a Holocaust survivor whose early experiences shaped his principles of invention. Gerber pioneered important developments in engineering, electronics, printing, apparel, aerospace, and numerous other areas, playing an essential role in the transformation of American industry. Gerber's story is remarkable and



inspiring; his method, redolent of Edison's and Sperry's, holds a key to a restored national economy and American creative vitality in the twenty-first century.

Gerber led an exciting and dramatic life, from his escape from the Nazis and his Horatio Alger-style rise from rags to riches in New York, to his first invention: a measuring device made from the elastic waistband of his pajamas. The book also details the start of his company, Gerber Scientific.

After arriving in Hartford, CT, Gerber completed high school in two years. He then won a scholarship to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI) in upstate New York, which he attended from age 19. As a junior at RPI, Gerber came up with a new kind of graphical numerical calculator, which he called a Gerber Variable Scale. This device looked like a slide rule, but used a triangular calibrated spring to make calculations.

In order to market his invention, Gerber formed the Gerber Scientific Instrument Company. While still in college, he turned to one of his former employers, who did a test sale of the new instrument, and then loaned Gerber \$3,000 to start his own company.

His most striking characteristic was his generosity. His goal was to invent products that helped people, not just make money. Gerber and his team were always interested in helping people and improving their lives, with the consideration that if they did, the money would come. A businessman who put people ahead of profits—what a novel idea. This was a man who worked every day of his life to help mankind, using his talents to make the world a better place.

And this is also a story of forgiveness. Despite what his family went through, regardless of all the suffering he experienced in his early life, Gerber always had faith in his fellow man, and always tried to help the world around him with kindness and generosity instead of the bitterness and rancor some might say he was entitled to feel.

A Teaching Moment From Rabbi Alan: Living with Direction

The Torah tells us the tragic story of a man who got into a fight because he didn't know where he was going. The story begins: "Now the son of an Israelite mother and an Egyptian father went out among the Israelites, and a fight broke out in the camp between him and an Israelite."

Our Jewish sages asked: Where did this fellow go? The verse says "And he went out," but it doesn't tell us anything about where he was headed—only that he was "among the Israelites," and he got into a fight.

The sages suggest that perhaps this man had no idea where he was going. They see him as a lost soul; perhaps he himself didn't know who he was or what he truly believed. He had no direction in life.

This often occurs in life today. When people have no direction, they sometimes go astray. If this poor soul had had a destination in mind when he "went out," perhaps he would have avoided the fight. But once he got off track, he started down a dangerous road and was ultimately lost forever.

Lewis Carroll's Alice in Wonderland includes a profound message. Alice doesn't know which path to choose, so she asks the Cheshire cat: "Would you tell me, please, which way I ought to go from here?" "That depends a good deal on where you want to get to," the cat responds. "I don't much care where," Alice answers. "Then it doesn't much matter," says the cat.

These stories remind us that every decision we make and every step we take ought to be guided by our desired destination. Wherever we go, let's make sure that we are headed toward God.

* * * * * * * * * * *

As we enter the summer vacation phase of our religious school, let's make the time to read to the children in our lives—to share stories from the Bible or other books that exhibit values such as kindness and faith. Have them read, too; our library is filled with engaging books for children. Remind them to read the Hebrew that they have worked so hard to master during the year. (A few minutes a day reading Hebrew avoids summertime rust.) They all have their Siddurim, so the text is close to hand.

Remember: your children today are your leaders tomorrow!


Torah Fund Dessert: Thank You!



IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require

significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.

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
